## WHITTLIN'

Across the state, the recent Democratic primary election attracted only minimum interest because of a lack of hotly-contested offices. The daily papers considered this year's election sort of a "ho-hum" affair.

In Parmer County, which had a contested race, the voters turnout was just mediocre from an overall standpoint.

In the Bovina voting precinct, though, the story was different, as it so often is.

We'd like to think that Bovina people are better citizens than most and will just naturally turn out to vote in greater percentages. That's partly true, too. However, the big thing which caused the near-recording setting total vote here was a contested race for the office of Justice of the Peace which included a strong write-in campaign.

Probably nothing gets out the vote better than a good, local race, the professional politicians will tell you, we'd guess. We had all that plus in the first primary.

The same thing will hold true for voters in this precinct in the second primary, which is scheduled for Saturday, June 4. While most voters in Texas will have only the attorney general's runoff to vote on, Bovina and Rhea citizens will have that plus the JP runoff to decide. While we don't expect as large a turnout as we had in the first primary, we feel that the total vote will be as good, or better, compared with others throughout the state.

Political candidates, for the most part, want a large turnout at the polls. Their reasoning for this is that they want an expression from a majority of the people, not just a majority of the voters -- and there is a difference. At the same time, if they lose, it's better to know that the opponent was preferred by most instead of wondering if the results would have been different had there been a larger turnout.

There was a lot of conversation about the justice of the peace race back before the first primary, in coffee shops and other places.

In one of said coffee shops when the conversation was hotter than the coffee the participants were drinking, someone remarked that there was more interest here in the justice of the peace race than there was in Johnson-Goldwater race back in '64.

"Sure there's more interest in this election," somebody answered. "It's a lot more important than that one was."

The remark was made in a joking way, but there's some truth in it just the same. Local politics are highly important. On the local level is where national politics originate.

Much of this country's greatness comes from the people being able to govern themselves. When we get away from that principle, we're into something which isn't good.

This is that year, they're already beginning to say, when it never did rain!

"Those people who are complaining about business not being good might as well save their breath," a man told us this week. "It isn't going to get any better until we have a good general rain. People aren't going to spend money as they do normally when there's a drought on and when there's a dry, hot wind a'blowing."

By that we don't mean to imply that business isn't good or that people are complaining, we're just quoting what a man told us. Maybe he'd been in a position to hear more complaints than we had.

The best thing about a drought is a good, strong eight-inch irrigation well for each 100 acres. You can quote us on that.

Speaking of wells, the city is drilling a new one which is supposed to eliminate the potential water shortage in Bovina this summer. City officials hope it will be in use in the next 30 days or so. Without some natural moisture between now and then, that won't be a bit too soon!

## Headstart Program Personnel Named

Mrs. Jerry Burnett will be one of possibly two teachers for Bovina's Project Headstart program, Superintendent Otis Spears announced this week. Another teacher will be named if there is a sufficient number of students for two teachers, the superintendent pointed out.

The program, financed by the federal government and designed to give children from low income families a "headstart" toward their first year of regular school next term, is set up for 40 children here.

Spears said this week that he didn't know how many would enroll and was waiting until this figure is known before naming

a second teacher.

Mrs. Burnett is a first grade teacher during the regular school term.

Mrs. Helen Wassom of the cafeteria staff has been named to head the cafeteria portion of the Headstart program. An additional person will be named to assist her if the number of students warrants it, Spears says.

Ramon Delgado, pastor of the Mexican Baptist Mission in Bovina, will be the school bus driver for the program.

Project Headstart is scheduled to begin Monday, June 6, and continue for 40 school days.

Children who participate will receive two meals, breakfast

and lunch, each day and get medical attention as well as have classroom learning activities and supervised field trips.

A grant of \$5,644 has been made for the program in Bovina Independent School District through the federal government's Office of Economic Opportunity.

People knowing of children who will be first graders next school term and are eligible for the program are asked to contact Spears' office.

Parents are asked to bring their children to the school cafeteria June 6 at 8 p.m. for enrollment.

"Funds are available in the program to employ teacher aids

and it is possible that one or more people may be named to fill these positions," the superintendent said.

A large crowd was on hand during the day for the opening, according to Roy Allen, manager of the business which opened April 1.

