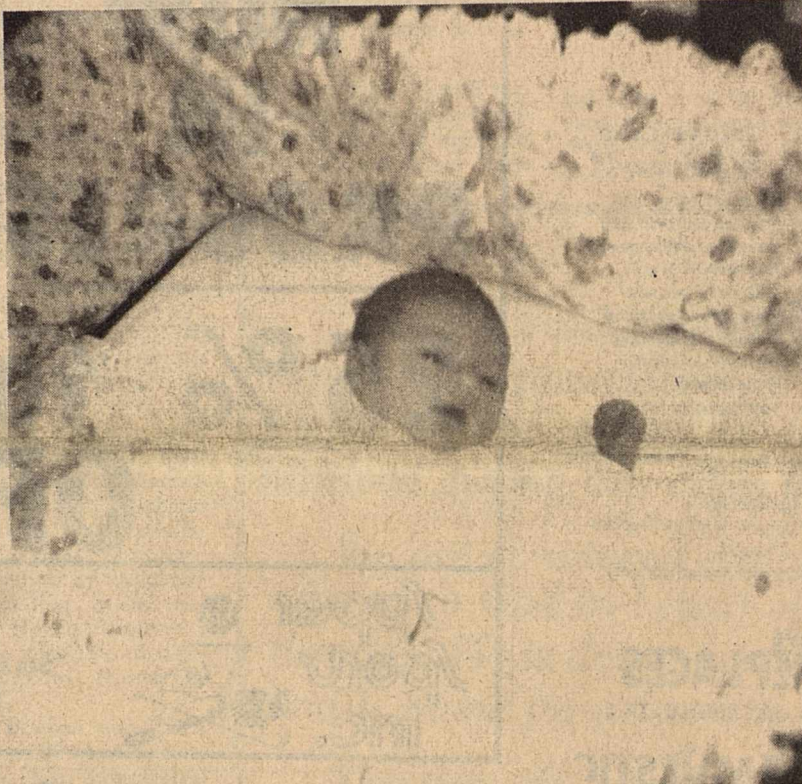
## Robert George Wilson III first baby for Sonora in 1983

