**REMEMBER THAT** old party game where you ask all the guests, "If you were stranded on a deserted island and could take with you any famous person who ever lived, who would it be?"

My choice would be... see if you can guess. From a poor family, next to the youngest of 17 children, had only two years of schooling and went to work at the age of 12. When he died at age 84 he had made of himself a writer, publisher, scientist, inventor, politician, diplomat, and philosopher.

All over the U.S. there are cities, schools, universities, libraries and wood-burning stoves named for this wise fellow.

He was the only man to sign four of the most important documents in the founding of our country: The Declaration of Independence, The Treaty of Alliance with France, The Treaty of Paris and the Constitution.

Some of his lesser-known achievements include: established the first men's club, the first fire department, the first library, the first street cleaning department, the first fire insurance company, organized a modern postal system and founded a university.

He was known for having a sense of humor and he enjoyed wearing bright colorful clothing in a time period when we think of people as being rather drab, dull and serious.

He must have had an inquiring mind, as he was a man ahead of his time. If you have guessed Benjamin Franklin, you are correct. But it is as a writer, newspaperman and publisher that I would like a chance to visit with this venerable old soul. I'd like to see what he could do with a word processor.

The printed page in those days was put together one letter at a time, and that must have required a great wealth of patience. And he exhibited a lifetime of patience, diplomacy, wit and wisdom in 1787, when at age 81, he was the one to cool the tempers when debate became heated at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia's Independence Hall.

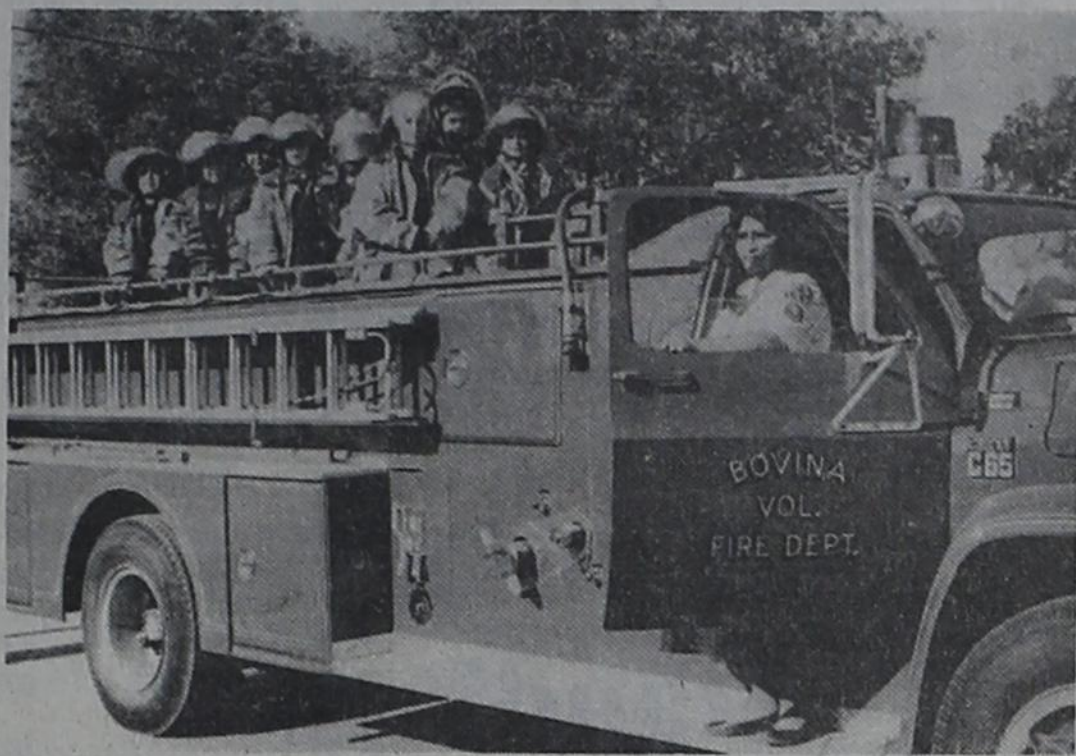
Having rubbed elbows with politicians and great minds in England, France and America, he would probably be appalled at the deterioration of the political scene of 1987. In his day, the business of running the country was considered serious and dignified. What would he think of today's political figures such as Gary Hart, Jesse Jackson, Pat Robertson, Joe Biden, Robert Bork, George Bush, et al.

More than that, what would he think of the modern press which works so hard to destroy the dignity of those office seekers, while ignoring their qualifications, their reasons for seeking the highest offices in the land, and their ideas for improving the country's problems.

We know nothing about how any of these people would handle the shaky economy, the Persian Gulf situation, the communist threat in Nicaragua, etc. But we know a lot about their personal problems and which pretty girls they did or did not sleep with; issues which have nothing to do with their abilities to guide, lead and advise while holding onto the many reins which keep our country running.

Twice each year, on about October 25 and April 3, I get really mad at old Ben because he is the fellow who invented daylight savings time. He first introduced the idea in Paris sometime in the 1770's. France now uses daylight savings time all year round, which would not be so bad. But this constant changing back and forth is nerve-jangling. I never know whether to spring backward, fall on my face, or just pull the covers over my head and stay in bed.

While we are busy changing all those awful digital clocks back next Sunday, I will be wishing for a buzzard to roost on the headstone of my old pal Ben.

## Mustangs Run Record To 5-1 With Win

The Bovina High School Mustangs ran their season record to 5-1 and won their second district game in as many starts last Friday, when they blanked the Lorenzo Hornets, 42-0 in a game at Lorenzo.

Bud Venable accounted for 22 of Bovina's points. He ran 69 yards from scrimmage on the first offensive play of the game, to get the Mustangs off and running.

Venable added the PAT kick, giving Bovina a quick, 7-0 lead. Only 16 seconds had expired in the first quarter.

Later in the opening quarter, quarterback Scott Scaff capped a drive by going a yard on a quarterback sneak, and Venable's kick made the score 14-0.

Todd Ware ran 48 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter to hike the score to 20-0 as the kick failed. Ware repeated with a three-yard run to make Bovina's lead 26-0. A running try for points failed.

Before halftime, Venable scored again on a six-yard run. He then caught a pass from Scaff for a two-point conversion as the Mustangs hiked their lead to 34-0.

The only other scoring in the game came in the third quarter when Scaff hooked up with Gabriel Mancini on a 65-yard scoring pass. Mancini has caught five passes in the five games, and all have gone for touchdowns.

"I thought we played a real good game. Those kind of situations are dangerous, because if you go in thinking you should win easily, sometimes you can get in trouble. We came out ready to

play," said Mustang Coach Bill Talley.

"We played well as a team. We had an outstanding game both on offense and defense," Talley said.

Venable was the leading ground-gainer for Bovina with 13 carries for 119 yards. Ware added 93 yards on 13 tries. Scaff completed 10 of 22 passes for 169 yards. As a team, Bovina gained 287 yards rushing and a total of 456 for the game.

Defensively, the Mustangs held Lorenzo to only four first downs and 114 total yards.

Denver Riddle caught three passes for 42 yards.
