Reagan-Bush win by lands

Approximately 66 percent of the registered voters of Sutton County turned out last Tuesday to cast their vote in the 1984 general election. There were 2642 registered voters and 1732 made it to the polls.

A break-down shows that 321 voted absentee, 372 voted in precinct one, 377 in precinct two, 437 in precinct three and 225 in precinct four.

In the presidential race, 465 from Sutton County voted for the democratic candidates Walter Mondale and Geraldine Ferraro while 1251 cast their votes for President Ronald Reagan and Vice-President George Bush. Lyndon H. LaRouche and Billy M. Davis, independent candidates received five votes in Sutton County.

Phil Gramm carried Sutton County with 1195 votes to Lloyd Doggett's 503 in the contest for United States Senator.

Congressman Tom Loeffler received 1272 over Joe Sullivan's 402 and Gary Lee Swilling's 1 vote in the United States Representative, District 21 race.

For Railroad Commissioner, Mack Wallace carried Sutton County with 929 votes while John Thomas Henderson received 666.

For Chief Justice, Supreme Court, John L. Hill received 929 over John L. Bates' 671 votes; Justice, Supreme Court, place 1 Franklin S. Spears received 1025 votes unopposed; Justice, Supreme Court, place 2 C.L. Ray, unopposed-1017 votes, Court of Criminal Appeals, place one-Sam Houston Clinton received 846 votes to Virgil E. Mulanax's 655; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, place two W.C. "Bill" Davis-unopposed 1039; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, place three-unopposed Bill White 1033, State Representative, District 67-unopposed 1078 for Gerald Geistweidt; Cheif Justice, Court of Appeals, fourth district Carlos C. Cadena-unopposed 1028.

In the local elections, District Judge, 112th Judicial District Brock Jones for the unexpired term received 1148 votes with no opposition.

J.W. Johnson Jr. received 1152 votes in his unopposed race for the office of District Attorney. David W. Wallace received 1357 votes in the race for county attorney and Betsy Johnson received one.


W.W. "Bill Webster received 1374 votes in his race for re-election, Joe Fincher and Ladd Turner each received one vote.

Ann Hill, unopposed, received 1408 votes for County Tax Assessor-Collector.


Miguel "Mike" Villanueva received 232 votes to Donald D. Patton's 184 in the race for county commissioner, precinct one.



The Sonora Broncos finished-up the 1984 football season with a super effort that accounted for a 35-7 victory over the Ozona Lions. This win makes the Broncos 7-3 on the season. All three losses were to play-off-bound teams.

The Broncos opened the scoring Friday night on their

The next three scores were the combined efforts of senior quarterback Scott Miller and junior receiver Esau Ramirez. They teamed up for scoring completions of 64 yards, 74

yards, and 43 yards. Miller booted all three PATs. The final Bronco score was again by Noriega on a six-yard run. Miller again booted the PAT to up the score to 35-0.

The Lions scored in the final minutes of the game, on a pass that bounced off the hands of a Bronco defender in the end-zone. The Broncos got four turnovers as Sonny Samaniego

got two interceptions. Senior linebacker Gilbert Martinez got one interception and senior defensive-end Mario Sotelo recovered a fumble.

In the rushing department the Broncos rolled up an impressive 220 yards on 40 carries. Joe Mike Noriega, the season rushing leader for the Broncos with over 700 yards, was the leader with 87 yards on 12 attempts.

John David Martinez added 73 yards on 9 carries. Victor Lira had 43 yards, also on 9 tries. Edward Mata had 30 yards on 5 carries. Esau Ramirez had one carry for two yards. Scott Miller was sacked twice for a minus

In the passing department, Miller was 5 of 11 for 201 vards. The Bronco quarterback upped his season total to 1088 yards or 108.8 yds. per game average. This will put him in the top group of West-Texas quarterbacks, all reaching that 1000 plus yard plateau.

The receivers had a good night also. Ricky Mesa caught one pass for 12 yards. Joe Will Ross had one for eight yards. Esau Ramirez had three catches for 181 yards. Ramirez went into the game as the leading receiver in all of West Texas with 654 yards. He finishes the year with 835 yards for an average of 83.5 yards per game. This, in all likelyhood, will keep him tops among all West Texas receivers.

Elsewhere around District 7-AAA, Ballinger finished at 10-0 as they beat Coahoma. Colorado City, the other play-off team, finished at 9-1 as they beat Crane. The Broncos finished at 7-3. Coahoma's season record was 4-5-1 while Crane and Ozona had identical 1-8-1 Congratulations to all the Broncos on a fine season

especially to the 18 seniors on this year's ball club. As far as our district goes, the playoff pairings will be Ballinger vs. Brady in San Angelo Friday and Colorado City vs. Gatesville in San Angelo at 2:30 p.m. Saturday.

