# Child abuse defined

The following article is the first in a series of articles concerning child abuse and neglect. We hop that the series will be of interest to our readers.

ABUSE AND NEGLECT Thousands of children in Texas are abused physically, sexually, or emotionally. They are also neglected physically or emotionally. The abuse and neglect occurs in all neighborhoods, at all socioeconomic levels, and among all races.

Child abuse or neglect is against the law in Texas. So is the failure to report suspected cases of mistreatment to a law enforcement agency and to the enforcement agency and to the Texas Department of Human Resources. A person who in good faith reports suspected abuse or neglect is protected by law from civil or criminal liability.

Physical abuse--inflicting bodily injury on a child. Sexual abuse--using a child in or exposing a child to sexual activities with or without the child's consent. Emotional abuse--demanding more than a child's ability; belittling; telling a child you wish he were

dead or had never been born. Physical neglect-failure to provide adequate food, clothing, shelter, medical care, education or super-

Emotional neglect--absence of love or hate, anger or warmth; the child is never shown feelings and may as well not exist, so far as the parents are concerned.

Child abuse reports can be made to a local DHR office of through a toll-free Child Abuse Hotline (1-800-252-5400) from anywhere in Texas. A caller can remain anonymous. Abuser Profile

Children are most often abused by a parent or someone living in the child's home. The picture of a typical abusive parent often includes these elements: isolated from a social system; lives far from relatives; lonely and has few if any friends; has family stresses from finances; marital trouble, new baby, a recent move; low self-esteem; role reversal by a parent unrealistically expecting to be nurtured by the child; parent abused as a child.

About 90 percent of abusive parents hate them-

Child Protective Services Texas law requires DHR to investigate all reports of abuse and neglect, DHR Child Protective Services workers investigated approximately 50,000 suspected cases a year. They find that abuse or neglect occurs in about 60 percent of the reports. Only in 4 percent of

the cases, however, do the children have to be removed from the home for protection. The goal of DHR staff is to keep a family together and to make a home safe for the children.

Workers have extremely difficult jobs. To be effective, they must learn to cope with hostile, involuntary clients, hazardous working conditions, and with the stress of making life or death situations.

The Texas family Code mandates DHR to provide at least minimum protection to abused and neglected children. DHR met this requirement in 1977. Funding limitations since have resulted in a 21 percent reduction in Child Protective Services workers, while reports of suspected abuse of neglect have increased by 65 percent.

**Priority for Investigators** In 1979, it became necessary to place a priority on child abuse and neglect reports. Workers needed guidelines for which cases to investigate first. Three

categories resulted. Priority 1 children in life-endangering situations. Priority 2 children in safety or health endangering

situations. Priority 3 children at high risk of abuse and neglect

All priority 1 and 2 reports must be investigated. Priority 3 reports are investigated as time permits.

# Loeffler reports

The declining availability of a clean and adequate water supply is clearly emerging as a crisis with the potential to rival the energy crisis of the past decade. Considering the time it took for this nation to recognize and begin to address the energy crisis, it is apparent that we must now turn with the same vigor to the issue of water.

We tend to take a safe, affordable, and abundant supply of water for granted. Yet in approximately 75 percent of the world where clean water is lacking, an estimated 10 million people can die in a year because of water borne diseases.

developing water problems. The critical statistic is not how much water is used, but how much is returned to the system that can be used again. Additionally, in Texas, the demands placed on our state's water supply are compouned by Sunbelt growth. According to the Texas Department of Water Resources, Texans currently consume 5.9 rillion gallons a year and, if growth projections hold, we could be using almost 95 percent more by

the year 2000. In Texas we already have to contend with the possibility of

geography and climatic conditions. Our annual rainfall rate diminishes on the average, about one inch for each twenty miles traveled across the state from east to west. This means that while the annual rainfall in our eastern border averages about 56 inches, the far western edge receives only eight inches a

Over the years, Texas responded to this insufficient distribution of water by constructing reserviors with 192 now supplementing our natural resources. A water source map of Texas shows 15 major river basins and eight coastal basins supplying surgface water and seven major acquifers and 17 minor acquifers providing underground

Fortunately, some of Texas' largest acquifers are found in the areas with below average rainfall. Unfortunately, the slow replenishment of water into agifers threatens their future usefullness. In greatest danger today is the enormous Ogalalla Aquifer that supports life and agriculture for the Great Plains states, which

stretches down into the High Plains of Texas, and stops not far north of Midland. The plight of the Ogallala has received national attention as well as careful study by those states directly affected, including our own state. This is only one example, however, of the problems to be addressed.

