Buchanan makes PBS appearance

James Buchanan, head of the Speech Department at Sonora High, appeared in December on the PBS Network program "Arts Chronicle". The presentation featured the Oklahoma Shakespeare Festival.

Buchanan's scenes as Duncan in *Macbeth* and the famous Lady Macbeth sleepwalking scene were the 2 events filmed in their entirety for the program.

Both the Oklahoma City and Tulsa PBS stations presented the 60 minute program which also featured interviews with Buchanan, Producer Molly Rizzo, and Managing Administrator Katy Morris.

Bronco girls gain two wins

The Sonora Bronco girls basketball team have come-out of the chute with a fast start on the second half of the season. They have defeated Junction 50-47, Iraan 47-28, and had a big win over Coahoma, 55-53, to open district play. This leaves the Broncos 11-5 for the year and 1-0 in District play. Elsewhere in District play, Crane beat Colorado City and Ballinger beat Ozona.

The Sonora girls played on Dec. 31 against Junction after a holiday break. They took a 15-9 first quarter lead behind the six points by Debbie Bible and 5 points by Lorri French. The Broncos upped their lead to 30-21 at halftime. They outscored the Eagles 10-8 in the third quarter, but Junction won the fourth quarter 18-10. For the game, Lorri French scored 17, Debbie Bible fouled-out after scoring 13, Della Heffernan got 6, Judy Merrill, 6, Lea Whitehead, 4, Kristi Hill, 2, and Anita Balch, 2. The Broncos were 8 of 22 from the foul line while Junction was 21 of 34. The Broncos had 21 field goals to Junction's 13.

In their last non-district game the Broncos avenged an earlier loss to the Braves as they downed the girls from Iraan 47-28. Lorri French led the Broncos with 20 points before fouling out of the game. Debbie Bible got 9, Kristi Hill, 8, Lea Whitehead, 7, Judy Merrill, 2, and Gina Heffernan, 1.

The Broncos led 12-7 at the end of the first quarter but fell behind 16-17 at halftime. The Broncos won the next two quarters 18-6 and 13-5 for the victory.

The Broncos opened District 6-AAA play in the friendly surroundings of the Bronco Gym against a very quick team from Coahoma. The Broncos started fast as their senior leader Lorri French was red-hot scoring 6 field goals and 3 of 3 free throws in the first quarter for 15 points. At the end of that first stanza the Broncos led 16-11.

The Broncos continued good play the second quarter and at one time led by 12 points before a late Bulldog rally saw the half end with a 30-26 Bronco lead.

The Broncos were not without problems as Debbie Bible sat out much of the half with four fouls and Kristi Hill had picked up three fouls. The third quarter seemed like the Bronco's downfall as the Bulldogs outscored them 15-4 for a 41-34 lead. To make the

problem worse, entering the fourth quarter, Bible, French, and Hill all had four fouls while Merrill and Whitehead had three each. The Broncos did see some luck as Coahoma managed only 1 field goal the entire quarter and Lea Whitehead took control of the game hitting 5 outside shots after Bible, French, and Hill all fouled-out and the Broncos were behind by 8 points.

Two sophomores and two juniors came off the bench for the Broncos to play very well in the persons of Gina Heffernan, Bonnie Jackson, Becca Powers, and Anita Balch.

For the last two minutes of the game the score was either tied or Coahoma led by 2 points. Lea Whitehead tied the score with 30 seconds to play and the Broncos

