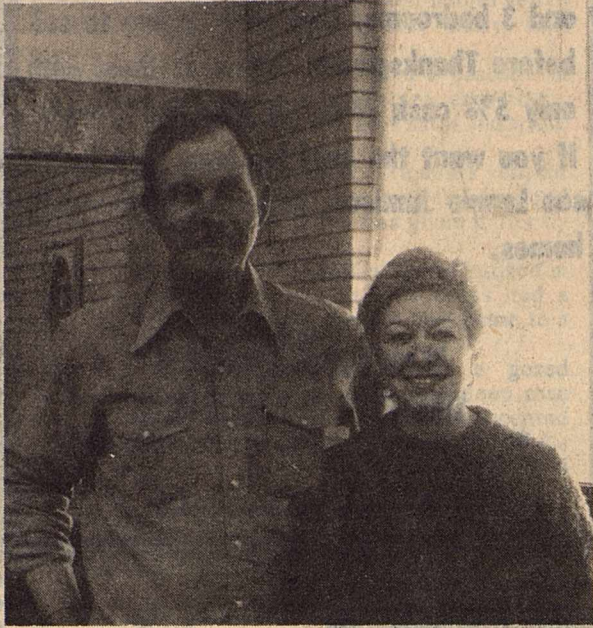


Photo Ranch honored by Chamber

The Photo Ranch was honored as the "Business of the Month" for November by the Sonora Chamber of Commerce.

Nancy and Jerry Johnson started the photo business five years ago with a small studio at the ranch, later moving to their present location in Sonora with a studio in the Old School building on Hwy 277 south.

They have won numerous awards internationally with photography. They have both served on the Texas Professional Board of Directors and are members of Weddings International. They are very active in local photography and are contracted each year to do the Sonora ISD school pictures.

The Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District met for their regular session in the Board room of the School Administration Building at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, November 8.

Jimmy Condra, president, called the meeting to order and W.A. McAndrew, superintendent, gave the invocation.

The district total enrollment is 1355 according to principals Clay Cade, Mike Ramos, and James Bible.

Principals Cade and Ramos reported that parent-teacher conferences had recently been completed with almost 100 percent participation by parents. Principal Bible reported on high school activities and possible changes in the curriculum, as suggested by the Governor's Committee on Public Education.

The superintendent was authorized to go ahead with arrangements for the purchase of an 83 passenger Blue Bird All-American bus from Bolain Equipment, Inc. of Denton for approximately \$68,000. This vehicle will be used for long-distance, extracurricular trips for such groups as the athletic department, the band, the choir and speech departments.

A brief report was given on the organizational progress of the local chapter of the PTA. A formal organizational meeting of the PTA is scheduled for Monday, November 14 at 7 p.m. in the Junior High Snack Bar.

The board unanimously approved a lease agreement with the City of Sonora for Lots 10, 11, and 12 on Block 21 for a five year period at the price of \$1 per year. Dr. Johnny Fields suggested the entire lease price of \$5 be paid immediately. The motion was made by Sammie Stewart, seconded by Kenneth Cayce. The motion was voted on and passed.

Also discussed at the meeting was the payment of the current bills, amounting to \$150,402.43. Sam Perez motioned for the authorization for payment, seconded by Stewart, and unanimously carried.

On a motion made by Carl Teaff, with a second by Cayce, the District's reimbursement rate for authorized use of a private vehicle was increased from 22 cents per mile to 23 cents per mile to conform with state guidelines.

Stewart brought up the subject concerning the poor

condition of the football field. The board decided to consult with an expert and plan to recondition the entire facility within the next year.

Also during this meeting the board was informed, concerning the Assessor-Collector, the budgets, receipts, and a statement of funds by reports.

After a brief discussion of the conflicts involved, a motion was made by Perez to set Monday, December 19, 6:30 p.m. in the school cafeteria as the date for the annual District-wide banquet for employees and spouses. The motion was seconded by Scott Shurley and unanimously carried.