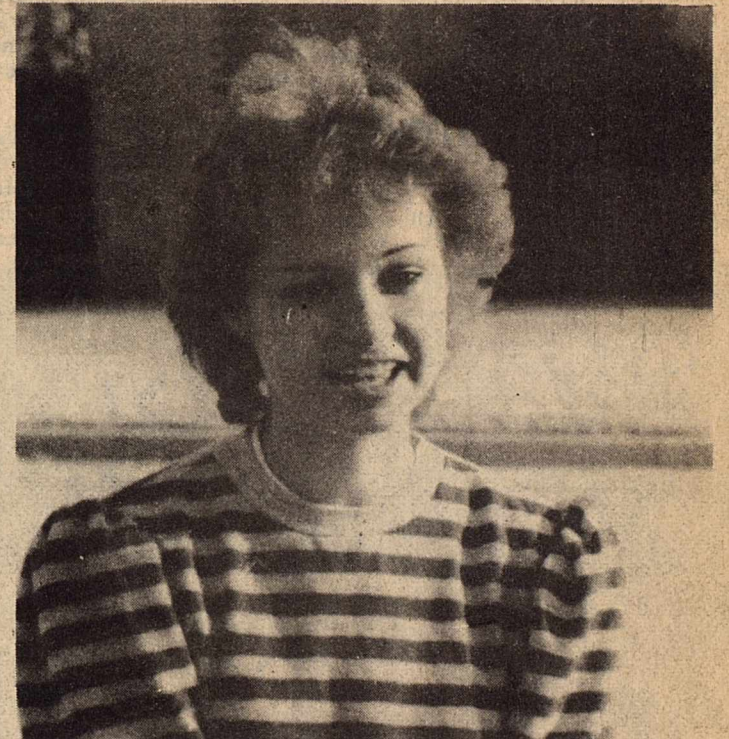

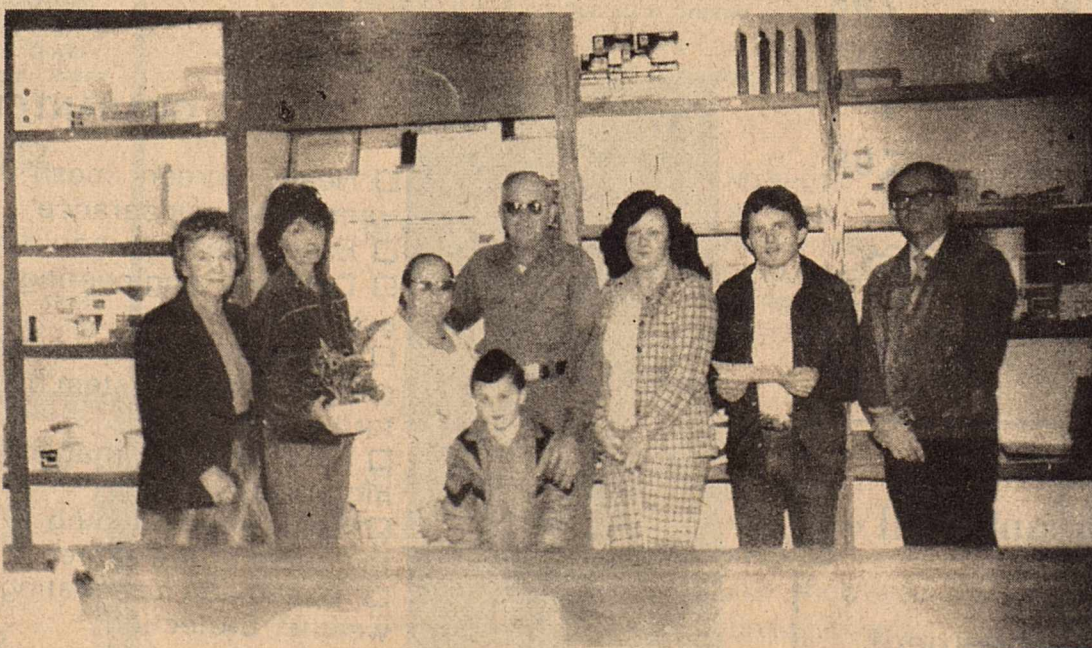

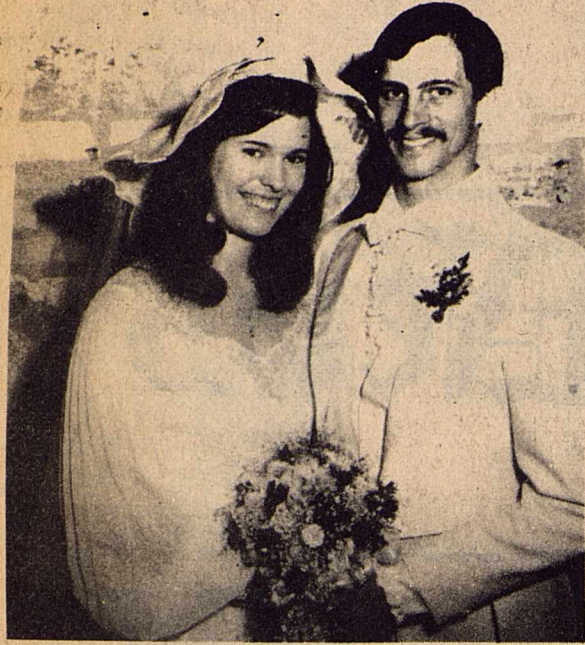
He attends the Baptist Church and is a member of the Disabled Vets.

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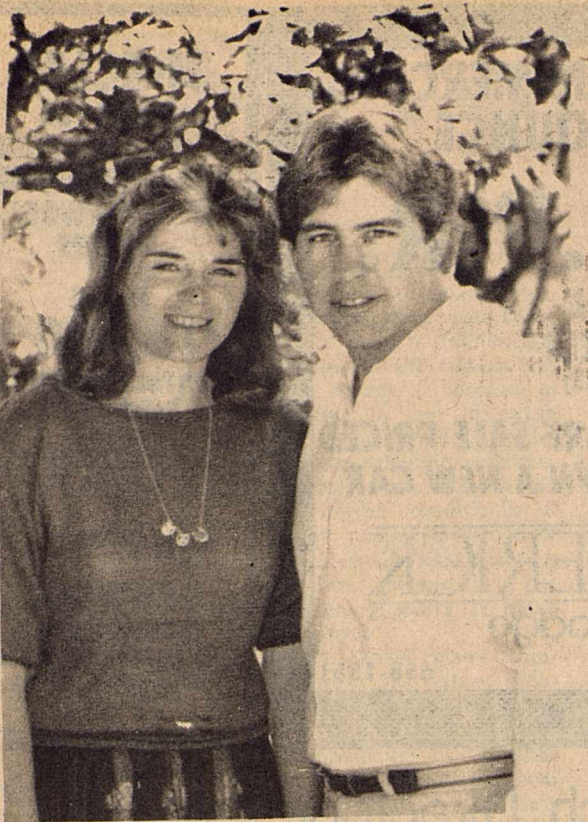

