## Sonora Occupancy Tax to be Rescinded

In a vote of 4 for and one abstention the Sonora City Council voted to effect a rescission of the Occupancy Tax, an ordinance placed in effect some two months ago.

Councilman Bill Keel, who made the motion to rescind the ordinance, said he "didn't know a better way to handle business than when you've made a mistake, correct it and go on."

Legal questions arising out of how the dispersal and use of tax gave rise

to the motion.

The Chamber of Commerce was to have been the chief beneficiary of the funds generated.

Chamber President Mike Street said, "I am quite disappointed but not surprised by the City Council's rescission of the occupancy tax. The City Council created an Occupancy Tax Board to be sure the funds raised were spent in accordance with the state laws, but that board could not come up with a plan that did not

raise questions about the legality of some of the spending. The Council did not want to open themselves to a lawsuit and I can't blame them in the for that.

I am disappointed because the Chamber has had a hard time with the old Santa Fe depot which was given us by the city. I think the Chamber can renovate and maintain the depot as a Chamber office, community center and public meeting place, but that will use up all our

funds. We would not have the money to do our job which is promoting the city of Sonora, its businesses and activities. That is why the Chamber pushed for the occupancy tax...by state law at least one-fourth of the funds raised have to go to the promotion of the city, and chambers of commerce are generally subcontracted by cities to do that.

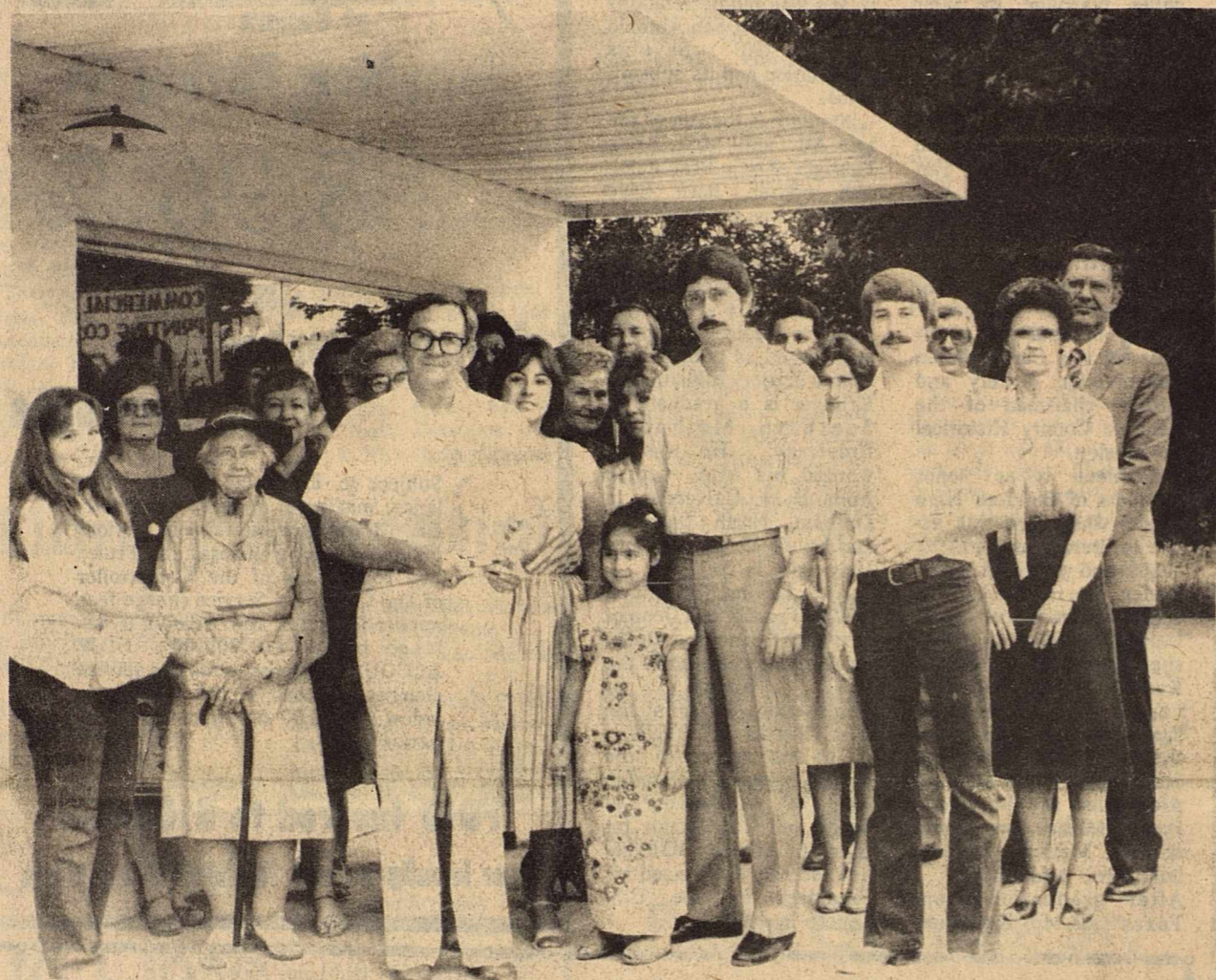
At our last meeting we gave the go-ahead to start work on the depot

