# Happy Birthday Belle Steen

If you've lived in Sonora for long, you have indeed seen our very own, spunky little lady. And she's a very special lady for several reasons, one of which is that on October 4th, Belle Steen will celebrate her 98th birthday.

On almost any given day, Steen as she is lovingly called, can be seen, with straw hat and brown cane, tripping down Main Street. She stops to visit on her rounds and many of us know that Steen bakes the most mouth watering ice-box cookies in town. She still lives alone, does her own housework with little help, and does her own shopping. She seldom misses a new store opening and in fact, has probably appeared in more pictures of Grand Openings and Business of the Month News Photos than any other person in town.

Steen is sharp, spry, and wears her years well. "I don't know why I've lived so long and I don't think about it," says Steen, "I've been healthy all of my life with little spells every once in awhile but then I get sick, I just go to the hospital and get it over."

"My father died at 75 and my mother at 80. It was pneumonia that did it to both of them. We had so much of it back then and so little medical care."

Steen was born in 1887 in Mt. Moria, Alabama, a small town in south central Alabama. She has two sisters, Thelma Bowman and Ruth Steen still residing

in Alabama and one brother, Charley Crawford who lives in Portland, Oregon.

Robert Steen was the man fortunate enough to win Belle's hand. Robert was a farmer and Belle settled in to be a farmers wife. Robert became ill with typhoid and the doctor suggested to the couple that they move to a high dry climate.

So in 1916, Robert and Belle came to Sutton County and a new way of life.

Steen says "Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana are such pretty states with big green trees and I thought the rest of the world oughta look just like it."

"But when I came out here-boy, oh boy-it was during a drought and there wasn't nothing and I thought we'd just starve to death. It turned out that I ended up getting fat on frijole beans, which we didn't have back in Alabama, and cornbread."

"We came to Sutton County because we knew the dentist who covered Eldorado, Sonora and Ozona back then, and he got us work on the Davis Ranch and then we went on to the Basil Halbert Ranch."

"Then Bob got sick and Dr. Wardlaw told him to get off ranching and stay off and Dr. Wardlaw offered him a job at the drugstore. Bob said that if he could go from farming in Alabama to ranching in Texas, he didn't see why he couldn't go from cattle and sheep to being a druggist."

"I was keeping house but finally Bob got me down to the drugstore working as a cashier and I stayed with it for over 50 years".

Steen remembers the first train pulling into Sonora in 1930 and how everyone in town turned out. All the town dogs and some men on horseback ran to meet the train when it first came into sight and many of them came near getting run over by the locomotive.

"When the train started coming everyday, it sure made a difference" says Steen, "no longer were we so far away from everybody, so isolated. It made us closer to the rest of the world."

"Quite a few people rode the train. I never did ride it although I kept thinking I would. The train hauled the cattle out but eventually trucks went to the ranches to pick the cattle up. It sure was a sad day when the train stopped coming."

"I wish I'd kept a diary. So many things have happened and I don't remember the date or the year."

Much of this article has been pieced together from former News articles and from knowledge and friends of Steen as she is in the hospital making a remarkable recovery from surgery. From all who know and love you "May God speed your recovery, Belle Steen. Happy Birthday and may you have many more. You are, indeed, and inspiration to all of us!"

Date set for Turkey Walk

### Save a heart

November 9, 9:00 a.m., has been set as the date for this year's American Heart Association "Turkey-walk" according to Tom Clifton, chairperson of the Turkey-walk.

"So many people are affected by heart disease, either personally or within their immediate families," states Clifton, "Events like the Turkey-walk give all of us a chance to get involved and to do something about the Number One killer in Texas."

The course for the walk of five miles, begins at the Methodist Church around the courthouse square, out Poplar Street and back to the Methodist Church. Each participant walks only as much of the course as they wish. And everyone is encouraged to participate either as a walker or as a sponsor.

"This year's goal has been set at \$6,000" says Clifton, "and that's not much money when you think about it. Last year we collected about \$5,200."

Last year there were 23 walkers with the first person to cross the finish line being William Burch, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Burch. Ruth Shurley won distinction as the oldest walker and Demetrio Castro as the youngest and each won \$50 savings certificates.

First place went to Roberta James as the top money gather and she won a trip to the Bahamas for her efforts.

