PUC blasts GTE rate hike

AUSTIN—The Office of Public Utility Counsel filed testimony today recommending a \$48 million decrease in the rates charged by General Telephone Company of the Southwest to Texas customers. The recommendation contrasts sharply with the telephone company's proposal to increase the company's revenue by \$84.8 million.

The Office of Public Utility Counsel was created as a separate state agency by the legislature in September 1983 to represent the interests of residential and small commercial consumers in utility rate proceedings before the Public Utility Commission.

The rate reduction proposal was contained within the prefiled testimony of Austin utility rate consultant James Jansen, who will present his recommendation to the Public Commission in a hearing which begins here on May 29.

"Based upon our analysis, General Telephone Company's current rates substantially over charge residential consumers," stated Public Counsel Jim Boyle.

"Over the past few years, both the Public Utility Commission and the general public have criticized the poor quality of General Telephone service," Boyle added. "And I am concerned that Texas ratepayers are asked by the company to pay vastly excessive rates for the service."

Jansen, who is a certified public accountant and experienced in regulatory matters, proposes reductions in the company's claimed level of expenses. His testimony states that the PUC should not require ratepayers to pay for over \$9.6 million in billings from an affiliate corporation operated by General Telephone's parent company (GTE). Among other recommendations, Jansen's prefiled testimony also trims the telephone company's proposed salary and wages expenses, because the utility's filing overestimates both the size of its work force and the increase in salary levels.

Boyle said the complexity of the rate case makes it difficult to estimate the precise effect of the proposed rate decrease on residential rates at this time.

Council calls public meeting on skating rink proposal

The Sonora City Council convened in its regular monthly session Tuesday, May 15 at 9 a.m. in the council chamber of city hall.

Mike Street and members of the "Yellow Rose" partnership approached the council to request the lease of lots 10, 11, and 12 of block 21 located on East Third Street. The partners are involved in a private venture and have requested the land for the site of a roller-rink and activity center for the youth of Sonora.

A presentation of the type of building, the projected number of young people the center would serve, and the financial details of the private partnership was heard by the council.

The Sonora Independent School District, the original lease holders of the property, has released the lease agreement on the property in order to enable the youth related activity center to be constructed.

Several members of the council voiced reservations concerning the immediate making of a decision on leasing land to the private partnership. Concern was expressed by the council on the setting of a precedent, the status of the project, and some apparent opposition which was not presented at the council meeting, to the roller-rink project in that area of the city. Due to the traffic and noise such an establishment might generate, some citizens have apparently voiced slight opposition.

A special meeting to determine the fate of the project will be held June 13. All interested persons are urged to attend this open meeting as the council feels that public input is a prerequisite for making a knowledgeable decision in this matter.

In other action at the meeting, the council members discussed the provision of water and sewer service to the proposed new high school complex being built by the Sonora ISD. The aldermen agreed that the property on which the new facility will be built must be annexed into the corporate city limits before the services may be extended to the site.

Mike Kropp appeared before the council to request that action be taken to discourage street peddlers of insurance, magazines, and other commodities within the city of Sonora.

Currently the city requires peddlers to purchase daily \$25 permits for the selling activities within the city limits. An annual permit is issued for \$100. According to Sonora Police Chief Brent Gesch, there are now 200 such active permits on the roll. He warned the council that although many of the street peddlers are "artists

at rip-off schemes as in the case of some insurance peddlers, we can't close the doors to our city". Because of the laws governing inter-state commerce, many reputable as well as disreputable peddlers are frequently knocking on the doors of Sonora's residents.

The council requested that the media inform the public of their rights in the case of a peddler who knocks on the door. The aldermen suggested that the consumer check out the peddler by contacting the Sonora Police Department. All peddlers must be registered with the city. In the case of an insurance peddler, the council recommended that the consumer contact the State Board of Insurance at (512)475-2444 for information. David Wallace, city attorney, is researching the laws involving peddling.

Next on the agenda was the downtown parking problem. Members of the council agreed to clearly mark parking spaces and to institute parallel parking in some areas that are now marked for diagonal parking.