and also to purchase 5000 up-to-date brochures on Sonora and Sutton County. The brochures will cost a little more than \$3,000.00. I don't know what we will do about the depot but I do want to go ahead and get the brochures. We will decide at our next meeting what we are going to do with the depot. I'd rather the Chamber perform its job as chamber of commerce from its current office, even though it is overcrowded, than have a nice office and not be able to

do our job as the Sonora Chamber of Commerce. I don't see how we can do both without the occupancy tax, or without raising our dues."

Keel pointed out that the rescission of the ordinance in no way closed the door on a future occupancy tax

should this board or any succeeding board decide it to be of benefit to the citizens of Sonora.

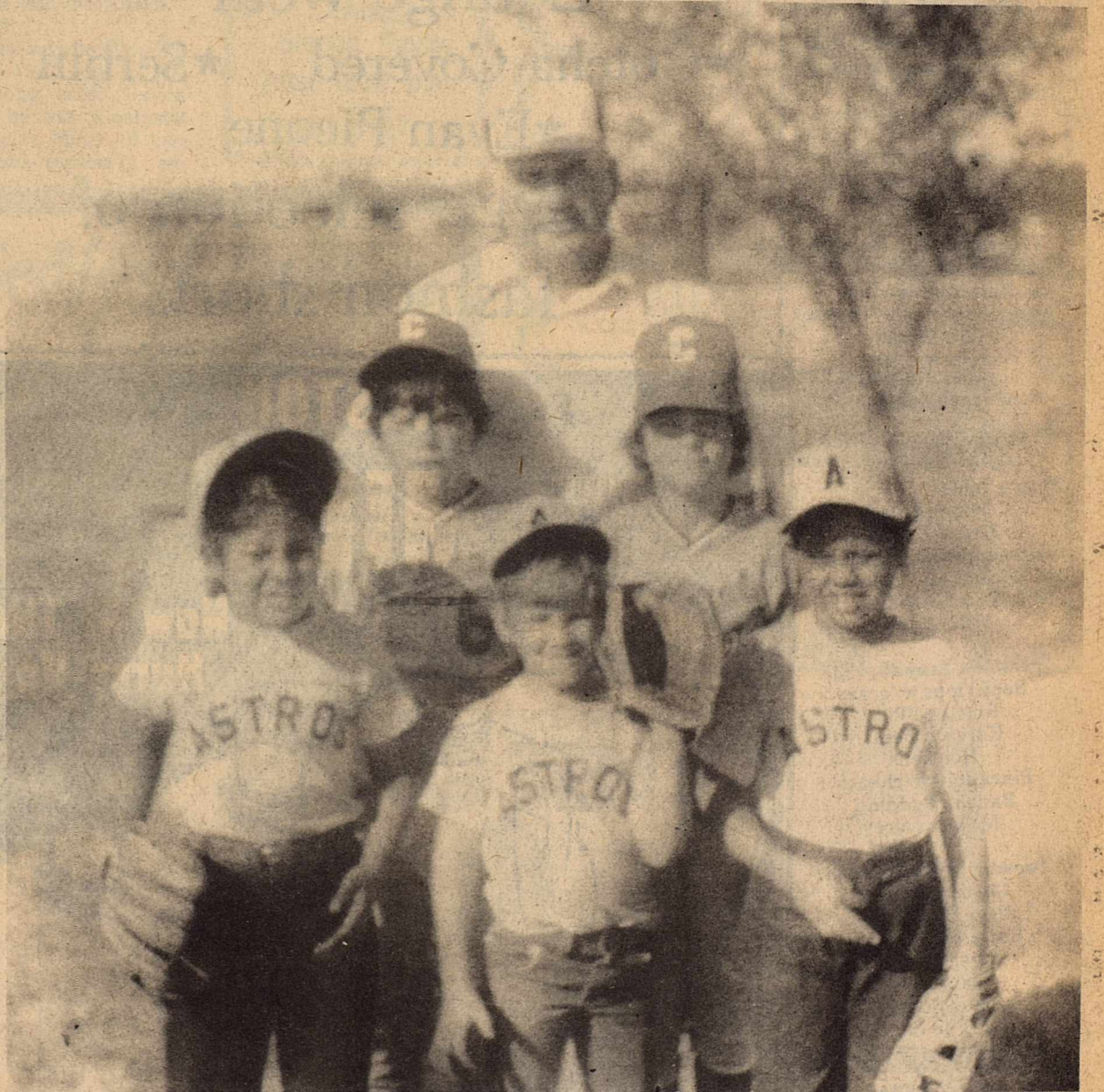
The commencement speaker was Texas Gov. Mark White. Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson was awarded an honorary doctor of humane letters

Mrs. Tobin is a past president of the San Antonio Conservation Society and current chairman of the Bandera County Historical Commission.

