### **School Board Discusses Long-Range Plan During Special Session**

The Sonora Independent School District Board of Trustees and concerned citizens met with a representative from a planning corpora-tion for the purpose of discussing long-range expansion for the school in a special meeting Monday, Octo-

Gary Keep, vice-president of SHWC, Inc. of Dallas has begun research of the growth of Sonora in order to help the Board plan for immediate and long-range needs.

Keep has met with different oil-related businesses and plans to talk to the County Commissioners, City Council and utility companies to help plan the long-range growth of Sonora.

The School Board and citizens discussed different options that the school could possibly follow to help the growing problem of crowded classrooms, cafeteria and play area for the children.

One immediate problem the board asked Keep to consider was the crowded cafeteria situation.

The possibility of building a new high school complete with gymnasium, band hall and vocational buildings at a rew location was discussed. This would leave the present facilities to be used by the junior high students.

A new location for the high school would alleviate some of the traffic problems around the school, which vas a major concern of board member Mary Adele Balch.

The problem of finding enough land, which was a major problem when the board considered building the present junior high building, was also discussed by the board members and citizens. Keep said that 40-50 acres would be needed to build a high school complete with athletic facilities at a new location.

Keep said that if the board members came to any decision by the spring semester of 1982, the new structures would not be completed until the fall semester of 1984.

Superintendent Wendell Mc-Andres and board members asked that any suggestions citizens may have would be welcome.


Keep said that he would meet again with school board members after a further investigation of the situation could be taken. meeting will be announced at a later

A blasting accident near Valero Transmission Company resulted in the death of one man Friday morning, October 23.

James Robert Taylor, 38, was announced dead on the scene by Justice of the Peace Herman Moore about 9:30 Friday morning.

#### **Reports from** Washington

#### The New Fiscal Year

October 1 was the beginning of the Federal fiscal year, the first that will bear the stamp of the Reagan Administration. This date also marked the symbolic beginning for the central policies of an Administration and Congress dedicated to an historic turnaround in the role of the Federal government in American life.

We have accomplished so much in our first legislative offensive of last summer that virtually every American will benefit by the tax and budget cuts pushed through Congress.

I am well aware that some critics have described the new economic policies as a war on the poor. I do not think that is an appropriate description. What we have is a quest for resurrecting the American dream for every citizen, especially the less fortunate Americans. For those who would suggest that what we are doing is wrong, I must ask what their alternative is.

President Reagan inherited an economy wracked by a decade of accelerating inflation unparalleled in this nation's peacetime history. This inflation had unbalanced the financial system, undermined productive investment and insidiously raised tax rates to the point where it was obvious that inflation is an impediment rather than a stimulus to real growth.

Let's look at the facts: One is that in just four years, from 1977 to 1981, we experienced the rate of inflation jumping from 4.8 percent to two years of back-to-back, double-digit rates for the first time in our history. During that same time we went from interest rates well below 10 percent to the 20 percent level and beyond — the highest in a century.

What is obvious is that the old types of economic programs did not assist the American people at large, and they certainly did not provide real and lasting assistance to the poor and truly needy. Rather, economic programs caused our economy to falter, sputter and fail. And, our nation cannot care for its own as long

We are now seeing the middle-income taxpayer, the enterprise base of our economy, develop the voice they should have had long ago in the equation of government spending. By tax reduction taxpayers have more cash in their pockets. These middle-income taxpayers have been the hardest hit historically because their tax dollars have paid for wasteful Federal spending programs.

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





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Chaloupka said. Presently. the Texas Constitution reads: "farm products in the hands of the producer are exempt from all taxation...". However, in 1976. former Texas Attorney General John Hill ruled that livestock and poultry are not "farm products" and thus could be taxed.

"Passage of this a-mendment will eliminate the inequity caused by that decision." the Farm Bureau president said.



# **RRC Sets Disposal Standards**

The Railroad Commission has ordered operators of disposal and injection in the Sour Lake Field, Hardin County, to renew their permits within

Before injection is begun, a survey must be conducted to ensure that he injected material can only enter underground strata approved by the permit. The same test must be conducted annually. Permit renewal will furoil and gas operations for the Oil and Gas Division. However, this restriction will not apply to RRCapproved enhanced recovery operations or for fluids used only for well stimula-

The order states that if the injected material is not confined to the approved strata, RRC authorization will be suspended and injection stopped until all fluid migration from the strata is eliminated.

The renewal requirement is the result of a Commission-called hearing to review existing permits for saltwater disposal wells and injection wells in the Sout Lake Field. The hearing was called after a rise in the level of water in a sinkhole in the field was

noted in June of 1980. Commission personnel investigating the area

tound casing leaks in several active, permitted disposal wells in the area. Some leaks were repaired by the operator. In other cases, the wells were sealed in by the Commis-

One operator in the field found and plugged an old well in the sinkhole. Since then. Commission personnel have found no overflow of saltwater from the sinkhole, and the water level continues to drop.