My special concern for a sufficient water supply goes back to the days of my childhood. I well remember the drought of the Fifties, when the ground was totally bare, creeks and rivers dried up, and we would look to the north in hopes that the cloud bank rolling in would be full of rain, and not full of dust and dry wind. Just two years ago, the West Texas economy was brought to its knees because of drought and I fought long and hard to finally win the

appropriate federal relief regired. Foresight in meeting the challenge of clean and adequate water supply in imperative--for unlike the energy crisis which led us to seek and develop alternatives to our conventional energy resources--the only alternative to water remains water.

protest test The Texas State Teachers Association and the National Education Association announced June 17 that it has retained the services of three law firms to review portions of House Bill 72 as it relates to competency testing of practicing teachers. Representing TSTA and NEA

will be the Washington D.C. firm of Bredhoff and Kaiser and the Texas firms of Schwartz, Waterman, Fickman and Van Os of Houston and Austin and Daves and Hahn of Tyler. 

# 2987 applications processed

A total of 2,987 drilling applications were processed by the Railroad Commission in May, according to RRC Chairman Buddy Temple. In April, the total was

So far this year, oil and gas operators have filed 13,355 applications. Through the same period last year, they filed 14,945.


The May total included 2,125 applications for permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 66 to deepen existing holes, 308 to plugback existing holes, and 97 for service (non-producing) wells. Operators also filed 391 amended drilling applications.







# Services available to all Lessons a success

The Texas Department of Human Resources is mandated by law to investigate reports of suspected child abuse and neglect and to provide services to protect children from abuse, neglect and exploitation. Services are provided to any child in need of protection without regard to family income or citizenship. During 1984, the number of investigators rose 6.7 percent to 61,576. Over the last two calendar years, the number of child sexual abuse cases has increased 50.4 percent. Services include:

-- investigation of reports of suspected abuse, neglect, or exploitation of children

-- services to the child and family, including counseling and referral to community agencies, if warranted

--court action, if necessary. Court action may include removing children from their homes, assignment of managing conservatorship or placement with relatives or in foster care.

--provision of temporary emer-gency sneiter for children removed from their homes for protection -- assistance to parents, care-

takers, or relatives to improve home conditions so the child may return to the home if possible --recruitment and development

of foster homes -- supervision of foster care -development of permanent plans of care for children in foster

-- adoption of services for children who are under the managing conservatorship of the department and whose family relationship has been legally terminated.

--programs for prevention of abuse and neglect.

The department maintains a toll-free 24 hour hotline (1-800-252-5400) to receive reports of suspected child abuse and neglect. The identification of callers is confidential. Reports are investigated on a priority basis, depending upon the extent of apparent danger the child faces. Services are designed to remedy the situation. Services to the child and the family include counseling and referral to community agencies. Court action is initiated if neces-

A court may order removal of children from their homes, assignment of managing conservatorship and placement with relatives or in foster care. When rehabilitative services fail, attempts may be made to legally free children for adoption. The department develops and certifies foster and adoptive homes for children re-

moved from their homes. Approximately 18,000-26,000 children in Region 04 will be at risk of abuse and neglect in 1985. In fiscal year 1984, 4,222 abused or neglected children were identified in Region 04. In fiscal year 1984, protective service workers investigated 2,547 reports of suspected child abuse and neglect in Region 04 with the number of confirmed instances of abuse or neglect being 2,247. As of February 1985, Region 04 had 55

children's protective service workers. An average of 311 children a month received foster care under the state-federal Aid to Families with Dependent Children program, while an additional 96 children received foster care paid entirely with state funds.

