ORDINANCE REGUL-ATING AND LICENSING TAXICAB AND TAXICAB DRIVERS AND PROVID-ING PENALTIES FOR VIO-LATION THEREOF LATION THEREOF
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE

SECTION 22-1 Definitions. The following words and phrases when used in this ordinance have the meanings as set out herein; (a) CALL BOX STAND means a place alongside a street, or elsewhere where the Chief of Police has authorized a holder of a certificate of public convenience and neccessity to in-stall a telephone or call box

stall a telephone of call box for the taking of calls and the dispatching of taxicabs.

(b) CERTIFICATE means a certificate of public con-venience and necessity is-sued by the City Council, authorizing the holder thereof to conduct a taxicab business in the City of business in the City of

(c) DRIVER'S LICENSE means the permission granted by the Chief of Police to a person to drive a taxicab upon the streets of the City of Sonora.

(d) FLAG FEE means a

fee for responding to a call for a taxi which is payable regardless of whether or not the person calling uses the services of the responding

(e) HOLDER means a person to whom a certificate of public convenience and necessity has been issued.

(f) MANIFEST means a daily record prepared by a taxicab driver of all trips nade by said driver showng time and place of origin destination, number of passengers, and the amount of fare of each trip.

(g) OPEN STAND means

a public place alongside the curb of a street or elsewhere, in the City of Sonora which has been designated by the Chief of Police as eserved exclusively for the

(h) RATE CARD means a card approved by the Chief of Police for display in each taxicab which contains the rates of fare then in force.

(i) TAXICAB means a motor vehicle regularly engaged in the business of carrying passengers for hire, and not operated on a

fixed route.

(i) WAITING TIME means the time when a taxicab is not in motion from the time of acceptance of a passenger or passengers to the time of discharge, but does not include any time that the taxicab is not in motion if due to ay cause other than the request, act fault of a passenger or passengers.

SECTION 22-2. CERTIE ICATE OF PUBLIC CON-VENIENCE AND NECES-SITY REQUIRED. No per-

son shall operate or permit a taxicab owned or controlled taxicab owned or controlled by him to be operated as a vehicle for hire upon the streets of the City of Sonora without having first obtain-ed a certificate of public convenience and necessity from the City Council. SECTION 22-3; APPLI-CATION FOR CERTIFI-CATE. An application for a certificate shall be filed with

certificate shall be filed with the Chief of Police upon forms provided by the City of Sonora; and said applicaoath and shall furnish the following information. (a) The name and address

the applicant. (b) The financial status of the applicant, including the amounts of all unpaid judg-

ments against the applicant and the nature of the transaction or acts giving rise to said judgments. (c) The experience of the applicant, including the a-

applicant, including the amounts of passengers.

(d) Any facts which the applicant believes tend to prove that public convenience and necessity require the granting of a certificate.

(e) The number of vehicles to be operated or controlled by the applicant and the location of proposed depots and terminals. depots and terminals.

(f) The color scheme or

isignia to be used to designate the vehicle or vehicles

of the applicant.

(g) Such additional information as the Chif of Police of the City of Sonora may

SECTION 22-4; PUBLIC HEARING. Upon the filing of an application, the Chief of Police shall fix a time and place for public hearing before the City Council thereon. Notice of such hearing shall be given to the applicant and to all persons to whom certificates of public convenience and neces sity have been theretofore issued. Due notice shall issued. Due notice shall also be given the general public by posting a notice of such hearing in the Devil's River News. Any interested person may file with the Chief of Police a memorantion to the issuance of a

certificate. SECTION 22-5; ISSU-ANCE OF CERTIFICATE.
If the City Council finds that
further taxicab service in the City of Sonora is required by the public convenience and necessity and that the applicant is fit, willing, and able to perform such public trasportation and to conform to the provisions of this ordinance and the rules promulgated by the City Council, then the city Coun-cil shall issue a certificate stating the name and address of the applicant, the number of vehicles authorized under said certificate and the date of issuance; otherwise, the application shall be denied