An analysis of water samples collected in the sinkhole area indicated that water quality is not being harmed as a result of the sinkhole.

The Sour Lake Field currently produces about one million barrels of oil each year. Water produced with the oil is expected to increase from the current level of about seven billion barrels annually.

Produced water is put back into the ground through disposal or injection wells in the area

**Texas State Lease Production Up** 

Railroad Commission Chariman Jim Nugent announced that State leases in bays, inlets and the Gulf of Mexico produced 85,294 barrels of crude oil during August 1981, in contrast to 50,967 barrels in the same month of 1980 and 98,960 barrels in July 1981.

Gas well gas production from state leases amounted to 18,853,887 Mcf in August against 17,894,139 Mcf a year earlier and 20,072,450 Mcf in July. Casinghead gas production totaled 274,074 Mcf in August against 169,087 Mcf in the same month of 1980 and 286,819 Mcf in

July. Condensate production from state leases amounted to 57,052 barrels in August, down from 81,769 barrels a year earlier and down from

66,166 barrels in July. In August, offshore crude production was approximately .11 percent of the total estimated crude production in Texas. Offshore gas well gas production was approximately four percent of the state total.

#### Age Of Interest To Rancher, Hunter

The age of a deer is of interest to both the landowner and the hunter. This interest is more than simple curiosity. Many things which measure deer quality and welfare are related to

On nearly all deer ranges in Texas, the food supply is the most critical element in the habitat. When deer numbers are not in balance with available food, inadequate nutrition is reflected in the herd by poor body condition, reduced reproductive efficeincy and undesirable antler character-

The massiveness of the antlers, rather than the number of points usually is related to age but is more strongly influenced by nutrition. A well-fed yearling could be an eight-point buck, but a poorly fed 7-year-old could be a fourpoint. Large antlers at an early age reflect good food

The age of a deer cannot be determined by replacement of the front teeth (incisors) as it can in sheep, goats and cows, but age can be determined by replacement of, and wear on, the

jaw teeth. As a deer grows older, certain portions of its teeth, particularly the crests on the jaw teeth next to the tongue, wear and expose increasing amounts of the dark dentine. Description of most age classes is based on the ralative amount of exposed dentine on the crests next to the

Deer have only six jaw teeth, although they appear to have many more. The teeth are in two distinct categories -- the premolars, and the molars.

Deer are aged in fractions because they are born around June or July and usually are examined during the fall hunting season.

Deer managers should keep accurate records on all deer harvested to determine the effects of practices such as brush control, livestock management and levels of deer harvest. Without such records, any change in management be evaluated accurately with respect to the impact

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#### **Hunting Accuracy Begins** With Preparation

Sunup is rapidly approaching on a cool, crisp autumn morning as the ments are mandatory for a hunter waits patiently, perched atop a deer stand somewhere in the Lone specialist based in Uvalde Star State. As the sun's rays begin to flicker across the eastern horizon on this somber Saturday morning, 1981 deer season has officially begun.

Somewhere directly ahead, the hunter hears make sure the barrel is brush crackle and a twig snap. Out of a mesquite thicket less than 100 yards away, a magnificent 12point buck emerges into the

True, this situation may seem more like one out of "Fantasy Island" but segments will be reinacted in varying degrees thousands of times this fall. Some hunts will end successfully; others in sheer frustration

quick, humane kill, say Dr. Dwight Guynn, a wildlife with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

According to Guynn, hunting accuracy begins with proper preparation and care of the rifle. Before loading he urges hunters to clear of obstructions. Rifle action should be checked for tightness, smooth operation and rust or dust. Magazines should feed and eject shells properly. Also, tighten scopes if loose.

pop out across the hunter's Sighting in the rifle be-forehead as a chill crawls fore hunting can be a critical factor, says Guynn. This can be done by firing at ranges of 50, 100 and 200 yards, distances at which most deer will be shot. It's also important to sight-in with exactly the same grain bullet you plan to hunt with. Then it takes dedicated repetitious practice, in all hunting positions, learning limitations while

improving accuracy. Now, assuming the hunter has sufficient sharpened

the shot be placed for the most effective kill? Knowing a deer's skeletal structure and exact location of vital organs and arteries can be very helpful.


Guynn prefers a shot to the lungs, when possible. He says the lungs form the biggest vital area, allowing for a shot to be somewhat off target and still be effective. A shot missing the lungs a little high may sever the spine: one a little low may hit the heart; a little farther back may strike the liver; and one too far forward could break the shoulder. Any of these hits can result in a quick kill.

