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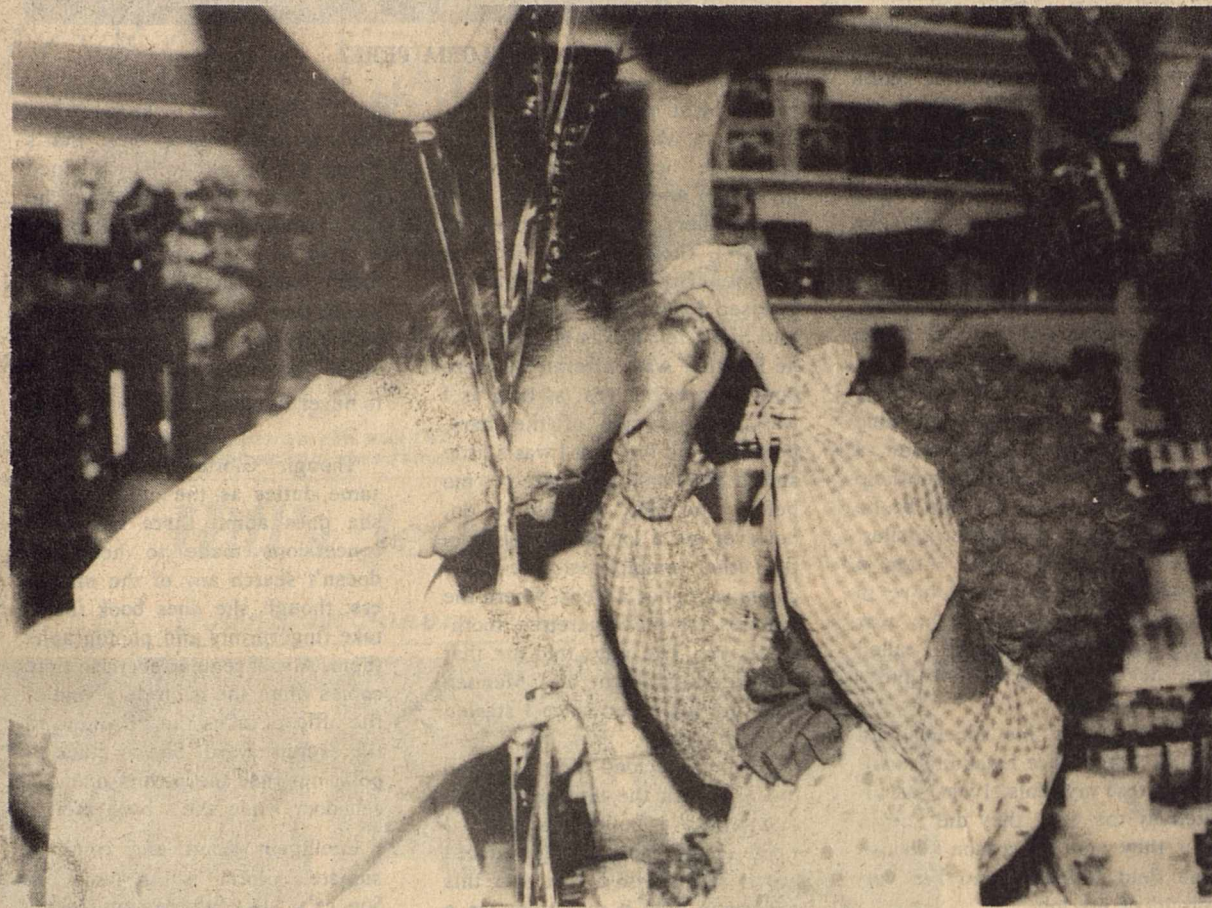

On June 14, 1985, Erich Roland Nicholas was born to Ron and Susan Nicholas at Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital in San Angelo.

On June 21, Erich was admitted to Shannon once

again and was diagnosed as having a very rare case of bacterial meningitis. A form of meningitis that is very difficult to combat. Erich is now two months old and is still in the hospital.

He has been on antibiotics for most of that time. Recently he was put back on antibiotics. Erich has undergone numerous X-rays. An operation was performed to drain of excess fluid from his brain via a reservoir.

It is expected that he will need another operation for a shunt to keep excess fluid from building up. A feeding catheter was used for a while to get his body weight up. It has now been removed.

His parents thank God for keeping his hand upon Erich at this time. His father is a school teacher in Sonora. The long stay in the hospital, doctors, surgeries and medicine are a great cost.