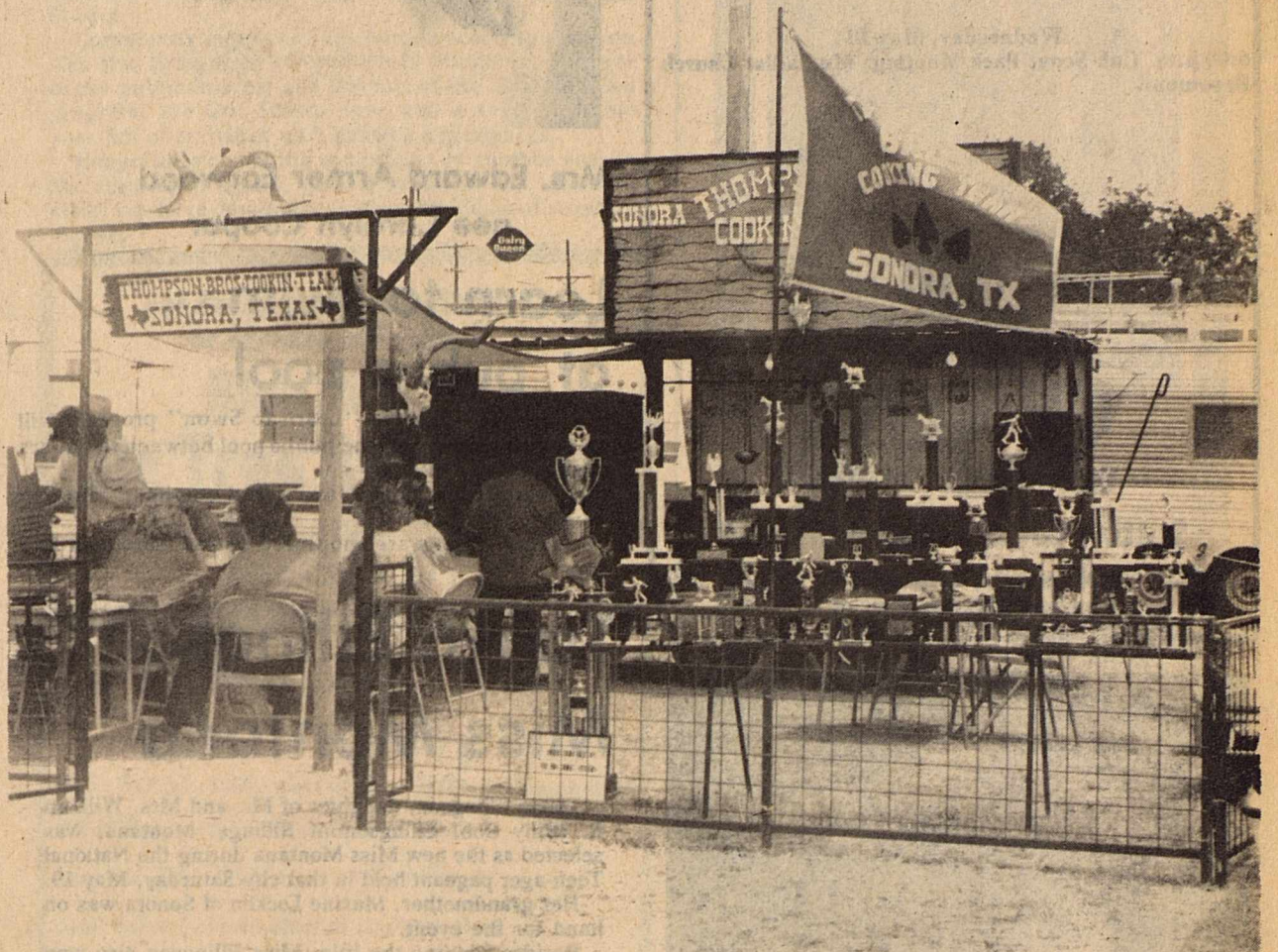
A proposed ordinance involving the general restriction of commercial vehicles, truck routes, use of coasters, unlawful riding, operation of unregistered motor vehicles, driving under the influence, vehicles laden with sand etc., and reckless driving, was presented to the council members by Wallace.

