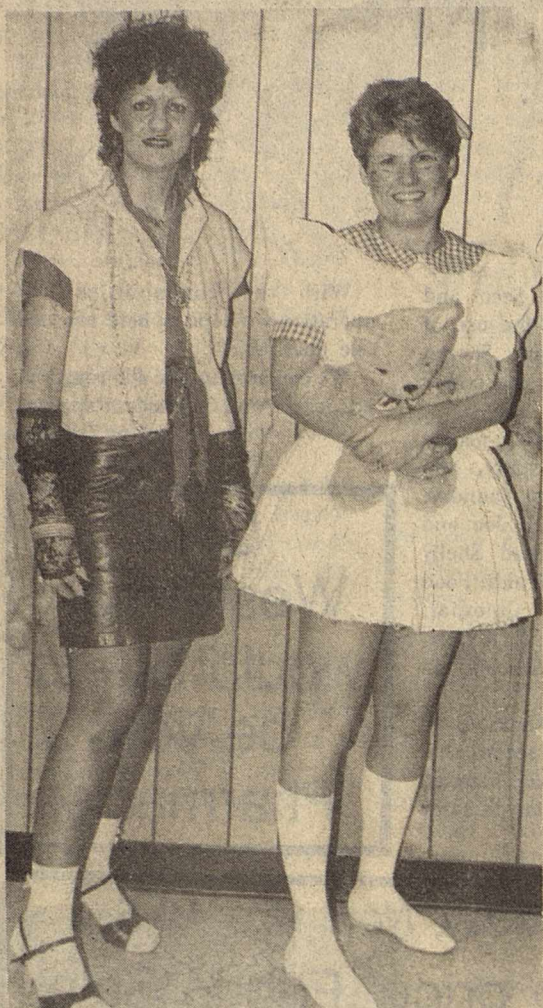

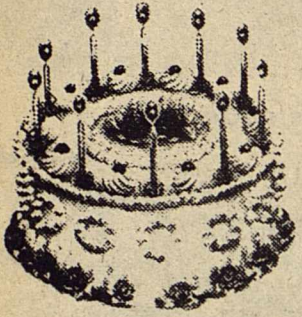

Deferred payment of taxes

By simply filing a sworn affidavit with the Sutton County Appraisal District, homeowners age 65 and over in Sutton County can defer payment of property taxes on their homesteads.

If an elderly taxpayer has already been sued to collect delinquent taxes on his homestead, he can still take advantage of the "over-65 tax deferral" by filing an affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

Friess, chief appraiser of the Sutton County Appraisal District, explained that once an over-65 taxpayer properly files the tax deferral affidavit, state law prevents taxing units from initiating or pursuing delinquent tax suits on the homestead for as long as the applicant owns and lives at that property.

Friess said that elderly homeowners can obtain forms for the deferral affidavit at the Sutton

County Appraisal District office. The homeowner should fill out the form and have his signature witnessed by a notary public or other official authorized to take oaths, she added.

Friess stressed that the tax deferral only postpones tax payments, it does not dismiss them. "Elderly homeowners should understand that the taxes, penalties and interest will continue to add up," she explained. "Once the homeowner no longer qualifies for the deferral—that is, if he no longer owns or resides at that homestead—all those deferred amounts must be paid. At that time taxing units may sue to collect the delinquent taxes, penalties, and interest, and foreclose on the property."

When the Right Thing is Wrong

"but those in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint." Isaiah 40:31.

The art of knowing the right response is indeed just that. It is easy for most of us to make the wrong or at least an inadequate response to some situation. Many people are not aware that there is in religious life a whole spectrum of responses that are acceptable. The author of Ecclesiastes says that "There is a time for everything." The truth of this is not only that there is a time for everything but there are times when we should respond one way and time when we respond another. If, of course, your experience only allows for one type of response then it follows that you will by necessity occasionally make the wrong response.

There are indeed times when a high emotional response is the way to react. Great joy and happiness demand a hilarious, light hearted response to jump and dance with glee. The beautiful rendition of a musical score might elicit a hearty round of applause or even a whistle or "Bravo". An outstanding accomplishment in sports brings a cheer of great gusto. A spiritually moving experience would extract an Amen or applause: Responses in life situations might well demand a highly emotional response for these are times when "They will soar on wings like eagles."

There are times when the response to a situation might demand a resolve to keep on. When the times of life grow tough it might be time to set your jaw and plan to hang in there. God gives us grace and the response then demands a commitment to be faithful to stay with the course.

Giving up is defeat but patience (the Greek word used in the Bible and translated patience in English means literally to hold up under the load or strain) enables us to keep going in the face of difficulty and is a victory. Heavy work load, depression, illness, and disappointments all take away the desire to finish the job. In times like these that hope in the Lord will help us run and not grow weary.

