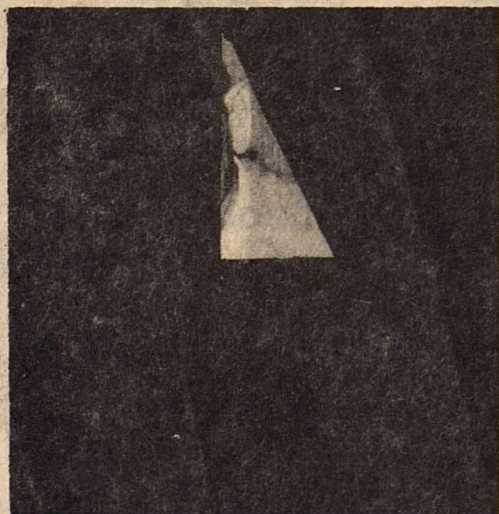
Spooks get ready! A Haunted House will be open the public on Wednesday, October 30 from 7-10 p.m. The admission will be free to all.

## Broncos prove wiser than Owls

A balanced offense and a gutsy defense helped the Broncos pull off a 22-20 victory over the Reagan County Owls, Friday night.

Going into the game, the Broncos were 10 point underdogs to the Owls, but someone forgot to tell the Broncos. The Broncos out played Reagan County in the first half and that proved to be the deciding factor.

The Broncos took a first quarter lead on Esau Ramirez' 32 yard field goal.

Ramirez also caught a 31-yard touchdown pass from Mickey Sharp to end the first period with the score 9-0.

From then on the scoring was very even with Sonora and Reagan County, swapping scores several times.

Sonora's second period points came on Junior Stevie Love's 5-yard run. With Ramirez' kick good the Broncos went into half-time with a 16-6 lead.

Reagan County scored first in the second half. When the kick attempt missed, the Broncos went into the final period with a narrow 16-12 lead.

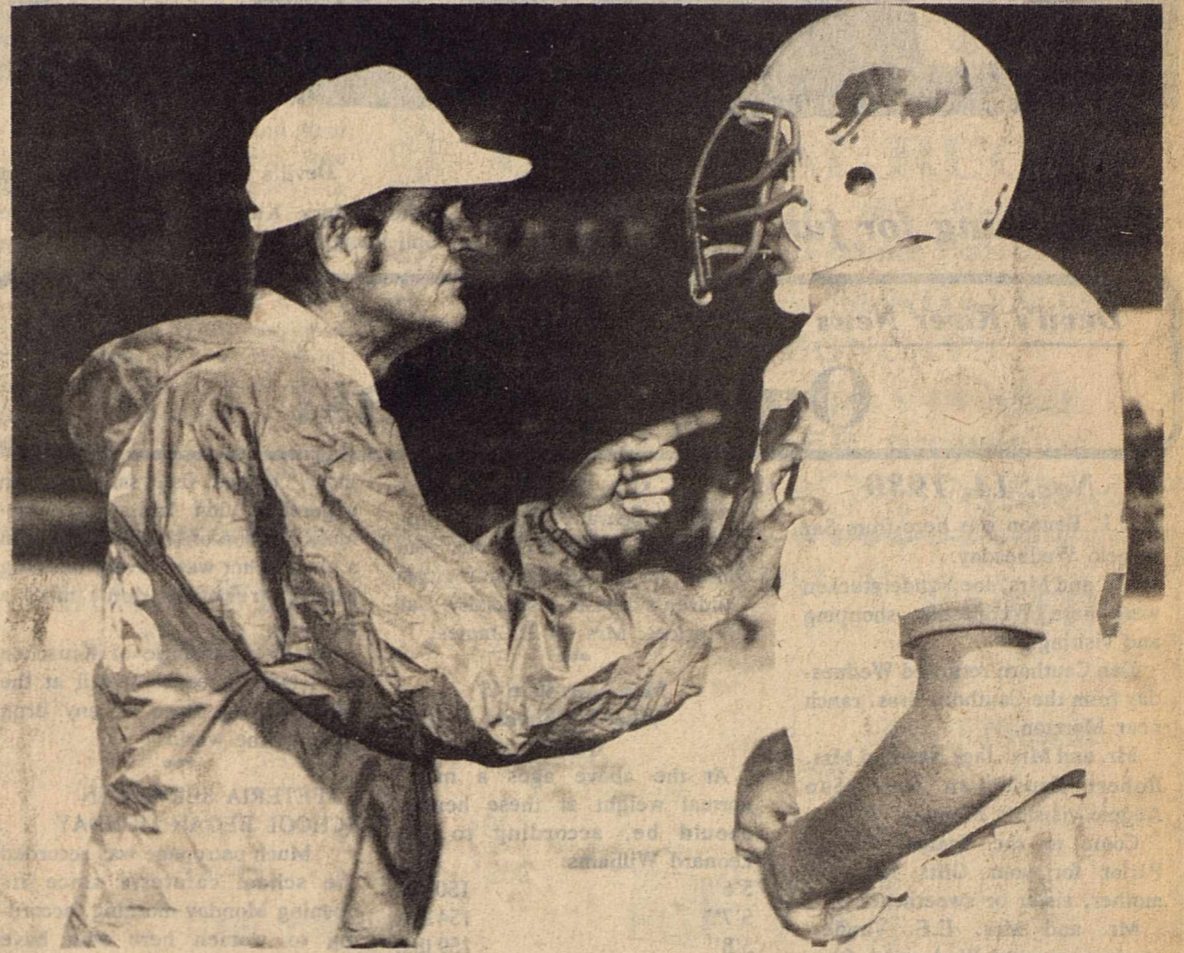
The Broncos fought back and once again increased their lead on a 15-yard pretty pass from Sharp to Senior Mike McBride. Victory was in the chilly air.

