The Sutton County Historical Society is sponsoring the Second Annual Home Tour and Crafts Fair to be held on Saturday, October 17, 1987.



## Tax increase in '88

DEAR COMMISSIONER NABERS: I have really been struggling during these tough economic times. Often I thought I might have to close the doors on my business and walk away. Maybe I am over the hump-at least I hope so-but today I started wondering what my 1988 unemployment tax rate would becan you give me any idea of what to expect?

employers in exactly the same situation. I wish the news I have to give you could be better, but here goes. There are two substantial law changes made by the last legislature which will affect employers beginning in 1988.

First, there was a change made in the method of computing the deficit tax. The deficit tax is one portion of an employer's overall unemployment tax rate. Previously, because of the computation formula, the deficit tax affected less than half of all employers. Now it will affect all employers.

Second, the wage base upon which an employer pays taxes has been increased from \$7000 to \$8000 in 1988 and \$9000 in

1989. In a nutshell, taxes will increase! In 1988, the minimum rate available under law is expected to approach 1%, and the maximum rate is expected to be about 8.5%. I am advising all employers to prepare for a tax increase but those who did not pay any deficit tax last year will be the ones to take the biggest

DEAR COMMISSIONER NABERS: Is there anything that we as employers can do to lighten our tax burden for 1988?

DEAR S.J.: The 0.8% FUTA (Federal Unemployment Tax Act) tax is due to decrease to 0.6% as of January 1, 1988. The additional 0.2% was imposed in 1977 to pay for extended unemployment benefits authorized by the Federal Government.

WHY, HONEY, I

The House and Senate committees in the U.S. Congress have included among the options considered in writing a tax bill, the extension of this tax.

Since the purpose for which it was imposed has been satisfied, we think the extension would be a new tax which you as employers have every right to protest. The extension will cost the employers of Texas approximately \$89 million in 1988 or about \$14 per employer.

Write to your U.S. Congressmen and Senators now stating your objection. The next two weeks are the crucial ones as far as this tax is concerned.

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## Know your blood pressure

A routine physical shows your lood pressure is a normal 20/80. But what does that tell

It could mean a great deal if ou're at risk of high blood ressure, or hypertension, ccording to Dr. Mary Ann leussner, a specialist in health ducation.

"The higher, top number in a blood pressure reading indicates the maximum pressure in your arteries exerted from a contraction of the heart," she explains.

"The lower, bottom number indicates the pressure in your arteries when your hear is between contractions."

According to medical experts a

blood pressure of 120/80 is "normal," reading between 140/90 to 154/94 are considered borderline hypertensive and readings over 160/90 may mean you have hypertension, Heusser says.

National Institutes of Health figures show that more than one out of every four adult Americans have high blood pressure. For people over 50, the ratio increases to one in three.

Since hypertension is a major factor underlying strokes and a contributing factor to heart attacks, it's important to have your blood pressure checked regularly, advises the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist.

She points out that the risk factors for hypertension include smoking, overweight, a family history of the disease, and a high sodium intake.

Too much sodium in the diet may aggravate high blood pressure once it exists. So reducing salt intake is often an important part of treatment along with exercise, weight reduction and medication, says Heussner.

Research has shown that most Americans eat more sodium than they actually need. For that reason, the U.S. Dietary Guidelines recommend reducing salt intake for the population as a whole.

For information on how to decrease sodium in your diet, the specialist suggests contacting the home economist at your county Extension office.

Jesus Christ is Savior and Lord! William Barclay has pointed out that "of all the titles of Jesus the title Lord became by far the most commonly used, widespread, and theologically important. It would hardly be going too far to say that the word Lord became a synonym for the name of Jesus."

ant to you? What areas of your life are affected by His lordship? This sometimes neglected aspect of the Christian experience must be carefully considered by all men and women who want to be His

