We herewith quote his recent column, which was written for Harris News Service, and recently printed in our Texas Press Association's monthly bulletin. He says some things a number of newspaper people have felt for some time:

"Dan Rather is not a newsman. Neither are his counterparts on

other networks. They are celebrities, showmen, or entertainers who read news reports. Behind the scenes, there are hundreds of reporters digging out the news and feeding them.

The TV folks who poke microphones into the face of interviewees and ask inane questions are not newsmen. Neither are the camera men and tape-recorder carriers who push and shove and jockey for position in the milling crowd.

Radio broadcasters who lift news stories out of newspapers aren't newsmen. Neither are the disk jockeys or ad salesmen who rip paper off news wires and breathlessly read the latest headlines on the air. Of course, I'm not saying all radio broadcasters do this, but many of

But the public confuses these people with newsmen. They lump them all together and label them the "press." Or they toss all newspeople into one mile called "media."

The difference between the electronic media and the press remains unappreciated by an indifferent public. The definition of media should be confined to electronics. The press should be defined only as print journalism.

To put the two in the same bed tarnishes one with the image of the other. Print journalists look down their noses at the media even though they themselves often are mistakenly called the media.

True news reporters don't shove microphones in the face of victims and ask them how it feels to hurt. They don't clutter the scene with massive cameras, floodlights and tangled wires. They don't attract crowds or create riots or spontaneous demonstrations with their presence.

True newsmen work quietly behind the scenes with little or no recognition. They don't thrust themselves into the story. They don't insist that the cameras focus on them as they work.

Yet a portion of the public ill-will toward the press stems from the stigma of the electronic crowd, especially television. The public has failed to separate the press from the

But (with some exceptions) they are two distinctly different creatures. One, a glittering, show-biz, superficial media; the other, a quiet, unglamorous, dedicated press.

Don't get me wrong. The Dan Rathers may have been newsmen. Walter Cronkite was once a hardworking UPI reporter.

But once they hit the shimmering air waves of TV tinsel-town, they became wealthy entertainers playing the ratings game.

They transformed themselves into objects of press coverage, with almost no kinship to print journalism."

## Hance Needs Big Turnout

Congressman Kent Hance, who was given overwhelming support by the voters of Parmer County in the May primary, is needing at least as many votes in the June 2 runoff, if he is to take the nomination from his liberal opponent.

Hance received over 90 per cent of the county's votes in the May 5 primary, and his totals went as high as 94.5 per cent at Friona, and 100 per cent in the Rhea voting box.

It behooves everyone who voted for Hance in the primary to return to the polls this Saturday, and those who did not vote the first time around can still help his cause.

Hance's opponent is Lloyd Doggett of Austin, termed a "super liberal, who is promising more of everything to those who feed at the public trough."

Doggett is heartily endorsed by labor union bosses, feminists, militant teachers' organizations, nuclear freeze advocates, and some consumer, environmental and minority activists.

Hance has achieved a solid record of achievement in the public interest, and his record in congress is an outstanding one. However, he will not be able to continue this good record unless his supporters match the get-out-the-vote effort of the special interest groups.

And, while we're at it, voters need to finish the job they started on May 5, by voting for Don Richards for the Congressional nomination.


Don's opponent in the runoff, Thomas Richards, has further confused the name-identification issue during the past month by attempting to hang a "liberal" label on Don Richards.

However, those of us who know Don Richards know him to be the type of person who would represent this area well--in the same mold as Kent Hance.

It was a dream! How many trips I've made over the kitchen sink! And once I spent a week going to Alaska by wall-map. But, this was real! We had been given a marvelous gift of ten days in Hawaii, Australia and New Zealand.

We left Houston, April 8, at 6 p.m. on Continental-I and arrived in Honolulu airport at 1:30 a.m. We spent one day in Oahu touring, in the morning, Pearl Harbour and learning what happened on that fateful day of December 7. At once we were proud of our men and women as they faced this disaster. And, then there were questions. We visited Dole Pineapple farms and saw them planting new fields. We saw how sugar cane is watered and enjoyed Punnai Nuts hanging on very long stems from back yard Kamani trees.

Too soon the day was over and at 11:15 p.m. CO-I carried us, and over 300 more visitors to the far away continent of Australia. We were truly "down under." Sydney was a busy city. The people were friendly and

always helpful. While our room was made ready we crossed the street to have coffee at McDonald's. Later we saw Long John Silvers, Pizza Hut and the Colonel's Fried Chicken.

Only a block from our hotel we discovered Sydney's Town Hall, a beautiful 100 year old building whose woodwork is polished red wood. The clear glass windows are etched with flowers and light is brought into the rooms by massive chandeliers. That night they were having a Bach concert in the 2200 seat concert hall.

Next door is St. Andrews Angelican Cathedral. It is 140 years old and has been in continuous use, also. Inside are great, tall columns and in the back of the long narrow sanctuary, under protective glass, is a copy of The Great Bible, printed in 1538. Because this translation was placed where all could read it or hear it read, it is credited with ushering in the Reformation. Billy Graham was to be there for an Easter service later that week.

In an adjoining block is the Queen Victoria Market building. Built in 1890 of Romanesque design it was to give the farmers a good place to display and sell their produce. Through the years it has undergone many changes and is now being restored to its original appearance. It will become a modern shopping center, complete with restaurants, ball room and basement parking.

revolving restaurants, was near our hotel so we enjoyed our first evening meal and a panoramic view of the

On Thursday we spent a day going to and seeing Canberra, Australia's capitol. An American, Walter Burley Griffin, won the world-wide contest, at the turn of the century, and became the architect of their new city. The War Memorial at the end of the Red Road and Australia's High Court on the banks of Burley Griffin Lake were special places to your young guide and so to us.