## Hunting leases are still available

With deer hunting season only a month away, the fever is already starting to hit.

According to Texas Parks and Wildlife, prospects for the upcoming white-tailed deer hunting season are good across most of Texas. Wildlife officials say deer are numerous, antler development is good and habitat conditions are much better in most areas than they were last year.

"I would advise hunters that prospects for success may be much better later in the season than they will be in the first week or two" says Horace Gore, white-tailed deer program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The whitetail season is Nov. 9, 1985 through Jan. 5, 1986 in most counties.

The concept has been hailed, by other papers, as an invaluable aid to both hunters and advertisers. Information on the Guide has been requested by newspapers in South Dakota, Pennsylvania, Washington, Maryland, Wyoming, Michigan, Wisconsin and Ontario, Canada.

## Operation Orphans termed highly successful

The Board of Directors of Operation Orphans has selected four dates for doe hunts during the forthcoming whitetail deer season. They are the following Saturdays: November 23rd, November 30th, December 7th, and December 14th. The first, third and fourth dates will all be boys' hunts, while the second date will be an all girls' hunt. An "Exotic Hunt" will be held on January 25, 1986.

This is the 25th year of this highly successful program. To date, 8,393 orphans have hunted with a total game harvest of 7,249.

It all began when the late Gene Ashby, a State Game Warden, realized that the Hill Country, primarily Mason and Llano Counties, had an excessive deer population and the necessity for removing a large number of antlerless deer. He approached some local ranchers with the idea of allowing orphans to harvest antlerless deer. They liked the idea and Operation Orphans came into being. Housing the young hunters was a problem, so another idea was realized. With backing from sportsmen's clubs throughout Texas, and other concerned individuals, a 320 acre tract of land on the north bank of the Llano River in Mason County was purchased from a generous

land owner at a fraction of its market value. Through donations, a 42 foot by 86 foot bunkhouse, capable of housing 100 orphans, was built. A 50 foot by 100 foot kitchen and dining room, as well as another bunkhouse/recreation hall and counselors' quarters, were soon added. The camp is managed by a supervisor who resides at the camp. Camp Gene Ashby, named in honor of the founder of Operation Orphans, is today a beautiful facility capable of housing and feeding 200 youngsters.