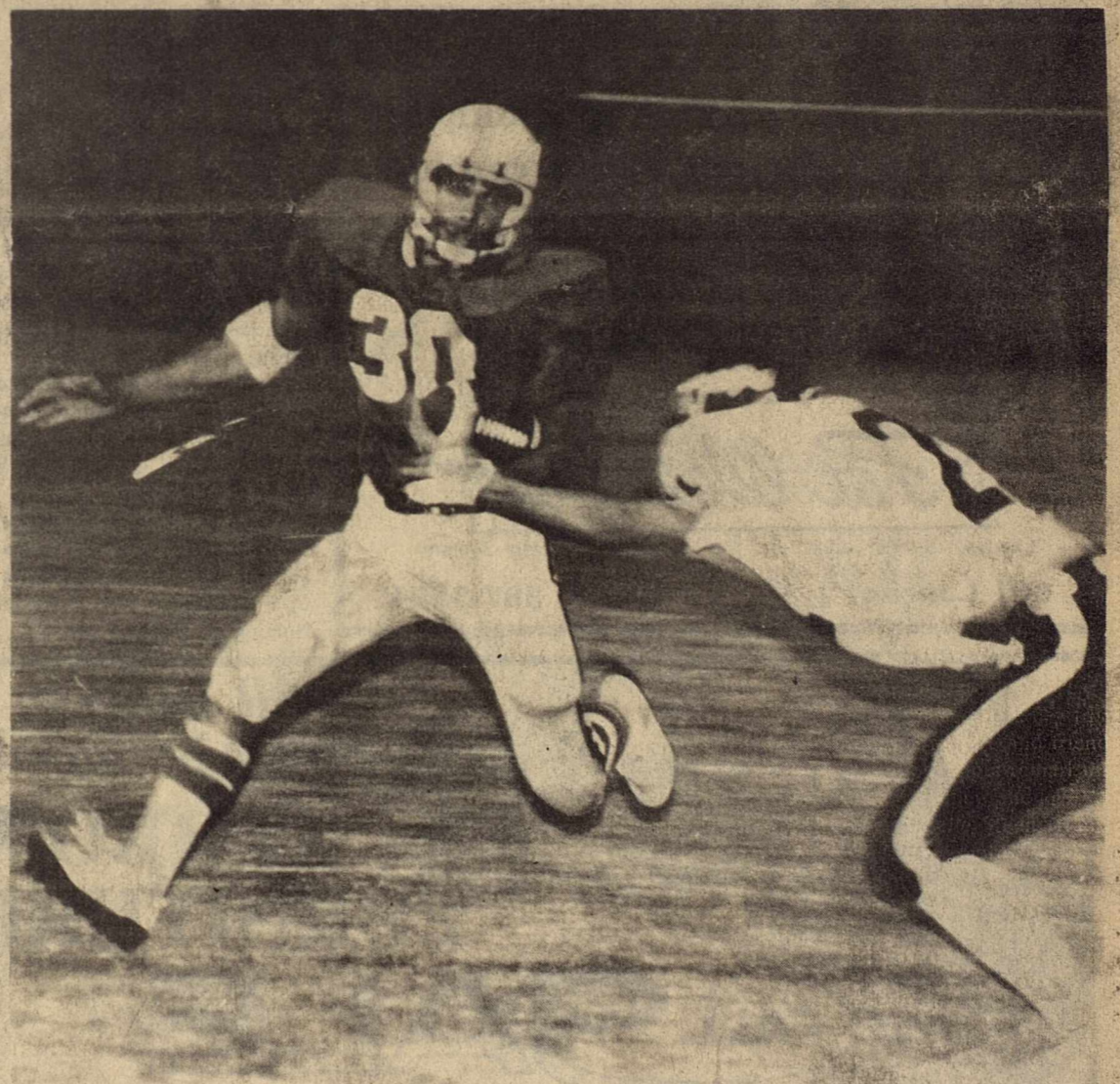
First place winner this year can look forward to a trip for two to the Caribbean Islands with weekends out of town, savings certificates and gift certificates going to lesser winners.

There will also be a trophy for the top money getter and a plaque for the business which contributes the most amount of money.

Persons walking gather pledges from individuals on a per-mile basis. Forms are available from Clifton at Tim's Liquors and additional information can be obtained from either Tom Clifton at 387-3351 or Mona Simpler at 387-5016.

The efforts last year garnered for the Sutton County Division of the American Heart Association, the distinction of being the top division in the state for under 40,000 population and for hosting the best walk in the state per capita.

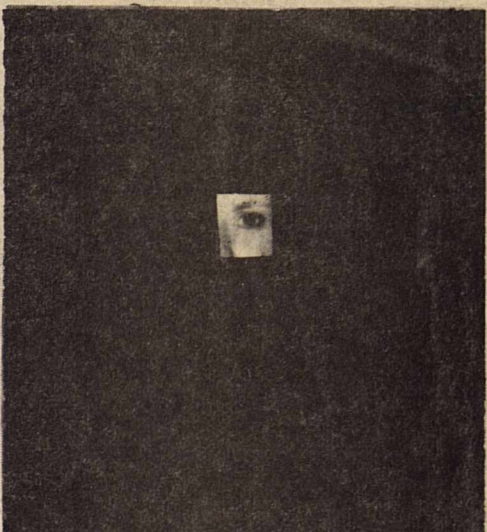
OUT OF MY WAY

The winners of last week's football contest was Dora Mata. Ms. Mata missed only one game.

