Land Bank **Rates To Rise**

Interest rates on all Land Bank variable rate loans will be increased to $11 \ 1/2$ percent on farm loans and 12 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans, said Wade A. Mosley, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora.

These rates become ef-fective June 1, 1982.

According to Land Bank President Thomas H. Benson, "Marketing conditions have prompted the Bank, with full cognizance of the problems facing agriculture, to recommend the increase."

"Refunding maturing bonds having a face rate ranging from 6.65 percent to 8.70 percent, with new ones in the 14 percent range continuing to cause obvious pressure on the Bank's earnings," Benson said.







'This is the time of year' when herbicides can be: used effectively in management of brush species," points out Dr. Tommy G. Welch, range brush and weed control specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&14 University System. He says that broadcast

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Soil moisture is also needed for pelleted herbi-cides to be effective, adds the specialist. These herbicides are applied to the soil surface and need moisture to dissolve and move into the root zone.

Pelleted herbicides are generally applied in late winter and early spring to take advantage of spring rains. They work well on several species of oad, winged elm, whitebrush, Macartney rose, pricklypear and redberry juniper.

Ranchers should be able to see the results of liquid herbicides within several



VA Doesn't Supply Information

To Third Party "Veterans Administra-

tion offices often are asked by a third party to supply information about an individual--when the federal Privacy Act doesn't allow such release," said T.W. Myatt, Director, Houston VA Regional Office. 'Usually, such a request is very innocent," he said, 'such as a husband asking his wife to call the VA for him while he is at work. But regardless of the reason, the VA in most cases is limited by law in the a-mount of information that can be given. This is also the reason why a veteran, when calling the VA, is asked for information verifying his identity.' The same federal legislation prevents release of requested file information on specific veterans to the new media. However, Myatt stressed, the VA can honor a request by a third party for information out of a person's file--if that person has given specific, prior, written consent. There also are instances," Myatt added, "When the VA can release information from a claimant's file without prior consent. This is usually to another agency that has a need for the information in order to process something concerning that person." Those rules generally hold true to most govern-ment agencies that have files on individuals, he added.





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
