Brooks said over half of the 1,100 school districts in Texas require
teachers to perform teachers to perform duties during
their lunch period. The new law
will require disticts will require districts to provide a
30 -minute free period to every 30-minute free period to every
teacher at least four days per week.
Donna New, an Austin Donna New, an Austin elemen-
tary teacher, said she welcomes the
new law, stating that it will be tary teacher, said she welcomes the

beneficial for students, as well as ber teachers.