Kathleen is an honor graduate of Bandera High School where she was active in literary and athletic events and was head cheerleader. She received a B.A. degree from Texas A&M University. While at A&M, she was president of Kappa Kappa Gamma and was named an Outstanding Young Woman of America. She participated in Indiana State University's summer programs in San Luis Potosi, Mexico, where she studied Mexican culture, language, and history. After graduation from Texas A&M, Kathleen

joined the Washington staff of Congressman Sam Hall (D, Marshall) as a legislative assistant. Most recently, she was public relations coordinator for San Antonio based Gill Savings Association and its subsidiaries.

Krueger is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Arlon Krueger of New Braunfels. His mother, born Faye DeBate, was a member of a pioneer Mason County family. His father was a New Braunfels business leader for many years who owned Krueger Motor Company and served as president of Comal Hosiery Mills there.

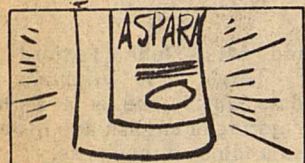

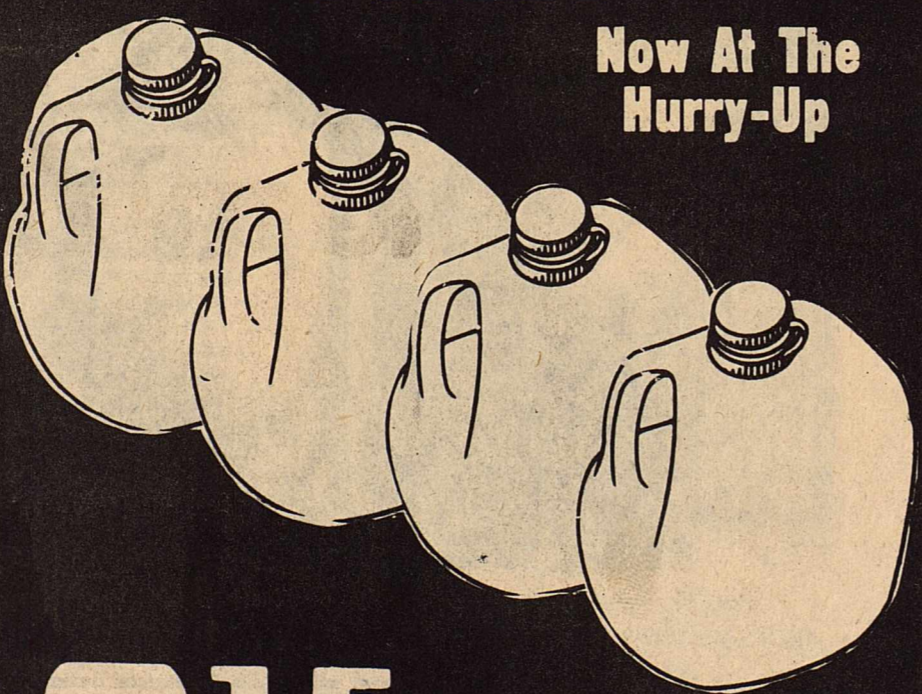

## U.S. Postal Service Accepting Employment Applications

The U.S. Postal Service announces examination to establish a register of eligibles from which future Clerk/Carriers in the 769 zip AREA REGISTER will be filled. Offices in this area include: Big Lake, Bronte, Ozona, Robert Lee, Sonora, Sterling City,

Eldorado and San Angelo, TX (Lead Office). A clerk sorts mail and distributes it by using a complicated scheme which must be memorized. Carriers have to collect and deliver mail. Starting salary rate is \$10.22 per hour.

To qualify applicants

must pass a written test and meet physical requirements.

## Green Thumb Training Focuses on Alcoholism

Former Congressman Wilbur Mills, Doc Severinson of the "Tonight Show", and Ralph Waite of "The Waltons" all have at least two things in common: they used to suffer from alcoholism, and they now have much better lives after coming to grips with the disease.

The stories of these prominent people were part of the information provided to more than 60 Green Thumb workers attending a special alcoholism training session at the Catholic Annex Building in Junction, Texas on May 17, 1983. Green Thumb employs about 1,000 persons aged 55 and over in community service projects across the state.

In a film entitled "They Do Recover," Waite, Mills, and Severinson discussed the development of their alcohol problems and the paths they followed to find relief.

"The fact that these well-known people are alcoholics helps to show the disease and alcoholism is a disease can strike anyone, rich or poor, lonely or in the spotlight," said Green Thumb district director Susan Armstrong, who conducted the training.

"Mills and Severinson suffered from severe blackouts, and Mills was afraid he had a brain tumor until examinations revealed his problem was alcoholism," she said.

