

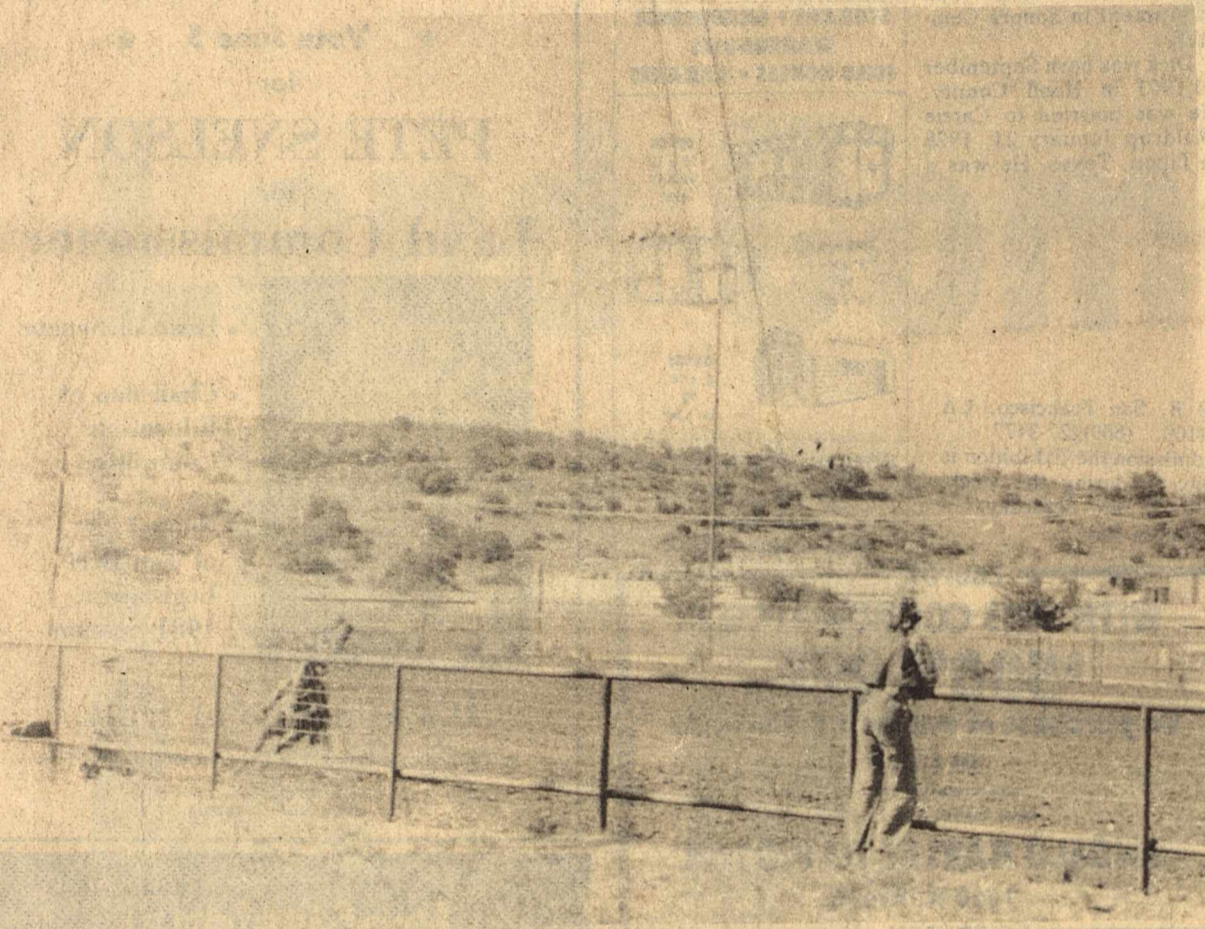

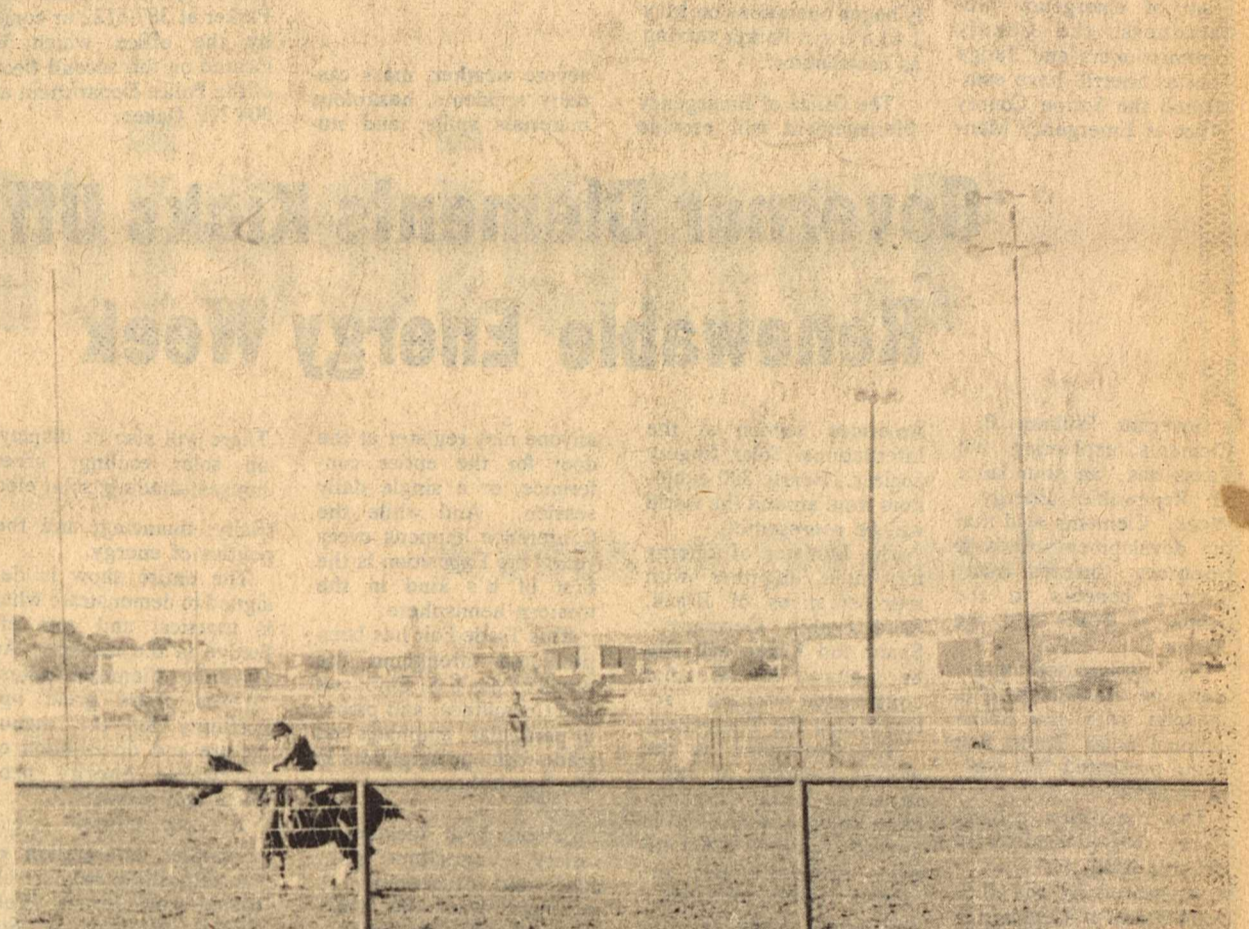

Three Sonora students are recipients of Carr Academic Scholarships for 1982-83 at Angelo State University.

Receiving awards are Jacquelyn Johnson, \$1,500; Nanette Sanchez, \$1,500 and Tracy Thompson, \$1,000. All are 1982 graduates of Sonora High School.

Provided by the Robert G. and Nona K. Carr Scholarship Foundation, the scholarships have been awarded on the basis of the students' outstanding academic records and personal achievements.