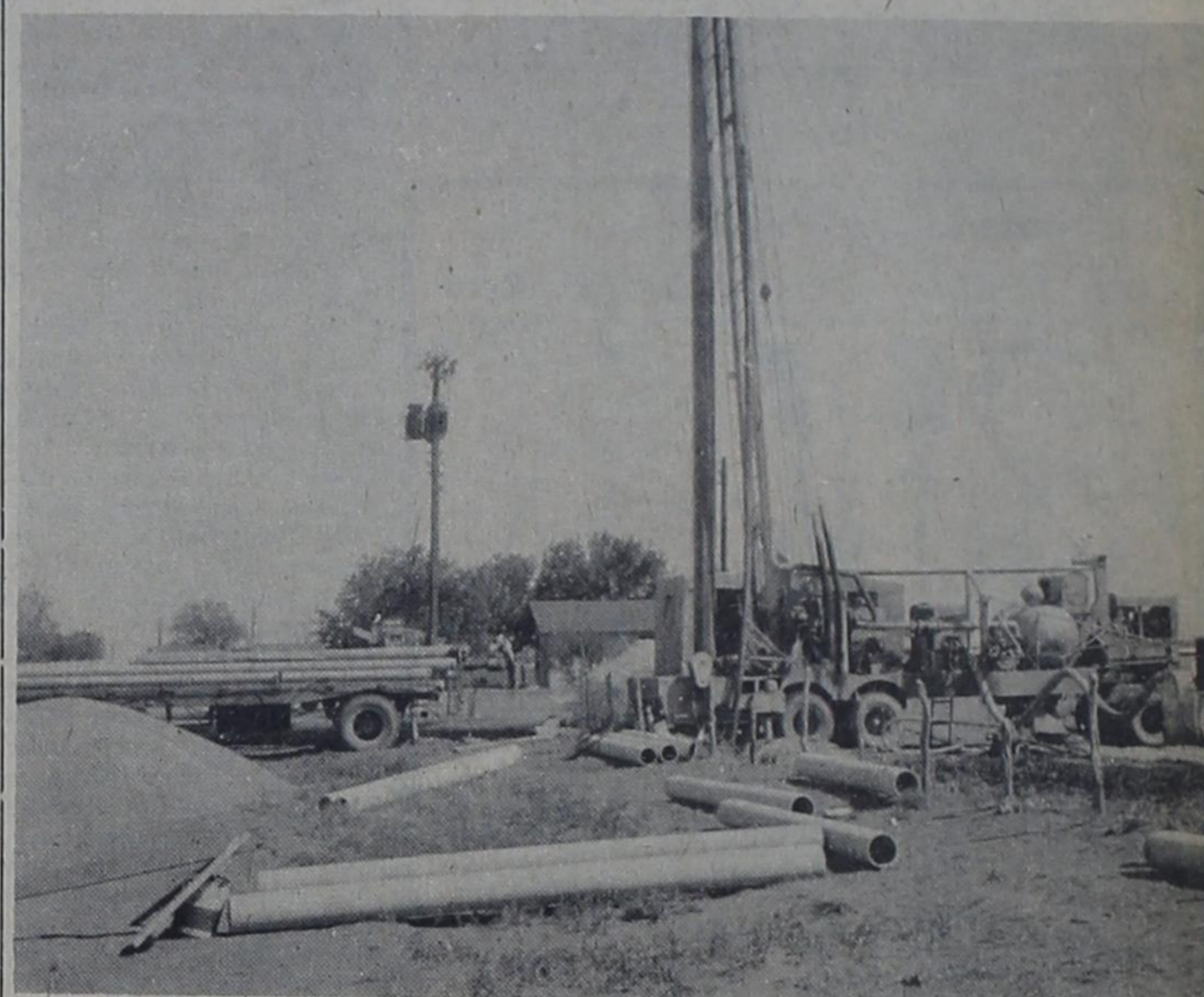

## Wheat Growers Have Near-Capacity Crowd

A near-capacity crowd was present Thursday night at annual membership meeting of Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc. Dan Ammerman, Amarillo radio personality, was guest speaker. He told his audience, "Each one of us can excel in something which will be significant in this world."

Re-elected, during the meeting, to the co-op's five-member board of directors were Raymond Schueler and M. H. Carson. They were elected to serve another three-year term each. Re-election of the two directors was recommended by the nominating committee headed by Durward Bell. There were no nominations from the floor.

In his annual report to the members, Jim Russell, manager of the organization, said that it appears now that the wheat price will be higher.