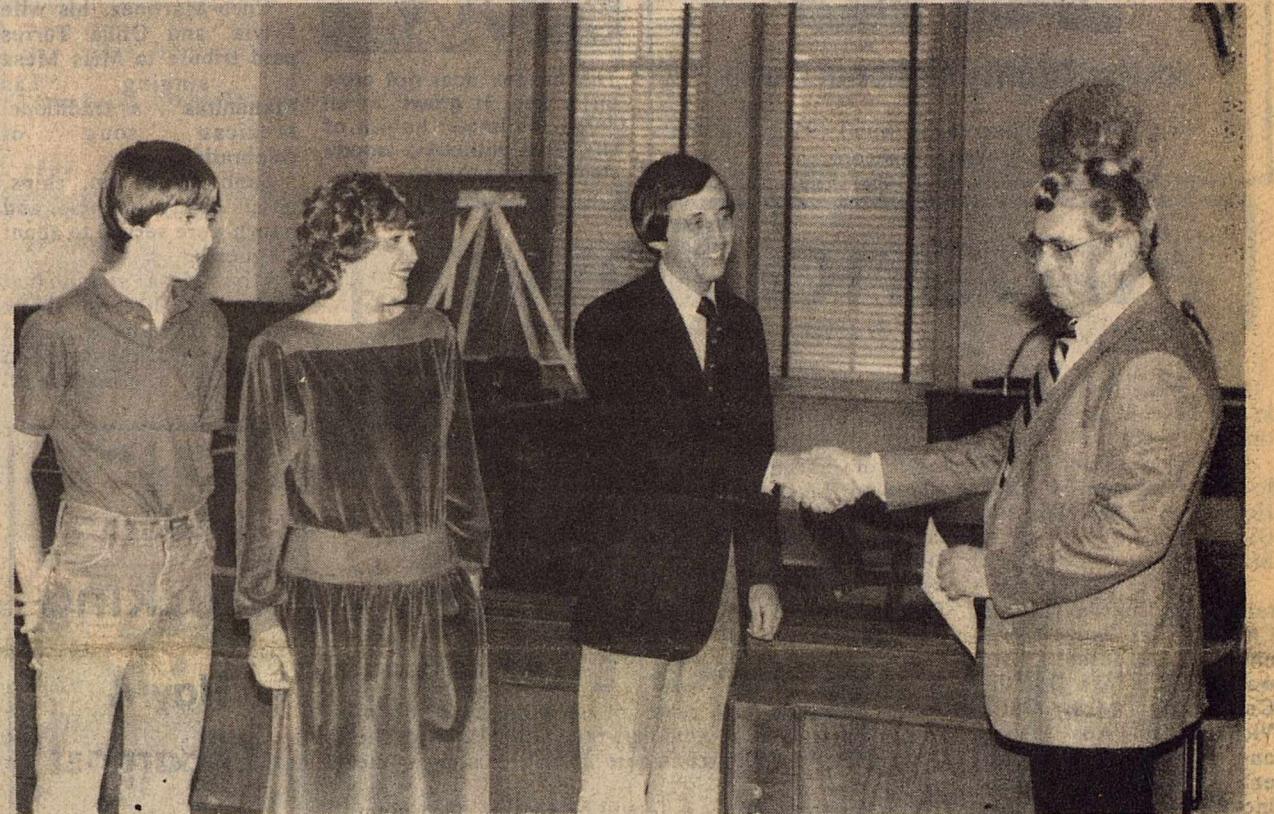
Also discussed was the decision to cancel the regular second monthly board meeting on November 22 at noon since the board members and the superintendent will be in New York for the rating and sale of the bonds for the new high school. The board requested that the superintendent's secretary prepare a calendar of events

and meetings for the months of November and December.

Other business included Cayce's report to the board concerning his recent attendance at a Pecos meeting of the Permian Basin School Board Association, telling them that it was well planned, entertaining, and informative.

President Condra thanked the audience for their interest and attention, and announced the fact that the board was going into executive session. Having taken no action during the executive session, and having no further business, the meeting was adjourned on a motion by Stewart and a second by Shurley.

Those present were: Condra, president; Shurley, secretary; Cayce, Fields, Perez, Stewart, Teaff and McAndrew, Superintendent. Others present were Bible, Cade, Ramos, Alice Taylor and Joan Latta.