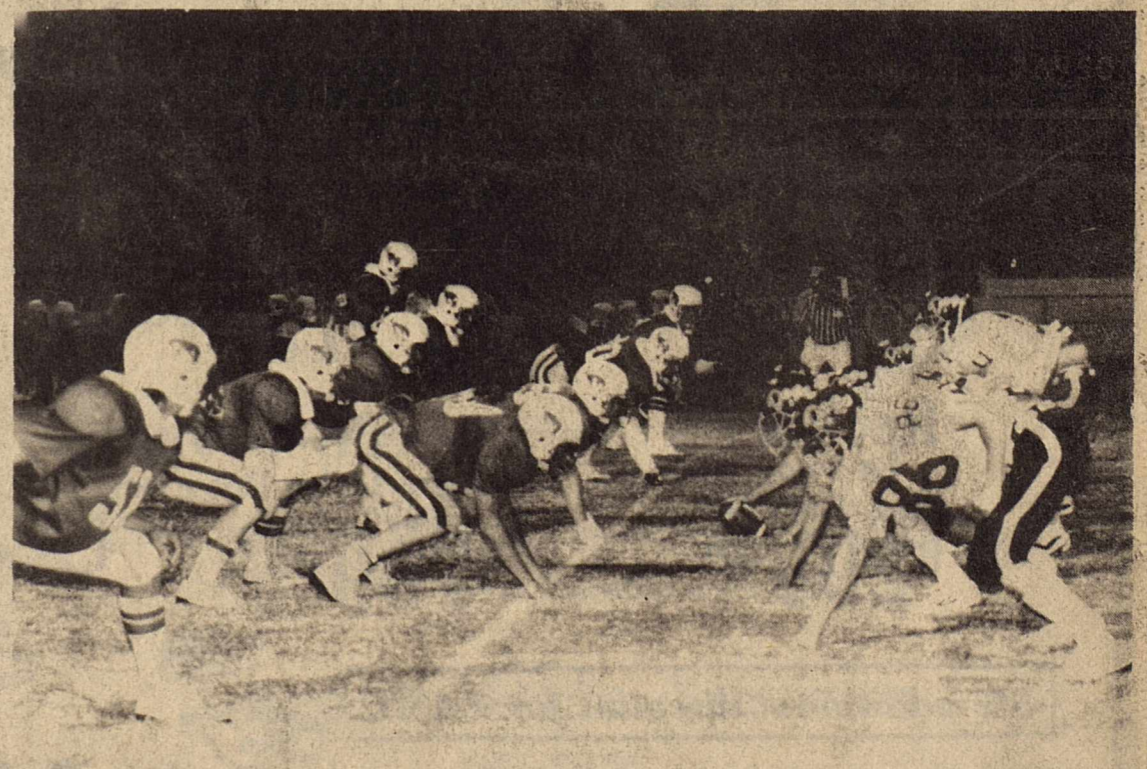
The second place winner due to a one point difference in the tie-breaker was Jamie Espinosa. He missed 2 games.

## Rousselots to head committee

The Sutton County Steering Committee for U.S. Rep. Tom Loeffler's gubernatorial campaign was announced recently with Norm and Doris Rousselot serving as co-chairmen.

"I'm proud Norm and Doris are providing the leadership for my Sutton County Steering Committee," Congressman Loeffler said in announcing the committee. "They, as well as the other committee members, represent the kind of grassroots support that we have throughout the state. These community leaders share a common goal: to preserve a strong, proud Texas, and to return leadership to the Governor's office."

Loeffler, who grew up on a ranch near Mason, announced he was a candidate for Governor on August 22. The Congressman received his undergraduate degree from the University of Texas, where he played football under Coach Darrell Royal, and received his law degree from the University of Texas School of Law in 1971. He served as Chief Legislative Counsel for U.S. Senator John Tower before being appointed Special Assistant for Legislative Affairs to President Gerald Ford in 1975. He was elected to the 21st District in Washington. Loeffler serves as Chief Deputy Whip--the third ranking Republican in the House of Representatives. He continues to serve in that position, as well as keeping his seats on both the powerful Appropriations and Budget Committees. He was re-elected in 1984 with 81 percent of the vote.

Congressman Loeffler, 39, and his wife Kathy, and three children live on the banks of the South Fork of the Guadalupe River near Hunt.