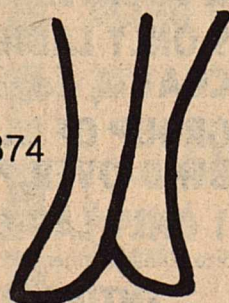

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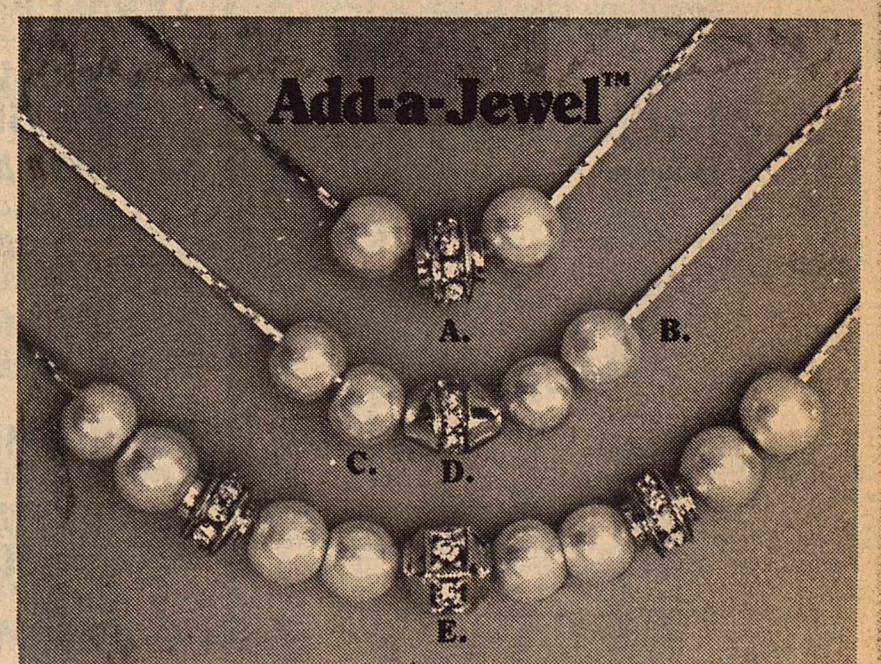

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# TSTA offers new pay plan

The Texas State Teacher Association (TSTA) will be promoting an "entirely new approach" to the state-funded salary schedule for teachers and other school employees in the 68th Texas Legislature, which will open on Jan. 11.

Barbara O'Neal, president of the 95,000-member educational association, said that TSTA's plan would raise the beginning minimum teacher salary from the current \$11,110 to \$15,000 for a teacher with a bachelor's degree and from \$11,880 to \$17,000 for a teacher with a master's degree. The immediate effect on every teacher's paycheck would be an increase of at least \$1,910 annually.

TSTA's salary proposal, which O'Neal said is intended to help Texas public schools "recruit and retain top personnel," seek significant increases for every level of the state minimum salary schedule. The state pays minimum salaries of

paraprofessionals, counselors and teachers, superintendents, principals and other administrators.

O'Neal, a classroom teacher from Waco, said TSTA is proposing to dramatically reorganize the current salary schedule. Instead of waiting 18 years to reach the maximum salary, as the current schedule requires, educators would reach the top of the schedule in 10 years under TSTA's new plan, which would enable a teacher to double his or her beginning salary in those 10 years.

The TSTA plan "compresses" the salary schedule into fewer pay grades and experience steps, as recommended by the Subcommittee on Educational Personnel of the Senate's Select Committee on Education.