These Sonora students are among approximately 325 distinguished high school students throughout the state and nation who have been selected to receive Carr Academic Scholarships for 1982-83. Another

350 Carr Academic Scholarships are being awarded to currently enrolled undergraduate and graduate students at ASU.

This distinctive scholarship program was created by the late Mr. Carr in 1978 and will provide approximately \$1,000,000 in academic scholarships during 1982-83 to assist worthy and deserving students to pursue their education at Angelo State.

Mr. Carr bequeathed to the Board of Regents, Texas State University System, for the use of Angelo State, all of his interest in oil, gas and other minerals with the provision that these properties be held in trust for the establishment of the Carr Academic Scholarship Program.

## County Court Establishes Office Of Emergency Management

In recognition of the need to provide a full-time program of emergency preparedness, the County Commissioners and Judge Charles Sherrill have established the Sutton County Office of Emergency Man-

agement. The county's newest department officially began operations on May 1 with Gwyn Parker serving as coordinator.

The Office of Emergency Management will provide

planning for community response to situations such as

severe weather, mass casualty accidents, hazardous materials spills, and nu-

clear war. Information on these topics is available free of charge from the local office.

Another area of emergency management includes the training of emergency medical personnel. Ms. Parker is a certified EMT

and an EMS skills instructor. She will be providing training courses as well as directing the operation of the local ambulance service.

Ms. Parker is a graduate of Angelo State University and has completed a variety of emergency management training programs. She was formerly employed as the Assistant Director of the San-Tom Green County Civil Defense Department.

## Governor Clements Kicks Off Renewable Energy Week

Governor William P. Clements, explaining that Texas has "an abundance of Renewable Energy Week. Clements said that the development of these resources "insures many positive benefits to the people of Texas and the Nation".

The designation was made by the Governor to coincide with the International Solar Trade Fair being presented that week in Houston.

Exhibits will include a variety of agricultural products and processes - especially from the wind energy and gasohol areas.

There will also be displays on solar cooling; green houses; shading; solar electricity; financing; and the politics of energy.

The entire show is designed to demonstrate what is practical and cost effective in the market. As Governor Clements notes, "Texas offers great opportunity for the manufacture and distribution of renewable energy products and services."

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## AstroWorld Makes Family Group Appeal

According to the Texas 1980 Census there has been a shift in the age structure of the population between 1970 and 1980. Today there is a smaller proportion of persons in the 0-17 years age group and a higher percentage in the 18-39 and over 65 age groups.

This change is due in part to the aging of the baby boom generation and the large number of people moving to Texas during the past 10 years. "Because everyone has different needs, AstroWorld now offers a new ticket program called 'custom ticket pricing,'" says McGeeney. "This allows you to purchase the type of ticket that best fits your particular needs."

For example, visitors may now purchase a Park Pass for \$7.95 that entitles the bearer to all shows (except "Here's Hollywood"), attractions, special festival activities and concerts. This is an economical ticket for visitors who want to come out and be with their children without going on rides.

For those who have "favorite rides," AstroWorld offers and Eight Ride Pass that includes a selection of eight rides, attraction and all shows - except "Here's Hollywood".

AstroWorld, with over 100 rides, shows and family adventures, will be open Tuesday through Sunday until midnight beginning June 1, 1982.

## Collins Continues Anti-Busing Fight

To expedite action on the anti-busing bill passed by the House almost one year ago, today, Texas Congressman Jim Collins filed a Discharge Petition seeking to discharge the Department of Justice Authorization bill from the House Judiciary Committee to the House floor for consideration.

In a speech on the House floor, Collins called the Discharge Petition: "absolutely necessary to give the House the opportunity to have full and complete consideration of this most important issue regarding education." Collins briefly illustrated the legislative delays the amendment has undergone:

On June 9, 1981, by a vote of 265-122, the House included the Collins' anti-busing amendment.

After eight months of delay, the Senate passed its version of the bill, with the amendment and other anti-busing language, by a vote of 57-37.

In an unusual parliamentary maneuver, after both Houses supported anti-busing language, instead of going to conference, which is the normal

procedure, the bill was held at the Speaker's desk.

On March 8, 1982, I wrote to Speaker O'Neill and Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, Peter Rodino, requesting that the bill be brought directly to the House floor or that it be referred to the House Judiciary Committee.