The Underground Water District advisory Committee, a group of interested people in Sutton County, will hold a public meeting with Drew Durham, attorney. The meeting will be held in the Sutton County Courthouse Wednesday, November 14 at 7:30 p.m.

This will be the third public meeting of the committee which was formed by the Sutton county Commissioners Court to study the possibility of establishing a local underground water district. According to committee chairman Joe David Ross, this will probably be the last meeting unless further need arises. Any future meetings will be announced and open to the public.

"It is important that the citizens of Sutton County be concerned with and protective of our local water supply," said Ross. He urges all interested persons to attend this "very important" meeting. Local input-pro or con-is needed by the committee.

Ross pointed out that establishment of a local water district will create another taxing entity. "However, there is no intent to open a new office or hire a full-time staff at the present time," he said.

Schleicher County has had an underground water district for 20 years and has seldom collected its very

HNG agrees to buy Transwestern

The Wall Street Journal HOUSTON--Houston Natural Gas Co. said it agreed to buy Transwestern Pipeline Co., a unit of Texas Eastern Corp., for \$390

The transaction will extend

Houston Natural's huge Texas pipeline system into the interstate natural-gas market. It also will generate cash for Texas Eastern after that company's \$1.04 billion acquisition of Petrolane Inc.

Under the agreement, Texas Eastern will retain a small pipeline, as well as the drilling and coal gasification subsidiaries and certain real estate holdings of Transwestern. The purchase, which is subject to federal approval, is expected to be completed by early January.

Transwestern's main asset, a 4,395-mile pipeline linking the Texas and Oklahoma gas fields to the California border, hasn't been a strong profit producer for Texas Eastern. It generated just \$35 million of profit in the 12 months ended June 30 on more than \$1.1 billion of revenue. Texas Eastern had total net income in the same

period of \$201.4 million, or \$3.86 a share, on revenue of \$5.7 billion.

The acquisition would increase Houston Natural's revenue about one-third. In its year ended July 31, Houston Natural had net income of \$141.5 million, or \$3.86 a share, on revenue of \$2.14 billion Houston Natural lately has been shedding businesses to concentrate on its pipeline operations, which are among the nation's most profitable.

Texas Eastern could use proceeds of the sale to help reduce debt incurred in the recent purchase of Petrolane, a marketer of liquified petroleum gas. Texas Eastern wouldn't comment on that speculation.

Some pipeline stock analysts said Houston Natural probably could make more money from the pipeline than Texas Eastern has. Houston Natural, which is a major natural gas producer as well as the biggest in-state pipeline operator in Texas, could bring less expensive gas to the Transwestern system, making the pipeline more competitive with other suppliers of natural gas to California.

Houston Natural is the third largest supplier to the Transwestern system.

The acquisition also would give Transwestern access to Houston Natural's Bammel storage field in Houston; Transwestern currently doesn't have any storage capacity.

Houston Natural said the California natural gas market, second in size to that of Texas, has "significant" growth potential. analysts noted that California has become a leading user of natural gas for electricity co-generation, a process in which waste heat is


recycled to generate energy.

The acquisition would make Houston Natural's earnings more stable, according to the company.







Mail early for the holidays

The Postal Service is cooperating with the business community of Sonora in urging customers to shop early

Postmaster Vaughan asks holiday shoppers to mail early this year and to make certain that mail is addressed correctly (Including Zip Codes) and that packages are wrapped correctly so that cards and parcels reach their destinations in plenty of time for the

"Normally, we handle about 20,000 pieces of mail a day--including cards, letters, and packages, but during the holiday season, volume goes up to about 30,000 pieces," the Postmaster says. "We in the Postal Service take pride in carrying your messages of love and joy. Mailing early helps us deliver the messages on time," Vaughan added.

The key to successful holiday mailing is to mail early and correctly. Postmaster Vaughan says that includes planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas.

'Many overseas mailing dates--including those for the armed forces stationed overseas--occur this month. Mailers can get specific information on the international dates by calling us here at 387-3161," Postmaster said.

'Customers should also take care to write ligible Zip Coded addresses for both the address and the return address. And remember that the use of Zip Codes following the name of the particular city and state will aid us in processing the mail."

"Last year, our customers helped us tremendously. They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they will choose to cooperate with us again this year, so we both will have an enjoyable holiday



Broncos end season at 7-3


The Sonora Broncos' football season came to an end last Friday as the Broncos crushed the hapless Ozona Lions 37-7 in Ozona.