We toured Sydney via the Sydney Explorer. One of its 20 stops is The Rocks area. Here settlement in Australia began. England, "--when the Colonies were no longer

available--," sent their prisoners to Farm was a highlight of our New Australia. Some of the old brick streets are still usable. We toured the famous Sydney Opera House, built to resemble shells on the sand. We ate a sandwich, fed part to the water birds, and watched the ships, ferrys and Hydrofoils leave Sydney Harbour. A short stop at the Royal Botanic Gardens and the day was over.

Saturday, April 14, we shopped a little, had breakfast in Picadilly Alley at a small outdoor Lebanese food stand. We ate ham sandwiches, homemade Lebanese pastries, fresh pressed pineapple juice and tabouli. At 12 noon, CO-II lifted high in the clouds and five hours later we sat down on the most exciting green country we have ever seen.

New Zealand must surely have been the first Eden! Our motel opened broad windows toward one of the many harbours around Auckland. After a good night's sleep we were ready for the One Day Tour to Rotorua, the center of North Island. The long day took us through the most beautiful pasture land we have ever seen. It was perennial rye and clover, thick and tall. The small "paddocks" were fenced with thorn bush trimmed in the shape of a hedge. Such a pretty picture on the hillsides!

Green fields were grazed by three and a half million dairy cows, mostly Holstein, 65 to 70 million sheep and a few deer. Deer farms and Kiwi fruit Sydney Tower, housing two are new exports to New Zealand. Kiwi grows on vines something like grapes and protected from wind by tall fences or tree hedges.

> The Maori people were the first settlers here. They came from the Society Islands, now known as Hawaii. We saw the Maori Arts and Crafts Institute where woodcarving is taught. We saw a Maori village and graveyards above ground on the hillsides. At Whakarewarewa Thermal Reserve we saw geysers, steam vents everywhere and "frogs," boiling mud pools. Rainbow Springs Nature Sanctuary has trout ponds. We walked from pool to pool down paths bordered by trees and thick growth. It was dense shade and cool! The only way to look at fish!

The show at the Agradome Sheep

Zealand trip. Nineteen brand of trained sheep were displayed on pyramids while the 72 year old owner explained the purpose of each breed and why they are raised in his country. After shearing a young sheep and displaying the talents of his sheep dog, we were allowed to visit the wool shopping center. Oh, such vests, rugs and coats! I bought wool covered coat hangers. The cheapest thing they had.


On Monday we toured the city of Auckland. We saw its harbours, bridges, beaches, volcanoes and homes with colorful tin roofs. I was finally allowed to dash into an open front vegetable stand to buy our evening meal. We saw a dairy farm at milking time, Rangi Toto, the big unconquered volcano whose name means Blood In The Sky and ended the day with a trip to the Green Stone Factory. They make jewelry from green stone (jade) and paula (abalone) shell. With the hamburgers from an open air Chinese "take out"

stand we had supper in our room. In Australia if you have a dented fender you find a Smash Shop. In New Zealand you seek a Pannel Bender. In New Zealnd we found Ford, International, Case, Massey Harris, John Deere and Ditch Witch. All small tractors.

We found a beautiful old church built of native wood. Rafters, benches, floors, walls--all were lovely native wood. Many exquisite stained glass windows filled the building. It, too, was over 100 years old. It had been moved to stand by the new church now in use. But, the old one had much more personality than the new brick and cement one.

It was time to pack, bid our hosts good bye and make our way to the airport. It was interesting to see how many faces we remembered from other flights, all going home. Holidays are so short!

It was a dream, a reality, and now a dream again filled with moments soon \* to be forgotten. And moments, places and faces to be remembered always.





## Early-Day Resident Pays Visit To City

Virgil Cunnings of Corona, California, stopped in Bovina for a visit last week while traveling through the country with his daughters, Betty Ann and Ermagene.

Cunnings, 87, was one of the first residents of Bovina and his father, Thomas Cunnings, was definitely one of the pioneers. Thomas Cunnings moved to Bovina in 1902 from Missouri and worked as a Santa Fe pumper. Virgil moved here with other members of the family when he was four years old. He graduated from Bovina High School in 1913 and the graduating class included only four members.

Virgil attended college at Seth Ward in Plainview. This college burned before Cunnings graduated and he finished his college classes in the Plainview Methodist Church.

He later worked in a drug store in Canyon and Clark Drug Store located in Hereford. Later he became a licensed pharmacist while in Hereford and has kept his license up to date all these years.

Cunnings married Ida Mae Leach in 1921. She was a rancher's daughter from Plainview. They had two daughters, Betty Ann and Ermagene, both born in Hereford.

He left Hereford in 1925 and moved to Plainview, then Pampa and in 1927 he moved to Corona, California. He worked in a drug store as a pharmacist after he moved to Corona. Later he purchased his own drug store and his wife was also an employee there.

Cunnings' wife died in 1980 and he retired as a pharmacist twelve years ago.

Cunnings' dad, Thomas, remarried while he lived in Bovina. His second wife was Mary Summer and they had one son.

Virgil said while living in Bovina and in high school he was a photographer for an undertaker.

Virgil has two daughters, five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

While traveling through this part of the world they enjoyed reminiscing about the early days in this area, and his daughters, Betty Ann and Ermagene had a good time seeing and hearing the stories about the place and people where their father spent his "growing up" years.




## Shawn Read Graduates At Dumas