"Waite says he often felt 'dead and alone,'" Armstrong said, "even though he was a national celebrity. Many of our co-workers—especially wi-

dows and widowers—know the feeling. We want to demonstrate that alcohol will only make any existing problems worse."

She said some of Green Thumb's enrollees have lost their jobs because of drinking, and for these people the future is dim. "They've lost their income and their self-respect, and a few of them will have the resilience and energy to fight back. Prevention, whether you're young or old, is the best answer."

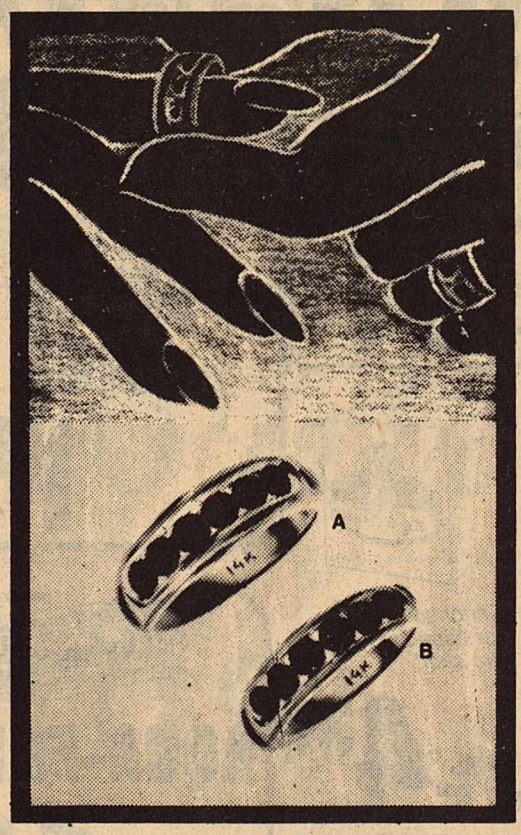

# CAPITOL UPDATE

Texans have always understood the critical importance of quality education in maintaining a free and prosperous nation. In fact, the founders of the Republic of Texas cited the lack of a public education system as one of their grievances when they declared their independence from Mexico.

A recent report on the colleges chosen by National Merit Scholars tells the nation what we as Texans knew already — that the quality of higher education in Texas is outstanding.

National Merit Scholars are chosen from among the top one percent of high school students taking an annual examination. Of the 50 universities which count among their students the largest numbers of these exceptionally bright students, four are in Texas.

Rice University in Houston ranks third in the nation with 554 Merit Scholars. Texas A&M University in College Station ranks sixth, with 445 Merit Scholars. The University of Texas has 424 scholars, placing it eighth among universities nationally, and Baylor University includes 196 Merit Scholars among its students, giving it 22nd place.

In terms of entering freshman Merit Scholars, Texas universities also rank prominently. Among entering freshmen in 1982, Texas A&M tied with Princeton University for second, with 190 scholars. Rice University had 172 entering freshmen who were Merit Scholars, making it the fourth most popular choice. The University of Texas ranked eighth with 130 entering freshmen.

One of the most impressive aspects of these statistics is the significant increase in the number of Merit Scholars who have chosen Texas universities in the period since 1979. Texas schools had a combined total of 1,914 Merit Scholars this school year, a 40 percent increase from the 1,367 in 1979. The most dramatic increase has occurred at Texas A&M, where there was a 129.4 percent increase, from 194 in 1979 to 445 this year. The University of Texas showed a 117.4 percent increase, and Baylor University, an 81.5 percent jump.

These figures indicate two things to me: Texas universities are among the best in the nation, and their national reputation is increasing each year.

In light of a recent report by the National Commission on Excellence in Education — a report which was less than flattering to our nation's schools — I find this testimony to the quality of Texas higher education to be a particular source of pride.

Of course, the numbers of Merit Scholars attending our universities is only one measure. The thousands of well-trained, well-educated young men and women who are graduated from our universities each year are the real reward to our commitment to excellence in education.

These are the young people on whom we will count in the future to fill the needs of our expanding business and industry and to make our communities better places to live. Each of our institutions of higher learning, and each of us as Texans, can be proud of the job we are doing to meet our needs for a new generation of educated, dedicated men and women to take our state into the 21st Century.

**The Border Task Force  
 An Important First Step**

Last year, Texans at home and in our Nation's capitol watched with concern the events signaling that our neighbor to the south was confronted with even deeper and more critical economic problems than had previously been experienced. As a result there were not one but two devaluations of the peso, with the second devaluation necessitating an immediate trip to Washington by Mexico's foreign minister to report that his country did not have enough foreign currency to pay for a month's imports.

The ramifications of the Mexican report were abundantly clear. The world's thirteenth largest economy was in trouble, and immediate action would be necessary to address its economic problems. In response, our Departments of State, Treasury, Energy and Agriculture joined together to help avert economic catastrophe for Mexico. Within days, the wheels were set in motion. The peso was successfully defended and Mexico given time to work out her own solutions both internally and with regard to her foreign debt.