During the first 20 years of the program only boys were allowed to hunt; however, a girls' hunt was added to the program in 1980, and an "Exotic Hunt" in 1982. The girls' hunt has traditionally been held on Thanksgiving Weekend, while the "Exotic Hunt" has traditionally been held the last Saturday in January after the whitetail deer season is over. The "Exotic Hunt" is co-sponsored by the Exotic Wildlife Association which is based in Kerrville, Texas. The "Exotic Hunt" has added a totally new dimension to an already successful program and is looked forward to by many orphans as the "icing on the cake".

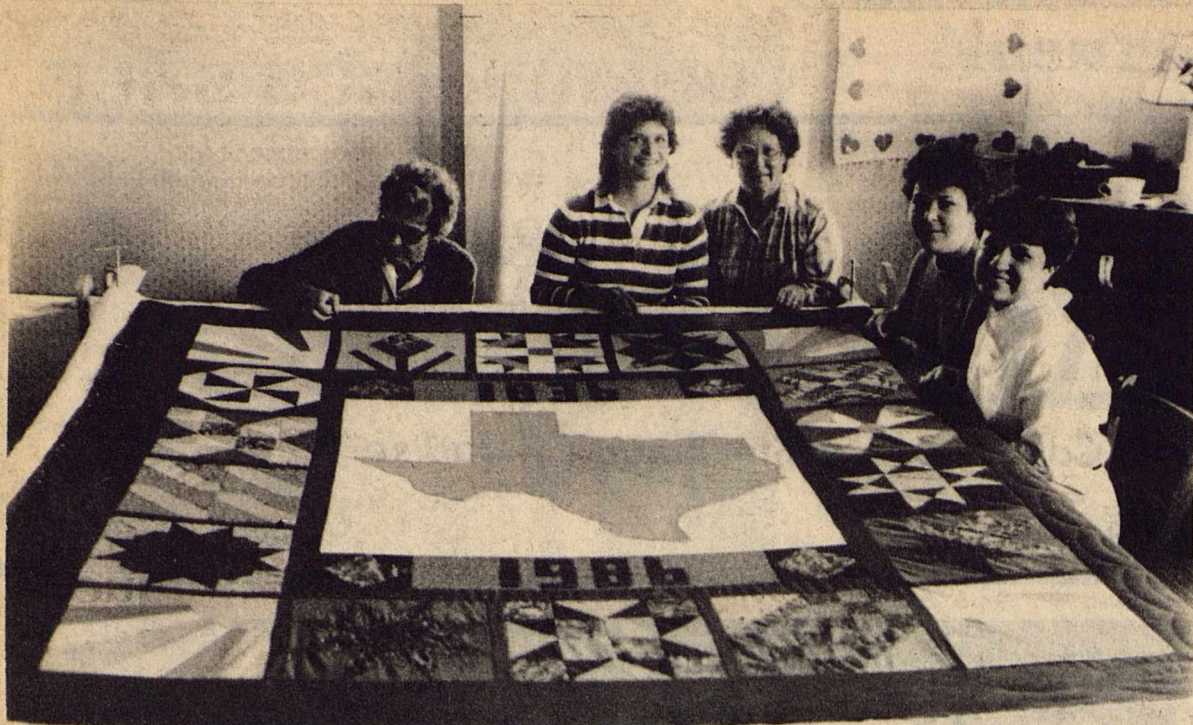
Though the annual deer and exotic hunts are the most popular

activities, the camp isn't idle the rest of the year. It is used periodically by other non-profit, social, and religious organizations for summer camps, et cetera, at nominal costs.

