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There is another Friona team that won't be going to state this year, but not because they lost a game. It is because the state finals are being held in Waco at the same time the Junior and Senior Prom is being held in Friona.

The "players" had rather go to the prom. The "coach" is disappointed. His "team" has been to state finals in Waco for 12 consecutive years. In 1990, his "team" went on to the Nationals in Corpus Christi and placed first.

During the last 12 years of competition, 87 per cent of the "players" that entered went on to state. Of those, 95 per cent won

If you haven't figured it out yet, I'll explain.

The first time I ever heard Tommy Carr's name after I moved out here last year was from a State Trooper that had me stopped between Bovina and Friona for not wearing a seat belt.

In looking over my license, he noted the last name Carr and asked, "Is Tommy Carr your brother?"

"No", I answered, "my brother is Rick Carr. I don't even know Tommy Carr."

Tommy Carr is a good man. He is smart too. He has taught Industrial Arts at Friona High and what to buy for who. It is not School for 15 years.

In case you don't know what Industrial Arts is, in my day we called it Shop. Today the Texas Education Agency (TEA) is asking school districts to call it Industrial

But Tommy Carr ain't buying it. "It is Industrial Arts. The TEA sends curriculum information on bridge building and aircraft maintenance, etc., subjects that

> Tommy Carr graduated from Panhandle State University in Goodwell, Oklahoma 15 years ago with a degree in Industrial Arts. He has worked as Industrial Arts instructor at Friona since then.

Beginning students in one of his four wood classes can pick a mantle clock, bread box, or wall shelf as their first project. This allows them to train on the equipment and learn the terminology.

Parents and grandparents no doubt have a proud clock or bread box displayed at homes throughout Parmer County.

Second and third year students can select more advanced projects, grandfather clocks. entertainment centers, headboards, and dining room tables.

Many former students displaying one of these items at state competition in Waco, have finished in first place.

Carr teaches two drafting classes and four wood classes in cramped facilities in the ag and shop building north of the high

For ten years or more, he has needed more space. Every department at a school like Friona High School needs more of

The school board has to decide where to spend, where to expand,

"We just need room for more kids to work on more projects at the same time. For example, I used to let them build waterbed frames, but two waterbed frames take up almost all the shop space."

In this day of tight money, Carr sometimes finds himself standing in line for funds.

In 1990, when the Industrial Arts national competition was held in don't seem to have much relevance Corpus Christi, there was no ready

fund to pay for his state winners to go on to national. But the money was found. His team went to Corpus, and won first place.

Carr has managed to acquire two computers for his drafting class through school district budget

Former students have used Tommy Carr's teaching and patience to further careers. Students like Chad Rhodes, Chad Stovell, Charlie Pope, and Dan Neelley are in colleges and/or working in drafting firms in Hereford, College Station, and Lubbock.

"Ironically", he says, "Chad Stovell and Charlie Pope are working for firms in Hereford that are doing design work for the rebuilding of Hi-Pro in Friona after the tornado last year. I am proud of

And well he should be. Some of his former students have also involved themselves in homebuilding and remodeling.

There will always be a place for people who can build things with their hands, even if they use a computer to help. The computer can draw plans, but it won't ever be able to drill the hole or drive the

Teaching young people how to do that is still up to dedicated teachers like Tommy Carr.

Maybe some other schools will have a chance to win more at state this year. Lucky for them.

Here in Parmer County, because of a school dance, Tommy Carr and his team won't be there for the first time in 13 years.



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

'We found that 12 per cent of the Water District service area will need from two to four inches of moisture to bring the soils to field capacity. About 40 per cent of the area will need four to six inches of moisture, and 40 per cent will need six to eight inches of moisture. About eight per cent of the area needs eight to ten inches of moisture to refill the soil profile." says Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS soil scientist.

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube at each of the 293 monitoring sites within the 15-county Water District service area. Each site is chosen based upon the soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates potential well yields, and typical farming operations in the area.

Plant available soil moisture varies according to the previous crop produced at the site. For example, soil moisture from the one to five foot level ranged between 1.2 and 1.6 inches per foot for the four main crops grown within the Water District service area (corn, cotton, grain sorghum

Generally, each foot of soil has a capacity to hold about two inches of soil moisture, or a total of about ten inches in the five foot root zone

Historical data shows that above-average crop yields are more likely when the five foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity at planting.