# Annual Lions Club Auction

Sonora has no United Way, no Community Chest yet we amazingly take care of our own. One of the primary ways of doing this is through the annual Lions Club Auction. With this year's auction less than two weeks away perhaps it's time to explore where the money from the auction is spent.

Last years auction brought in a total of \$13,350. Of this amount, the Lions supported scouting in Sonora by spending \$3,491.26 for repairs on both scout buildings. Utilities, paid by the Lions, for the Boy Scout Building were \$928.56. Insurance for both buildings, paid by the Lions, was \$327.00.

Lions have always supported sight and spent a total of \$1,031.82 on eyeglasses and exams for the children of parents who could not afford some.

To the Wool Show 1984 and 1985, both of which fell within the Lions fiscal year 84-85, they contributed \$1,772.31.

Little League received \$750.00, annual Speech Meet, \$467.01 and the 4-H Livestock Show, \$213.56.

The Lions bought a new sewing machine for the Sutton County Senior Center at the cost of \$249.97 and also purchased two Emergency Response units at \$325 each.

The Lions contributed to Sutton County Days, the annual Hunting party, Care, Inc., and to Boy's Ranch.

All these expenditures plus the cost of last year's auction totals approximately \$12,000.00. With the difference the Lions payed Int'l dues, gave to the Dist. Eye Bank and payed for miscellaneous items, checks, box rent, etc., necessary to do business.

Perhaps knowing that the majority of the money goes back into our community is one of the reasons why the auction has been so successful since its conception in 1937. The other reason is, of course, because it's so much fun.

This year's auction will kick off, Tuesday, Septem-

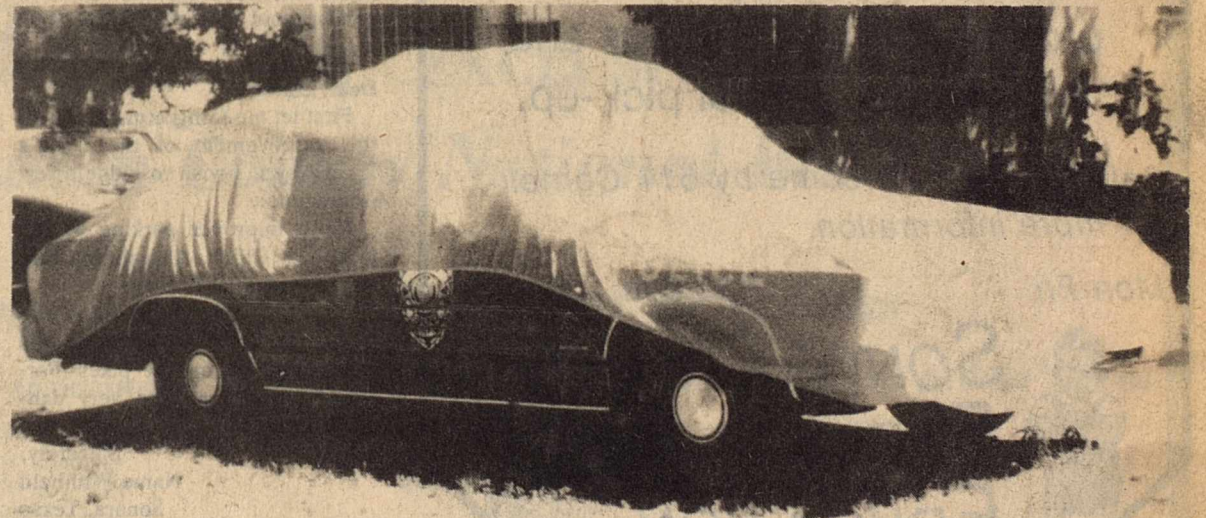
ber 17, at 6:00 with a bar-b-que. The meal, which is free to the public, will include plenty of brisket, goat, lamb, potato salad and beans, all cooked up with that special Lion flair.

Immediately following the bar-b-que, Lem Jones will step up to the podium, and "What am I bid?" will echo from the walls of the 4-H building. Lem, from Harper, is very much a part of the auction having been the auctioneer for the past 29 or 30 years--he's been coming here for so long no one remembers exactly when he started, not even Lem. He could aptly be called an "auctioneer" as he urges the crowd into bidding, not only by his skill as an auctioneer, but also with his wonderful, homespun humor.

Items to be auctioned off are donated by local merchants and individuals and include baked goods, handmade crafts, camping gear, livestock, meals, groceries and automotive goods with the highlight of the evening being the Mystery Box. The Mystery Box was born in 1945 in an effort to add a spark to the auction. It has done it's job well. It comes out of the vault at First National Bank, one night a year, for the auction. The Box usually brings upward of a \$1000, the purchasers name goes on the Box and it goes back to the bank--unopened. The box has never been opened, no one knows what it contains and that's the fun of it.