Another day and the prospects of it seem to much. A terminal illness, the death of a loved one, business or professional set back or even failure all demand a response but not great joy or even to run, but simply to walk without fainting is an answer to prayer. In the soupy thick darkness of despair the spirit can not fly with eagles or run with the athlete but, to walk and not faint is enough. God gives responses for every situation and he

also gives us the ability to know which is appropriate

Sometimes ones religious experience is too limited to realize that the Bible covers every response man might need and the Holy Spirit of God guides us in the uses thereof. Therefore, we rejoice when we realize that God helps to fly when we should, run without fainting, and walk without fainting. God helps those who hope and trust in Him through whatever comes their way. This hope is for all who believe in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. The old hymn sums up the situation when it declares "Only Trust Him". Having a right response does not make it the right one for all occasions because we must respond to the situation. You can do the right thing at the wrong time but having the ability to gear our response to the occasion is indeed a gift of God.

Great American Smokeout a great day for quitters

Smokers who want to give the cigarette habit may find the task earlier on Thursday, November 21. That's the date of the American Cancer Society's ninth annual Great American Smokeout—a day when the nation's 54 million smokers are encouraged to kick the habit for at least 24 hours, just to prove to themselves that quitting is possible.

Smokeout Day is celebrated throughout the country as an upbeat, lively event. Parades, "Run Your Butts off" races, rallies, cigarette "matches" and other activities keep the mood light, and keep smokers' minds off cigarette. American Cancer Society volunteers organize Smokeout events in shopping malls, parks, corporations, schools, hospitals, and other areas. The aim: to offer support and assistance to smokers trying to quit for the day.

The Sutton County unit of the American Cancer Society will host a booth at the Annual Sutton County Health Fair, November 13, 1985 at the 4-H Barn, a film will be shown, hand out material and helpful information will be given out with all unit members on hand to encourage smokers to quit for 1 day at a time and non-smokers not to start.

Although the Great American Smokeout may seem all festivities and celebration, it has a very serious purpose, since more than 340,000 Americans die each year of diseases linked to smoking, representing one out of every seven deaths in the United States.

Cigarette smoking is responsible for 83 percent of all the lung cancer deaths in the nation, and, in 1985, lung cancer will surpass breast cancer as the leading cancer killer of women. This statistics is attributed to the large number of women who started smoking during and after World War II. Cigarette smoking is a significant factor in other cancers as well: cancer of the mouth, esophagus, larynx, pharynx, bladder, pancreas, and it has been linked to some cases of cervical cancer.

Last year, a record number of smokers—an estimated 20.4 million, according to a Gallup survey—participated in the Great American Smokeout. Of the participants, 5.4 million smokers—about 10 percent of the nation's smokers succeeded in quitting for the day.

