DEFEAT OZONA LIONS 45-34

Broncos finish season with win

The Sonora Broncos closed out the 1983 football campaign in grand fashion with a 45-34 win over the Ozona Lions. This left the Broncos season mark at 6-4 and 2-3 in district play. It dropped the Lions to 3-7 and 0-5.

The Broncos took the opening kickoff and on the first play quarterback Jeff Brittain connected with wide receiver Esau Ramirez for a 55 yard completion down to the Ozona 9 yard line. Fullback Tino Martinez carried twice down to the two yard line, where on third down Brittain took it in the score. Scott Miller kicked the extra point.

The Lions fumbled on their next possession and defensive end Mario Sotelo came up with the ball. This time it again took only one play and again it was Brittain to Ramirez for a 34 yard touchdown. Scott Miller split the uprights making the first quarter score 21-0 in favor of the Broncos.

The Lions scored on their next possession as they completed key passes added to the hard running of Diego Leal.

The Broncos were unable to mount a ground attack and the Lions forced them to punt. The Lions then went on a 70 yard drive that ended in 7 points just before halftime making the score 21-14 at the break.

The Broncos got their running game started in the third quarter and moved the ball steadily down field. Fullback Tino Martinez scored on a 7 yard run. Scott Miller again booted the extra point. This made the score 28-14.

The Lions came passing right back and scored quickly moving the ball on long passes. The extra point attempt failed making the score 28-20.

The next Bronco possession moved to the Lion 20 yard line before ending in a Scott Miller 27 yard field goal. This made the score 31-20.

The Broncos forced an Ozona turnover on the Lions next possession. The Bronco running game steadily moved down field behind the hard running of Tino Martinez, Mike Polocsek, Victor Lira and Joe Mike Noriega. The drive ended in a three yard score by Jeff Brittain and enter Scott Miller for the extra point making the score 38-20.

The Lions could have folded but instead showed a great deal of pride and spirit as they came roaring back to make a game of it. They scored on their next possession and also scored a two point extra point to up the score to 38-28. They then executed a perfect on side kick and got the ball back with about four minutes left in the game. Again they attacked through the air and faking the pass and running the draw play and scored again. The extra point attempt again failed. This made the score 38-34. The onside kick attempt failed this time as an alert Bronco got on the ball. The Broncos moved the ball on the ground using up most of the time left in the game and the score came on a one yard Jeff Brittain keeper. Scott Miller booted the final extra point making the final score 45-34.

Tino Martinez was the leading rusher with 104 yards on 16 carries. Victor Lira carried 11 times for 40 yards. Mike Polocsek had 30 yards on 5 carries. Joe Mike Noriega had 25 yards on 10 attempts. The team total was 221 yards on 51 carries.

In the passing department Jeff Brittain was 5-8 for 154 yards and 2 touchdowns. Esau Ramirez caught three for 132 yards and Drew Wallace caught 2 for 22 yards.

Elsewhere around the district, Ballinger beat Coahoma 19-9 and captured their second straight district championship with a district record of 4-0-1 and 9-0-1 season record. They will face Fabens in a

bi-district game in Ballinger. The other game saw Crane advance to the playoffs with a 21-14 win over Colorado City. This left Crane 4-0-1 in district and 9-0-1 on the season. The Wolves finished 3-2 in district and 6-4 on the season. Crane will face Kermit in their Bi-district playoff game at Crane.