Finally, on March 22, 1982, the Senate bill was referred to the House Judiciary Committee.

Since 30 legislative days have passed since that time, and since the Judiciary Committee has not scheduled hearings, and since Chairman Rodino has stalled action and House consideration of the anti-busing amendment, I am now filing a Discharge Petition.

Once we have 218 signatures, the House will once again have an opportunity to voice their overwhelming objection to the negative practice of forced school busing.

Since 1968, Collins has fought in Congress to end forced school busing. He believes: "this is the year we will achieve this great victory for all students."

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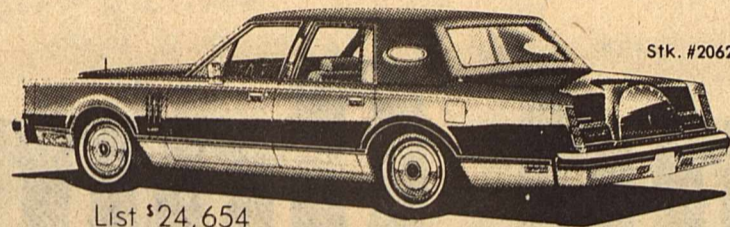

# Fire Prevention Begins At Home



If charity begins at home, be charitable to everyone in your family by launching a home fire safety program.

Start by installing an adequate number of heat and smoke detectors. A heat detector serves as a warning of a flaming fire in the immediate area of the detector. A smoke detector is designed to go off at the first trace of smoke.

Fire experts say the ideal system should include smoke detectors near bedrooms and heat detectors in all areas of the home. If such a system appears too expensive, definite protection is still possible with one smoke detector on each floor, or a smoke detector located between bedrooms and the rest of the house. Be sure to check the

**Consider Roofing**

Another area of concern regarding fire safety, which some homeowners overlook, is the roof. Roofing that does not ignite easily, emit burning brands or contribute to the spread of fire is a definite plus in the area of fire prevention. Readily combustible roofing, on the other hand, endangers not only the people living in a home, but others in the neighborhood as well.

For example, untreated wood shingle roofs, once on fire, are capable of spreading rapidly. In some cases, they touch off new fires some distance away when equipment regularly and keep it in working order.

burning brands, carried by wind currents, drop on combustible roofs elsewhere. Over the years, fire officials have blamed untreated wood shingles as a major cause of several conflagrations.

One way to determine whether a roof is fire resistant is to look for the fire-resistance label of Underwriters Laboratories, Inc. Three-dimensional asphalt shingles, including those with a fiber glass base, are tested for fire resistance by UL. The label indicates the shingles will not ignite easily, contribute to the spread of fire, nor emit burning brands.

**Use Common Sense**

Finally, say fire officials,

don't look on smoke or heat detectors and fire resistant roofing as substitutes for common sense fire prevention. The admonitions against smoking in bed, using hazardous appliances or overloading electrical circuits are still safety precautions that apply no matter how elaborate your fire prevention and detection system.

Plan at least two escape routes in case of fire and practice escapes until everyone in the family is familiar with the routes to take should fire break out.

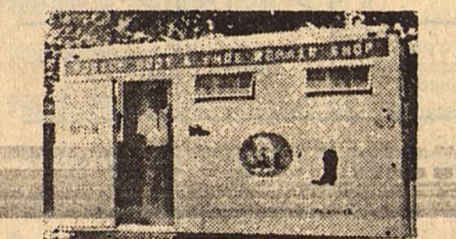
Girls and boys who belong to Camp Fire, the national youth agency, use these guidelines for good manners.

## Gerald Geistweidt To Represent Sutton Co.

By action of the Legislative Redistricting Board last year, Sutton County was changed from District 70 represented by Susan Mcbee to the 67th District represented by Republican Representative Gerald Geistweidt of Mason. The 67th District now includes Irion, Concho, Crockett, Schleicher, Menard, Mason, Sutton, Kimble, Edwards, Real, Kerr, Gillespie and Uvalde Counties.

Geistweidt was first elected to the Texas Legislature during a special called election in 1979 to fill a term vacated by Representative Jim Nugent of Kerrville who was appointed to the Railroad Commission by then Governor Dolph Briscoe. Geistweidt defeated eight opponents in the special election. The freshman representative was unopposed in his bid for his first full term in November, 1980, and is again unopposed in the upcoming general election.