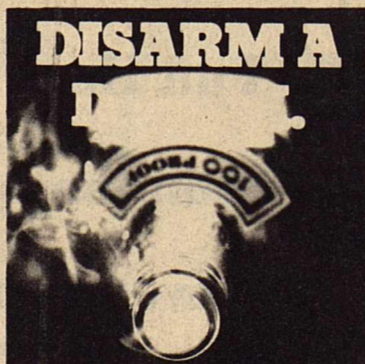

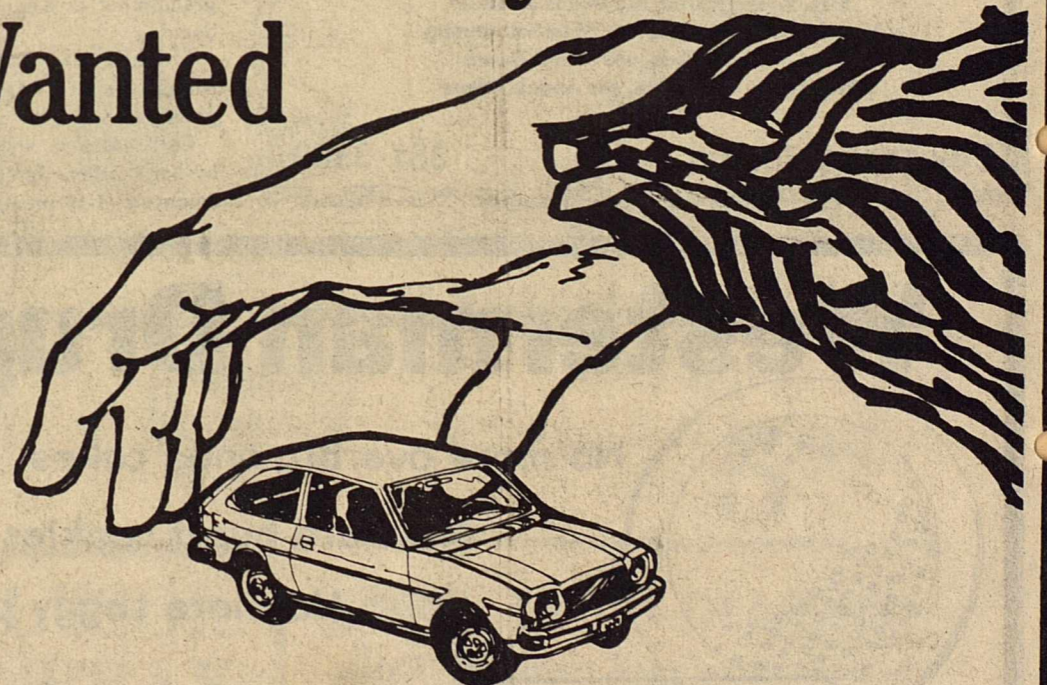

## Buckle up Car accidents threat to children

The number one threat to the lives of all young children continues to be the automobile accident. Since enactment of the Child Passenger Protection Law in January 1985, the Texas Department of Public Safety believe that more parents are buckling up their children.

An Austin mother found that her children were protected from injury by using the car seat and car safety belts this past winter. "If our children, ages nine months and four years old had not been in car seats or seat belts they would have been seriously injured or killed. Our vehicle flipped completely over onto the top, both boys were literally hanging (upside down) from their seats and belts." In January to June of 1985 twenty-two (22) children from 0-4 years of age were killed in passenger vehicles with 2,906 injuries occurring. These figures are down 39.8 percent on fatalities and 11 percent on injuries compared to the same period in 1984.

The Department of Public Safety is concerned about the improper use of car safety seats. The following are common mistakes with car safety seats.

**Infant facing forward**—For maximum protection, an infant must face the rear of the car, with the

center back seat the safest position for the child. The child seat can be turned to face forward when the child can sit alone, about 17-20 pounds.

**Harness or straps not used**—Child must be harnessed according to car seat manufacturers instructions, straps must be buckled snugly.

**Seat belt in wrong place or not used in securing the car safety belt**. The car seat that is unsecured can cause damage to the occupants of the vehicle in case of a collision.

The child restraint law requires that a child from birth to 2 years of age ride in a child passenger restraint that meets federal standards for crash-tested restraint systems. Children from 2 to 4 years of age must ride in an approved child safety seat or wear a safety belt. A fine from \$25 to \$50 can be levied. However, with proof of purchase of a car safety seat within ten days of issuance of ticket, charges will be dismissed.

The Texas Department of Public Safety has a car seat loaner program available for loan from local DPS offices. The DPS offices offer a list of approved car safety seats that meet the federal crash-tested standards to encourage parents to correctly protect their child.

# Bow hunters it's time to quiver

The 1985 archery season for white-tail deer opens October 5 in most Texas counties. The outlook for bowhunters this fall is excellent said Dr. Dwight Guynn, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Guynn, who is headquartered at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Uvalde, said, "Deer herds have bounced back from the 1979-80 die-off and numbers are high in most areas of the Edwards Plateau."

Many regions of the Edwards Plateau experienced good rainfall this past winter and well into summer, he added. "This wet weather provided better-than-average nutrition and resulted in an increased fawn crop," Guynn explained.