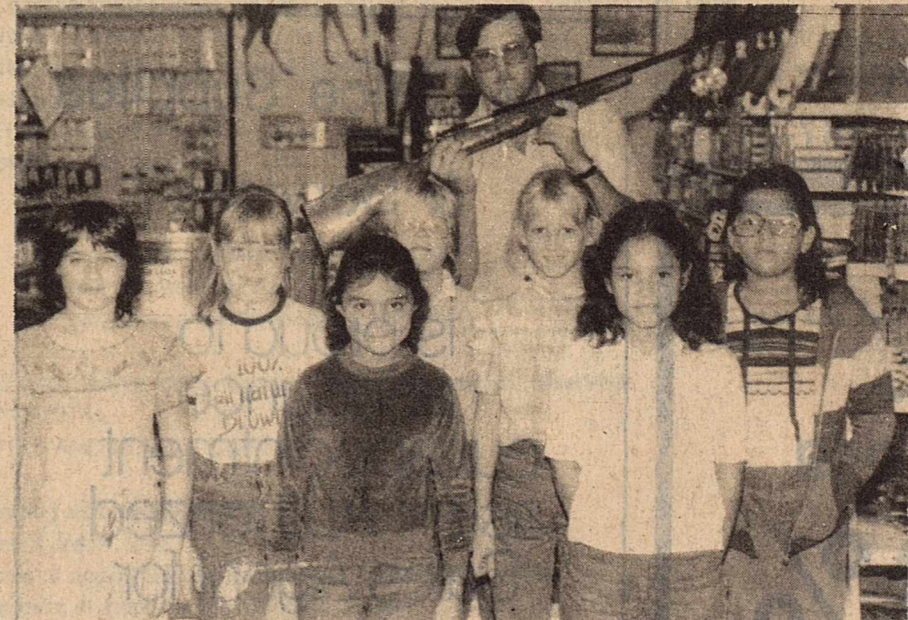
The Bronco season was a very good season and much of that due to a group of seniors that worked hard and were good team leaders. The offensive load was carried by fullback Tino Martinez who carried 199 times for 915 yards on the season. Victor Lira accumulated 317 yards on 79 attempts. Jeff Brittain got 226 yards on 53 attempts. In the passing department Drew Wallace was 12 of 44 with 3 intercepted for 215 yards and Jeff Brittain was 12 of 52 with 3 intercepted for 324 yards.

The receiving leader was sophomore Esau Ramirez with 12 catches for 392 yards. The next two leading receivers were Jeff Brittain with five catches for 66 yards and Drew Wallace 4 catches for 55 yards.

The offensive statistics are great but could not have been accomplished without the fine blocking of the offensive linemen. For most of the year they were, Ronnie Pollard at Center, Daniel Garza, Mario Sotelo, Jerry Jimenez at guards, Ismael Sanchez and Rodney Jones as tackles and Ruben Garza and Barry Graves at tight end.

The defense was also very impressive and was tough on opposing offenses. Senior Ronnie Munns anchored the noseguard position along with help from Roy Hulsey. The tackles were Houston Powers, Rodney Jones, and Jerry Jimenez. The linebackers Gilbert Martinez, Tino Martinez and Jeff Brittain. The ends where Ruben Garza, Mario Sotelo, Ronnie Pollard, Robert Mittel. The Secondary was Victor Lira, Tony Garza, Eddie Castro, Jessie Guerra, Joe Mike Noriega, and John David Martinez.

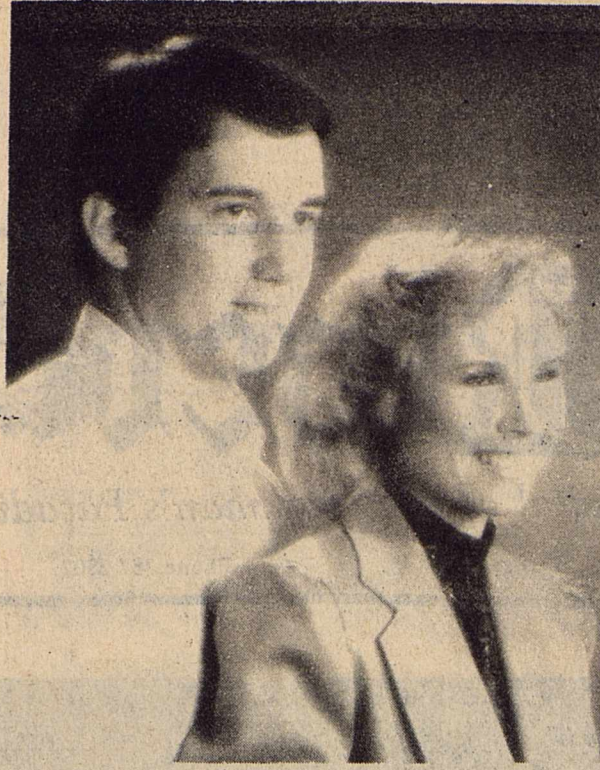

Mrs. J.W. (Jewel) Sykes of Sonora, 74, died at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, October 29, at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital after a long illness.