During the 1981 regular session, the Hill Country legislator attempted to pass 23 bills. Ninety-one percent of these bills were adopted by the House and 87 percent were adopted by the Senate and signed into law by the Governor. This compares favorably with the record of other legislators who, on the average, introduced 30 bills each and saw only 16 percent become law.

A strong proponent of limited government, Geistweidt concentrated his efforts on legislation that would decrease, rather than increase, the role of government in the lives of the people of Texas.

The repeal of the Texas Inheritance tax was one of Geistweidt's accomplishments. The bill effectively abolishes the half-century old state inheritance tax, while preserving the state's right to a portion of the federal levy of estate taxes.

"The bill will save taxpayers money-both in payment of inheritance taxes, reduced attorney and accountant's fees and in eliminating one department of the comptroller's office," Geistweidt noted.

Other legislation passed under Geistweidt's leadership included a bill upgrading the penalties imposed on trespassers and a bill requiring criminals to make restitution to their victims as a condition of parole and insuring closer supervision of criminals released on parole.

Geistweidt's efforts also brought more funds to counties for road repair without raising ad valorem taxes. The bill will return more control to local governments and have the practical effect of giving the district Geistweidt represents close to one million dollars for road repairs.

Sutton County's new representative is a rancher and attorney in Mason County. He is a graduate of Texas A&M and the University of Texas Law School. He and his wife, Tess, are the parents of three daughters.

Geistweidt noted he will continue to be one of those fighting for conservative government when the legislature convenes in January.

Geistweidt practices fiscal conservatism and returned over \$60,000 to the state for office expenses he did not incur as a two term representative.

"I am looking forward to representing the people of Sutton County. Since my district is one of the largest in Texas, it will not always be easy to personally visit each county as I might like but I will try to represent all my constituency to the best of my ability. ## Land Bank Rates To Rise

## Allowable Calculation To Save \$

A new procedure for calculating allowables for one-well prorated gas fields approved by the Railroad Commission will save oil

and gas operators and the Commission significant time and money. The new method will go into effect June 1.

The form G-7, a forecast of production and disposition of gas well gas, will no longer be required for one-well prorated gas fields. Roland Childress, assistant director of production allocation for the Commission's Oil and Gas Division, estimates an annual savings of \$97,704 to the industry and \$29,064 to the Commission time during a critical period each month

when gas allowables must be calculated.

Allowables for the one-well gas fields will be equal to the volume of deliverability times the number of calendar days in a given month. Deliverability is the volume of gas produced by a well in a 24 hour test period. Allowables for fields which are overproducing or underproducing will be adjusted according

to a formula developed as part of the new procedure.

The Commission now assigns allowables in the affected fields based on a

comparison of the nominations for purchases filed by gatherers and the forecasts filed by producers on the form G-7. The complicated formula requires manual auditing, keying and processing of forms and a series of automated calculations.

According to Childress, in addition to saving time and money, the new method will continue to insure operators and ample allowable, while meeting market demand.

## HNG Fossil Fuels Makes First Ore Shipment

HNG Fossil Fuels Company, a subsidiary of Houston Natural Gas Corporation (HNG), and Cobb Resources Corporation, of Albuquerque, New Mexico, have announced the first shipment of gold and silver concentrate from ore produced at their London

Mines outside Fairplay, Colorado.

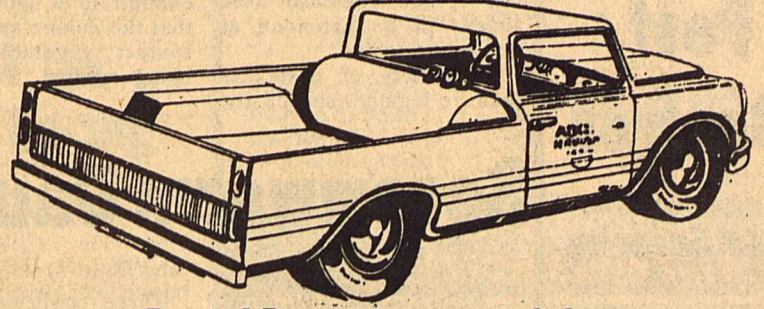
The floatation and jig concentrates, processed at a recently completed mill adjacent to the mine, are being shipped to American Smelting and Refining Company's smelter in El Paso, Texas. The floatation concentrate is anticipated to average approximately 3 1/2 ounces of gold per ton, and the jig concentrate is expected to average 30 ounces of gold per ton.