"The picture for grain sorghum doesn't look so rosy," he said. He pointed out that the price of grain sorghum could be \$1.50 or possibly \$1.40 -- depending on whether free storage is made available to farmers through March 31 as it has been in the past. The 1965 price was \$1.70 cwt.

Harold Hawkins, president of the board of directors, was master of ceremonies for the program and introduced Ammerman. Webb Gober, also a member of the board, read the minutes of the 1965 meeting. W. C. Russell of Hereford gave an audit report on the past year's business.

A meal featuring barbecue was served to the 237 attending. Invited to attend were all stockholders and their families. Prior to making his reports,

Manager Russell introduced out-of-town guests and employees of the business.

This total in attendance was down slightly from the 274 which set the attendance record for the affair in '65.

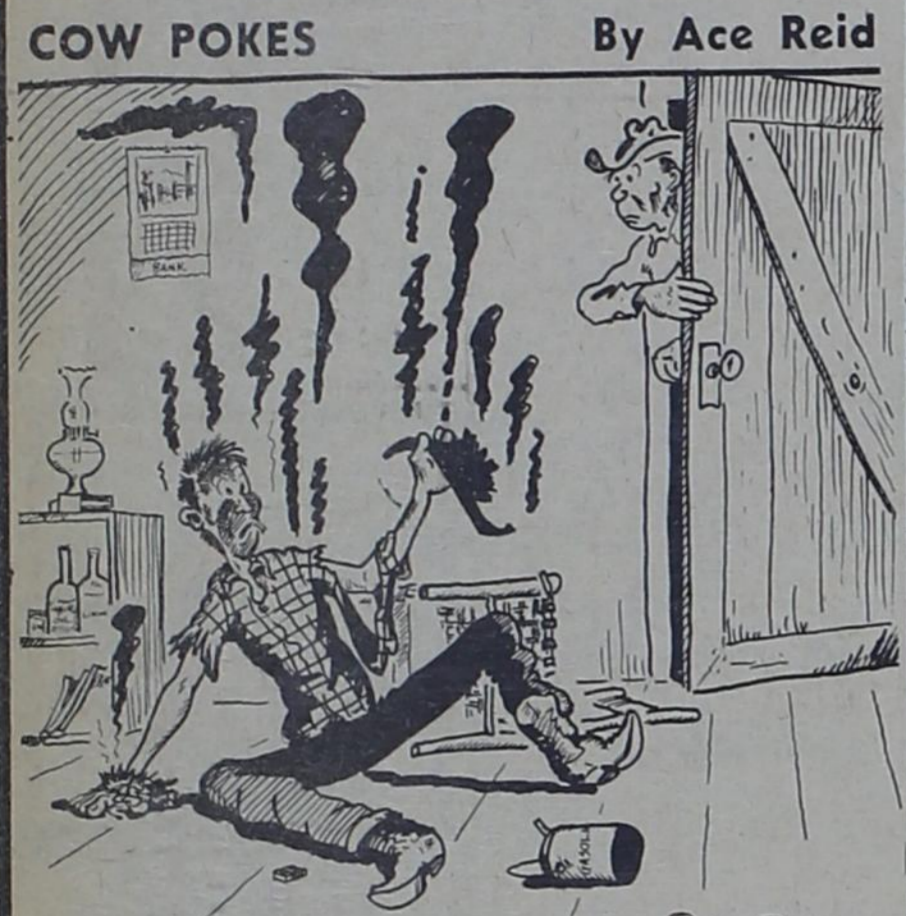

**LAWN PROBLEMS & MORE PROBLEMS --**  
 Not many people escape lawn problems, that is if they have a lawn. It is either the brown spots, crabgrass, or dandelions, and even the pesky gophers add to our woes.

For those brown patches, specialists in this field recommend that over stimulation with nitrogen be avoided as this increases the fungus disease that attack the lawns.

If your favorite shrub or tree seems to be dying, it could be a neglect of watering throughout the winter months. This often happens especially if little moisture was present during the long winter season. Too often people assume that watering is not necessary during cool weather, which is a mistaken idea.

Two new bulletins are available from the Extension office here in the courthouse; one is "Better Lawns," and the other is called "Thumbs Down on Pocket Gophers". Call or come by the office and get a copy. Several bulletins on lawn care are available and could help solve some of the lawn and tree problems if you don't yet know the answers.