A shot into the brain or one severing the spin both achieve quick, definite results, but must be very accurately placed because of the small targets. If a trophy mount is desired, shots into the head or neck may do serious and even irrepairable damage to those portions needed for

## Adequate Equipment Needed For Successful Hunting

Football may soon have serious competition.

hunters all across the state will relinquish their roles as armchair quarterbacks to renew their annual quest for freshly stocked freezers and handsome wall mounts. Many, however, will be on their first big game hunt and may be somewhat confused over the inordinate amount of hunting paraphernalia to

So, before taking to the countryside, it's a good idea for all hunters to make sure they have acquired adequate equipment and found it to be in good specialist based in Uvalde with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

First and foremost is the selection of firearms, assuming, of course, that leases and licenses have been secured.

Guynn suggests choosing a rifle with sufficient caliber (firepower) for a quick, humane kill. He says it's important to match caliber with one's physical size and shooting experience. Hence, large, heavier men can probably handle larger caliber rifles more accurately than small,

The most popular deer rifles used today are .243,

vice wildlife specialist headquartered in Uvalde. After the deer has been killed, promptly tag and prepare it for field dressing by propping the animal on its back, using rocks or other available objects.

The initial step, according to Guynn, is to remove external sex organs with a sharp knife. Next, cut down to the pelvic bone.

Turning the knife blade up, use your other hand to hold the belly away from the intestinal organs and cut up

However, avoid cutting the skin any further forward than the middle of the breastbone if the head is to be mounted, Guynn stress-

Continuing the process,

hold intestines to one side

to the breastbone.

while cutting the thin layer of muscle, or diaphragm, which separates the intestines from the chest area. Reach into the rib cage and cut loose the windpipe and esophagus as far forward as possible. Grasp the windpipe and esophagus with both hands, pulling those organs out. The intestines can now be pulled free of the pelvic region.

Next, Guynn says to cut the skin and muscles around the anus, being careful not to puncture the bladder, and pull the intestine forward and free of the carcass.

In these few short minutes, the hunting cycle is complete. The animal has been shot, field dressed

removed much easier while the carcass is still warm, you may want to consider skinning the animal soom after field dressing.

If the head is to be mounted, Guynn suggests hanging the animal by its hind legs and skinning from the hind legs downward. You may want to consult a local taxidermist on the best mehtods to use for skinning the head and neck

of your trophy. Guynn advises leaving the skin free of cuts forward of the front legs so the taxidermist will have enough hide to make a good mount. He says it's also a good idea to salt or freeze the head and skin until it is delivered for mounting.

But if the head is not to be mounted, hang the carcass its head and skin it from the neck downward. The Texas A&M University specialist says the hide is easier to remove in this position. Next, cut the skin loose from around the neck, around the legs and down Grasp the skin in back of the head and pull down firmly with both hands.

Finally, hang the skinned carcass by its hind legs in shade to cool and age. If hung outside, protective covering is needed to keep insects off the carcass.

The carcass can now be cut to preference or it can be commercially processed

Handling techniques after the kill will greatly influence final meat quality. Guynn strongly encourages field dressing the animal soon after being shot and hanging the carcass so it will cool thoroughly. He says skinning the animal soon after field dressing seems to enhance meat quality slightly. But if the animal must be transported or aged before processing, it's best to leave the skin intact to prevent the outer surface from dry-



smoke meat. One way of smoking is to build a small fire out of hardwood (pecan, hickory or oak) at one end of a backyard, closedtype cooker. Burn it until coals are obtained; then put a few hardwood chips on the coals. Place the sausage or cured meat cuts on the rack on the opposite end from the coals. Use enough water on the chips so they do not blaze and smoke the sausage with the cooker closed. Keep the temperature of the cooker between 130 degrees F. and 150 degrees

Smokehouses can be made from any closed device such as old refrigerators, oil drums, etc. An air inlet is needed at the bottom and a damper at the Some method for keeping the interior hot is needed. The whole smoking and drying procedure can be accomplished in one of these devices, but requires close watching.

Try a small quantity at first until you perfect your own special method. This is not an exact science.



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### Hunters Should Make Preparations In Advance For Trips Afield

With the approach of fall hunting seasons, Texas sportsmen should begin making preparations for their trips afield. These preparations should include more than marking hunting dates on a calendar and contacting landowners about hunting leases. Time and effort should be spent getting field gear and 'desk chair physiques' ready for the hunting adventures ahead.

This will not only prevent disappointment over a missed shot, but will also get the shooter used to the "Feel" of his weapon

Boot stitching should be checked, and the leather should be oiled or treated for comfort and protection. It is a good idea to wear new boots around the house to break them in before starting out on a long days

In addition to checking his gear, the smart hunter prepares himself physically for the field. Many of us work at jobs which don't allow us to stay in shape for our once-a-year hunting trips. Perhaps the best solution is to start early

with sensible exercise. This may mean just walking every day or it may include jogging and dieting off a few pounds for the hunter who will pursue game which requires strenuous effort. Remember, more hunters die from heart attacks brought on by overexertion than from firearm