In the past two years, HNG Fossil Fuels and Cobb have developed ore in excess of 110,000 tons at a grade of .33 ounces of gold per ton. The two companies are attempting to define the grade of an additional 30 million tons of mineable material.

Additional exploration and development work is proceeding along the McDonald 1, McDonald 2 and London veins.

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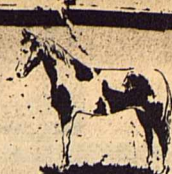

## Spray Now To Protect Pecan Crop

The pecan nut casebearer is a potential menace at this time of year. Pest management specialists with the Texas Agricul-

tural Extension Service have predicted first generation emergency for this area about May 27-28, 1982 according to Preston Farris, Sutton County Extension Agent.

Since the casebearer may hatch over a one-to two-week period, residual activity of the chemical used needs to be extended as long as possible.

A variety of pesticides can be legally used on the

pecan nut casebearer. Among those recommended are Sevin, Malathion and Zolone. Zolone is probably the most effective,

long-lasting insecticide which can be used on this pest. However, if pecan trees are located close enough to a garden area that the Zolone spray could contact vegetables when being applied, Sevin (car-

baryl) or malathion should be substituted. This is necessary since Zolone cannot legally be sprayed on vegetables crops nor can the consumption of those sprayed crops be recommended. Sevin and malathion are familiar vegetable garden insecticides and are effective controls for the pecan casebearer if timely applications are made. Entomologists, however, recommend that Sevin not be

used in early season pest control. This helps prevent outbreaks of aphids and honeydew later. Sevin is good for stink bug and webworm in mid-July and August.

When spraying to control this damaging pest, be sure to add zinc and the fungicide benomyl to the mixture to prevent leaf rosette and fungus scab damage. Zinc must be applied as a spray on foliage to be effective since zinc soil applications

are quickly rendered unavailable for plant uptake in alkaline soils. The wettable powder zinc sulfate or the liquid formulation NZN can be used. Zinc sulfate sprays should not be applied close to peach or plum trees since defoliation can occur. If peach or plum trees are growing near pecan trees, NZN should be used as it will not cause a defoliation if mixed according to label instructions.

## Screwworm Caution Brush Control Time Again!

Confirmation of additional screwworm cases along the Hidalgo-Starr county line brings this warning from Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission:

Livestock producers in that area should delay, if at all possible, dehorning, branding, or castrating animals. "This is a precautionary measure to prevent the possibility of any undetected screwworms from finding a place on which to lay eggs. Screwworms lay their eggs on open wounds," he explained. If surgery is necessary, treat the wound.

Three confirmed screwworm cases were reported this week within a four-mile area, about 35 miles north of Mission along the Hidalgo-Starr county line. These are the first cases reported in Texas this year.

"Livestock producers within 100 miles of the Mexico-Texas border are urged to check the animals for possible screwworm infestations, and submit suspected samples to the fly lab at Mission. Special kits are available for this purpose and may be obtained from TAHC area offices or from county agents," Dr. Holcombe said. Sterile screwworm flies are being dropped in the affected area and specially treated pellets called SWASS which attract and destroy screwworms are also being dispersed.

"There is a need for increased submission of samples. Records indicate that screwworm sample submission is running about 60 percent of last year. It is understandable for the let-up, but the confirmed cases in Texas emphasize the need for more suspected cases to be submitted," Dr. Holcombe explained.

He also suggested it is a good idea for livestock producers throughout the state to be on the look out for suspected screwworm samples and submit them to the fly lab at Mission.

Mesquite and other brush can best be controlled with herbicides in spring and early summer when soil moisture is favorable and the brush is making rapid growth.