President Reagan has now called for an equally dramatic response to the problems the peso devaluations caused on our side of the border. In my judgment, the economic crisis confronting our border states — including Texas — calls for the same coordinated effort. Therefore, it gave me great satisfaction to learn, prior to his trip to Texas for the Cinco de Mayo celebration, that the President would be announcing the establishment of the Working Group on Southwestern Border States.

To be chaired by Robert Dederick, Under Secretary for Economic Affairs in the Department of Commerce, this border task force will be composed of representatives of the Departments of State, Treasury, Justice, Labor, Health and Human Services, Housing and Urban Development, the Office of Management and Budget, and the Small Business Administration, as well as the White House. Within 45 days the border task force is to report the President concerning the magnitude of the problems which exist in the border region, what state and local governments can do at the present time, and what action the Federal Government should take.

The choice of San Antonio for this important announcement was highly appropriate. For, while the impact of the peso devaluations have been felt most severely along the Mexican border — where unemployment ranges from 20 to 30 percent and where retail and wholesale trade are down as much as 60 percent — in truth our entire State is adversely affected and could be for years to come.

These sharp increases in unemployment, coupled with falling business activity, are causing local tax bases to erode rapidly at the same time that local government entities are being required to shoulder the additional burden of educating alien children in Texas public schools. Illegal immigration, as we all know, is up 50 percent over last year and some are estimating that fully one-third or more of the 2 million illegal entrants will become permanent residents. Many are expected to find their way to Texas, which will exacerbate State and local burdens.

While we all share in the hope that the Mexican economy fully recovers, there is no question that the recovery will be a long and extended process. Therefore, those areas within the United States along the border simply can wait no longer.

We must turn with the same commitment and coordination to help those in our own country who, through no fault of their own, have been suffering due to the devaluation of the peso. The President's border task force is an important first step — a step which must be followed by prompt action.

**Social Security  
 Urges People to  
 Check Records**

Even though earnings for recent years are not posted to a person's Social Security Record, earnings for those years will be included when his or her benefit rate is figured, Frank Upp, Social Security District Manager in San Angelo, said recently. This is because Social Security can use other evidence to establish the correct amount of earnings, Upp said. Commonly used documents are W-2 Forms for the years concerned. Self-employed people can submit copies of the federal income tax returns, along earnings through 1980 are posted at this time. Posting of 1981 earnings should be completed early this year, Upp said.

Social Security processes about 210 million wage items each year. Employers send wage reports for their employees to Social Security by the end of February for the previous year and Social Security processes these reports throughout

the year. About .5 percent of the wage reports show an incorrect Social Security number or name and another 1 percent have no number or name at all. All but about 1.4 percent of the incorrect reports can be corrected through processing.

Reports that cannot be processed are kept on file and can be used when the person involved reports that some of his or her earnings are not recorded. Most of these earnings are those of people who work at casual labor, migrant work, or other irregular jobs.

People are urged to check their Social Security record every 3 years. A free post card form can be obtained for this purpose at any Social Security office. More information about Social Security Records can be obtained at the San Angelo Social Security Office, located at 2214 Sherwood Way. The telephone number is 949-4608.

**Traffic Deaths Decreasing**

Statewide traffic deaths decreased last year for the first time since 1976, according to statistics released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said 4,271 traffic fatalities were reported in 1982, a reduction of 9.1 percent compared to the previous year. The mileage death rate decreased 12.8 percent to 3.4 deaths per hundred million miles traveled in 1982 compared to 3.9 in 1981.

Adams believes the reduction in fatalities resulted from several factors.

"Stepped-up enforcement by DPS and local officers brought about a 25

percent increase in DWI arrests last year," he said. "The Highway Patrol has also been concentrating on speed enforcement, and this has helped bring the top speeds down on our highways."

The DPS director said public concern about DWI has contributed to the decrease in fatalities.

"Widespread attention to the drunken driving problem by the news media and citizen groups has increased the public's recognition of the seriousness of this menace," Adams pointed out. "Motorists who drink now have a greater fear of the consequences of driving under

the influence of alcohol, and consequently are being more careful. Our challenge now is to sustain this public concern to help turn this temporary reduction into a lasting accomplishment. Pending DWI legislation will assist greatly in this respect."

Adams noted that 25 percent of the statewide fatalities (1,066) were DWI related.

"We still maintain that this statistic would be in the 50 percent range if state law required blood alcohol measurements from all drivers involved in fatal accidents," he said. "But this figure makes it plain

that DWI remains one of the leading causes of traffic deaths."

Motorcycle operator and passenger deaths totaled 403 in 1982, an 8.8 decrease compared with the previous year. Four out of five of the motorcyclists killed were not wearing protective headgear when accident occurred.

More than 98 percent of the persons killed in passenger vehicles were not wearing seat belts.