So make your plans now to attend the auction. If you've been there before, you know you are going to have a good time, if you haven't, you are in for a treat. The car, springs creaking from the overload, pulled out of the driveway the other day, heading for college. It wasn't like the other times, this time there was a finality in the departure—my girls are moving into their own "pad".

The first semester of college was a little rough, but I knew in the dorm they were safe and they would eat a fairly balanced diet. Each semester thereafter, it was easier to see them go, I would look forward to the peace and quiet and besides, they had to come back—they didn't have their grandmothers ice-box cookie recipe.

This time they took with them all the props needed to set the stage for adult life including a recipe box chocked full of the favorites. I promised them

malnutrition, though, when they said the only things they knew how to fix were hot dogs and bologna sandwiches. I don't know why they never learned to cook. I'm sure it had nothing to do with the fact that I always pushed them out of the kitchen so I could fix the things they really liked.

Unfortunately, we seldom show our feelings but instead, mask them with other emotions. I mean, how could I cradle these grown young women and convey to them how dear they are to me, how life has been constructed around them. They're both taller than I am, and besides I don't want them leaving with a sense of guilt. So true to form I started, several weeks ago, with quips like "I at least hope you are going to clean your bathroom before you go" (they didn't) and "Now you will appreciate what I've always done for you" (they will but it will be years from now).

The name of my house will always be "home" but now that name will be based on memories, not because they live here. They'll be home for the holidays but they plan to travel on spring break and next summer, I'll be deprived of the joy of nagging about clothes strewn down the hall and loud music and feeding 15 people on a meal designed for five.

So as I watched the car pull out of sight, eye-water dripping off my chin, I thought "Ha-ha, you'll be back. You forgot the blender, and I purposely didn't tell you how to make my biscuits—you know you love them—and dear God, how I love you!"

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**Young, pretty and a jailer**

Young, petite, pretty, vivacious. Hardly words we associate with describing a jailer but they are precisely the words needed to describe Gloria Perez, Sonora's first female jailer.

Gloria, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Gomez, has held the position for the past three months and she describes this time as "probably the most exciting time of my life."

Having graduated from Sonora, Gloria attended Southwest Texas University, in San Marcos. She lacks ten hours having a BA in criminal justice and is now taking correspondence courses to compete her studies. "I learned a great deal at school" says Gloria "but you can't learn from books as you can from actual experience."

Having worked as a para-legal in San Angelo and for the Supreme Court in Austin, Gloria says she moved back to Sonora so that her son Joshua, 3½, can grow up here. "I love Sonora and since my first priority is to Joshua, I want him to grow up with the same advantages as I had. I know that he will have them here."

Upon her return to Sonora, Gloria worked part-time for David and Beth Wallace. "The way I got this job is kinda crazy." Gloria Says. "I needed another part-time job so I came to Bill Webster. I thought he might need some help at the health club. He told he no but he had an opening for a jailer, and was I interested? After a discussion, he said he'd have to sleep on it, to call him the next morning. I was so excited I called the next morning at 9:00, and I went to work."

"I've known Joe Fincher and Bill Webster since I was in school. They were my idols, I was fascinated by the work they did and in fact, they were the reason I choose the field I choose and I'm very proud of my job."

When asked if she had any problems with the prisoners, given the fact that she is a pretty, young woman, Gloria responded, "Not

really. Most of them are too curious as to why I am a jailer. On only one occasion has anyone given me any hassle. They were two brothers, tourists, picked up for DWI. They both got a little out of line. One told me that he guessed I thought I was smart. I told him I felt it was too bad that he felt that way, afterall we were both people, but yes, as long as I was on this side of the bars, perhaps I did feel that I was a little smart. They both apologized to me before the left, though. I do, however get a lot of teasing from the other employees. We have commiserary once a week, where the inmates can buy cigarettes, tooth-paste, etc. The guys told me that the orders for Brut and Mennen had sure increased since I started to work here."

"Joshua decided after I started this job, with the uniform and all that I was a policeman. Hey, I went along with it. It worked great. When I told him that this policeman said it was time for a bath, I didn't get any argument. Suddenly one day it was all over when he said, 'Mommy, you aren't a policeman, you work in a

jail.' I asked him if he knew what a jail was and he said 'Yes, that's where bad people go.' I explained to him that jail was like when he did something he shouldn't have, he had to stand in a corner. It didn't mean that he was bad, it meant that what he had done was wrong and hopefully, when he got out of the corner, he had learned to never do whatever it was again.