Queen Contest scheduled Monday

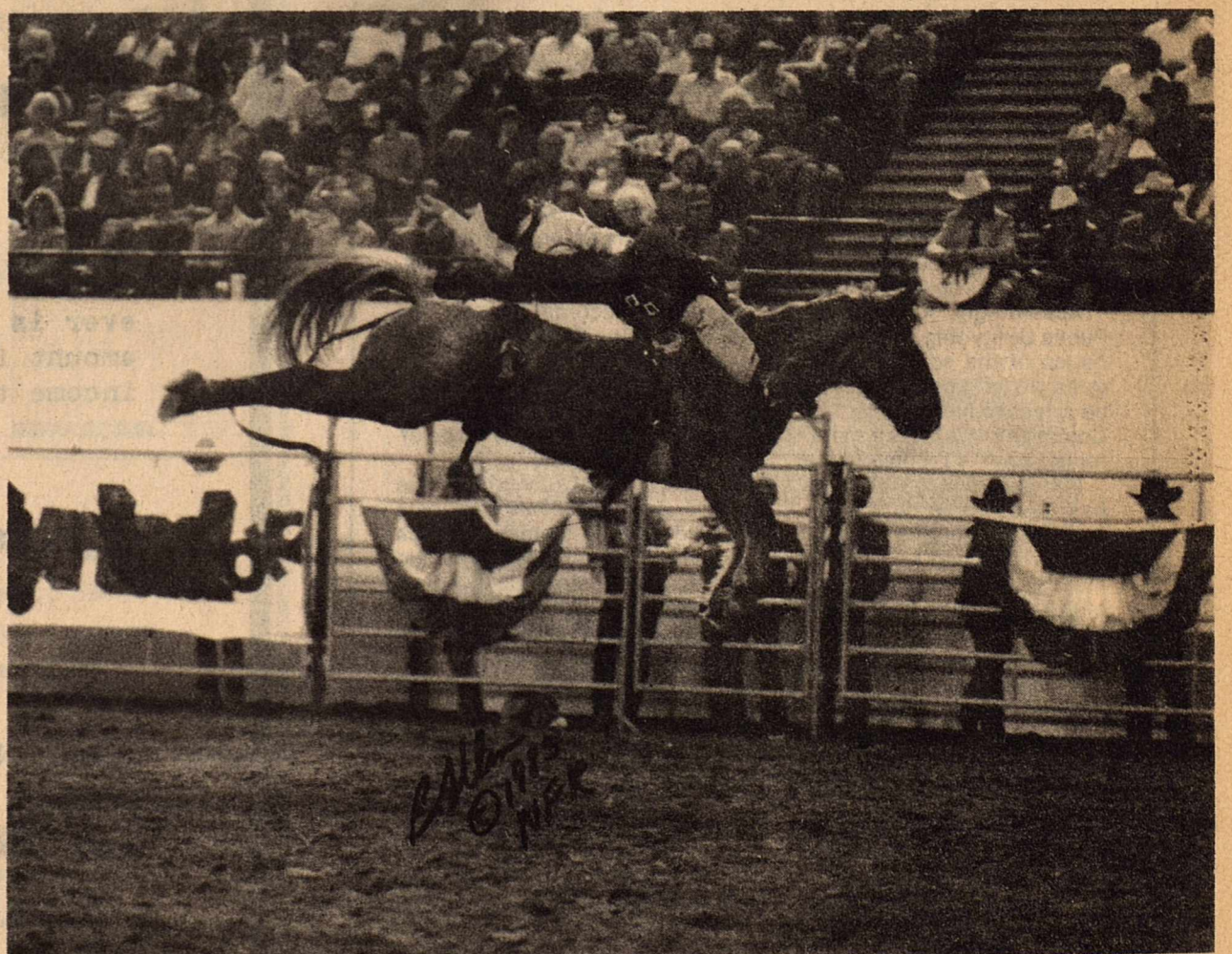

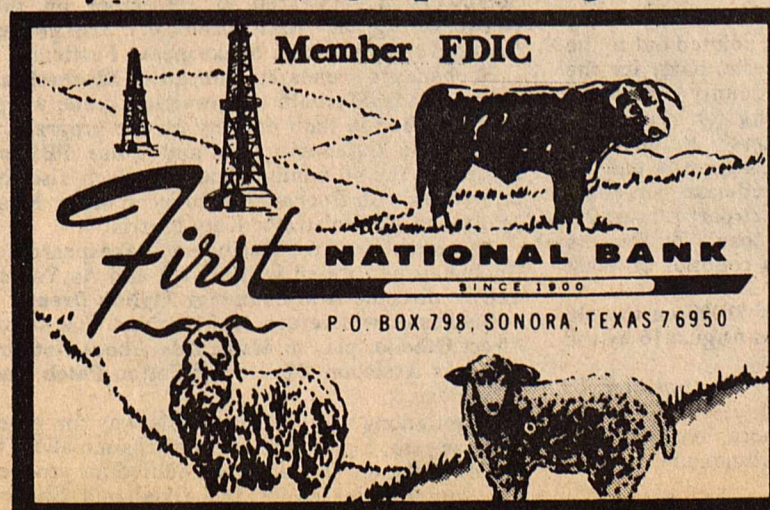

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- Q. What is Keogh?**
A. Keogh is the name for a tax-sheltered retirement plan for the self-employed.
- Q. How do I know if I qualify for a Keogh Plan?**
A. You qualify if you are self-employed and not incorporated.
- Q. How do I benefit by a Keogh Plan?**
A. You can deposit up to 15 percent of your earned income or a maximum of \$15,000 per year (whichever is less), and shelter that amount from your current year's income tax.
- Q. Who is a self-employed person?**
A. In general, a self-employed person is one who has earned income and who pays his/her own Social Security tax without an employer contribution.
- Q. Does that mean I never pay any taxes on my Keogh funds?**
A. No, but it does mean that while your funds are accumulating, you will pay no income taxes. Keogh is a tax-deferred plan in that you will pay taxes as you withdraw your funds.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

In proceedings pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), local exchange telephone companies are requesting authority to charge AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc., for use of their facilities. These proposed charges are higher than AT&T Communications can pay at current Texas long distance rate levels. To position itself to be able to implement rates that are sufficient to produce revenues that will recover the costs facing the company, AT&T Communications must now file for rate relief to be able to implement rates that reflect the costs of access that are ultimately imposed on the company.