"Although we saw a significant reduction in statewide fatalities last year, the number of per-

Screwworms, a serious pest of the Texas livestock industry and wildlife populations, have been successfully eradicated from the United States, but the possibility of reinfestation is a real danger, reported Dr. Clifford Hoelscher, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Hoelscher, who works for the Texas A&M University System, said that isolated infestations of screwworms have been detected and successfully eradicated in southern Texas during both 1981 and 1982. The last positive case of screwworms in Texas was identified from Starr County in August 1982.

"The mild winter weather and spring rainfall experienced in central and south Texas are prime environmental development conditions for this pest," he said.

Currently, the governments of the United States and Mexico are working on a nine-year-old cooperative program to eradicate this pest from most of Mexico.

"Reinfestation of previously clean areas behind the eradication line is always a major problem," Hoelscher said. He noted that the Extension Service relied heavily

on individual livestock owners and local veterinarians to send in larval samples from all animal wounds to keep up surveillance for the screwworm. Early detection of any new infestations would be the key factor in keeping this pest from becoming established.

Special mailing tubes are available without cost from the local veterinarian and county Extension agents. Cattlemen should collect and send at least 10 larvae from deep within wounds of livestock or pets for identification to the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Laboratory, P.O. Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572.

### Preserve Reforms Act Called On

The president of the Texas Farm Bureau has called on Texas Congressmen and Senators to help preserve reforms of the Economic Recovery Act of 1981.

In a letter to the Texas delegation in Congress, S.M. True Jr. said farmers are "deeply concerned about the apparent change in attitude in Congress toward solving the very real financial crisis which this nation faces."

True charged that Congress has abandoned attempts to achieve a balanced budget by cutting federal spending in favor of increasing taxes and allowing federal deficits to build at what he called an unprecedented rate.

The cotton and grain

farmer from Plainview said Farm Bureau is concerned about reports that the House Ways and Means Committee is recommending repeal of the third year of the income tax cut scheduled to go into effect July 1; freezing the estate tax exemption phase-in at the present level of \$275,000, and repeal of the indexing provision due to begin Jan. 1, 1985.

"We still believe that passage of the Economic

Recovery Act of 1981 was a necessary economic adjustment to correct 'obvious financial inequities caused by excessive federal spending and the resulting inflation,'" True told members of the Texas delegation.

True said the "catastrophic consequences of the runaway inflation of 1978-1982 is still firmly impressed in our memory. We hope that we all learned from that painful experi-

ence, and that the current attitude of Congress will not result in a recurrence of that tragedy."

House and Senate budget committees have adopted First Concurrent Budget Resolutions for Fiscal 1984. The resolutions are non-binding and do not require presidential approval. However, they do establish the fiscal framework or goals which Congress theoretically will try to follow in fiscal 1984.

Texas Christian University Press has announced plans to public "150 Years of the Texas Cowboy", a major art book to be written and illustrated by the 16 members of the Texas Cowboy Artists Association as their sesquicentennial project.

Scheduled for publication in the summer of 1985, the book will be over 200 pages, with approximately 100 pages in full color. Each painting, drawing and

sculpture used in the book will be specifically designed for this book and will be available for private purchase. After publication of the book, the original art will be kept together during the sesquicentennial period for display throughout the state at various art galleries and book signing parties.

Texas Cowboy Artists Association is an 11-year-old organization dedicated to documenting historically--through art--the heritage and domain of the cowboy. Membership in the organization is by invitation only, and the work of any prospective member is carefully considered for quality and

authenticity. The group previously illustrated "XII: The American Cowboy," published in 1975 by Oxmoor House. For their sesquicentennial book, TCA members will hold several juries at which members will vote on each piece of art submitted for the project.

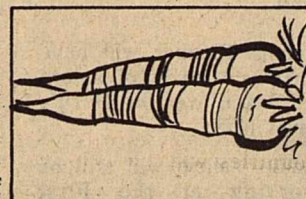

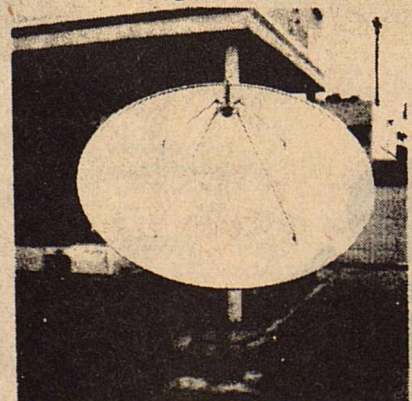

## Texans, Beware of Tick Fever

The tick population is up this spring, likely due to the mild weather, and therein lies a potential threat to Texans.

Some ticks can cause Rocky Mountain spotted fever, a disease that can be fatal to humans.

"Texans should be aware that ticks are active this time of the year and should be especially cautious when

camping or in the outdoors," says Dr. Phil Hamman, an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Cases of Rocky Mountain spotted fever have increased rapidly in Texas in recent years, with two deaths resulting. Cases of

the disease have occurred over most of the U.S. in recent years.