**AN OUNCE OF PREVENTION**  
 If you store your woollens in a cedar chest, use an ounce of prevention in the form of moth crystals or mothballs, instead of relying wholly on the cedar trunk's aromatic fumes to ward off moths.

Although new cedar chests do give protection from moths, it is safer to treat woollens with a good mothproofing agent before they're stored.

This is especially important with older cedar chests. Tests show that red cedar loses some of its effectiveness against moths after 24 months, and white or South American cedar after 12 to 20 months.

Researchers also find that the tightness of a chest is an important part of the mothproof-

ing. Cedar-lined closets also should be tight and woollens moth-proofed, before storage. Whenever you use a pesticide, remember to follow the instructions carefully and note the precautions on the label.

**DARK RINGS ARE HARMLESS IN HARD-COOKED EGGS**  
 Do you ever wonder why eggs cooked at high temperatures for a long period of time may have a dark ring where their whites and yolks touch?

This is caused by a combination of sulphur in the white and iron in the yolk, which forms ferrous sulphide.

Although it may detract from the egg yolk's appearance, this darkening is entirely harmless. The higher the cooking temperature and the longer the cooking time, the more darkening takes place.

By plunging the eggs into cold water immediately after cooking, the possibility of this darkening is reduced. This lowers the egg's temperature and helps prevent the formation of ferrous sulphide.

Immersing eggs quickly and holding them in cold water for a short time after cooking also makes eggs easier to peel.

Amid the noise of strife and the turmoil of revolution we sometimes wonder if peace is truly God's will for man. One problem after another arises on the world scene. We are tempted to throw up our hands in despair. A closer look from a world perspective leads us to conclude that much of the turmoil is unavoidable as we overcome the prejudices and injustices of the past.

We are shocked by disorder and violence in some of the new nations. What we forget is that years of warfare, arbitrary decisions by imperial powers, and long periods of foreign domination when few national leaders were developed, preceded independence. Colonialism brought certain benefits, but it also sowed the seeds of anticolonialism and intense nationalism.

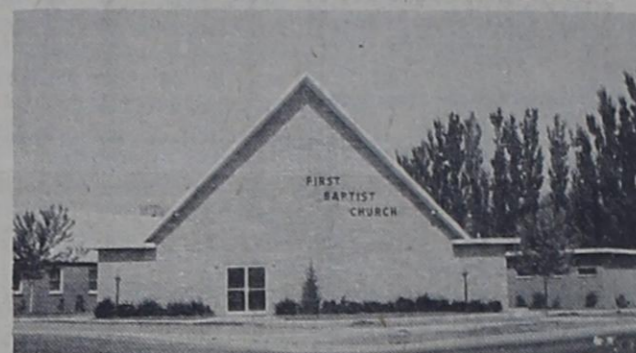
More than fifty nations with a population of over one billion people have become independent during the last twenty years. These nations are trying to compress the achievements of centuries into a few decades. The United States is still wrestling with problems growing out of the great struggle of a century ago. Should we not expect the peoples of these new nations to encounter difficulties as they build schools, choose governments, and strive to achieve nationhood in a divided world?

One lesson in the Old Testament is that God does not allow injustice and unrighteousness to continue indefinitely. Furthermore repentance and renewal are as painful for society as for individuals. Through the process of change God makes way for new relationships and institutions as well as for new persons. In faith let us search for God's will as we build for the future. Let us seek peace and work for it.