NEW ATTORNEY SWORN IN

Mark Friend Shurley was sworn in as an attorney by Judge Charlie Sherrill Friday, November 11. Shurley attended Sonora public schools, received his bachelor of science degree in agricultural economics from Texas A and M University in 1979 and graduated Summa Cum Laude. Shurley also received a doctor of Jurisprudence at Texas Tech University School of Law in 1983. Shurley's pioneering family settled in Sutton County in 1897 after his grandfather, Jobe Taylor Shurley, purchased the WORD Ranch. Shurley moved to Sonora

in 1958 with his mother and father, Jackle and Jerry Shurley and one brother, Jerry Jr. They were engaged in ranching and his father had a law practice. His father also served as county attorney for several years until he died in February of 1971. In 1966 Shurley married Kathy Grelle. They have one son, Drake, who is 13 years old. Mrs. Shurley received her Bachelor of Science Degree in home economics from Texas Tech University in 1983. The family is presently residing at the family ranch south of Sonora. Drake attends Sonora Public Schools and is in the eighth grade.

FOR NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

Minor changes in plans made

A special meeting of the Sonora Independent School District Board of Trustees was held Thursday, November 10 at the Vocational Building.

Jimmy Condra called the meeting to order and W.A. McAndrew gave the invocation.

Nominees were chosen for the Tax Appraisal Board with the school board having three nominees, Ed Carrasco, David Ross, and Albert Ward. The city of Sonora nominated Quade Sutton, and the county nominated Margaret Galbreath.

Other business discussed at this special meeting concerned the building and planning of the new high school.

It was decided to use separate funds to clean and clear the property. This will save money and the contractors time. There will be an effort to save as many of the oak trees as possible by flagging the ones to be left standing, and a few may even be transferred to a new location on the lots.

The bids for clearing the lots are now being accepted. At the next meeting to be held December 13, the board will look at the drawing and get approval.

The architects provided a schedule for the School Board, with the estimated finish being in November or October of 1985.

School can be moved into the new buildings in December of 1985, with classes being able to start January 1.

The foundation is to be built on top of the ground to aid in trenching and to save time and money because of the many rocks in the ground.

A few changes were made in the plans, with one of these changes concerning the auditorium seating space. The seating space was originally designed to seat 375 persons. The architect was told that was too small, so it was redesigned to hold approximately 500 persons.

Discussion was then turned to the Industrial Arts, with nothing definite being decided, but there were thoughts of building a separate building for the Vocational Ag. program between the highway and the tennis courts at a later date.

Another change made was that there was originally only one resource room, but it was decided that there was a need for two. It was decided to utilize the extra space in design and make two resource classrooms at an extra cost of \$15,000.

Mike Street requested that there be extra phone jacks and heavier electrical outlets at access to the scoreboard in the gymnasium for broadcasting games over the radio. It was also mentioned that there might be a need for a place to video tape games for both teams. It was agreed to leave out a couple of seats at the back for a camera, and it was also agreed to add the phone jacks and outlets.

James Powers promoted in U.S. Air Force

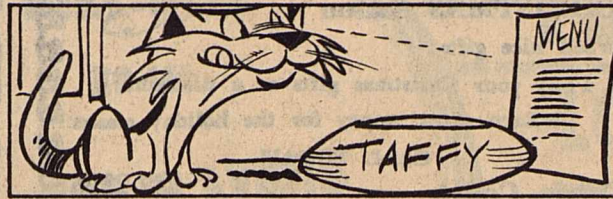
James H. Powers, son of Valeda J. Powers of Canon City, Colo., has been promoted in the U.S. Air Force to the rank of technical sergeant.