"This is the time of year when herbicides can be used effectively in management of brush species," points out Dr. Tommy G. Welch, range brush and weed control specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

He says that broadcast application of liquid herbicides is probably the most popular method of brush control. These herbicides must be taken into plants through their leaves and translocated to stems and roots. How well this takes

place depends on growing conditions when herbicides are applied.

Mesquite is best controlled after the leaves have fully extended and have turned from light to dark green, explains the specialist. Other brush species such as huisache and Macartney rose may be sprayed during the fall.

"Soil moisture and soil temperature both influence the effectiveness of foliar herbicides," says Welch, "because they affect plant growth. As the soil temperature increases and soil moisture becomes more favorable, plants grow better. And that's when foliar herbicides are most effective."

Soil moisture is also needed for pelleted herbicides to be effective, adds the specialist. These herbicides are applied to the soil surface and need moisture to dissolve and move into the root zone.

Pelleted herbicides are generally applied in late winter and early spring to take advantage of spring rains. They work well on several species of oad, winged elm, whitebrush, Macartney rose, pricklypear and redberry juniper.

Ranchers should be able to see the results of liquid herbicides within several weeks after application, he adds.

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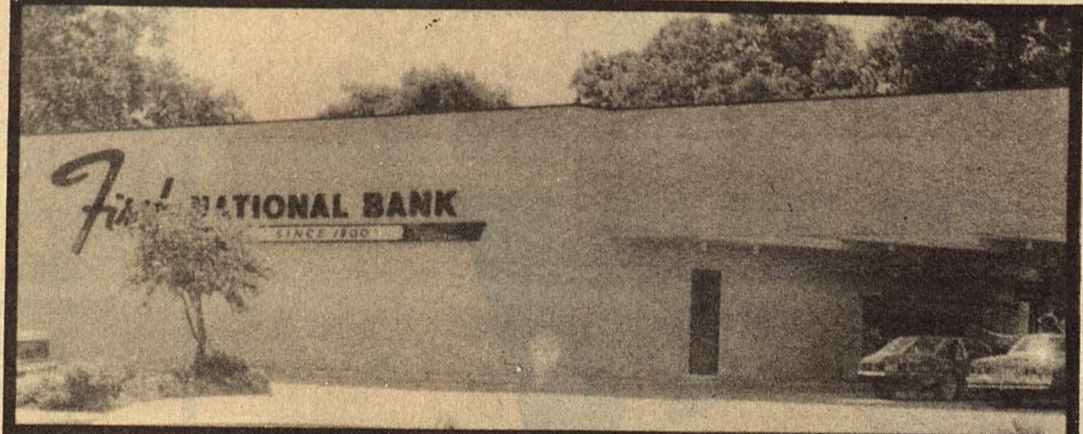

**Reports from Washington**

**Considerations of National Security**

On a recent trip to Texas I was honored by the Reserve Officers Association at their state convention in Austin when they presented me with their Nathan Hale Award for Public Service. The award was given for work in the area of promoting and preserving national security. I was very pleased to receive this high commendation.

The execution of the teacher-soldier Nathan Hale at the hands of the British during our Revolutionary War provided one of the great hero-martyrs in our fight for Independence. His brief but stirring words at the gallows — "I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country" — has become part of the historical memory of every school child in this country, as well it should.

The American people have always participated to the fullest in the changes that shape our world. We have applied Nathan Hale's courage individually and collectively as a nation throughout our history. We have known depression and prosperity, the ordeal of war and the tranquility of peace.

Such is the nature of American power and American purpose. Today, it has become essential for the United States and its allies to deal with new realities, although global military balance is still the province of the superpowers. Three trends in particular raise crucial questions about the prospects for Western security — and international peace — for the remainder of the century.

The first trend is lagging Western strength. We are even now making efforts to reverse this but we must deal with the reality that the United States has gradually lost many of the military advantages over the Soviet Union that once provided an absolute margin of safety for the West. Some of this has been by choice; in other cases, it is the result of neglect and error. Meanwhile, the Western alliance has suffered increasing political and economic strain. The cooperative impulse still exists but it would be severely strained by another decade of relative military decline or sterile economic rivalry.