The Directors hope to make participation in the forthcoming hunts the largest ever; however, this is dependent upon the number of ranchers who participate. The orphans will be brought to Camp Gene Ashby from homes throughout the state on Friday preceding the Saturday hunt. They will be housed, fed and transported to the host ranches before daylight the following morning by guides from various Texas sporting clubs and other interested individuals. For the third successful year, the Texas Parks and Wildlife has agreed to provide extra doe permits should they be needed by the participating ranches.

The thimbles, needles, quilting

thread, etc. are kept with the quilt at Patricia's Place. In order for the quilt to be finished before the deadline, more quilters are needed. Also, the cost of materials has not been completely covered, so donations are appreciated. About \$25 dollars is needed.

Any contributors of time or effort will be named on a label to be sewn permanently onto the quilt. We

Fat and Sodium in Fish

The amount of fat and calories in fish go hand in hand. Fattier fish-meaning a higher oil content-including herring, mackerel, trout, catfish, sardines, tuna and salmon. In general, the darker the color of the flesh, the higher the fat content.

Shellfish, snapper, drum, cod, sole, flounder, haddock, halibut and other white finfish are low in fat. However, the level of fat in all fish is not always constant. Some species put on more in the summer and fall than at other times. The fat content of certain fish may be as much as 4 times higher in summer than in winter.

But the primary source of fat calories in fish is the butter, margarine, oil, sauces or breaded and fried coating we add when cooking. For example, a breaded, fried fish fillet may have 4 or 5 times more calories than the white fish broiled alone.

Canned fish packed in oil has double the calories and more than five times the fat of the same fish packed in water. Even though water-packed fish is lower in calories, it's usually not lower in sodium. Both oil-packed and water-packed versions are high in sodium chloride, or salt.

A large portion of the salt that is added in processing can be removed by rinsing and draining the fish in a sieve or colander. Rinsing will not remove the other valuable nutrients.

Some manufacturers have begun

to eliminate salt by offering tuna with about half the sodium. If you're on a low-sodium diet, beware of smoked or dried fish because it is preserved with salt. Otherwise, fresh fish, in general is quite low in sodium. Remember, October is Fish and Seafood month.

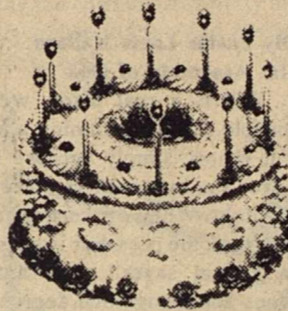

**Proper range management provides better forage**

The playground for the "deer and the antelope" is in poor condition in more than half of the Nation's Federal and privately owned rangeland and this is cause for great concern, said Wilson Scaling, Chief of USDA's Soil Conservation Service.

Wildlife share with livestock the almost one billion acres of rangeland that is an important asset to agriculture, to the economy, and to the quality of our environment.

Although some of the poor condition is caused by shallow soil and low rainfall, much of the rangeland productivity can be improved by good management, Wilson emphasized.

Often in the same general area, poorly managed rangeland provides little forage for livestock and poor feed and cover for wildlife, while well managed rangeland provides adequate forage for livestock and supports healthy populations of wildlife.

Wildlife can mean additional income from hunting fees for ranchers. The kinds and amount of

plants determine the kinds and number of animals, livestock and wildlife, the area of rangeland can support.

Proper rangeland management practices will improve forage growth and protect the soil and water resources. These practices include deferred grazing, brush management, range seeding and proper grazing, said District Conservationist Virgil Polocsek.

Deferred grazing improved cover for ground-nesting birds and improves water quality and quantity. Patterned brush management provides essential cover for wildlife and increases the variety of plants that will grow. Range seeding can include plants important to wildlife. Well-managed, planned grazing systems can produce the most benefits for livestock and wildlife of rangelands.

The Soil Conservation Service can help ranchers design and apply these and other practices. For assistance, call the local office of USDA's Soil Conservation Service.