The fever is caused by the organism, rickettsia, which is carried in rodents and other wild animals and transmitted by ticks. Humans can be infected with the disease through actual tick bites or through their fingernails when crushing ticks found on dogs or other pets, explains Hamman.

Symptoms of spotted fever develop in 2 to 14 days after contact with an infected tick. First symptoms are sudden onset of headache, fever and aching muscles. If these symptoms occur within two weeks after a tick bite or other contact with a tick, get immediate medical at-

tention, emphasizes the entomologist.

Early treatment averts serious illness or complications, says Hamman. A rash (hence, the name "spotted fever") develops two or three days after fever starts. The rash starts the wrists and ankles and spreads to other parts of the body.

Two types of ticks are known to transmit Rocky Mountain spotted fever in Texas—the American dog tick and the Lone Star tick. The first is found throughout Texas while the Lone Star tick is found mostly in central and eastern areas.

What precautions can be taken regarding ticks? "Awareness is half the battle," points out

Hamman. "Be aware that ticks are in the environment when you're camping or just outdoors and routinely examine your body and clothing for ticks—two or three times a day. Early removal of ticks is important since the disease organism is not transferred until ticks have fed for two to eight hours."

Always remove ticks with their mouthparts intact, cautions the entomologist. Mouthparts left in the skin can transmit the disease or cause secondary infections.

To relax tick mouthparts for easy removal, touch the tick with a hot needle or a few drops of camphor, alcohol, turpentine, kerosene or chloroform. Sometimes the best method is to grasp the

tick firmly with tweezers or fingers and remove it with a slow, steady pull. Always treat the wound with a germicidal agent.

When outdoors for extended periods, Hamman recommends using an insect repellent, spraying the shoes, socks, and pant legs. Since most repellents are effective for only short periods, repeated applications may be necessary.

If ticks are found on pets or in the yard or home, several pesticides are available for treatment. Those that can be used both inside and outside the home include chlorphrifos (Dursban), diazinon and propoxur (Baygon). Be sure to follow label directions in using these materials, cautions Hamman.

## Soybean Outlook Clouded

Despite some price strengthening as a spinoff from the PIK (the government's payment-in-kind program), a continuing large surplus is clouding the outlook for soybeans, says a Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist.

"Texas soybean growers will likely receive between \$5.50 and \$6.50 per bushel for their 1983 soybeans—slightly above last year's price," predicts Johnny Feagan. "And the state's

soybean acreage will likely be down sharply from the 920,000 acres harvested in 1982 when the crop sold for \$125 million."

Soybean prices have improved some due to the high farmer participation in PIK regarding feed grains,

cotton and rice. (Soybeans are not included in PIK.) The high percentage of land to be idled under PIK will reduce total soybean production over the U.S. by about 8 percent since some

farmers have double-cropped with soybeans in the past. Under PIK, this practice is not allowed, notes Feagan.

The economist expects soybean exports to remain soft during the year and increase only about 2 percent. However, 45 percent of this nation's soybeans sales could be to the European Economic Community during the 1982-83 marketing year, with another 20 percent going to Japan.

Feagan sees some slight improvement in soybean oil prices if economic conditions improve in the U.S. and Europe. However, increased soybean crushings in the South American countries will increase the competition for U.S. oil and meal products.

"An increase in livestock and poultry feeding could spark an increase in domestic soybean use," says Feagan, "as prices improve

for meat products and competing feed prices increase."

The final price that farmers get for their beans hinges on a number of factors, according to Feagan. These include the total size of the crop both in the U.S. and abroad, weather conditions, the amount of double cropping, strength of the U.S. dollar abroad, marketing patterns of PIK products, and margins in livestock and poultry feeding.

## Texas 4-H'ers Compete for Scholarships

Four Texas 4-H members will be among 27 to 11 states to receive a \$750 college scholarship donated by the Santa Fe Railway System.

The scholarships are awarded to 4-H'ers who have demonstrated outstanding ability, leadership and proficiency in 4-H projects, says Preston Sides, 4-H and youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

These four Texans, plus another four, will also receive expense-paid trips to the National 4-H Congress, November 27-December 1, in Chicago. Santa Fe

provides a total of 60 such trips.

Winners are chosen by the Extension Service. Awards are arranged by the National 4-H Council, a not-for-profit educational organization that supports the 4-H program with private resources.

More information on the Santa Fe awards program is available from the county Extension office, notes Sides.

Santa Fe has been a supporter of the national 4-H program for more than 60 years.