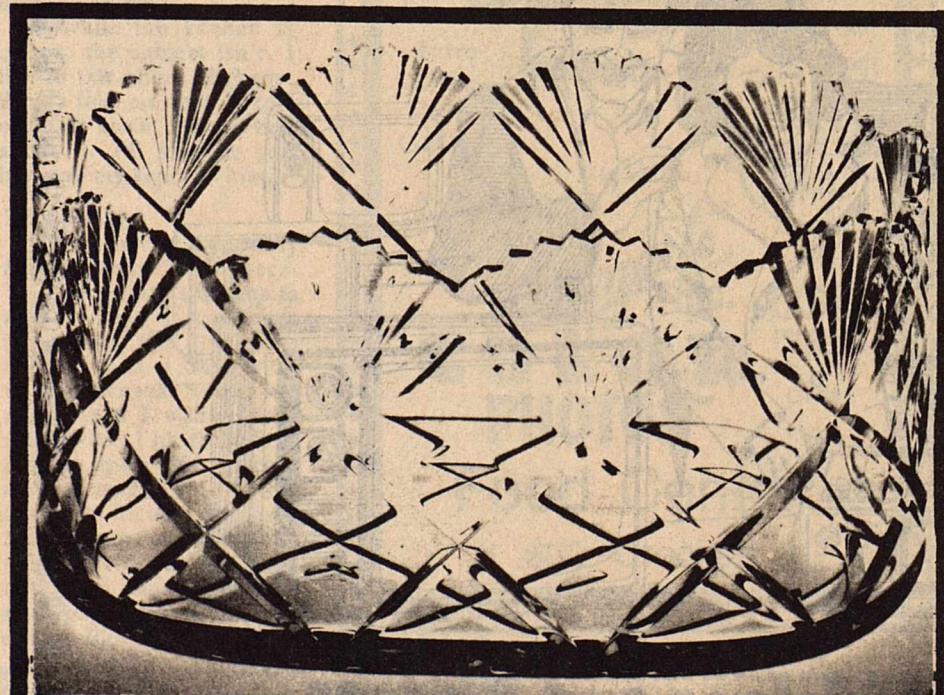

"Pick a Phone, Any Phone?"



Just because a phone will plug into your wall jack, it doesn't mean that it will work.

Why?
 Well, for instance, let's look at a phone that will be used on a party-line. Since customers share a common line to the telephone company switching office, each phone has its own special ringing-cycle setting which allows the phone to know when it should ring on the party-line.

Even if you have a 'Private Line', you still may have problems.

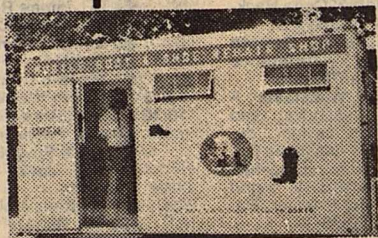





Reports from Washington

The U.S. and the U.N. Time for Reappraisal

Emerging in 1945 from the devastation of a world war that produced 49 million military and civilian deaths, the United Nations was to many a new hope for a more peaceful world.

Chartered to provide a forum for discussion so that disputes could in the future be resolved peacefully, the United Nations also was designed to provide the framework — through specialized agencies and voluntary programs — which would allow member nations to work together in addressing the social, ethical, and economic global problems of the day.

Originally, the American people were among the strongest supporters of such a concept and were proud that New York was to be the host city for an organization dedicated to world peace. Approval of the U.N. Charter in the Senate by an 89-2 vote, in fact, reflected the popular sentiment of the day. However, by 1983, only 36% of the public believed the U.N. was doing a good job compared with an 87% approval rating in 1959.

While there are many reasons attributing to declining support, prominent among them is that quite simply, taxpaying Americans are tired of paying more than our fair share of the U.N.'s budget, especially when we seem to be the U.N.'s favorite whipping boy.

The internal governing body and main forum for discussions, the General Assembly, is composed of 158 of the 168 nations of the world. In the General Assembly, the vote of the United States, with over 234 million people, is equal to the vote of the newest member, the newly independent Caribbean island nation of St. Kitts-Nevis which, with a population of around 44,500, is slightly more populous than Comal County in the 21st District of Texas.

Quite frankly, while the democratic ideal of one man, one vote is applicable to countries and communities with democratic traditions, this approach does not apply to organizations containing large numbers of nations who differ dramatically from each other. The one nation — one vote approach leads to policymaking divorced from policy reality. In the U.N. General Assembly today, a majority comprised of roughly 120 developing nations, which contribute almost nothing to the U.N. budget and bear almost no burden for affecting U.N. programs, consistently determine the policies which the United States and other democracies are obliged to execute and underwrite.