Since late July, weather conditions have turned dry and hunters should have deer responding well to baited stands this fall, he said.

"Serious bowhunters should have begun regular target practice session in preparation for the October season," Guynn said.

Unlike rifle hunters, who may be prepared after a few sessions at the shooting range, the archer requires much more practice to develop the strength, reflexes and coordination necessary to deliver the arrow to its target consistently, he said.

State law requires that a bow used in hunting must be capable of shooting an arrow equipped with a broadhead hunting point for a distance of 130 yards, Guynn said. Broadhead hunting points must be at least seven-eighths of an inch in width and not more than one and one half inches in width, he added.

Bowhunters are reminded that arrows must be marked with the name and address of the user in a non-water-soluble medium, he said.

"Crossbows are not considered legal archery equipment," Guynn emphasized.

Bowhunters are not required to use doe permits in addition to their hunting license tag to properly tag does during the archery season, he said. In addition, new regulations this year allow the taking of four deer in many counties that previously has a limit of three, Guynn added.

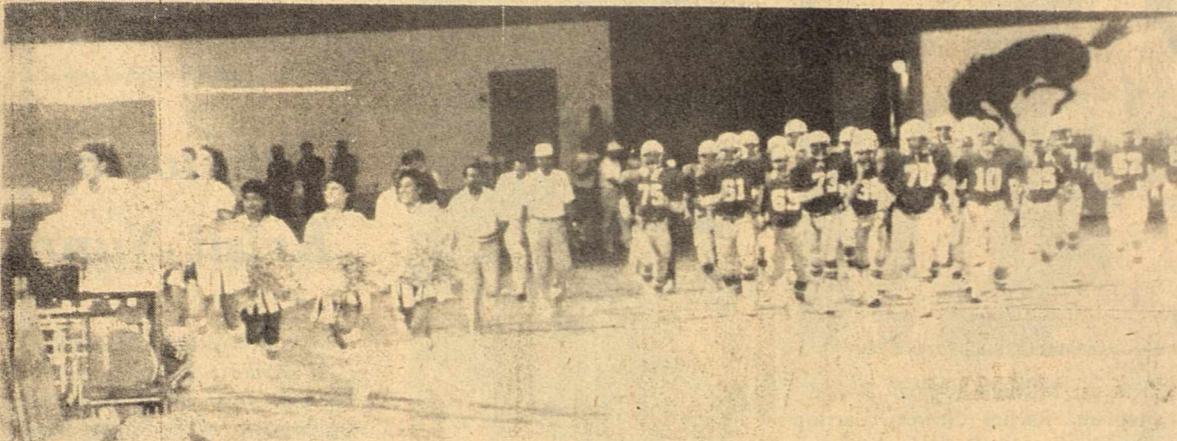

On September 13, 1985, the Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas an Application for Approval of a Fuel Overrecovery Refund and for Reduction of Fixed Fuel Factor. A recent case of rabies occurred in a thirteen-lined ground squirrel from Odessa (Ector Co.). A domestic cat brought 3 ground squirrels into its owner's house. An 8 year old boy and another cat began playing with them. The boy was bitten or scratched by one of

the squirrels (which one is unknown). Other children played with the squirrels but there were no obvious exposures. The boy's father became concerned and arranged to have the squirrels tested for rabies. The child has begun the post exposure series and

the two cats were destroyed. Because of the existing risk of rabies in wild animals such as racoons, skunks, foxes, and bobcats, these wildlife should never be kept as pets.

