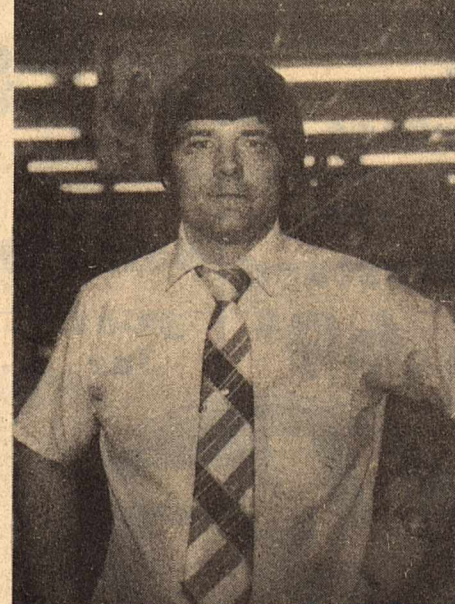
Hershel Davenport

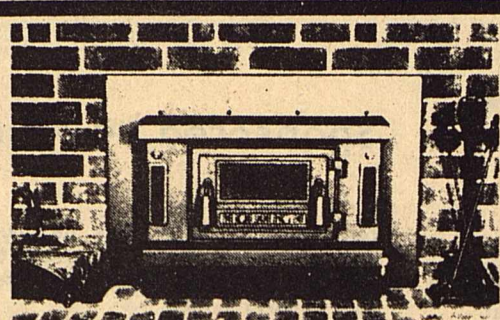

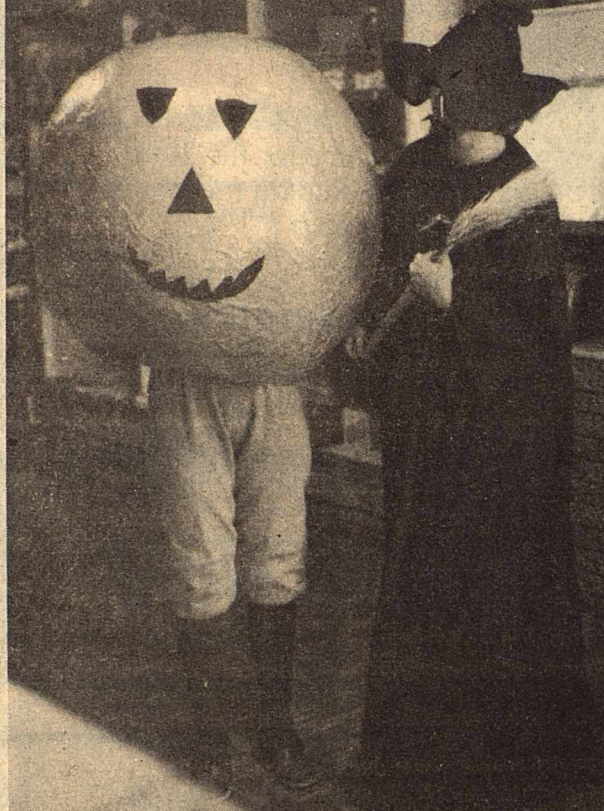

## Mixed drink taxes up 9%

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said collection of the state's 10 percent mixed drink tax during the third quarter of 1982 was up nine percent over the same period last year.

Bullock said the state received \$34.6 million in taxes on the sale of mixed drinks during the third three months of this year.

He said his office is sending checks totaling \$10 million to 217 counties and 408 cities as their share of the gross receipts tax on mixed drinks for the third quarter.

The state's general revenue fund will receive the balance, \$24.6 million, of the tax money collected.

Texas cities and counties each receive a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and the city-county rebates are sent out quarterly by the Comptroller's office.

Bullock said the mixed drink tax has brought in \$105.1 million dollars during the first, second and third quarters of 1982.

## TSTI receives grant from Halliburton

Texas State Technical Institute received a \$7,500 grant from Halliburton Foundation Inc. of Dallas to provide special funds for faculty members in five or more of the school's instructional programs.

The grant will be used to supplement salaries, make incentive awards of provide assistance in professional development activities for faculty members in drafting and design technology, electrical power distribution, machine shop operations, mechanical technology and welding technology.