Some of the finer points of the ordinance were gone over and it was decided to take more time to consider the ordinance before passing it. Revisions and additions may be made to the ordinance before being approved by the council.

In further action, the council approved a speed zone change for the 40 mile-per-hour zone stretching from Oak Street to the junction of Highways 290 and 277. The speed limit in that area was changed to 35 miles per hour.

The council also approved an ordinance proposed by Joe David Ross to plant shrubbery along the fence line of the Sonora Municipal Airport for beautification purposes.

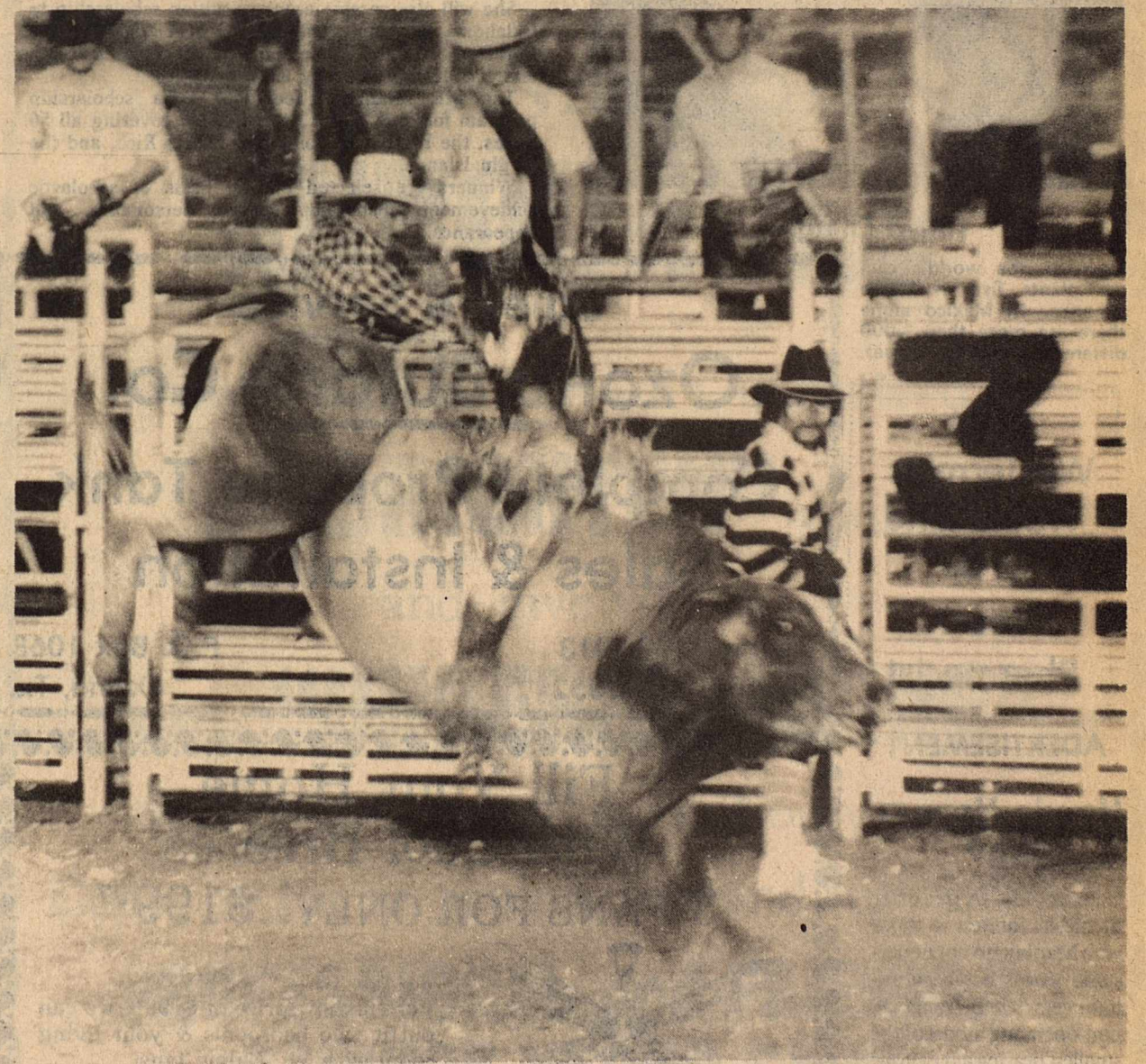
Also accepted by the council was a proposal by St. Ann's Catholic Church for members to use the lot adjacent to the Church for parking. The lot belongs to the city. The council agreed that the Church could make necessary improvements to the property such as paving or putting caliche over the topsoil during such time as the lease agreed upon by the city.