The Department provided adoption subsidies to 61 children in Region 04 with special problems or handicaps enabling them to have permanent homes with families who otherwise could not afford their special needs.

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

# AHA programs designed to increase awareness

in Texas announced recently the existence of three programs designed to increase the public's awareness of high blood pressure and methods for controlling this serious condition.

High blood pressure--or hypertension, as it is sometimes called is a major cause of heart attack and stroke. It significantly reduces life expectancy, and the higher the blood pressure, the greater the rreduction in length of life.

High blood pressure occurs when the smallest arteries of the body become narrowed and the heart must pump harder to force the blood through. This serious condition afflicts over 37 million American adults.

According to James M. Atkins, M.D., President of the American Heart Association in Texas, a dramatic change in what was know about hypertension took place in the past thirty years. "In the mid-1960s, only about 50 percent of individuals with high blood pressure knew of their condition.

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By late 1970s, studies found that 75 to 80 percent were aware of their condition. In addition, there was a great increase in the number of people with high blood pressure who were under adequ-

ate treatment," said Atkins. The American Heart Association was on the forefront of this wave offering education activities aimed at the public and physicians. Millions of individuals had their blood pressures checked at AHA sponosred blood pressure screen-

In the 1980s, however, as more and more people became aware of their blood pressure, new methods were needed to reach those who were still unaware of their blood pressure or did not have it under control.

To accomplish this goal, the American Heart Association in Texas developed a program that allows individuals to become familiar with blood pressure and its treatment. It is called the Blood Pressure Awareness Training Program, and is patterned after the Heart Association's CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) training program. Individuals who take this course include church groups, scout troups, company employee groups, school groups--virtually anyone wishing to learn more about blood pressure and its measurement. In order to conduct blood pressure screenings or control programs. The course can be carried out in a total of four

The Blood Pressure Awareness Training Program is composed of a number of parts which can be selected to best meet the needs of the audience being taught. Although designed for a lay audience without medical training, the program can be utilized as a review for individuals with medical training, to enhance their techninque or knowledge.

This training program ensures

quality control for the screening of the public. At the state level, the Heart Association trains instructors who, in turn, conduct local training programs. This pyramid-type training allows the American Heart Association to utilize individuals in nearly every community to screen for high blood pressure.

Two additional programs tie in to the Blood Pressure Awareness Training Program for successful implementaion. A Letter of Agreement Program encourages organizations other than the American Heart Association to conduct blood pressure screenings and educational activities in companies, schools, or for the general public. The outside organization is

maintenance of any needed equipment and visual aids. The curriculum, training and screening procedures must meet the standards of the American Heart Association in Texas. The American Heart Association in turn trains the organization's instructors and provides the high blood pressure materials at no cost.

Another AHA prgram, entitled Heart At Work, promotes cardiovascular health among employees at their worksites. One of the modules of this programs deals specifically with blood pressure. Both the Letter of Agreement Program and the Blood Pressure Awareness Training Program

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# Cheese can be frozen

Recent tests on freezing cheese should be good news for those who would like the convenience of having a stock of their favorite cheeses on hand.

Ten different varieties of cheese proved successful for home freezing in tests reported by the Minnesota Experiment Station, says nutritionists Dr. Dymple Cooksey.

But the success depends on rapid freezing as well as the composition of the cheese, explains Cooksey, a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

"The temperature in the freezer should be zero degrees F or lower, and the pieces or packages of cheese should weigh no more than one pound," she advises.

The varieties of cheese that were successfully frozen and kept in freezer storage for six months in the Minnesota tests were: Cheddar, Brick, Port du Salut, Swiss, Provoloni, Mozzarella, Liederkranz, Camenbert, Parmesan and Romano.

"The three brands of Blue cheese tested all became crumbly and mealy after freezing." notes the specialist. "But if Blue cheese is to be used for salad or dressings this would not be a disadvantage and might make the cheese handier to use.

Since the cream cheese in the tests became watery and mealy, it is not recommended for freezing, Cooksey says.