Al Senulis of Brown and Root Inc., Houston, presented the grant to Dr. James A. Bird, TSTI executive vice president. Brown and Root Inc., an organization involved primarily in industrial and marine construction services, is a part of Halliburton Co., an international oil field services and engineering construction firm.

The grant was the fourth donation awarded to TSTI by the foundation, which has contributed a total of \$22,500 to the vocational-technical institution.

Senulis said the foundation makes grants primarily to colleges and universities from which Halliburton companies employ a substantial number of graduates.

"The TSTI students we have employed are excellent," Senulis said. "TSTI is one of the finest schools not only in terms of relationships between the institution and industry, but in terms of relationships among students, faculty members and industry."

Other Halliburton foundation representatives participating in the grant presentation were Thomas E. Davis of Brown and Root Inc. and Jerry Root of Welex, a Halliburton company.

## Energas increases residential gas to 26%

A spokesman for Energas in Amarillo, Jake Hubert, told us this week that the average increase for a residential gas customer this winter will be 26 percent. This figure is based on \$3.43 per thousand cubic feet in October 1981 compared to \$4.32 per thousand cubic feet in October 1982. Once again, the average increase for natural gas in the energas system is 26 percent per thousand cubic feet for a residential customer. We apologize for any confusion and we believe the breakdown in communication is now solved.

In other news, Texas Governor Bill Clements

said he will support legislation next year which would allow royalty owners and independent producers to hold a lien against their oil so they are assured of payment. This action resulted from the recent bankruptcy petition filed by several oil purchasers.

The Democrat nominee for Governor of Texas, Mark White, has called for an end to fuel adjustment charges that allow electric utility companies to pass fuel costs on to customers. He said that the companies no longer have to negotiate for fuel since it's a 100 percent pass through. The

Lawyer for the Public Utilities Commission, Allen King, replied that it would force utility companies to include fuel costs in basic rates or change the name of the extra charge.

In the Permian Basin our rig count for this week was 284. One year ago it was 472.

## Gulf Production offshore

State leases in bays, blets and the Gulf of Mexico produced 79,690 barrels of crude oil during August 1982, in contrast to 85,294 barrels in the same month of 1981 and 84,202 barrels in July 1982, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent. Through the first eight months of this year, state leases produced 633,834 barrels of crude oil offshore.

Gas well gas production from state leases amounted to 19,066,364 Mcf in August against 18,853,887 Mcf a year earlier and 17,866,554 Mcf in July of this year. Total gas well gas production offshore from state leases was 175,751,814 Mcf through August.

Casinghead gas production totaled 192,222 Mcf in August against 274,074 Mcf in the same month of 1981 and 237,241 Mcf in July. That makes 1,808,822 Mcf through the first eight months of 1982.

Condensate production from state leases amounted to 59,061 barrels in August, up from 57,052 barrels a year earlier and up from 54,906 barrels in July. Through August, state offshore leases produced 558,338 barrels of condensate.

In August, offshore crude production was about .1 percent of total estimated crude production in Texas. Offshore gas well gas production, was approximately five percent of the state total.

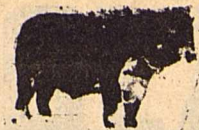

## 4-H offers volunteer opportunities

America has entered the "age of volunteerism," and that's important to 4-H.

The current emphasis on lessening governmental influence has brought the realization that volunteers may be the only way to service many of society's future needs, including youth programs such as 4-H, says Preston Sides, 4-H and youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

As early as the 1920's, several youth organizations

were heavily into the business of volunteers. The industrial age suddenly freed some of the time Americans normally spent in earning their livelihood, and they used this time to volunteer service. Youth organizations flourished. But the great depression which followed left many of those organizations in a quandary. They were forced to reduce services and many simply went broke.

With the advent of World War II, youth organizations again flourished as Amer-

ica's young people found it popular to become a part of a youth group, says Sides. It was during this period that the 4-H Club organization, long active in farming areas of the nation, came to the forefront. Victory Gardens were everywhere and 4-H gave them the emphasis they needed. Suddenly 4-H received nationwide recognition and volunteers flocked to become a part of the program.

Today's 4-H program offers volunteer opportunities for more than one-half

million persons from every walk of life. The enormous growth of 4-H during the 1970's sparked renewed interest which has made 4-H the largest youth serving organizations in America, the specialist points out.