Though Gloria performs the same duties as the other jailers, she does admit there are some concessions made to her. She doesn't search any of the prisoners, though she does book them, take fingerprints and photographs them. Also if regular exercise time comes when she is on duty, one of the officers takes the prisoners to the exercise yard. She is quick to point out that she never opens a cell door while she's by herself.

Intelligent, kind and compassionate, Gloria is an asset to Sonora's law enforcement team. She perhaps sums it up by saying, "I know the people in these cells are criminals, they have a debt to pay but they are also humans."

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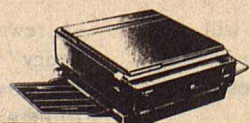

## What is a Quince Anos celebration?

A tradition among Mexican-American communities is that when a young lady reaches the age of fifteen years she has a celebration call quinceanera (quince anos)-which means fifteen years.

The custom dates back to a custom of the Mayas and the Toltecas. It was considered that the muchacho was not a person until he reached the age of fifteen. It was at this time that he was presented to the tribal community. It was then that he became a warrior. At this time he was given his *escudo* and *espada*. Now he legally belonged to the community.

The young lady was also presented to the community because she was looked upon as a vital force of the tribe. Because of her power of motherhood, she gave warriors to the community. For the young lady, the ceremony included the commitment and responsibility she had to the community. The community in turn accepted her as a committed and responsible member. This custom also dates back to the Jewish custom of presenting the young lady in the temple.

The way this custom is popularly understood today is the presentation of the young lady to society.

In order to bring out the religious and spiritual dimensions, Catholics celebrate this custom with special emphasis on the awareness and sensitivity of the young lady in dealing with the values, concerns and challenges of the Christian community.

Special emphasis is given on the privilege of receiving Holy Communion during the Mass at the actual church celebration.

During Mass special gifts are presented to the young lady.

- (1) The medal symbolizes the religious expressions of faith.
- (2) The ring symbolizes the tie and the responsibility the young lady has to the community and to her God.
- (3) The crown symbolizes the victory the young lady has won in trying to live a Christian life in the

midst of all the problems and challenges of her environment.

(4) The flowers symbolize the newness of the commitment and responsibility to the community. Flowers symbolize new life at any event.

The Eucharistic celebration with all that is attached to the quince anos will be celebrated in the spirit of gratitude for the gift of life.

Persons who are significant for the young lady and invited guests will be present.

At one time, this was the standard content of silver coins. Thus, the name "coin silver" is synonymous with this specific percentage of silver content. In fact, actual coins were frequently melted to make silver items. This was so prevalent in England that a law was passed in 1696 making the standard for silver items higher (.958) in silver content than in coins. Unfortunately, this did not eliminate the problem. Shrewd silversmiths con-

tinued to melt coins and add silver to bring the content up to standard. In 1720, the higher standard became optional.

# 150th celebration to begin

In celebration of Texas' 150th birthday, the Texas State Library will present seven special Sesquicentennial exhibits beginning November 1985.

Visitors to the Lorenzo de Zavala State Archives and Library Building in Austin will be able to view priceless manuscripts, original documents, books, photographs, and other historical treasures throughout the celebration. Showcased will be a draft of the 1836 Constitution, diaries and journals of early settlers, plus documents relating to Revolutionary War heroes such as Sam Houston, Ben Milam and J.W. Fannin.

The exhibits will cover the spectrum of Texas' development since early Spanish exploration and will focus on the laws, people, cities, and events creating today's modern state.

The first display features "Texas Books and Writers: 150 Years" and will spotlight the variety and depth of literature including biographies, fiction, folklore, and history. In conjunction, a statewide campaign will be launched urging each citizen to conduct personal observance by reading one Texas book per month during 1986. Contributions to local libraries will also be encouraged to augment and expand Texana collections and research materials.

The exhibit schedule for January-February 1986 includes "Legislative Landmarks of Texas" a survey of significant laws which continue to affect daily life. On display will be official copies of legislation, landmark laws, and governors' messages to the House of Representatives and Senate. Both the process and influence of legislation will be highlighted.

Open March-April will be "The Texas Revolution depicting political and military events of the period through private papers, government records and printed works.

"The Republic of Texas" during May-June will survey the stormy ten-year period of independence and the achievements during this unique era of American history.

During July-August, "The Governors of Texas" will spotlight the chief executives of Texas, the accomplishments of their administrations, and the role of the executive branch in state government.

