The framework set forth by the President provides a responsible vehicle to achieve decontrol. At the same time, quite frankly, I do have certain reservations which I and other Members will be addressing during the upcoming debate.

First, gas produced from tight sands formations - found in Texas and other parts of the country — is treated in a more festrictive fashion than is other gas also considered difficult and expensive to produce.

Second, the proposal violates a very basic legal principle: the sanctity of contracts. In my view, a contract is a contract and should be upheld. Within the proposal is a provision which could nullify "take-or-pay" and "price escalator" clauses, thereby

creating a legislative mandate not to fulfill the terms of a contract. Finally, a ceiling placed on the purchase gas adjustment passthrough is, in my judgment, too restrictive to allow for a smooth transition into decontrol.

However, despite these reservations, I believe the Administration has drafted a generally fair and responsible approach to the problem. I am hopeful that this will provide the foundation for action whereby America's energy producers receive a fair return while at the same time meeting the needs of consumers in the most

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 481,397,322 Mcf of gas in Nvember 1982, down 8.34 percent from field runs a vear earlier.

Marketed gas production totaled 393,633,261 Mcf and reflected a 9.44 percent decrease from the November 1981 volume. Marketed production is the total gas to transmission lines for carbon black and plant fuel and lease use.



Credit Cuts Taxes for 'Older Americans'

Some taxpayers who are 65 and older, and some even younger, can recieve a tax credit for the elderly of up to \$375 if they are single, and \$562.50 if they are married and filing a joint federal income tax return, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The tax credit for the elderly is available on 1982 federal tax returns filed by taxpayers who are age 65 or under age 65 can claim the credit if they recieve a taxable retirement income from a public retirement

Because this is a credit, it is subtracted from the tax due, but it cannot be greater than the total tax, the IRS says.

The IRS will compute the credit if the taxpayer files a filled-inSchedule R&RP, "Credit for the Elderly," with the Form 1040. The credit cannot be claimed on Form 1040A

More information on the credit for hte elderly is available in the free IRS Publication 524, "Credit for the Elderly." It can be ordered by mail using the handy order blank contained in the tax package.