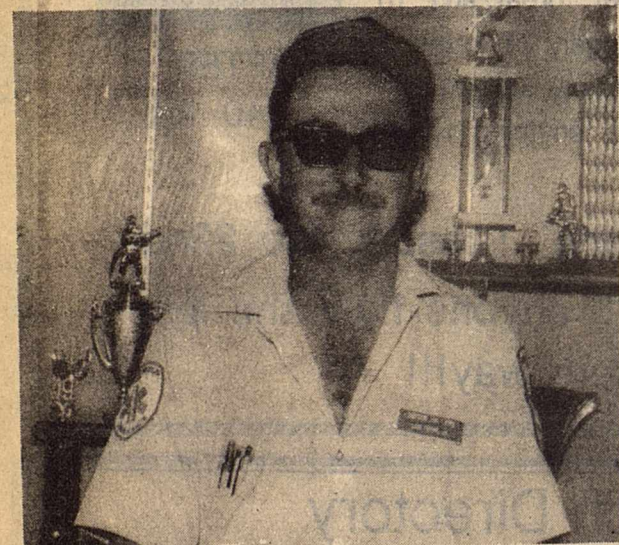
This must change and our own financial obligations to the United Nations must be reevaluated, as well.

Until 1964, the American taxpayer provided nearly 40% of the U.N.-assessed budget and even now with our share reduced, the United States still pays about one quarter of the United Nation's bills. Since 1945 it is estimated that our contribution has totaled almost \$12 billion. By contrast, the Soviet Union pays only 13% of the U.N. budget — and is \$169 million in arrears! Even more striking is the paltry support from those who control the U.N. The approximately 120 developing nations who command a permanent majority today contribute less than 9% of the organization's cost. While some of these nations are very poor, others such as Saudi Arabia, are quite rich.

Regrettably, the recent suggestion by a Soviet diplomat that the United States was not worthy to be the host country will not lead to the relocation of U.N. headquarters to Moscow, as I would like to see. In fact, I would gladly lead the band playing the farewell tune to those espionage agents who are able to use the U.N. as cover for their hostile activities. While, unfortunately, chances are there will be no relocation, at least the Congress is beginning to look more realistically at our commitment.

Although we were not successful in the recent effort to reduce the United States' contribution to the U.N. — a proposal which had my strong support — the Congress did vote to freeze our contribution to the U.N. for one year. This is an important first step, which I hope will be followed at the earliest opportunity by further significant reductions.