In making the above find-ing, the City Council shall take into consideration the

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number of taxicabs already in operation, whether existing transportation is adequate to meet the public need, the probable effect of increased service on local traffic condition, and the character, experience, and responsibility of the appli-

SECTION 22-6; LIABIL-ITY INSURANCE REQUIR-ED. No certificate of public convenience and necessity shall be issued or continued in operation unless there is in full force and effect a liability insurance policy issued by an insurance com-pany authorized to do busipany authorized to do business in the State of Texas providing liability insurance for each vehicle in the amount of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for bodily injury to any person; and the amount of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) for injuries to more than one person which are sustained in the same accident and one Hundred Thousand Dollars Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for property damage resulting from any one accident; each vehicle shall also be covered by an insurance policy providing uninsured motorists protection in the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for bodily in-

jury to any one person, in the amount of Twenty Thou-sand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for injuries to more than one person which is sustained in he same accident and Ten housand Dollars Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for property damage resulting from any one accident. Proof of the foregoing liability insurance shall accompany the application for a Certificate for the same accident.

Public Convenience and

Necessity

SECTION 22-7; LICENSE FEES. No certificate shall be issued or continued in operation unless the holder thereof has paid an annual license fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50,00) for the right to engage in the taxicab business and Twenty Five Dol-lars (25.00) for each for each additional vehicle operated under a certificate of public convenience and necessity. Said license fees shall be for the calendar year and shall be in addition to any other license fees or charges es-tablished by proper author-ity and applicable to said holder or the vehicle or vehicles under its operation and control. In addition to the foregoing license fees, the holder of each certificate shall pay to the City of Sonora a fee of equivalent to Two percent (2 percent) of the holder's gross income from the operating of the taxicab business, which sum shall be payable quarterly, on January 15th, April 15th, July 15th and Septem-

ber 15th of each year FER OF CERTIFICATES.
No certificate of public convenience and necessity may pe sold, assigned, mortgag-ed or otherwise transferred without the consent of the

City Council. SECTION 22-9; SUSPEN-SION AND REVOCATION CERTIFICATES. certificate issued under the provisions of this ordinance may be revoked or suspend-ed by the Chief of Police if the person holding the certificate has discontinued operation for more than thirty (30) days, or if the person holding the certificate or any of his agents or amployees have (a) violated cate or any or his agents or employees have (a) violated any of the provisions of this ordinance; (b) violated any ordinances of the City of Sonora, or the laws of the United States or the State of Texas, the violations of which reflect unfavorably on the fitness of the holder to the fitness of the holder to

offer public transportation. Prior to suspension revocation, the holder shall be given notice of the proposed action to be taken and shall have an opportun-

ity to be heard before the City Council.
SECTION 22-10; TAXI-CAB DRIVER'S LICENSE. No person shall operate a taxicab for hire upon the streets of the City of Sonora, and no person who owns or controls a taxicab shall permit it to be so driven, and no taxicab licensed by the City of Sonora shall be so driven at any time for hire, unless the driver of said taxicab shall have first obtained and shall have then in force a taxicab driver's license issued under the provisions of

this ordinance. SECTION 22-11; APPLICATION FOR DIRVER'S LICENSE. An application for a taxicab driver's license shall be filed with the Chief of Police on forms provided by the City of Sonora; and such applica-tion shall be verified under oath and shall contain the

following information:
(a) The names and addresses of four (4) residents of the State of Texas who have known applicant for a period of three (3) years and who will vouch for the sobriety, honesty and general good character of the applicant.

(b) The experience of the applicant in the transportation of passengers.
(c) The educational back-

ground of the applicant. (d) A consise history of the applicant's employ-Each application shall be

accompanied by a certificate from a reputable physician of the City of Sonora certi-fying that, in his opinion, the applicant is not afflicted with any disease or infirmity which might make him an unsafe or unsatisfactory At the time the application is filed the applicant shall pay to the Chief Police the sum of Five ollars (\$5.00).