In its official report, the Subcommittee recommended a "compressed" schedule because it "might permit and individual to reach a higher, more com-

petitive salary prior to mid-career rather than after mid-career.

Both the Senate Subcommittee and TSTA are attempting to end the teacher shortage currently facing many Texas school districts and to avert an even more serious and widespread shortage in the future.

TSTA's overall legislative program for the 68th Session of the Texas Legislature includes proposals for statewide health insurance, professional negotiations, improved sick leave provisions, increased funding for bilingual and compensatory education, and support of equalization plans, among others.

O'Neal said TSTA will also work to improve the evaluation procedures for professional educators that the Association supported in the 1981 session and to further improve teacher preparation programs and certification standards.

"It is critical," O'Neal said, "for the 68th Legisla-

ture to take decisive action in 1983 to significantly improve Texas public schools. While we claim that our state has the strongest economy in the nation, Texas ranks 42nd in per pupil expenditures for edu-

cation among the 50 states and teacher salaries are far below where they should be in order to attract and retain the best teachers for our students. That's just not good enough for

Texas." She concluded, "TSTA feels that for responsible, fiscal management the best investment the 68th Texas Legislature can make is in the students and teachers of Texas."

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## Tower named Chairman Housing and Urban Affairs

U.S. Senator John Tower (R-Texas) has been named chairman of the Housing and Urban Affairs Subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs. Having served on the committee since 1961, Senator Tower most recently chaired the Financial Institutions Subcommittee, on which he will continue to serve.

"The Housing and Urban Affairs Subcommittee is charged with issues of vital importance to Texas, particularly to our state's fast-growing urban areas such as Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Austin," Tower said. "Among

others, these issues include finding new solutions to the continuing challenges of urban development, transportation, and adequate housing for all Americans."

"As chairman of the Housing and Urban Affairs Subcommittee, I believe that I can bring an understanding of, and compassion for, the problem and needs of our nation's cities and surrounding suburbs. This is a critical time -- a time when we on the federal level must look ahead, beyond the 1980's and even the 1990's, to lay the groundwork now so that our cities can enter the 21st century with a firm foundation for their mass tran-

sportation, housing and other needs," Tower continued.

"Our cities in Texas continue to lead the nation in building permits and new housing starts. Texas is growing, and I am pleased to have this opportunity to take this new role in developing solutions to our cities' changing needs," Tower concluded.

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## Local residents to receive federal income tax packages

"Almost 6 million taxpayers will receive their federal income tax packages within the next two weeks," Glenn Cagle, Director for the Dallas District of the Internal Revenue Service, said.

Based on which form they filed last year, taxpayers will receive either the Form 1040 or Form 1040EZ and 1040A package. This year, the 1040EZ, containing only 11 lines to complete, has been added to the Form 1040A package. "The 1040EZ is designed for single taxpayers who have no dependents, whose taxable income is less than \$50,000, earned from wages, salaries and tips and no more than \$400 in interest," Cagle said.

Generally, as in previous years, the Form 1040 is for those taxpayers who item-

ize deductions or claim such tax credits as child care, energy, political contributions and investment credit.

Since filing their tax forms last year, some taxpayers may have had a change in their tax status and need a different form than that received in the mail. Federal tax forms and schedules are available at most post offices, many banks and some libraries. The most convenient way to obtain additional forms is by using the handy order blank in the tax forms package.

The tax forms package received in the mail has a pre-addressed, peel-off label and large, pre-addressed envelope which is useful to the taxpayer and to the IRS. By using the label and envelope, the

taxpayer can help to speed up the processing of the tax return, decrease the chance of errors and often receive a refund faster.

If the mailing label has incorrect information, such as a wrong address or Social Security Number, the correction should be made directly on the label.

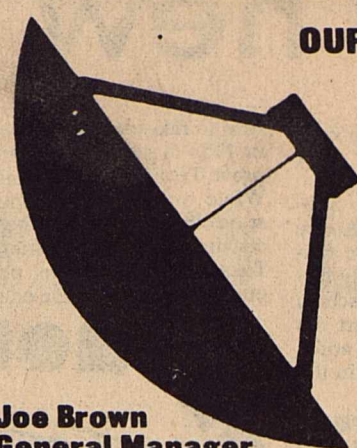
Each tax forms package contains instructions on the preparation of the form in the package. If additional information is needed on credits, deductions, exemptions or income, the IRS offers more than 90 free publications on these and many more subjects. These publications are available by using the order form in the tax forms package.