Funeral services were held October 30 at 3 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church with E.B. McCowen, minister of an Abilene Church of Christ, officiating. Burial was in Sonora Cemetery under the direction of Kerbow Funeral Home.

Mrs. Sykes was born Jewel Martin, March 28, 1909 in Petersburg, (Hale County) Texas. Her parents were the late Albert Sidney Johnston Martin and Nettie Blanchewhite Martin. Jewel was the only daughter in a family of seven sons.

She graduated from Harold High School, Harold, Texas in 1927 and attended college in Canyon, Texas at Texas Tech in Lubbock.

She began teaching in the Owensville Community in Sutton County in 1930.

She married John Wesley Sykes of Owensville community on December 27, 1936.

After the birth of one daughter, Janis and twin sons, the L.W. Elliott School in Sonora where she taught until the birth of her last child, Jack, in 1956. When Jack began kindergarten in 1961, she again went back to teaching and drove the bus from the Owensville Community until her retirement in 1974.

She is survived by her husband, John Wesley Sykes; one daughter, Mrs. George (Janis) Boucher of Elko, Nevada, two sons, W. Alfred Sykes and Jack M. Sykes of Sonora, and ten grandchildren.

Also surviving are four brothers: Virgil Martin of Halecenter, Albert Martin of Sonora, H.O. Martin of Medford, Oregon, and Charlie Martin of Petersburg, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Mrs. Sykes was preceded in death by her parents, by her son Albert Sykes and brother Estes Martin, Clyde Martin and Marvin Martin.

Mrs. Sykes was a dedicated educator. She was active, until retirement, in the Sonora Art Club and has had a booth displaying her work for Sutton County Days since 1975. She won numerous awards and ribbons at the Mason Art Show, San Angelo Fat Stock Show and other small community art shows in this area.

She was an avid enthusiast in pursuing family history and aided in producing a genealogy and history of her mother's family, the late Ed M. White, pioneer founder of Petersburg, Texas.

She collected and restored great amounts of antique memorabilia which she used in furnishing and decorating the Sykes ranch house.

She was an active member of the Church of Christ and attended Cedar Hill Church of Christ.

Pallbearers were grandsons Wes and Jack Sykes, and friends Billy D. Evans, Ted Dunavant, Elmer Wilson, Glen Chadwick, George Schwiening, and Lester Shroyer.

Travels with Mary Ann

My first choice of travel was Hawaii, mainly because I am a travel agent and last year had the opportunity to go on a familiarization trip which covered four islands in one week. For relaxed travel, this is too much ground to cover in so short a time, but I had the good fortune of mixing pleasure and education. I learned to pronounce the names of the islands when I go there, which was part of the experience.

The literature strongly suggested a hat, sun lotion, and cool comfortable clothing. Not being a "seasoned traveler", I forgot my hat and took enough clothes for a month, with only one pair of sandals and too many dress shoes. Because I was so excited and packed at the last minute; upon arrival my wardrobe packed for a laundry bag special.

Experience taught me you do not see anyone more than once on the street; therefore, comfortable expandable clothing is more appropriate. The general dress is shorts, slacks, sundresses and maybe one after five dress with comfortable shoes for walking. The men will need shorts, slacks, casual shirts with a light weight sports jacket or suit. In Hawaii the difference between formal and casual is determined by whether you wear shoes or not.

In examining the alternate prices of a similar trip, I found the price of the airfare could vary as much as two hundred dollars depending on a direct flight from Dallas or a plane change in Los Angeles. The hotel prices vary by locations, accommodations, and ratio of staff per guest. The restaurants and coffee shops we found to be very good and reasonable with lots of fresh fruit and light pastries.

Next time I will take you on a shopping tour and the local personalities I met in Hawaii. our 50th state.

SELECTING HOLIDAY TURKEY—When shopping for a holiday turkey, consumers should look first for the USDA inspection mark located on the package, say Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service food and nutrition specialists. This mark assures that the processing and marketing procedure was carried out under sanitary conditions. Since tenderness of the meat is determined by the age of the bird and not the grade, size or sex, consumers should look for the words "young" or "fryer-roaster" on the package. When deciding what size turkey to buy, plan for three-fourths pound per person, or one pound if you want leftovers. Dieters should select fresh-dressed or frozen plain

turkey. Pre-basted frozen turkeys have more calories and usually cost more.