Today's 4-H volunteer might be working mothers or retired corporate executives. They may live right next door to you. Texas currently has 20,000 volunteer who work with 150,000 young men and women in 3,000 4-H clubs and groups all across the state.

Just about everything there is to do in 4-H is done by volunteers, Sides says. They serve on planning and

advisory committees, serve as teachers by being project

leaders in some 40 different subject-matter areas, help to plan and conduct camps,

transport members to and from activities, and recruit new members and new volunteers.

But most of all, 4-H volunteer listen, learn and love the boys and girls with whom they work.

If you have a few hours to give and if you truly care

about young people, 4-H has a place for you. Why

not call your county Extension office? 4-H can open the door to opportunity for you.

## 1982 Water for Texas Conference Scheduled for Nov. 18-19

The 1982 Water for Texas Conference, scheduled November 18 and 19 at Texas A&M University, will address major water issues facing the state: planning, financing, understanding and managing water resources.

"Water Issues for Today, for Tomorrow" will be the theme of the conference, the eighteenth to be held by the Texas Water Resources Institute.

Texas legislators will face many important issues dealing with water in the next legislative session which opens January, points out Dr. Jack R. Runkles, Institute director. The Institute funds statewide research to manage and conserve water resources, and is a special unit of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the state's agricultural research agency.

"Federal funding for water development and for water and wastewater treatment has literally

'dried up.' Additionally, water users from throughout the state—in cities, on farms, in energy and industrial development—all are pressuring the legislature for a statewide effort to assure adequate water in the future," Runkles explains.

Participation in the Water for Texas Conference is expected from many diverse groups.

Among speakers will be state agency heads, river authority managers, attorneys, engineers, water users and several state senators.

Keynotes for the conference, which opens at 9:30 a.m. November 18 in the Rudder Theatre, will be State Senator Grant Jones of Abilene, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee. His subject will be "Water Issues Facing Texas."

Conference sessions will continue through noon

November 19.

## Fashion lengths make a difference

How does one determine the best length? "A good way is to look at your current wardrobe. Try on your clothes. Check each outfit to see if it could be improved by raising or lowering the hemline. Often an inch can make all the difference--so be sure you find the right hem location," Saunders says.

look best in a skirt length just below the knee, she adds.

"If you are short, you may find an inch below the knee is best. If you are tall,

two inches or more may be necessary. Another guide is the calf of the leg--a smart hem often hits just where the curves starts," Saunders suggests.

Be careful, however, not to fall into the "hemline rule" in dressing.

"Do not assume that every hemline has to be 'so many inches' below the knee, such as about 'an inch.' If that length looks good in a A-line skirt, a straight skirt may need a slightly longer hem to look

best. A dirndl may need even more to keep you from looking too youthful," she says.



## Converting energy by windmills

Windmills have long been popular for pumping water for livestock as well as for farm and ranch homes in remote areas. They also have potential for converting wind energy into electricity, but the process is costly.

"As a fuel, wind is free, but the devices needed to use the energy beneficially can be quite expensive," says Wayne Keese, and agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Wind chargers" were a common sight in the 1930s and early '40s and were the only source of electric power for many rural areas. But when the Rural Electric Cooperative system brought low-cost central station power to all parts of the country, wind-generated electric power systems practically disappeared, explains Keese.

"One of the disadvantages of wind-powered electric generators has been the need for power storage," notes the engineer. "Batteries can be used to store power but are costly."

However, wind power systems that can be interconnected with utility power lines are now available. With these systems, utility power can be used when the wind-powered generator produces too little power. On the other hand, excess power produced by the generator can be fed into the utility power line.

How much electricity a wind machine can generate is determined by wind speed, rotor size and the machine's conversion efficiency. Manufacturers of wind machines provide performance curves to describe the power their machine will put out at different wind speeds. However, the "rated capacity" of a wind generator is not an indication of how much electricity will be produced under all wind conditions, cautions required to determine the economic feasibility of generating electricity with a wind machine," Keese.

"In remote locations, a wind machine, coupled with storage batteries for no-wind conditions, may be the most feasible method of providing electricity."

A new publication available at county Extension offices, B-1412--"Wind Power Systems," provides more detail about selection and use of wind-power systems, says the engineer.