The IRS offers a number of taxpayer assistance programs for those who need tax help. The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program has trained volunteers in basic return preparation who will complete returns for low-income, handicapped,

bi-lingual, elderly and disadvantaged taxpayers.

Throughout the filing season, IRS will send employees to community centers for group tax assistance. In addition, the toll-free telephone system offers tax information Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The new toll-free number is 1-800-424-1040; in Dallas dial 742-2440; in Ft. Worth, 335-1370.

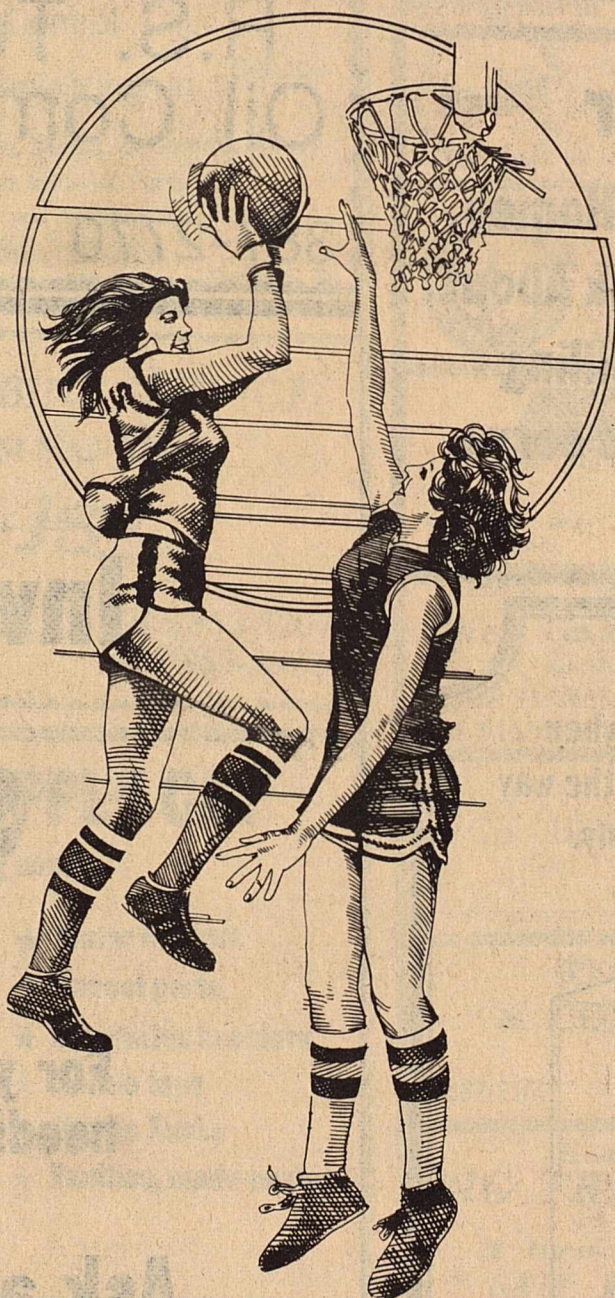

## The 1983 Stock Season has arrived in West Texas

One can tell that stock show season has arrived in West Texas by observing the weather. In over 20 years of covering these events for the news media, I have never understood why we put our youth through this strenuous competition at this time of year.

However, every time I bring it up, I'm told it has to be this way in order to get all the levels of competition in for the year. From county to district to region-

al and state, the circuit takes months to complete. From the usual ice and freezing temperatures of January to the blowing dust of March and the first whispers of autumn, it comes with the territory!

Something else that came in with the new year that is very precious to West Texans is moisture. Good rains, some with ice and one of the wettest snows in years blessed dry terrain.

Larry Donaldson of Eldorado's D&D Feeds says the country is in good shape "with weeds springing out of the ground. That means these old sheep will have something to graze on soon."

"And now that deer hunting season is over, we will probably see some grass growing back in the pasture roads since hunters won't be driving them out every day," he laughed.