SECTION 22-12; EXAMINATION OF APPLICANT-CURRENT STATE MOTOR VEHICLE OPERATOR'S PERMIT REQUIRED. Be-fore any application is final-ly passed upon by the Chief of Police the applicant shall be required to pass a satisfactory examination as to his knowledge of the City and to show that he has a current chauffeur's license of ssued by the State of

SECTION 22-13; POLICE INVESTIGATION OF AP-PLICANT - TRAFFIC AND POLICE RECORD. The Police Department shall conduct an investigation of each applicant for a taxicab driver's license and a report of such investigation and copy of the traffic and police record of the applicant, if

record of the applicant, if any, shall be attached to the application for the consideration of the Chief of Police.
SECTION 22-14; CONSIDERATION OF APPLICATION. The Chief of Police, upon consideration of the application and the reports. application and the reports and certificate required to be attached hereto, shall approve or reject the application. If the application is rejected, the applicant may request a personal appear-ance before the Chief of Police to offer evidence why his application should be

reconsidered.
SECTION 22-15; ISSUANCE OF LICENSEDURATION-ANNUAL FEE. Upon approval of an application for a taxicab driver's license the Chief of Police shall issue a license to the applicant which shall bear the name, address, race, age, signature and photograph of the applicant.

Such license shall be in

effect for the remainder of the calendar year. A license for every calendar year thereafter shall issue upon the payment of Five Dollars (\$5.00) unless the license for the preceding year has

for the preceding year has been revoked.

SECTION 22-16; DIS-PLAY OF LICENSE. Every driver licensed under this ordinance shall post his driver's license in such a driver's license in such place as to be in full view of all passengers while such driver is operating a taxi-

SECTION 22-17; SUS-PENSION AND REVOCA-TION OF LICENSE. the Chief of Police is hereby given the authority to suspend any driver's license issued under this ordinance for a driver's failing or refusing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, such suspension to last for a period of not more than period of not more than thirty (30) days. The Chief

of Police is also given authority to revoke any driver's license for failure to comply with the provisions of this ordinance. However, a license may not be revoked unless the driver has received notice and has had an opportunity to present vehicle.
(b) Prohibited Solicita-

an opportunity to present evidence in his behalf. SECTION 22-18; FAIL-LURE TO COMPLY WITH CITY, STATE AND FED-ERAL LAWS. Every driver licensed under this ordinan ce shall comply with all City, State, and Federal laws. Failure to do so will justify the Chief of Police in suspending or revoking a

suspending of Tevoring a license.
SECTION 22-19; VEHIC-LES-EQUIPMENT AND MAINTENANCE.

(a) Vehicles Must Be Licensed. Prior to the use and operation of any vehicle under the provisions of this under the provisions of this ordinance said vehicle shall ordinance said vehicle shall be thoroughly examined and inspected by the police Department or such person as the Chief of Police shall designate and found to comply with such reasonable rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the Chief of Police. These rules and regulations shall be promulgated to provide safe transportation and shall specify such safety equipspecify such safety equip-ment and regulatory devices as the Chief of Police shall deem necessary therefor.
When the Police Depart ment finds that a vehicle has met the standards es

has met the standards es-tablished by the Chief of Police, the Department shall issue a license to that effect, which shall also state the authorized seating capacity of said vehicle.
(b) Periodic Inspections. Every vehicle operating un-der this ordinance shall be

periodically inspected by the Police Department or such person as may be designated by the Chief of Police at such intervals as shall be established by the Chief of Police to insure the continued maintenance of safe operating conditions.
(c) Vehicles Must Be

Kept in a Clean and Sanitary Condition. Every vehicle operating under this ordinance shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition according to rules and regulations promulgated by the Chief of Police.