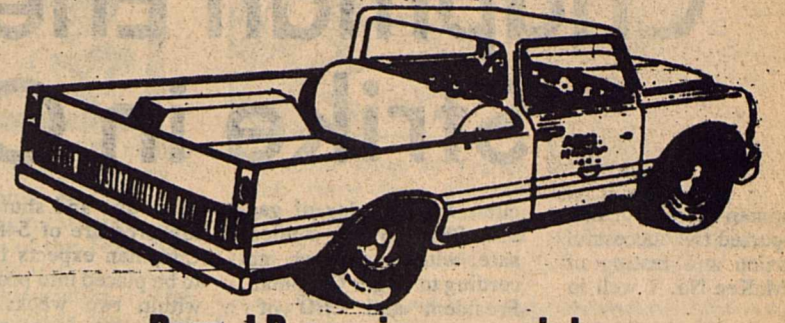

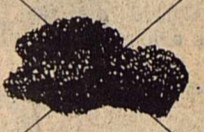

## Chapman Energy Reports Major Strike in Orange County

Chapman Energy, Inc. has reported the successful completion and testing of their McKee No. 1 well in the Peveto Field, Orange County, Texas. The confirmation well to Sanders No. 1 is flowing 5,028,000

cubic feet per day of gas, 312 BBL/day of condensate, with zero water, according to Roger Chapman, President and CEO of Chapman Energy. The McKee No. 1 test on a 13/64 choke shows a flowing tubing pressure of

5382 lbs., and shut-in tubing pressure of 5480 lbs. Chapman expects the well to be placed into production within two weeks. The company has a ready market for the oil and gas. According to Roger Chapman, "the test results

of McKee No. 1 indicate a very significant development for Chapman Energy. We plan to begin drilling the next well within 45 days." Chapman also noted that Chapman Energy, Inc. has a 12-1/2 percent work-

ing interest in the McKee No. 1 as well as in all additional development wells to be drilled. Chapman Energy, Inc. is a diversified oil and gas exploration and development company head-

quartered in Dallas which operates principally in Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma. The stock (NASDAQ symbol CHPN) is traded over-the-counter. The company also has offices in Houston, Texas.

## Pipeline Permit Summary

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that 15 permits to operate new pipelines in Texas were granted by the RRC in April. Last month the Commission approved eight permits, and 25 were granted in April 1982.

Top of the new permits were for gathering pipelines, three were for trunk transmission lines, and two were for other types of lines. Gathering lines bring oil and gas from production leases, while a trunk transmission line is a larger diameter line into which smaller lines con-

nect. Fourteen of the newly-permitted lines will transport gas, and one will carry products. In April, five permits were granted to operate pipelines in deep South Texas, four in the Refugio area, two each in East Texas and West Central

Texas, and one in North Texas. One was granted for an offshore line. Gathering lines approved: High Island Pipe Line Inc., Houston, gas, offshore Jefferson County; Flatwood Gas Inc., Winters, TX., gas Eastland County; Teco Pipeline Co., Houston, gas, (five lines--one in Duval County and

four in Live Oak County); Victoria Gas Corp., Corpus Christi, gas, Cameron County; Tejas Gas Corp., Corpus Christi, gas, Upshur County; Entersprise Resources Inc., Houston, gas, Fisher County. Trunk transmission lines approved: Tejas Gas Corp., Corpus Christi, gas, Duval County; Triangle Gas Pipe-

line Co., Tyler, gas, Smith County; Dorchester Transmission, Dallas, gas, Nueces County. Other lines approved: Enserch Exploration Inc., Bridgeport, gas, Hender-

## Permian Basin Petroleum Association Energy Report

The House of Representatives' tax oversight subcommittee heard testimony recently on the tax differences between independent producers and major oil companies. The deputy assistant secretary of the U.S. Treasury Department, the director of the Congressional Budget Office and some economists said the tax differences amount to subsidies for independents. The Budget Office director

Alice Rivlin, said 2.5 billion dollars could be raised by eliminating the windfall profits tax rates and percentage depletion for independents. Most of the subcommittee members, and several independent producers said the tax preferences are needed and they should be enlarged to help the industry slump. The Treasury Department spokesman said the tax differences would amount to between 12 and

13 billion dollars over the next five years. An economist with the Library of Congress, Jane Gravelle, testified that the tax preferences are inefficient because independents invest only ten cents of every dollar saved in taxes. Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen said independents reinvest \$1.05 for every one dollar earned. In Texas Legislative news, the Senate State

Affairs Committee approved an amendment to the oilfield pollution bill that would allow the posting of a bond if a person, utility or corporation is charged with polluting. The bond would be effective until all judicial review of the order or decision is final. In the Permian Basin our rig count for this week is 238. Last week it was 234. One year ago it was 363.

## Drilling in April

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace announced that Texas operators reported 101 gas and 68 oil discoveries in April 1983. On year ago, 126 gas and 57 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency. Gas discoveries in April include 33 in deep South Texas, 19 each in Southeast Texas and the Refugio area, eight in the Midland area, seven each in North Texas and West Central Texas, three in East Texas, two in East Central Texas and one each in Panhandle and the Lubbock and San Angelo areas.

Lubbock area. In April, operators reported 465 exploratory and field test wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,402 in April, which was the same total for these test during the same month a year ago. Applications to drill, deepen, a plug back and for service wells in April amounted 2,799 against 2,767 a year earlier. Operators filed 731 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 898 amended requests.