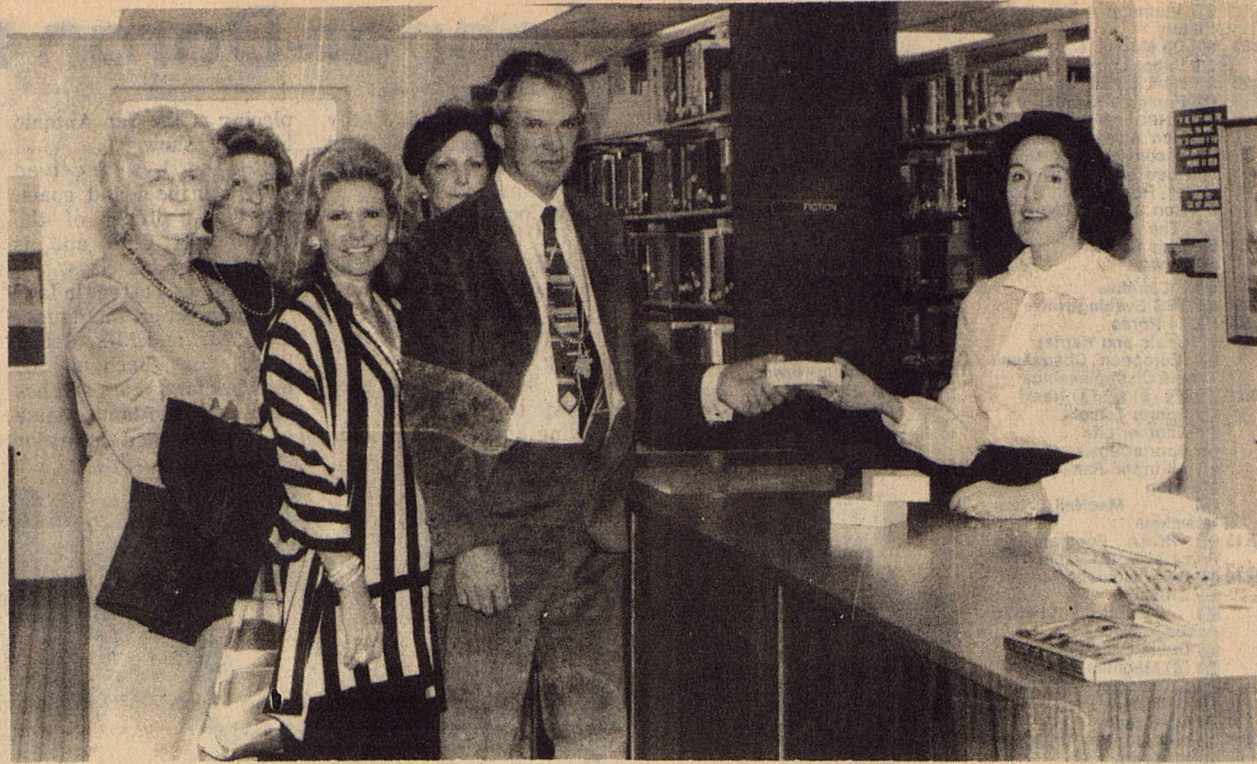
The value of the U.N. lies in providing a forum for communication among nations; however, that communication can and should take place at a lower cost to the American taxpayer. We have been overgenerous far too long and that must now stop. If other nations have to reach deeper into their own treasuries, perhaps, just perhaps, they will begin to accept a more responsible role in U.N. deliberations and programs.

