WHOEVER THOUGHT UP Branson, Missouri should have gotten a patent on it. The place has evolved into the family entertainment capital of the country, or maybe it is the bus tour capital. Either title would fit quite well.

Practically everybody in this area has made a trip to Branson except us, so we took off a week and went on one of the bus tours. Our staff did a grand job of getting the papers out last week while we were gone and we appreciate them more than we can say.

We stopped for lunch the first day in Oklahoma City and ate too much. When we got back on the bus, the bottom step got hung up on the curb and the bus driver couldn't shut the door. Everybody had to get up and lean over to the left side so he could get the door closed. That set the tone for eating, snacking, gobbling and gorging all the way across Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and into Missouri.

The driver took us on an unscheduled side trip to downtown Oklahoma City so we could see the damaged buildings around the bomb site. Windows are still boarded up waiting for insurance to decide if the buildings will be repaired or torn down. It is difficult to see how more people were not killed in those surrounding buildings.

Bill often says that the Panhandle area is kind of like one great big home town. The 38 folks on our bus proved this. Everyone either knew someone or was related to someone in Friona or Bovina.

Ten lively couples from Amarillo were all big golfing buddies and they kept the rest of us in stitches from the moment we took off. The rest of our bus mates were from the surrounding area... Pampa, Vega, Mobeetie, Happy Dumas, Abernathy, Shamrock, Claude.

There were actually two buses on this tour and Bovina's own Joyce Read and her mother Lucille Stowers of Amarillo were on the other bus. This was their third bus tour to Branson and they said it was

by far the best one yet. The shows were better than ever.

My good buddy Anne Spring went on the trip, too, and her seat mate was a lady from Iran. I found out that it isn't a foreign country, but is a town right here in Texas. This lady also had a sister from New Braunfels on the bus.

Everyone took turns coming up front to the microphone to get acquainted and tell funny stories. The whole bus just fell in love with Anne and enjoyed hearing her stories about England, how she met Dr. Lee Spring and came to the U.S. They asked a lot of questions to keep her talking because they loved to listen to her delightful English accent. She said that when English finally becomes the official language of the U.S. we'll all have to learn to speak it and she will be giving lessons.

One leg of our trip was through the Ozarks of Northwestern Arkansas and Southern Missouri to view the Fall foliage colors. It was breathtaking. We had a couple of overcast days, but I've never seen such bright red trees even with no sun shining on them.

Between Harrison and Eureka Springs, Arkansas we crossed the South Fork of Dry Creek. Bill said that sounded like most of the "bodies of water" that we have around here and if you have a dry creek then why do you need a south fork of it? We went through Blue Eye and Lizard Ridge and stopped to use the two story outhouse at Booger Hollow where the population is seven "including one old coon dog."

We had two nights in Arkansas and then on to Branson where we saw eight great shows in three days and came home exhausted and ten pounds heavier. Bill said the trip reminded him of his Muleshoe High School Senior Trip to Eureka Springs exactly forty years ago. It must have been similar because the bus driver said we were all just a bunch of recycled teen-agers.

As one of the top five individual finishers, she qualified to compete in the regional cross country meet November 4 in Lubbock.

Campos finished with a time of 13:06 by using great pacing and a superb second-mile to come from 50th place for her fourth place finish.

Fillie runner Maria Fragoza also ran her best race of the season. She was aggressive and finished a strong 11th at 13:35.

Other varsity runners were Lori Beauchamp-19th-14:04; Marcy Guevara-26th-14:31; Melissa Cantu-30th-14:44; Alex Dopp-32nd-14:50; and Stephine Villarreal-39th-15:06.

In JV competition, the Fillies used number force as 22 Fillies combined to form three teams and

finished 2nd, 3rd, and 6th.

JV Fillies, using pack running, were led by freshman Monica Perez-8th-15:11. Overall point total competitors managed to stay in the race, with five more contests to predict.

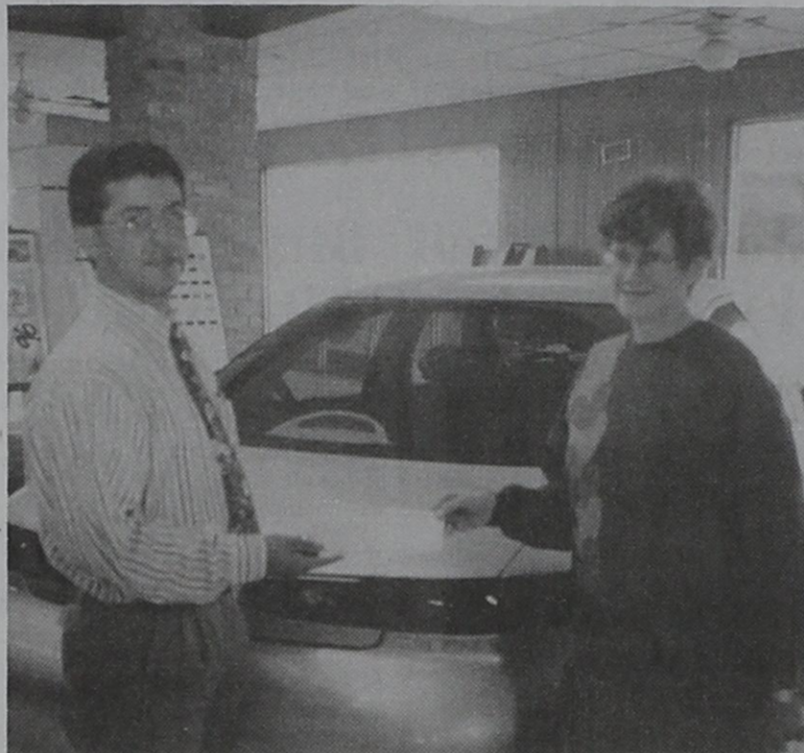
Mike Read is alone this week in first place with 83 points, followed by J.T. Roach and Susan Kerby with 82.