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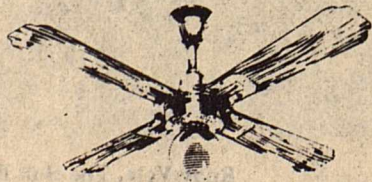
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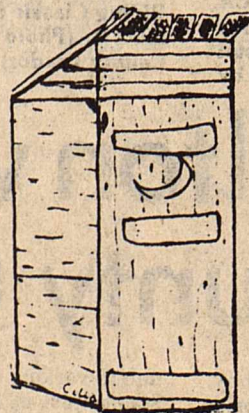
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Carolyn Cooper & Edward Earwood exchange wedding vows

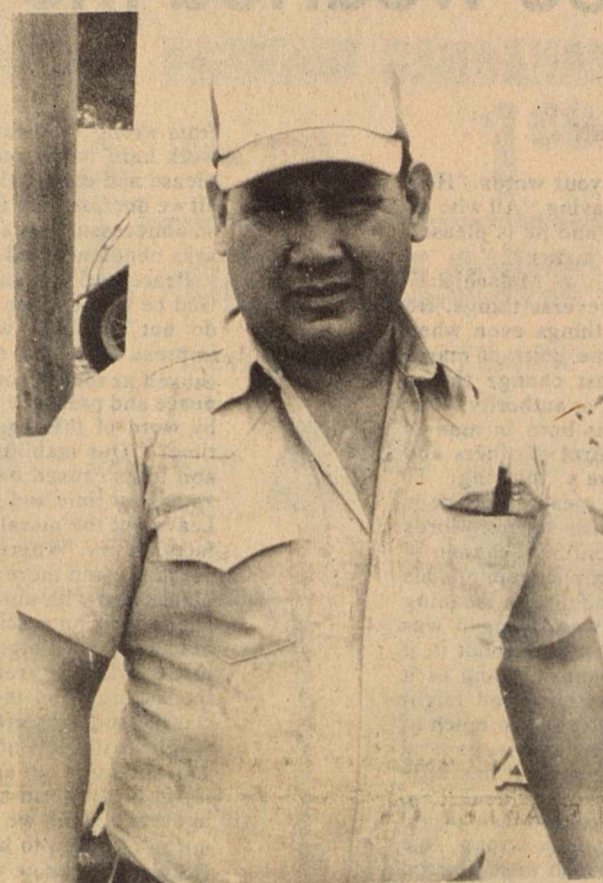

Emergency Response System to benefit local senior citizens

Pending approval on the type of system desired by the county, Sutton County senior citizens will soon gain a new tool to make the odds of their survival in an emergency situation much better.

The Emergency Response System is a 24-hour electronic monitoring system for functionally impaired, elderly or disabled persons living alone.

The emergency response System for Sutton County will utilize a cordless transmitter worn on the person of the senior citizen. A button on the transmitter will set off an alarm at the Command Center to be located in the Sutton County Sheriff's Office in the event of an emergency.

When the alarm sounds at the Command Center, the dispatcher on duty will notify relatives or paramedics of

the situation, and help will soon be on the way.

In Sutton County, there are approximately 389 persons over the age of 65; of that number, 232 live alone. The Emergency Response System is designed to aid these senior citizens in remaining independent. The Emergency Response System will ensure the senior citizen that someone will respond in the case of an emergency.