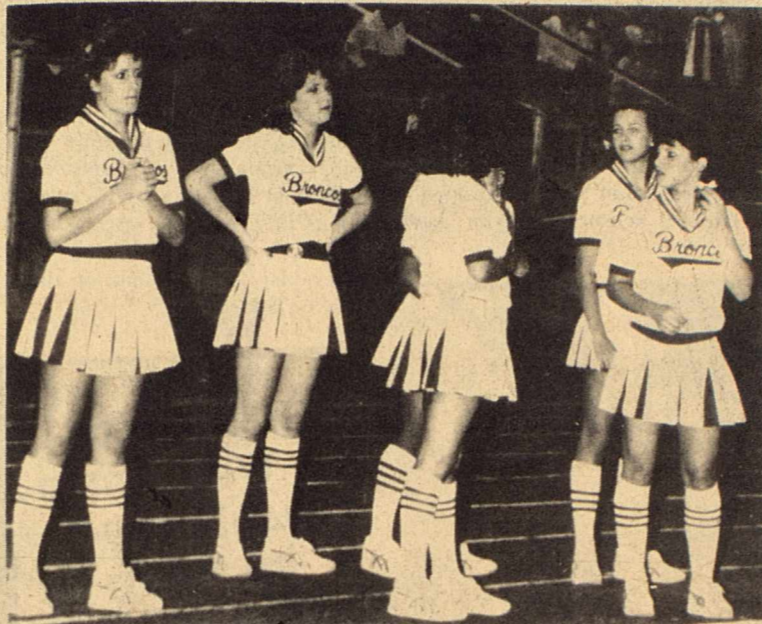

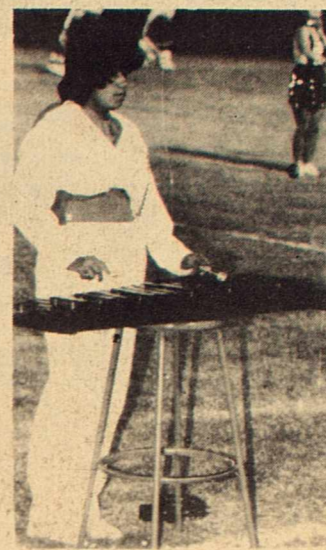

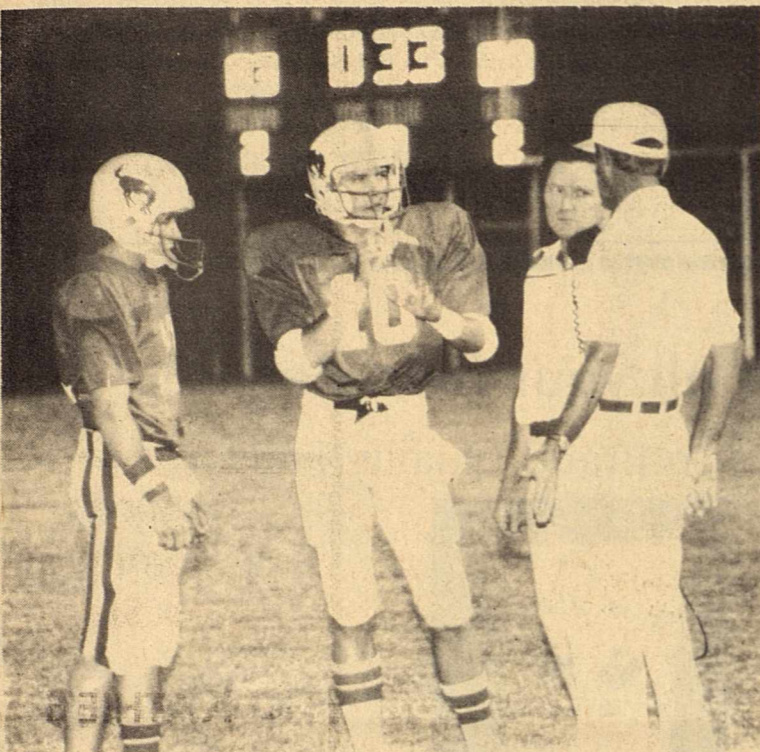

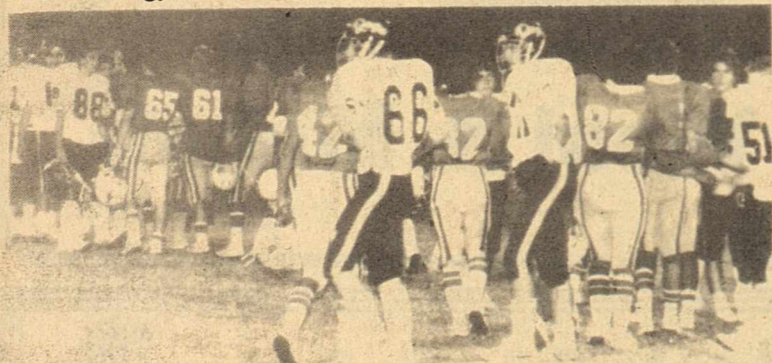

**Aneurysm**

An aneurysm is the result of a weakening of the wall of an artery which balloons out in a bubble-like protrusion. It may rupture under the pressure of blood flow—this could cause sudden, potentially fatal loss of blood, or stroke if it occurs in the brain. Aneurysms may develop in any artery, but the abdominal aorta is the most common site. If the aneurysm progressively increases in size, it should be removed despite the risk. Treatment involves surgical removal of the aneurysm and replacement of that section of the artery with a graft.