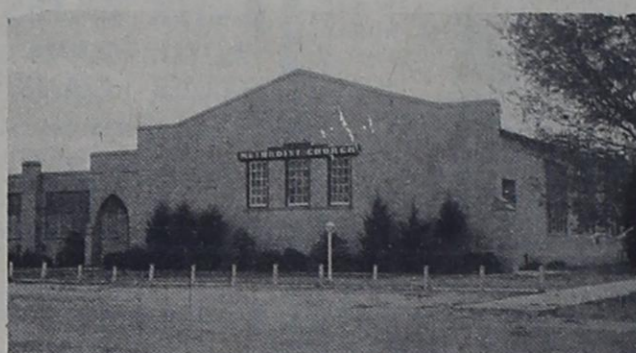

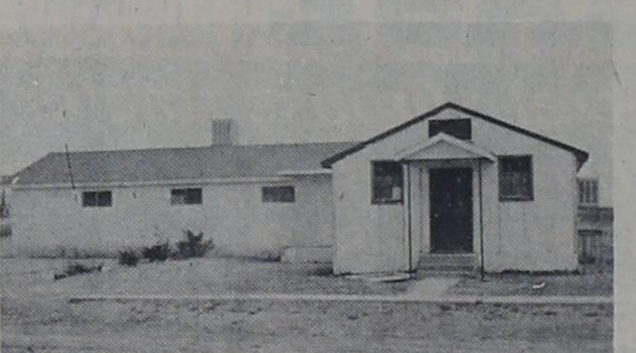

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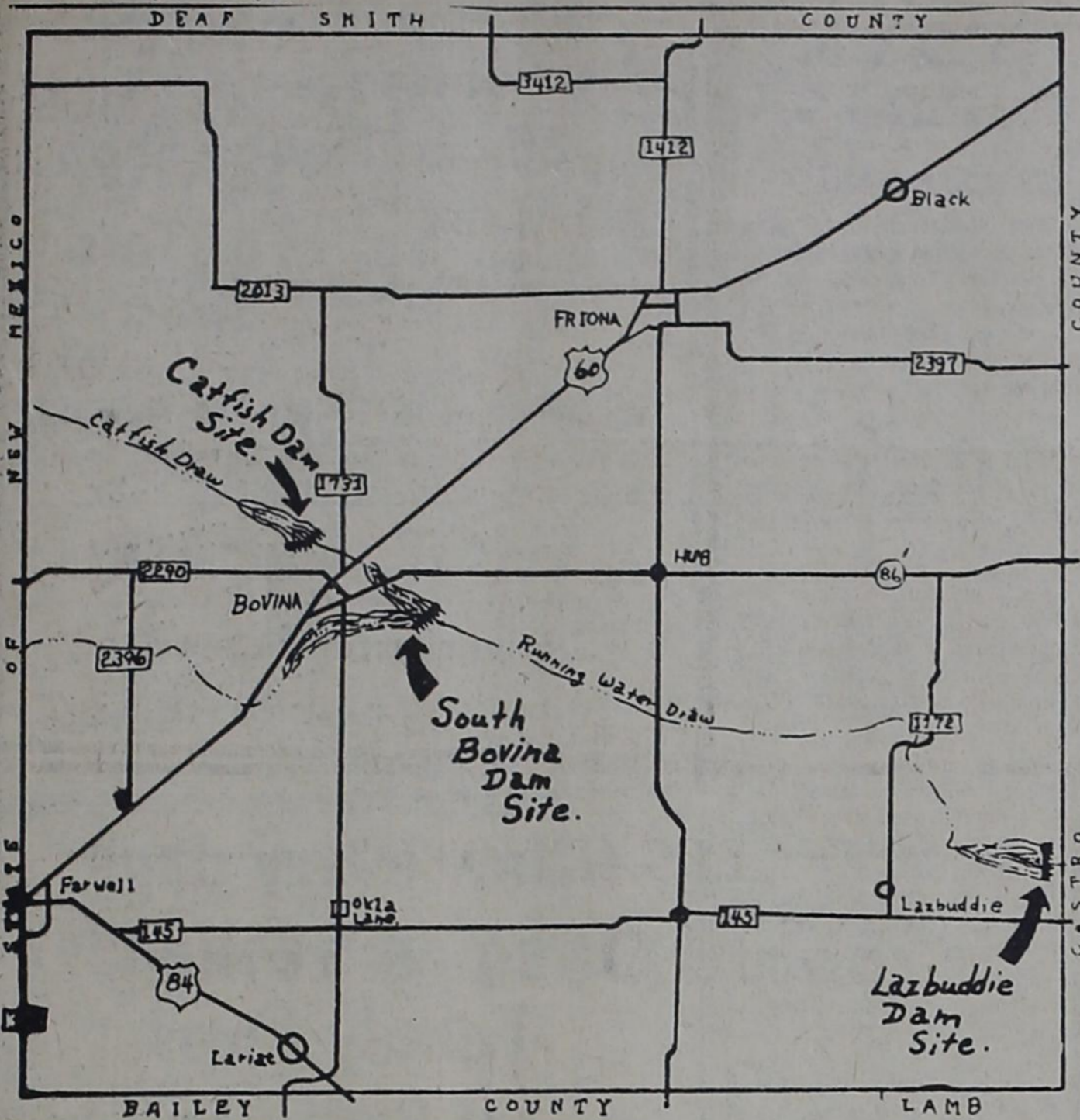

# County Dam Sites Named

Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Commissioners Court, who are sponsoring an upstream flood water protection program on Running Water Draw in Parmer County under Public Law No. 566, recently held a meeting to make tentative selection of Dam sites to be constructed in Parmer County. The sponsors authorized the Soil Conservation Service to complete the plan and prepare it for submission to Congress for approval. All dam sites are tentative until approved by Congress.