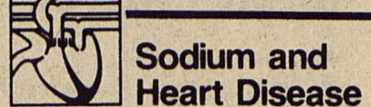

### Sodium and Heart Disease

Sodium is a mineral found in nearly all foods. The most common source of sodium is

table salt, sodium chloride. Sodium is an essential nutrient and plays a major role in the physiological regulation of the body fluids. A high intake of sodium affects the level of blood pressure in some individuals. It is thought that excess sodium remains in body tissues and holds water there. By decreasing the sodium,

the blood pressure is reduced by shrinking the volume of fluid in the vessels. The decrease in fluid reduces pressure upon the interior walls of the vessels and lessens the effort which the heart must put into pumping the blood.

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## "Hell"

Hell is a real place, with real people. Satan is winning a masterful victory simply because so few gives the matter of Hell very little thought. When a preacher brings it up, then the preacher is considered a "doom sayer". Our antipathy does not change one degree of the reality of Hell.

How long has it been since you've heard a message on hell? You think of Hell as a swear word, or a rough condition someone endures on earth.

But it's far, far more than that. Hell is as real as the town you live in. Hell is as sure as yesterday. Satan is using the biggest cover-up in the history of man to keep you from knowing about it. Preachers avoid the subject. Churches act as if it didn't exist. No one wants to be reminded of the place Jesus described in Mark 9:44, "Where the worm dieth not, and the fire is not quenched."

Psychologists tell us not to punish our children, yet our prisons burst with mass murderers.

We talk glowingly of rehabilitation, not punishment. I've been reading different reports of murder and it seems that the most any of

them serve in prison is one year. Perhaps in some cases crime does pay. Somewhere and somehow we have lost the meaning of retribution.

But God hasn't lost it. He still understands it. He has not changed. His word says, "The soul that sinneth, it shall die. The Son shall not bear the iniquity of the father, neither shall the father bear the iniquity of the Son: the righteousness of the righteous shall be upon him, and the wickedness of the wicked shall be upon him." (Ezekiel 18:20)

Here are a few things we know about Hell!

1. There will be no escaping its confines. There is no scriptural basis for believing in a second chance after death. Hebrews 9:27 says, "And as it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgement."

"He that is unjust, let him be unjust still; and he which is filthy, let him be filthy still; and he that is righteous, let him be righteous still; and he that is holy, let him be holy still." (Revelation 22:11) Today would be a good day to escape Hell!

2. "And he cried, and said, Father Abraham, have mercy on

me, and send Lazarus, that he may dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame." (Luke 16:24) Jesus was telling us this story of a man who found himself in Hell "being in torments." There will be weeping and wailing. Pain will be so great that people will gnash their teeth. Can you imagine such a place?

You may be wondering why God would react in such an extreme manner. The Creator does not take His Laws as lightly as people do. He has declared in His word that obedience brings forth eternal life and disobedience brings forth death.

3. Abraham told the rich man that was suffering, "Son, remember..." There will be people there that will begin to remember the opportunities that they passed up to escape this devilish place.

They'll remember all the radio sermons, all the people that witnessed to them, the tracts they read and threw aside. Sad to say many will remember setting in a church week after week and not bidding to the call of God.

What a nightmare! Is it any wonder that faithful pastors weep as they labor among you? Is it any wonder that the world's relatively

few intercessors cry out in the night for the souls of humanity? Is it any wonder that the Holy Spirit pleads with us now to surrender to Jesus Christ?