While AT&T Communications does not want to increase its Texas rates, an increase would be required to recover the increased access charges AT&T Communications will have to pay to the local exchange telephone companies under several proposals pending before the Commission. These access charges at the proposed increased levels represent more than 80 percent of AT&T Communications' operating expense in Texas.

Accordingly, AT&T Communications, in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the rules of the PUC, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates for long distance calls within Texas. The proposed rates will be effective January 28, 1984, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. All customers and classes of customers would be affected by AT&T Communications' proposed rates.

If higher access charges are ordered, AT&T Communications has no recourse but to pay these charges and recover the costs from its customers as a cost of providing long distance service within Texas. AT&T Communications has filed rates which would mean a maximum overall increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$301.4 million, or 27.85 percent. This amount would help recover cost increases due to the proposed level of access charges now pending before the PUC.

A complete copy of all tariffs and rate schedules is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with every municipality in Texas.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 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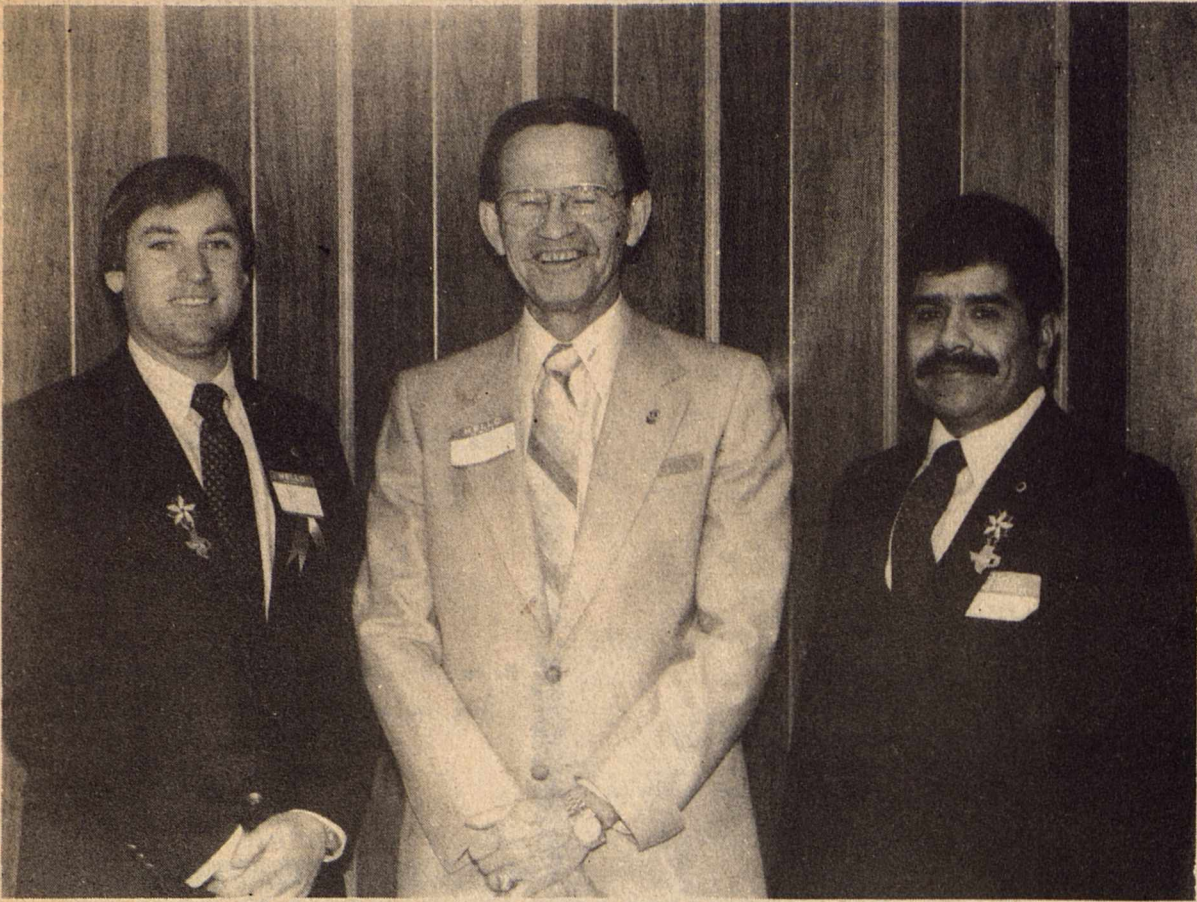