John Dublin has witnessed "a great deal of deer die-off in Schleicher County this winter. I don't think it is from lack of food so much as it is overpopulation."

Out near Big Lake in Reagan County, Richard Boggs told this writer that the cattle are poor. Rich-

ard, working in the oil fields on the Rucker b Ranch, says they are fed daily and have something to eat in the pastures. "I tell ya, they have looked bad ever since calving," he added.

John Powell comments: "All is fine around Menard as 1983 starts. We had over five inches of moisture in December and some more last week."

Andy Smith said over a cup of coffee the other day that range conditions up the North Concho River around Water Valley were in top shape.

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## Mohair producers pass CCC vote

Washington, Dec. 30, Mohair producers, by a 1,279 to 353 margin, have voted to authorize deductions from Commodity Credit Corporation mohair incentive payments to finance promotion of mohair, according to CCC Executive Vice Present Everett Rank. Producers voted in a referendum held Dec. 6-17.

Preliminary returns show 78.4 percent of the producers favored the advertising and other market development activities under a proposed agreement between the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Mohair Council of America. This agreement provides for the conduct of both domestic and foreign advertising and sales promotion programs, Rank said.

The proposed agreement authorizes deductions from payments made under the National Wool Act on mohair marketed during 1982-1985. The new agreement authorizes deductions of up to 4.5 cents a pound on mohair. The Mohair Council of America has had no income through deductions from mohair payments since 1971. However, promotion activities have continued. When the funds acquired from deductions were exhausted, activities of the Mca were financed by the Texas Mohair Producers Board.

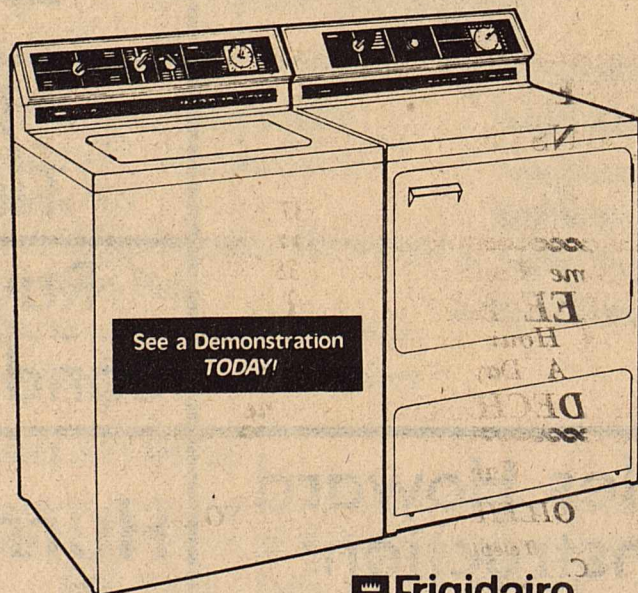

## Mack Wallace elected to serve as chairman of TRC

Mack Wallace was elected to serve a two year term as chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission

Outgoing chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent

made the nomination, which was supported by Commissioner Buddy Temple, at the beginning of the Commission's regular

Monday conference. Nugent had served as chairman since January of 1981.

Wallace, who is the Commission's senior

member, was appointed to the Commission by Governor Dolph Briscoe in September, 1973, to succeed Byron Tunnell. He was then elected to serve the remainder of the term for

which he was appointed; and in 1978, was elected to serve a full six-year term. This is Wallace's second

term as Railroad Commission chairman. He previously served as chairman from January of 1977 to December of 1978.

Wallace, 53, is a graduate of the Baylor University School of Law. After four years in private law practice, he was elected Henderson County Attorney in 1957. From 1962 until 1973,

Wallace served as District Attorney for the Third Judicial District of Texas.

In January of 1973, Wallace was appointed Legal Counsel to the Governor. In April of that year,

he was appointed Executive Director of the Governor's Criminal Justice Council, where he served until his appointment to the Railroad Commission.

Serving as the governor's representative, Wallace chaired the Interstate

Mining Compact Commission from January 1 to December 31, 1980, and is presently serving as chairman of the Compact's Legal Committee. He is also co-chairman of the Legal Committee of the Interstate

Oil Compact Commission, chairman of the Texas Solar Advisory Committee, and a member of the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council.