This system will automatically dial the Command Center. At the Sheriff's Office, persons trained in Emergency Response will respond to the signal and notify the designated person or persons.

The Emergency Response System program is supplemented in part by the Concho Valley Council of Governments, and is a cooperative effort by that group as well as Sutton County.

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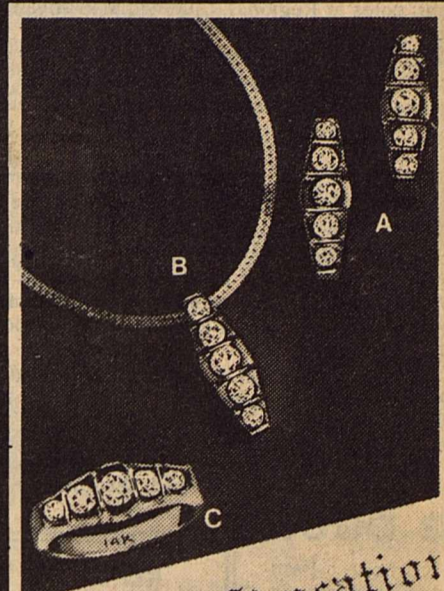
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Students qualify for state rodeo

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Sutton declared Brucellosis free

Sutton County was included in the report by the Texas Animal Health Commission on the list of Brucellosis free counties in the state.

About one-third of the counties in Texas --76 to be exact-- are free of brucellosis according to the figures released by the commission.

Most of those counties free of brucellosis are in the Class B area of Texas, which contains 141 counties

in the western half of the state. Sutton County, one of the 72 counties free of brucellosis is classified in that group.

In the Class B area, there are almost 60,000 cattle herds; of that number only 145 under quarantine.

Neighboring counties included in the Class B area include Schleicher, Kimble, Crockett, Mason, Reagan, Val Verde, and Concho counties among 64 others.

At the beginning of the 1983-84 school year, a decision was handed down stating that a student 21 years of age or before September 1st, would not be eligible for a free public education.

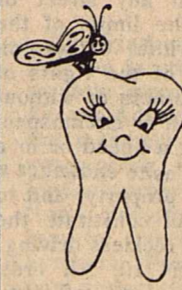
A ruling made by James R. Nowlin, United States District Judge on October 3, 1983 stated that all

PUBLIC NOTICES

General restrictions on operation of commercial vehicles; truck routes; use of coasters, etc.; unlawful riding; operation with clinging objects; parking of trailers; operation of unregistered motor vehicles; driving under the influence; vehicles laden with sand, etc.; reckless driving.

Whereas, the City of Sonora desires to provide for the welfare of its citizens and to prevent accidents and injuries.

Whereas, operation of motor vehicles should conform with set standards to avoid accidents and injuries.

NOW, Therefore, be it ordained by the city council of the city of Sonora, Texas

SECTION 1: General restrictions on operation of commercial vehicles; truck routes.

a.) Through commercial vehicles. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a through commercial vehicle upon any street, boulevard, avenue or alley within the limits of the City, except that such commercial vehicle may travel or be operated upon any street, boulevard, or avenue designated as a U.S. or State Highway or as a Truck Route.

b.) Local commercial vehicles. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any local commercial vehicle upon any street, boulevard, avenue or alley within the limits of the City, except on a designated U.S. or State Highway or a designated truck route. A local commercial vehicle may leave any designated U.S. or State Highway or a designated truck route and travel on any street, boulevard, avenue or alley within the City for the purpose of delivering or picking up goods, wares, materials and/or merchandise, or returning to its established place of business or home. When a local commercial vehicle enters a street, boulevard, avenue or alley as herein permitted, such vehicle shall enter such street, boulevard, avenue or alley at the intersection nearest the point of pickup or delivery or its established place of business or home and return to the truck route by the nearest route. Where more than one pick-up or delivery is required, additional pick-up or delivery may be made, and the vehicle shall not be required to return to the truck route after each individual pick-up or delivery but shall return to the truck route upon the completion of all pick-ups or deliveries.

c.) Truck routes established. Every U.S. and State Highway and Farm and Market Road within the limits of the City is hereby designated as a truck route under the terms of this section, and the following street, roads and highways are hereby designated truck routes by names as follows:

d) Marking of truck routes. All truck routes established herein shall be marked by erection of suitable signs.