Dam sites selected are the Catfish Dam located just north of Bovina on Catfish Draw, South Bovina Dam located south and east of Bovina on Running Water Draw just below where Catfish Draw empties into Running Water Draw, Lazbuddie Dam located approximately 100

yds. west of the east county line.

The Commissioners Court and Soil and Water Conservation District wish to thank everyone who has had a part in accomplishing the work that has been done. However, at the same time, they would like to point out that the job has been begun. By selecting the sites that are needed, an outline detailing the job to be done has come into focus. Before any site can be approved for construction 75% of the active erosion from both wind and water, must be stopped.

It would be a great disaster to construct one of these sites, which would cost approximately \$200,000,00, then have it rendered useless because of silt washing and blowing into the structure leaving no capacity for floor water. These structures are designed and built to offer protection from floods for at least 100 years, if the structure and watershed are used properly.

Aside from flood water protection benefits, these structures will offer recharge bene-

fits which is estimated to be approximately 3,000 acre feet per year. A dollar value placed on an acre foot of water would be approximately \$16.00 per acre foot.

All Federal Agencies in Parmer County have pledged their support and have helped in every way possible with the project. The Soil Conservation Service has recently increased the work unit staff at Friona from three men to six men in order that District Co-Operators inside Running Water Draw Watershed may receive additional assistance in stopping erosion on their farms and ranches.

The ASCS office in Farwell has asked for and received special funds to be used in stopping erosion on 18,138

acres above the proposed Catfish Dam site.

The FHA in Parmer County will be glad to financially assist through soil and water conservation loans any land owner inside Running Water Draw Watershed.

The Extension Service, through the local county agent, will be glad to assist in any and all ways possible.

# Voting By Mail

Cotton producers in Parmer County are now voting on the question of whether cotton farmers may be permitted to sell or lease their cotton allotment, in Parmer County, to another cotton producer for use on a farm in a different county.

Transfers of cotton may not be made outside the State, if

such transfers are approved by at least two-thirds of growers voting, the transfers will apply to the next three upland cotton crops, 1967, 1968 and 1969, announces Prentice Mills, county ASCS office manager.

Ballots have been mailed to all known cotton producers in Parmer County, together with

information on the purpose of the vote. Cotton producers who did not receive a ballot, should get in touch with the County ASCS Office where a ballot is available, Mills explains. A

producer may vote by mail or in person. To be counted, the ballots must be in the county office by the close of business May 25, 1966.

This is the first time that a vote on a commodity referendum has been conducted by mail, and "we hope that this convenient method will result in a large vote," the ASCS manager points out.

Parmer County has led Texas in the past several years in "turning out" for this type of referendum.

"We urge our growers to maintain this record by returning their marked ballots to the county office by May 25," he says.

**World of Gardening**

The origin of most of our popular flowers is rooted in antiquity. The Chrysanthemum was popular in China more than 2000 years ago... the Rose was referred to in Greek mythology... and the Lily is mentioned in the Bible. A relative newcomer to the world of gardening is the Begonia, celebrating its 100th birthday.  
There is an interesting history surrounding the Begonia. Although the plant was first discovered in Mexico in 1649, it wasn't until 100 years ago that the first tuber-forming Begonias arrived in Europe. There, under the tender ministrations of Belgian horticulturists, the first hybrids and the ancestors of the plants we know were developed.  
To celebrate the Begonia's birthday the townspeople of Lochristi, Belgium, transform the village into a carpet of flowers for the annual Begonia Festival the last weekend in August. Thousands of tourists from all countries flock to view the magnificent floral displays.  
Today, there are hundreds of variations of the basic Begonia strain—and they offer a fabulous variety to any gardener with a green thumb. Types range from crested, frilled, giant single blossoms, multiflora, pendula, camellia, rose and ruffled species—and the colors include shades of yellow, white, orange and red. All varieties are hardy, and add a rainbow of color to your garden.  
Pheasants and quail are becoming so scarce in the United States that the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife is planning on importing the Tinamou from South America, which will breed faster.