Wallace also presently serves as a member of the National Academy of Sciences committee to study the emergency productive capacity of the nation's oil and gas fields.

While a member of the Texas Energy Advisory Council, Wallace chaired the Emergency Energy Preparedness Committee and the Advisory Committee of Lignite Research, Development, and Demonstration,

and served as a member of the Advisory Committee on Nuclear Energy.

Until January of 1979, Wallace also served as a

member of the Texas-Louisiana Steering Committee for the development of geopressed geothermal energy. On October 2,

1981, Wallace was appointed to serve a three-year term on the Advisory Committee of the Center of Energy Studies of The University of Texas at Austin.

Wallace recently served as chairman of a special committee designated by the governor and lieutenant governor to develop a report reflecting the Texas position on federal natural

gas policy. The report was delivered to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and members of Congress in August, 1982.

## Railroad Commission issues injunction

Acting at the request of the Railroad Commission and the state Attorney General, Judge H. Clark of the 109th Judicial District issued a temporary injunction prohibiting B.J. Elliott of Kermit from causing or allowing a discharge of salt water onto the ground in Winkler County.

The order, which was agreed to by the attorney representing Elliott, was sought after Commission inspectors documented severe pollution control violations on several oil leases operated by Elliott in the Hendrick and Kermit fields located between the cities of Kermit and Wink-

ed pipeline connections to several leases, forbidding purchasing companies to buy the oil produced and directed Elliott to cease production from the wells.

When continued spillage and discharges of large quantities of salt water threatened to pollute underground water resources in the area, the Commission turned over the evidence collected on the violations to the Attorney General asking that a temporary injunction be sought.

The Commission has also asked the Attorney General to seek civil penalties for violations of the Texas Natural Resources Code and the Texas Water Code.

Inspectors from the Commission's district office in Midland visited the leases on eight different days in late November and early December, finding illegal salt water disposal wells, discharges of salt water from several badly corroded tanks and water lines, and intentional dumping of salt water directly onto the ground. Commission inspections are continuing with a total of 17 leases visited on Dec. 29.

Directives to stop the discharges and clean up salt water on the ground were not complied with; and the Commission sever-

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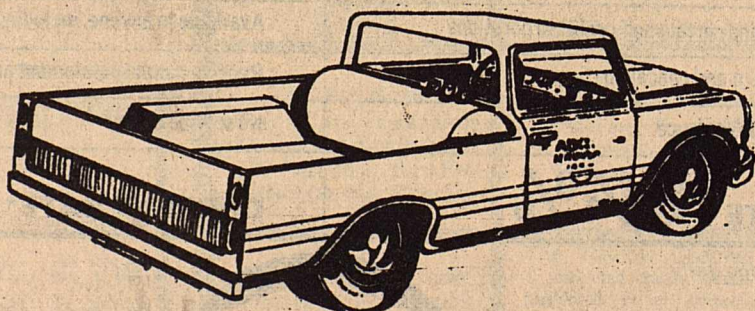
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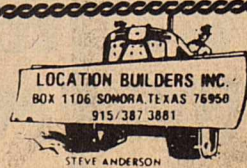

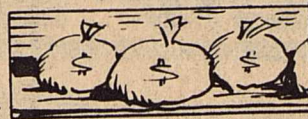

## 5 cent/gal. Fed. gas tax effective April 1,

Congress has officially passed the 5 cent a gallon increase in the federal gasoline tax. The tax will not go into effect until April first. The money will be used for interstate high-

ways and for mass transit in our larger cities.

In other words news, the Texas Railroad Commission recently ruled that a gas utility company had to give customers five working days notice before service is terminated, provided customers with a statement of their rights in both English and Spanish and to inform customers on how to resolve billing disputes and register complaints. Two other proposed changes would require gas utilities to postpone termination of gas service if it would endanger the health of a resident and the other would allow customers to postpone payment of disputed portions of their bills which exceed their monthly average until the dispute is resolved.

The average price for a gallon of regular gasoline in 1982 was 11.25. This was about 7.5 cents less than 1981.

And, the national rig count was up 60 units last week which made the tenth week in a row for an increase. The final nationwide 1982 rig count was 2,768. The year's weekly average, however, was 3,107.

In the Permian Basin our rig count this week is 347. Last week it was 366. One year ago it was 529.