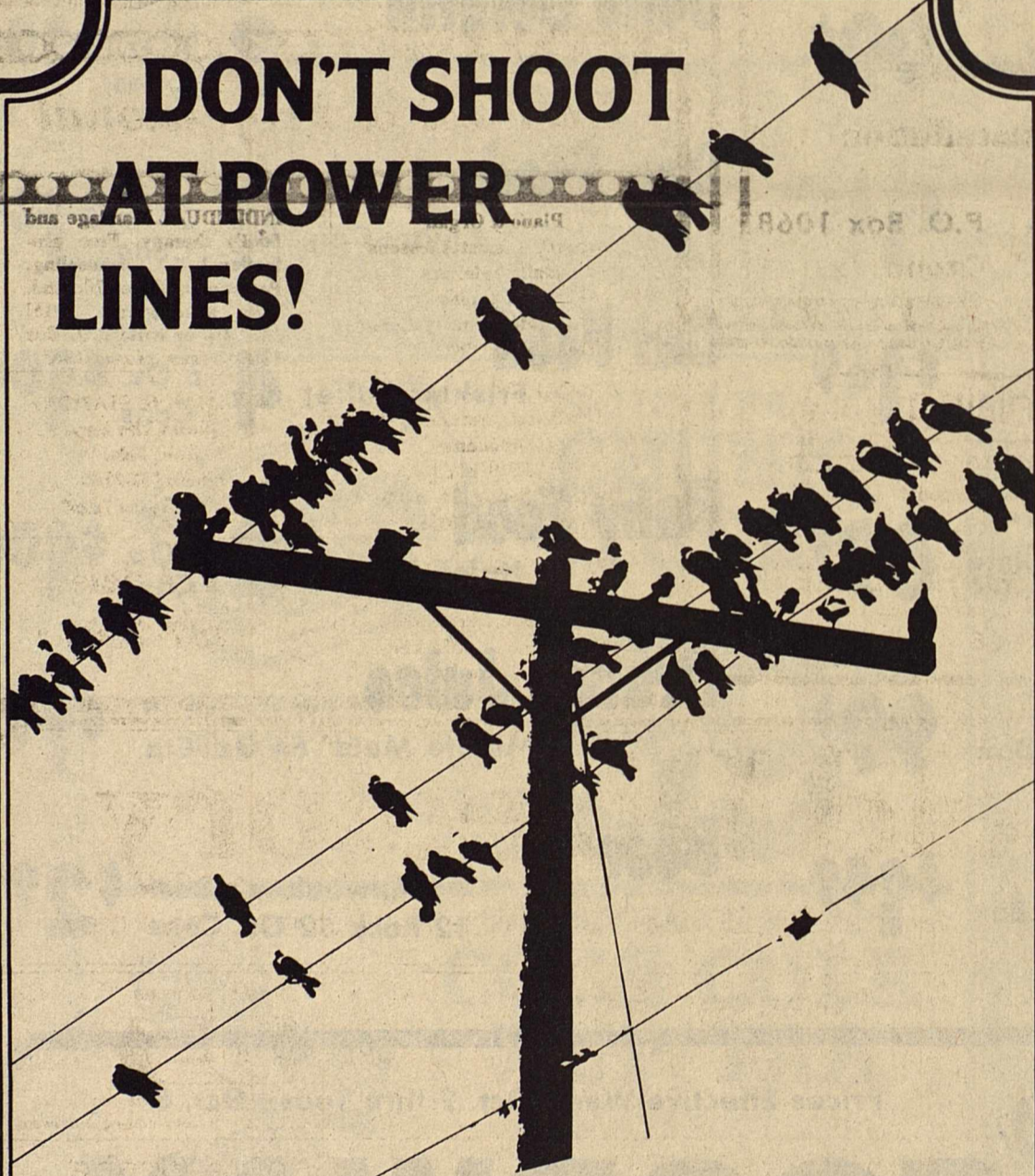