SECTION 22-20; DESIGNATION OF TAXICABS. Each taxicab shall bear on each side, in painted letters not less than four (4) inches nor more than five (5) inches in height, the name of the owner; and in addition, may bear an identify-ing design approved by the Chief of Police. No vehicle covered by the terms of this ordinance shall be licensed whose color scheme, identifying design, monogram, or insignia to be used thereon shall, in the opinion of the Chief of Police, conflict with identifying design, mono-ram or insignia used on a vehicle or vehicles already operating under the ordi-nance, in such a manner as to be misleading or tend to to be misleading or tend to deceive the public; and provided further, that if, after a license has been issued for a taxicab hereunder, the color scheme, identifying design, monogram, or insignia thereof is changed so as to be, in the opinion of the Chief of Police, in conflict with or imitate any color scheme, identifying design, monogram, or insignia used by any other person, owner or operator, in such a manner as to be misleading or tend to deceive the public, the license of or certificate covering such taxicab or taxiering such taxicab or taxi-cabs shall be suspended or

SECTION 22-21; RATES OF FARE-RATE CARD RE-QUESTED. No owner or driver of a taxicab shall charge a greater sum for the use of a taxicab than in accordance with the follow-

ing rates:

(a) Flag Fee: One Dollar and fifty Cents (\$1.50).

(b) Mileage Rates: seven and Five-tenths Cents (\$0.75) vertenths of seven and five tenths of seven tenths. (\$.075) per one-tenth of a

mile.
(c) Waiting Time: Twenty
Cents (\$.20 per minute of

waiting time.

Every taxicab operated under this ordinance shall have a rate card setting for the authorized rates of fare displayed in such a place as to be in view of all passenge. to be in view of all passeng-

SECTION 22-22; RE-CEIPTS. The driver of any taxicab shall upon demand by the passenger render to such passenger a receipt for the amount charged, either by a mechanically printed receipt or by a specially prepared receipt on which shall be the name of the shall be the name of the owner, license number or motor number, amount of meter reading or charges and date of transaction.

SECTION 22-23; SOLICITATION, ACCEPTANCE AND DISCHARGE OF PASSENGERS.

(a) Solicitation of Passen.

(a) Solicitation of Passen-gers by Driver. No driver shall solicit passengers for a taxicab except when sitting in the driver's compartment of such taxicab or while or such taxicab or white standing immediately adja-cent to the curb side therof. The driver of any taxicab shall remain in the driver's compartment or immediate-ly adjacent to his taxicab for not more than ten (10) consecutive minutes, and provided further that nothing herein contained shall

be held to prohibit any dirver from a lighting to the street or sidewalk for the purpose of assisting pas-sengers into or out of such

(b) Prohibited Solicita-tion. No driver shall solicit patronage in a loud or annoying tone of voice or by sign or in any manner annoy any person or obstruct the movement of any persons, or follow any person for the purpose of soliciting patro-

nage.

(c) Receipt and Discharge of Passengers on Sidewalk Only. Drivers of taxicabs shall not receive or dischar ge passengers in the road-way but shall pull up to the right-hand sidewalk as nearly as possible, or, in the absence of a sidewalk, to the extreme right-hand side of the road and there receive or discharge passengers, except upon one-way streets, where passengers may be discharged at either the right or left-hand sidewalk, or side of the roadway in the absence of a sidewalk.

(d) Additional Passen-

gers. No driver shall permit any other person to occupy or ride in said taxicab, unless the person or the persons first employing the taxicab shall consent to the acceptance of additional passenger or passengers. No charge shall be made for an additional passenger except when the additional passenger rides beyond the previous passenger's desti-nation and then only for the In the event additional passenger rides beyond a previous passen-ger's destination, no addi-tional flag fee may be

(e) Restriction on Number of Passengers. No driver shall permit more persons to be carried in a taxicab as passengers than the rated seating capacity of his taxi-cab as stated in the license for said vehicle issued by the Police Department. A child in arms shall not be counted as a passenger.