SECTION 2: Use of coasters, roller skates and similar devices. No person upon roller skates, or riding in or by means of any coaster, toy vehicle or similar device shall go upon any roadway, except while crossing a street or crosswalk.

SECTION 3: Unlawful riding on vehicles. The operator of a motor vehicle shall not carry any person on the fenders, running boards or bumpers of a vehicle, and no person shall ride on any motor vehicle on that portion not designed or intended for the use of passengers.

SECTION 4: Operation of vehicles with motorcycles, bicycles, etc. clinging thereto. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a vehicle upon a roadway while any person riding upon any motorcycle, coaster, sled, roller skates or toy vehicle has attached the same or himself or herself to such vehicle.

SECTION 5: Parking of trailers. No person shall park on any city street or alley for a period longer than seventy-two (72) continuous hours any trailer, semi-trailer, boat-trailer, trailerhouse or other non-motorized device or equipment designed or intended to be towed upon public streets by means of attachment to a motor vehicle or other self-propelled vehicle or equipment; nor any motorized, self-propelled motor home or any other motor vehicle containing or intended to contain permanently installed sleeping facilities and/or human sanitary treatment or disposal facilities.

SECTION 6: Operation of non-registered motor vehicle. No person shall operate a non-registered motor vehicle on any street, alley, boulevard or road within the city limits.

SECTION 7: Driving under the influence of liquor or drugs. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive or operate any vehicle upon any street or alley within the city while such person is in any degree under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs.

SECTION 8: Vehicles laden with sand, etc.-Materials not to spill. No person shall intentionally or knowingly operate, or cause to be operated, on any paved public street or paved public alley, any vehicle so loaded with sand, gravel, rock, earth or other particles in bulk, that any such material is likely to fall or be thrown upon such street or alley.

SECTION 9: Reckless driving. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive any

vehicle on any street or alley in the limits of the City in willful or wanton disregard of the rights of safety of others or without due caution or circumspection, or at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger a person or property, and to do so shall constitute the offense of reckless driving.

SECTION 10: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith shall be and are hereby repealed to the extent of conflict herewith.

SECTION 11: This ordinance shall be published by caption once in a newspaper of general circulation in Sutton County, Texas and in the City of Sonora.

SECTION 12: If for any reason any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid by final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect any valid provisions of this or any other ordinance of the City of Sonora to which these rules and regulations relate.

SECTION 13: The necessity requiring suspension of the rules that no ordinance or resolution shall be passed unless read at three separate meetings of the City Council, and the Mayor having declared that such necessity exists, and having requested suspension of the rules of three readings and that the ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction and to take effect and to be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication, IT IS AC-CORDINGLY ORDAINED.

CITY ORDINANCE No. 264

Whereas, the City of Sonora has found it convenient and in the best interest of the citizens and business of the City of Sonora to beautify the area around the municipal airport.

Whereas, Joe David Ross and/or Devil's River Motel of Sonora, Texas has approached the City of Sonora with the idea and desire to plant bushes and/or shrubs along-side the airport fence for beautification purposes at the cost of said individual, and that said bushes and/or shrubs will be maintained in accordance with the desires of the City of Sonora and other Federal and State authorities.

Therefore, be it known, that the City of Sonora, acting by and through the signature of its Mayor, hereby ordains that Joe David Ross and/or the Devil's River Motel may

plant bushes and/or shrubs along the fence line of the Sonora Municipal Airport in a manner which will not endanger the safety of aircraft or any other persons. That said Joe David Ross and/or Devil's River Motel shall bear all the cost of planting and maintenance of said bushes and/or shrubs in a manner which may be set out by the City of Sonora or any State or Federal Agency.

PASSED this 15th day of May, 1984, at a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Sonora, there being a quorum present, by 5 yeas and 0 nays, and approved by the Mayor on the date above set out.