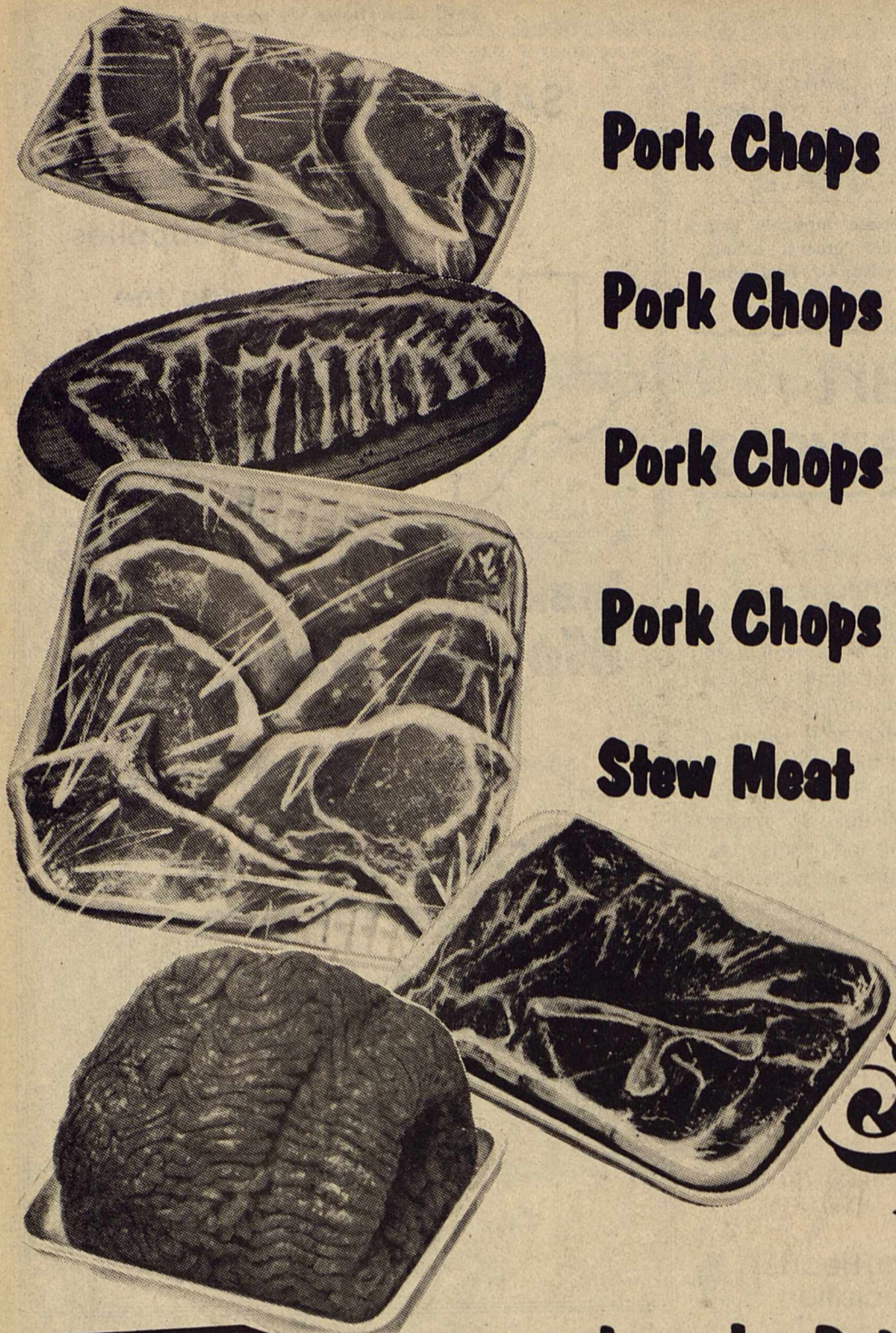

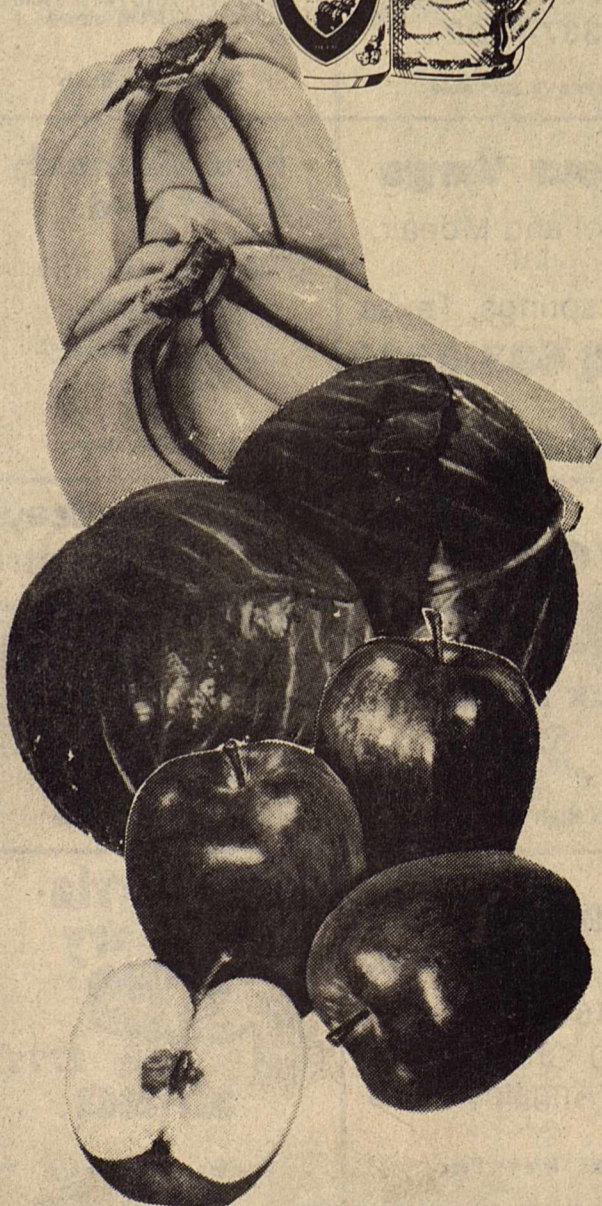