Photographs, documents, and publications on view in September-October will trace the development of Texas cities, businesses and family life in "150 Years of Texas' Growth."

Culminating the Sesquicentennial exhibits will be "Texans in the Wars" during November-

December. Maps, diaries, correspondence, and military records will honor the valor of Texas fighting men from the Revolutionary to the present.

An exhibit summary brochure will accompany each display and list significant dates and a bibliography. In addition, special Sesquicentennial souvenir certificates will be available to document visits to the archives during 1986. Visitors will also be able to view

items on permanent display, such as copies of the Texas Declaration of Independence, the Travis letter from the Alamo, and various treaties between Texas and other countries. Group tours of the lobby can be arranged by calling (512) 475-2445.



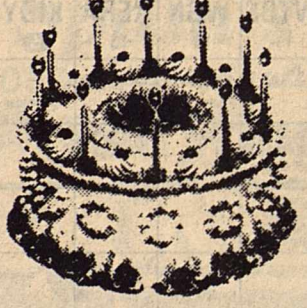

Economic dependence, guilt, shame, fear of being alone or having no place to go traps a woman into staying with an abuser.

# School attendance policy changed

The School Board has passed the following attendance policy for students in Sonora ISD.

Students as well as parents should be aware of this change.

### ATTENDANCE POLICY

Regular attendance is necessary to the educational process. An absence from a class for any reason can never really be made up. The class period has simply been missed and is forever gone.

If a student is absent, he or she must bring a written, signed statement from the parent stating the reason for and the date of the absence. Come by the Attendance Office and get your admission slip to be signed by all teachers.

A student is allowed the same number of days to make up work as he was absent.

A student is allowed a maximum

of 5 absences for a semester course or 10 absences for a full year course.

Students may not leave the campus without checking out of the Attendance Office before leaving the campus. If a student has written permission from a teacher or parent, he will be able to check out.

### UNEXCUSED ABSENCES

A student shall not be given credit for a class if the student has more than 5 days of unexcused absence during a semester. "Unexcused absence" means an absence not excused under E. Code 21.035. For each class missed a "0" will be recorded for that period's work.

### STATE APPROVED ABSENCES

Any student not already exempted from the compulsory at-

tendance law may nevertheless be excused for temporary absence resulting from personal sickness or death in the family, quarantine, weather or road conditions making travel dangerous, or any other unusual cause acceptable to the Superintendent or the teacher or principal of the school in which the student is enrolled (Ed. Code 21.035 (b)).

### EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The District shall not schedule nor permit students to participate in any school related activities--on or off campus--that would require, permit, or allow a student to be absent from class in any course more than 10 times during the 175 day school year, (full year course) or 5 days for a one semester course. Current U.I.L. eligibility will be enforced.

### OTHER ACTIVITIES

In order for a student to receive an excused absence under this provision, there must be a request in writing from someone in authority (parent, teacher); the principal must approve the absence in advance; and the student

must be passing all subjects from which the student will be absent. Any absence not approved by the principal in advance becomes an unexcused absence. A student is allowed a maximum of 5 absences for a semester course or 10 absences for a full year course.

### CREDIT FOR A COURSE

To receive credit in a course the total number of absences cannot exceed 10 per semester. Absences are recorded for the individual class periods.

### APPEAL PROCESS

The student has the right to appeal more than 10 absences per semester and receive credit if approved by a review committee consisting of the Principal, the Counselor, the Teacher and the Assistant Superintendent.

After Uriah's death, 2nd Samuel 11:25 says, "Then David said unto the messenger thus shalt thou say unto Joab, let not this thing displease thee, for the sword devoureth one as well as another; make thy battle more strong against the city, and overthrow it; and encourage thou him."

Later David confessed to God. "Behold, thou desirest truth in the inward parts; and in the hidden part thou shalt make me to know wisdom." (Psalms 51:6)

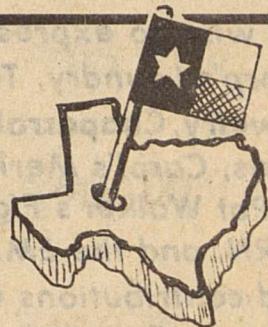

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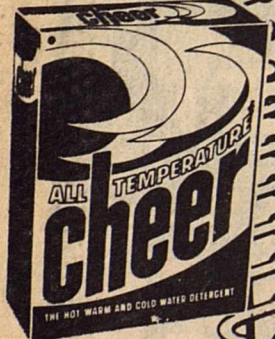


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