4. "For if God spared not the Angels that sinned, but cast them down to Hell, and delivered them into chains of darkness, to be reserved unto judgement." (2nd Peter 2:4) Hell is a land of darkness. 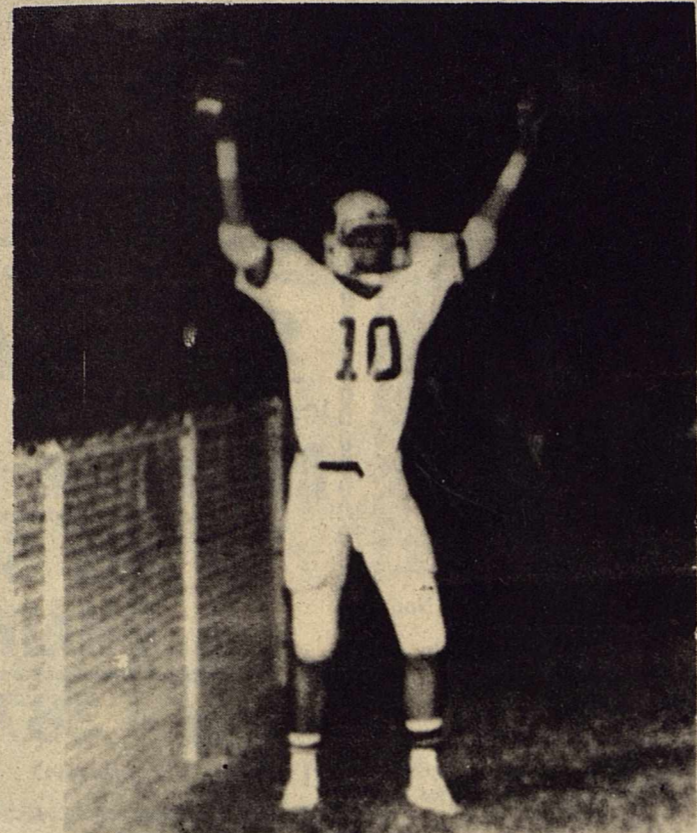

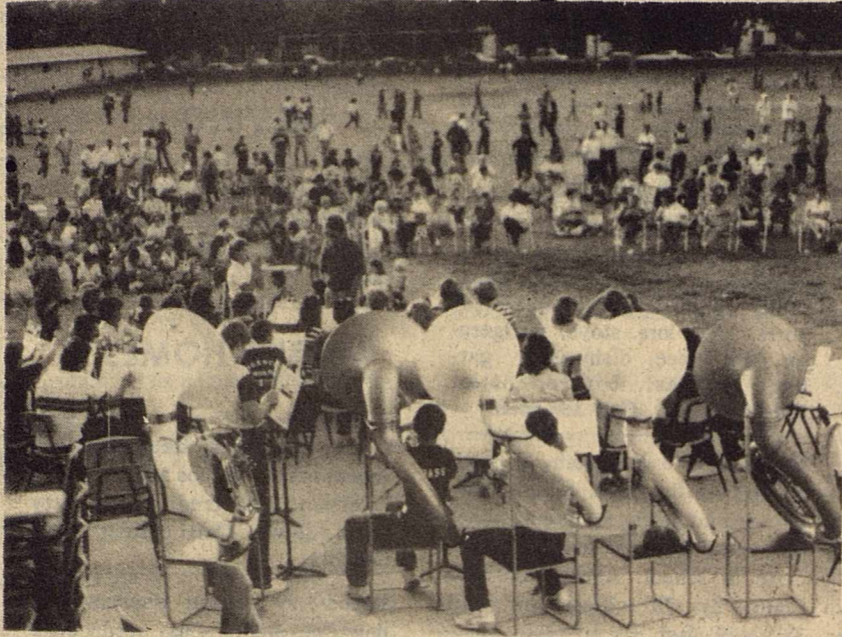

Second period is the class the state takes as an attendance survey. If possible, all should try and make dental and doctor's appointments for the afternoon.