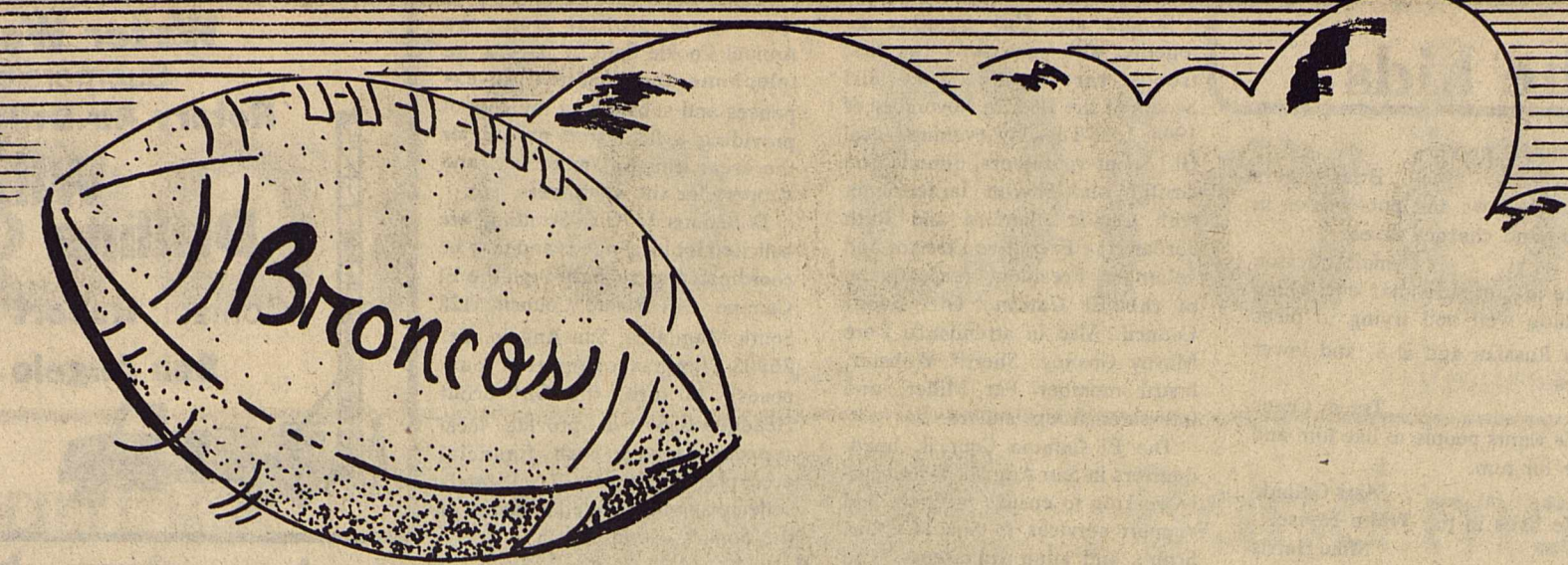
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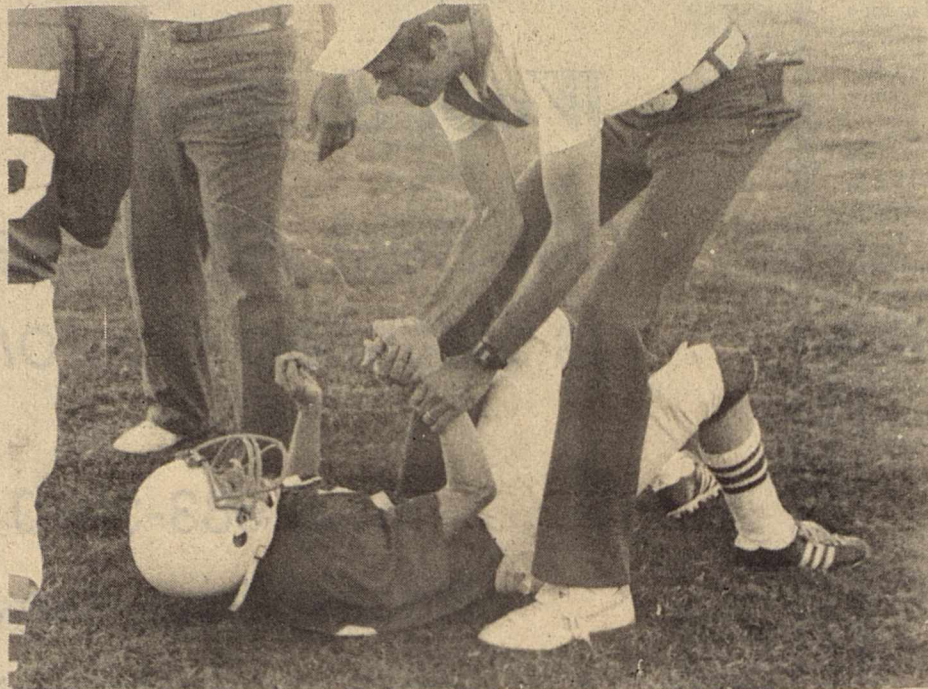
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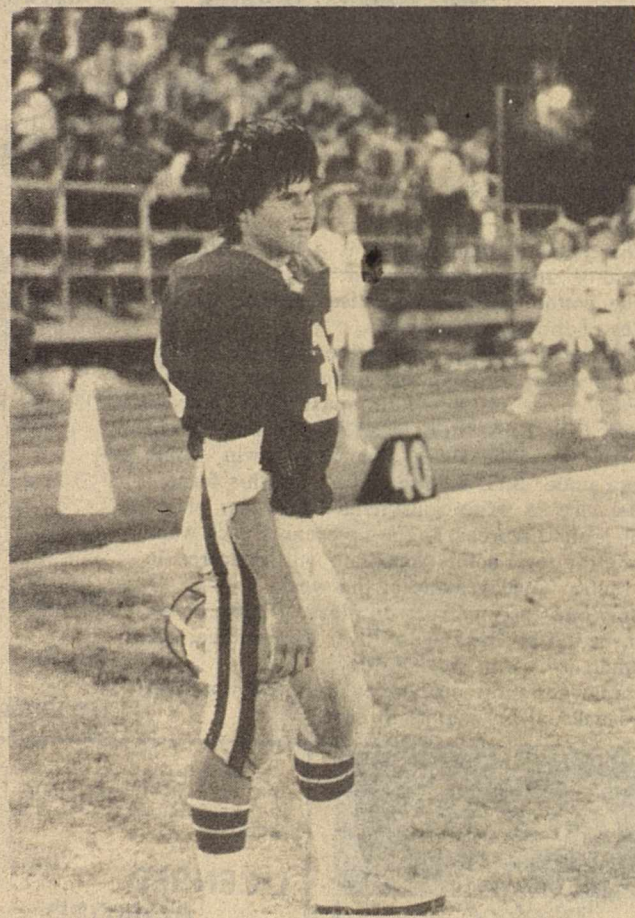