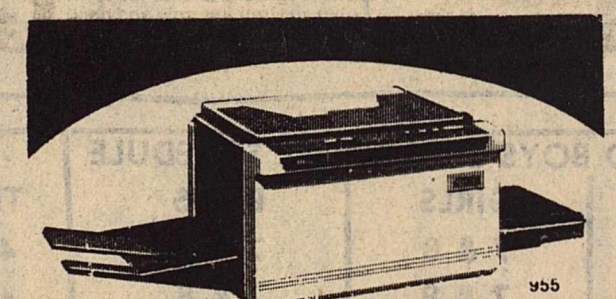

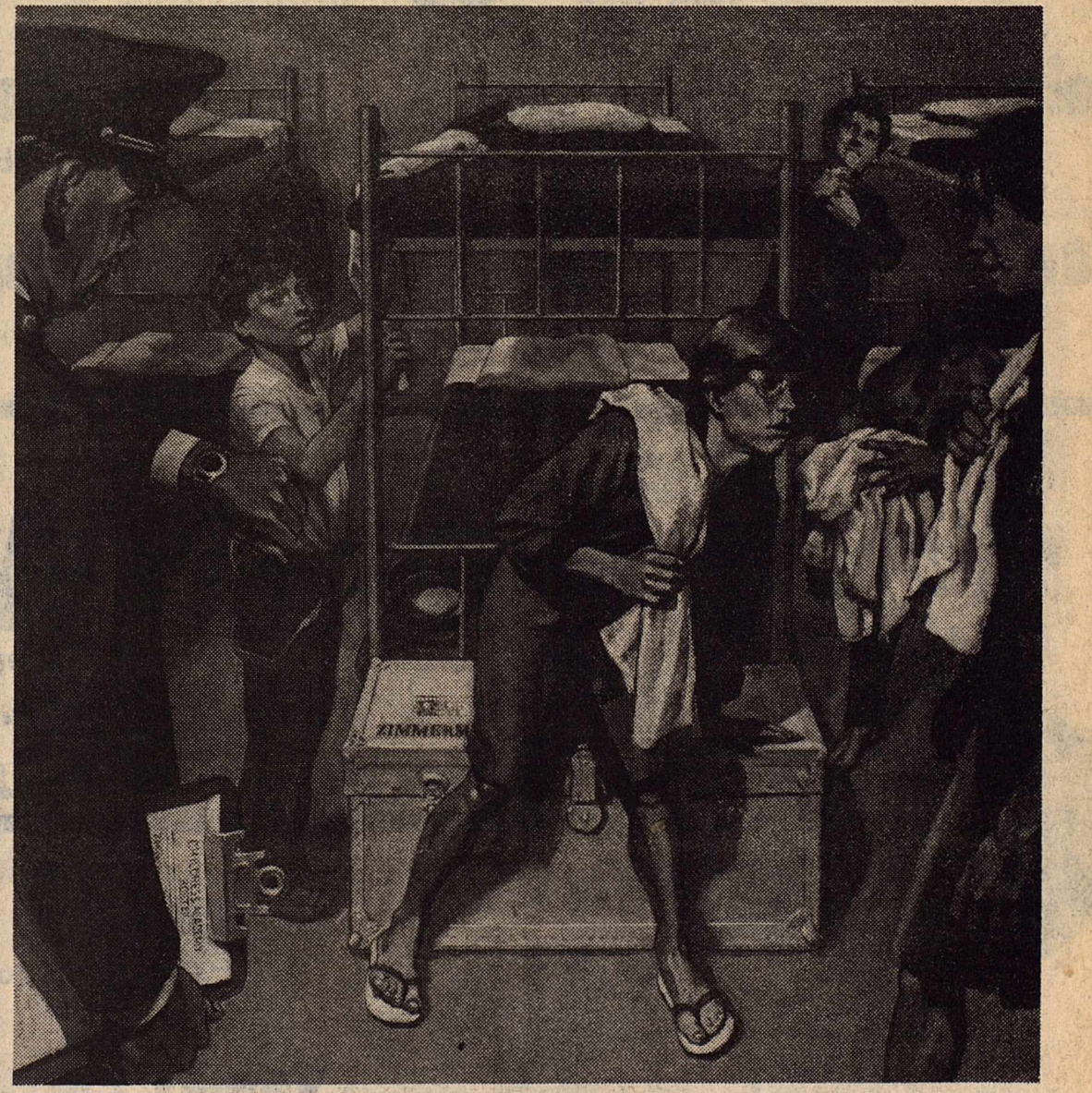

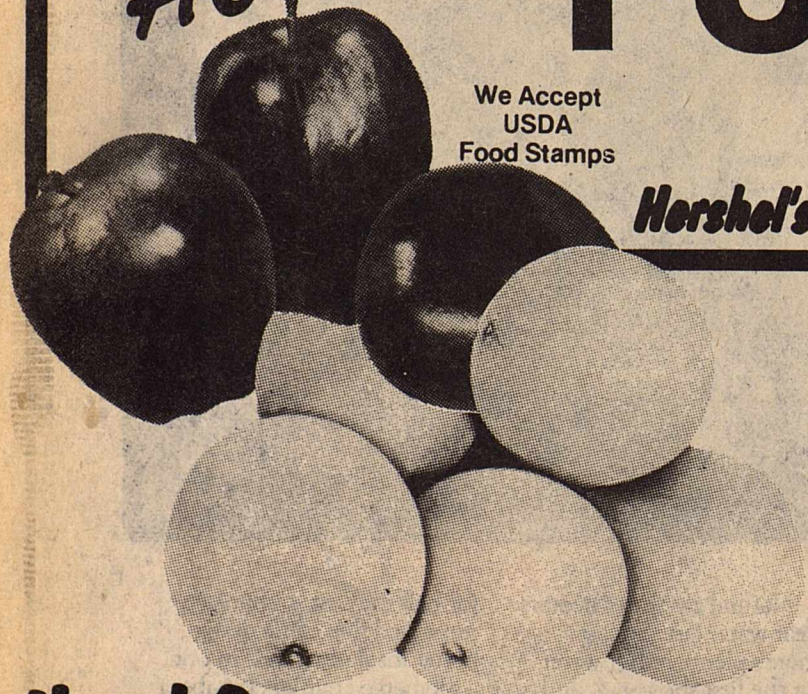