(f) Refusal to Carry Ord-erly Passengers Prohibited. No driver shall refuse or neglect to convey any orderly person or persons, upon request, unless previously engaged or unable or forbidden by the provisions of this ordinance to do so. Nothing contained herein shall require any driver to convey any disorderly person or persons.

(g) Prohibitions of Drivers. It shall be a violation of

ers. It shall be a violation of this ordinance for any driver of a taxicab to solicit busi-ness for any hotel or motel or attempt to divert patrons from one hotel or motel to another. Neither shall such driver engage in selling intoxicating liquors or solicit business for any prostitute or use his vehicle for any transporting of passengers and their baggage or the delivery of packages.
(h) Prohibition of Passen-

gers. It shall be unlawful for the driver of any taxicab to permit any person or perons to ride on the exterior of such vehicle while the same is in motion, and it shall be unlawful for any person to ride on the exter-ior of such vehicle when the

or of such vehicle when the same is in motion.
SECTION 22-24; OPEN STANDS- ESTABLISH-MENT - USE.

(a) Establishment. The City Council of the City of Sonora is hereby authorized to establish open stands in such place or places them. such place or places upon the streets of the City of Sonora as it deems neces-sary for the use of taxicabs operated in the City. The City Council shall not create an open stand without taking into consideration need for such stand by taxicab companies and the convenience to the general public. The City Council shall prescribe the number of taxicabs that shall occupy such open stands. The City Council shall not create an open stand in front of any place of business where the abutting property owners object to the same or where such stand would tend to create a traffic hazard.

(b) Use. Open stands shall be used by the different drivers on a first come, first served basis. The driver shall pull on to the open stand from the rear and shall advance forward as the taxicab ahead pull off. Drivers shall stay within five feet of their taxicabs; they shall not solicit passengers or engage in loud or boisterous talk while at an open stand. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as preventing a passenger from boarding the taxicab of his choice that is parked at an open stand. SECTION 22-25; CALL BOX STANDS - ESTABLISHMENT - USE.

(a) Establishment. The Chief of police is hereby authorized and empowered to establish call box stands upon the streets of Sonora, rexas, in such places as in its discretion he deems proper. A holder desiring to establish a call box stand shall make written application to the Chief of Police. The applicant must attach to the application the application that the application to the application th the application the written approval of the abutting property owners of said space, consenting to the creating of such stand. Upon filing of the application, the Police Department shall make an investigation shall make an investigation

of the traffic conditions at

said place and shall there-after file their written re-commendation to the Chief of Police. The Chief of Police shall then either grant or refuse the applica-tion. When a call box stand has been established as has been established as herein provided, it shall be used solely by the holder to whom the same was granted and his agents and employ-ees and no other holder shall be permitted to use the same; PROVIDED HOW-EVER, that no holder shall obtain permits for more than five (5) such closed stands within the downtown

business area.

(b) Use. A holder operating a call box stand as provided for in this ordinance shall be allowed to have on duty at such stand, a starter, or other employee, for the purpose of assisting the loading or unloading of passengers from taxi-cabs, for receiving calls and dispatching taxicabs, and for soliciting passengers at such stand. The words "at such stand" shall mean that part of the sidewalk immediately adjacent to and of equal length with such call box stand. It shall be unlawful for any such start-er or other employee to go beyond the area herein designated for the purpose of iciting passengers or as-

solicting passengers or as-sisting them in boarding such taxicabs. SECTION 22-26; PRO-HIBITIONS OF OTHER VEHICLES. Private or other vehicles for hire shall not at any time occupy the space upon the streets that has been extablished as either open stands or call box stands. SECTION 22-27; TAXI-