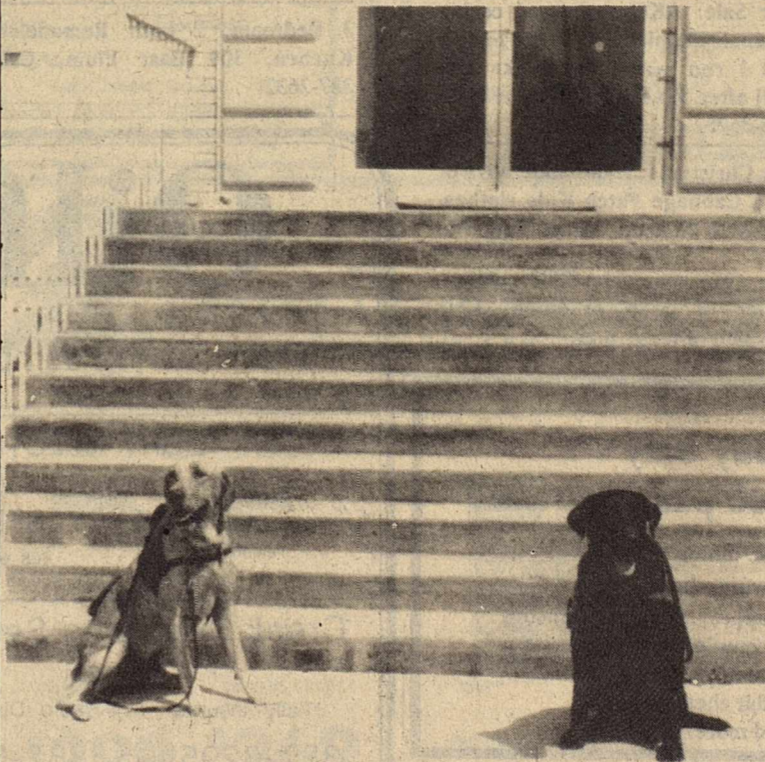
The Student Council has decided to call each habitually absent student before school and inquire if they shall be in school through the month.

## Social Security News

### Retirement age to change

Under the original Social Security Act, the age at which a person could retire with full benefits was set at 65. Since then, many people have come to regard 65 as the retirement age. The fact is, however, that a 65-year-old man or woman in the 1980's is a very different person from the 65-year old of the 1940's, not only in terms of life expectancy but in relation to their attitudes, activities, and self perception. The rocking chair is no longer an accurate symbol of their interests.

Under the 1983 Social Security Amendments, beginning with the year 2,000, the age at which a person will be able to retire with full benefits will increase to 65 years 2 months. The retirement age will continue to increase by 2

months each year until it reaches 67 in 2027 and after. A worker will still be able to receive reduced benefits at 62, as now, but the rate will be lower than it is at present.

Today, people who retire at 62 receive 80 percent of the benefits that would be payable to them at 65. Under the new law, people retiring at 62 will receive 70 percent of the benefits that would be payable at 67.

Another provision of the 1983 Amendments calls for a study of the effects of the change in retirement age for people who are engaged in physically demanding work or who, because of reasons of health, many not enjoy increased longevity. A report and recommendations are due by January 1, 1986.

### SS number a key to future

A person's Social Security number is the key to his or her future protection against the loss or reduction of income because of retirement, disability, or death. Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

This is because future Social Security benefits will be based on the record of earnings kept under the Social Security number during a person's working lifetime.

Many people have the same name, but each person has his or her own Social Security number. The number singles each person's record from some 200 million others.

A person should show his or her Social Security card to each employer and make sure the number is copied correctly for the employer's records. This will help avoid any mistakes as earnings will be reported under the correct number.

A person should keep a record of his or her number in a safe place so

that he or she can apply for a replacement card should that become necessary. A person should apply for a replacement card only if he or she loses the card or there is a change in name.

A person applying for a replacement Social Security card must show evidence of identity. A person whose name is changed should show evidence showing both the old and new names.


It is against the law to use another person's Social Security number or a number not assigned to you. It is also against the law to use a Social Security number obtained by giving false information on the application. Penalties include a fine, a jail sentence, or both.