Secondly, we have to deal with developing countries who strike a public posture against the United States. The Third World has emerged and with diversity its fragile unity is already fragmented by regional conflict and global rivalry. At the same time, many of these nations are threatened by the strain of sudden political, social and economic change.

Yet another factor is the emergence of the Soviet Union as a global military power and its increasingly bold use of power and might to promote violence. Communist bloc countries have been shaken by unrest and chronic economic failure has eroded the appeal of the Marxist-Leninist ideology. Military expansion, unfortunately, has been the result.

Today, we must ask ourselves if we can increase our strength and improve our collaboration with our allies; we must find common interests with developing countries; and we must create a more constructive relationship with the Soviet Union — one that is based on strength and sense of purpose.

We must go beyond the postwar vision of half a world free toward a whole world of greater liberty, more peaceful change, and increasing economic progress. I believe we can do these things while safeguarding the legacy of Western values and achievements.

Candidates for the ministry will be ordained in a Service of Ordination on Wednesday evening at 7:30 at the Travis Park Church. The annual session adjourns following the service, while the new ordinands are guests of honor at a reception at the downtown church.

# Senator Pete Snelson Refutes Opponent's Claim

Senator Pete Snelson, certified as the leading candidate in the race for Texas Land Commissioner by a margin of more than 4,000 votes, today expressed amazement that his run-off opponent, Austin lawyer Garry Mauro, was misrepresenting the facts in news releases and press appearances.

Press reports show that reporters in Texarkana, Tyler and Nacogdoches said Mauro contended in appearances last week that he was the race leader. The Dallas Morning News reported that Mauro had known for a week prior to his news conferences that the Democratic Party tally showed Snelson led the

race. Official final results showed that Snelson received 340,781 votes and Mauro's total was 336,643. At one point after the May 1 primary, unofficial returns showed Mauro gaining a 2,000 vote edge but party certification of the results had turned that into a 2,000 vote lead for Snelson as early as May 14. That lead broadened to 4,000 votes by the final total.

In the May 1 primary, Snelson carried 147 counties while his run-off opponent was high in only 39 counties.

Snelson completed a state-wide tour which included 30 news conferences last week.

"It was necessary to compress three weeks of campaigning into one week as a special session of the Legislature convened on May 24 and this will greatly reduce my travel plans," said Senator Snelson.

Senator Snelson, Dean of the Senate and chairman of the Education Committee, is the sponsor of the two proposals included on the agenda of the session which will eliminate the state ad valorem tax and make emergency appropriations for construction at state universities.

## VA Doesn't Supply Information To Third Party

"Veterans Administration offices often are asked by a third party to supply information about an individual--when the federal Privacy Act doesn't allow such release," said T.W. Myatt, Director, Houston VA Regional Office.

"Usually, such a request is very innocent," he said, "such as a husband asking his wife to call the VA for him while he is at work. But regardless of the reason, the VA in most cases is limited by law in the amount of information that can be given. This is also the reason why a veteran, when calling the VA, is asked for information verifying his identity."

The same federal legislation prevents release of requested file information on specific veterans to the new media.

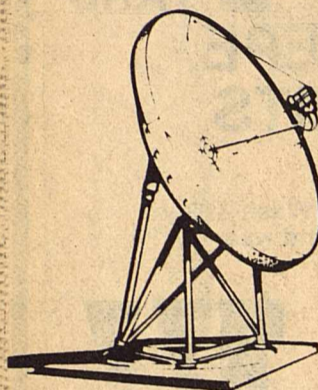
However, Myatt stressed, the VA can honor a request by a third party for information out of a person's file--if that person has given specific, prior, written consent.

"There also are instances," Myatt added, "When the VA can release information from a claimant's file without prior consent. This is usually to another agency that has a need for the information in order to process something concerning that person."

Those rules generally hold true to most government agencies that have files on individuals, he added.

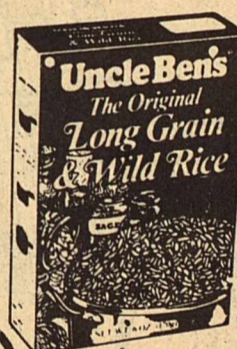