CAB SERVICE. All persons engaged in the taxicab busiengaged in the taxicab obsi-ness in the City of Sonora operating under the provi-sions of this ordinance shall render an over-all service to the public desiring to use taxicabs. Holders of certifi-cates of public convenience and necessity shall maintain a central place of business and keep the same open twenty-four hours a day for the purpose of receiving calls and dispatching taxicabs. They shall answer all calls received by them for services inside the corporate limits of the City of Sonora as soon as they can do so; if said ser-vices cannot be rendered withing a reasonable time, they shall then notify the they shall then hotify the prospective passengers as to how long it will be before the said call can be answerand give the reason therefor. Any holder who shall refuse to accept a call anywhere in the corporate limits of the City of Sonora, at any time when such holder has available taxi-

to such holder shall be revoked at the discretion of the Chief of Police. SECTION 22-28; MANI-FESTS. Every driver shall maintain a daily manifest upon which are recorded all trips made each day, show-ing time and place of origin and destination of each trip and amount of fare and all such completed manifests shall be returned to the owner by the driver at the conclusion of his tour of duty. The forms for each manifest shall be furnished to the driver by the owner. to the driver by the owner and shall be of a character approved by the Chief of

Said reports shall reach the City Manager's office on or before January 15th, April 15th, July 15th, and September 15th of each year. vear

(c) All accidents arising from or in connection with the operation of taxicabs which result in death or which result in death or injury to any person, or in damage to any vehicle, or to any property in an amount exceeding the sum of Two mundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00), shall be reported within twenty-four (24) hours from the time of occurrence to the Police Department in a form of report to be furnished by said department.

(d) It shall be mandatory

(d) It shall be mandatory for all holders to file with the City Manager copies of all contracts, agreements,

arrangements, memoranda, or other wiritings relating to the furnishing of taxicab service to any hotel, theater, hall, public resort, railway station or other place of public gathering, whether public gathering, whether such arrangement is made with the holder or any corporation, firm, or association with which the holder may be interested or er may be interested or connected. Failure to file such copies within seven (7) days shall be sufficient cause for the revocation of a certificate of any offending holder or the cancellation of any taxicab stand privileg-

SECTION 22-30; ADVER-TISING. Subject to the rules and regulations pre-scribed by the Chief of Police, it shall be lawful for any person owning or opera-ting a taxicab or motor vehicle for hire to permit advertising matter to be affixed to or installed in or on such taxicabs or motor however, no such advertising matter shall interfere with the driver's vision or project from the vehicle in such a manner as to be

SECTION 22-31 : POLICE DEPARTMENT - DUTY TO ENDORCE ORDINANCE. The Police Department of the City of Sonora is hereby given the authority and is instructed to watch and observe the conduct of holders and drivers operating under this ordinance. Upon discovering a violation of the Provisions of this ordinance, the Police Department shall report the same to the Chief of Police, which will order or take appropriate

action. SECTION 22-32; PENAL-TY. Any person who intentionally, knowingly, recklessly or with criminal negligence violates any provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon con-

KCTV Begins Construction " Of New Tower

Construction of a new tower and transmitter facility, scheduled to begin in May, will virtually double the coverage area of KCTV channel 8 of San Angelo.

When operational in September, the \$1.5 million facility will improve the station's signal in its current five-county area while expanding coverage into all or parts of 12 other coun-

tries.
"This facility has been in the planning stage several years," said Gil Schneider, KCTV General Manager. "We are proud that before long we will be able to provide the finest in viewing and service to a much greater part of Central WEst Texas."

Schneider explained that the facility will consist of a 1,400-foot tower located 24 miles southeast of San Angelo. A 95-foot antenna will be located on top of the tower with the transmitter housed at the base of the

Effective radiated power of the proposed installation will be 316,000 watts, seven times the current power. KCTV presently telecasts from 446-foot tower located at its studio site at 2800 Armstrong.

signal. "Along with tranmitting a clear signal in areas for-merly in KCTV's fringe," said Schneider, "the station will also expand its news programs to provide

local coverage to viewers in our new service area."
An added feature of the new transmitter will be the VIR, or Vertical Interval Reference signal, which automatically controls the color on those sets equipped with VIR circuitry.

According to KCTV Chief Engineer Eddy Smith, VIR was introduced a few years ago as a means for broadcast stations t maintain correct color and tint levels from the control room to the receiving set.

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


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