ORDINANCE No. 266

"An ordinance regulating the speed of vehicles upon the public streets of Sonora and repealing ordinance number 266 and all other ordinances and sections of ordinances in conflict herewith". It is ordained by the City Council of Sonora as follows:

State speed laws applicable. -- The State traffic laws regulating the speed of vehicles shall be applicable upon all streets within this city, except as this ordinance, as authorized by State law, hereby declares and determines upon the basis of engineering and traffic investigation that certain speed regulations shall be applicable upon specified streets or in certain areas, in which event it shall be prima facie unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle at a speed in excess of any speed so declared in this ordinance when signs are in place giving notice thereof.

It is hereby declared that the prima facie speed on Hwy. Loop 467 within the limits of Sonora shall be as shown on the attached plan which is hereby approved and made a part of the ordinance and which shall apply at all times when

signs are erected giving notice thereof.

PBPA report

The Synthetic Fuels Corporation is still alive. WE recently reported that the Reagan Administration and key members of Congress were going to allow the Synfuels program to expire. Now, President Reagan says he wants to cut the Synthetic Fuels Corporation budget in half...from \$19 to 9.5 billion.

The President also wants to put tighter restraints on the subsidies the Corporation handouts. To add to their problems, the director of operations, John Carter has just resigned. This leaves five of the seven seats on the board empty. Maybe it will self destruct!!

Many members of Congress still favor doing away with the program entirely. And, this one place we agree with Congress 100 percent.

The Environmental Protection Agency may ban the production of leaded gasoline. An announcement could be made as early as July. If the rule is proposed, it would become effective early in 1985.

The federal government paid one billion dollars less than it did in 1982. The savings were attributed to a drop in 2267 Trawood oil prices and a slight El Paso, Tx. 79935 increase in conservation. The total spent last year was 12.5 billion dollars.

A law passed in 1975, mandated that the federal government was to reduce its energy use 25 percent by 1985. So far, according to D.O.E. Undersecretary Pat Collins, civilian agencies are down 16.1 percent while the military has reduced use by 13.6 percent.

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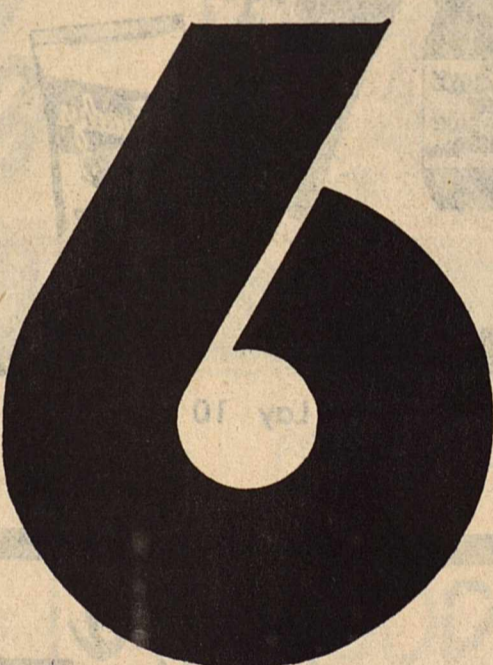

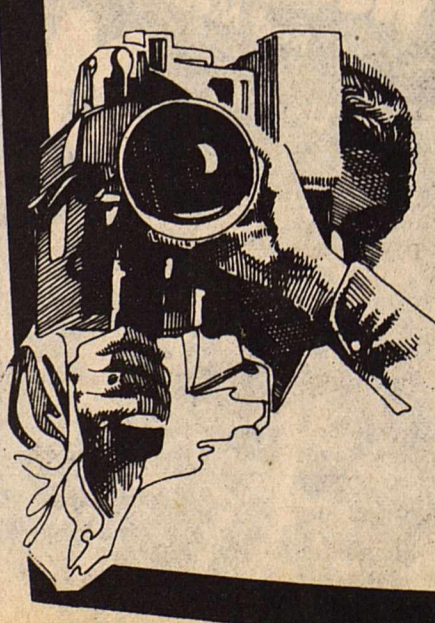