Dozens upon dozens of titles have been given Jesus Christ in the scriptures. Among these are teacher, Lord, Christ, King of Kings, and Lord of Lords, just to name a few. According to God's word, Jesus Christ is Lord of creation (Col. 1:16-17), the living

and the dead (Rom. 14:9), and all Christians-the Church (Col. 1:18). Christ should have the same place in our hearts that He holds in the universe. According to Philipians 2:9-11 God Himself exalted Jesus Christ by giving him a name above all others. Rev. 5:12 acknowledge Jesus' lordship: "Worthy is the lamb that was slain to receive power and riches and wisdom and might and honor What does Christ's lordship and glory and blessing." We have been bought with a price, therefore, we should glorify God in our bodies-in all that we do! (1

> Cor. 6:19-20) Jesus Christ, Lord of Lords, has always existed and always will. Not all people presently acknowledge Him as their Lord, but that does not alter the fact of His lordship. All will someday acknowledge Christ as Lord, but the priviledge of acknowledging and obeying His lordship is possible now. Allow Christ to be the Lord of your life, by a

decision followed by daily

According to Col. 1:18 Christ should have first place in a believer's life. It's been said, Christ is present in all Christians, Christ is prominent in some Christians, but in only a few Christians is Christ preeminent. J. Oswald Sanders has said, "A clear and definite activity of the will is involved in recognizing His lordship, since He is to be Lord of all.'

Consider the following questions: Who knows perfectly what is best for my life? Who is most able to do what is best for my life? Who really desires at all times what is best for my life? The answer is obviously Jesus Christ. Take some time today and meditate on the lordship of Christ. As a believer have you decided to acknowledge Jesus' lordship in your life?

Good intentions don't guarantee good results. A good start does not ensure a strong finish; decision is only the beginning. Once you have decided to acknowledge the lordship of Christ in your life, you will prove that He is Lord by submitting to Him hour by hour and obeying Him in the daily affairs of life.

Jesus Christ is declared to be Lord by God in the scriptures. He is worthy to be Lord because of who He is, not merely because of what He has done. Although Jesus Christ is Lord, He does not hold a preeminent place in the heart of every believer. In order to enthrone Christ in his heart, the Christian must decide to present himself to Christ and to allow Him to reign over his life. Various areas of a believers life may not be subject to the control of Christ. ## Those durn coons...

by Ray Bronk

A few years ago, I was a guest on a fishing trip. My host and I had fileted about 30 panfish, and since his refrigerator was full and the night was chilly, he stored them to cool on his screened porch. The next morning, all that remained of the fish filets was an overturned platter. There was a new hole in the screen. I thought my host would be furious. Instead, he just laughed and said, "Those durn coons, I should have known better than to trust them with fish left out like that."

Few members of the animal kingdom are as well known, and enjoy the charitable good will of humans, as does the Raccoon, Procyon lotor. His "masked bandit" black facial configuration, lumbering, pigeon-toed gait, and the ease with which he can be trained, tend to make him one of the more lovable and acceptable members of the animal kingdom found in Texas.

The raccoon is found throughout the lower provinces of Canada, all of the United Sates, and all of Mexico. Several races of pale-colored, dwarf raccoons are found on the Florida keys.

'Coons," are grayish in color, with the famous black mask across the eyes and cheeks, and with five to eight black bands on the tail. They have long, buff colored guard-hairs, tipped in black, and a creamy white underfur. Their fur is prized for coats, and the raccoon is hunted both for pelt and for sport.

A fully developed adult raccoon living in an area of ideal conditions, and with an abundance of food, can weigh as much as a medium sized dog, as much as 45 pounds, although less than 30 pounds is a more normal maximum male weight.

made from dusk to dawn, since they usually forage for food during hours of darkness. For this reason, they are rarely spotted during daylight hours.

The den is usually a hollow log or hollow tree, when trees are abundant, and in rocky clefts and crevices in treeless areas.

They are expert climbers. They use their non-webbed, elongated, spindly toes with great dexterity when climbing and when examining objects. In captivity, when water is available, they have an unexplained habit of "washing" their food, even if they have just caught the item in that same water. In the wild, however, they seldom wash their food, usually swallowing their food with no particular preparation.

Raccoons are usually found living near water, since they eat many foods growing in or near water. They are omnivorous, and consume crawfish, fish, and snakes, as well as fruits such as grapes and persimmons, and they eat acorns, nuts and corn. They will also eat birds, insects, and larval and adult wasps. They scavenge in rubbish and garbage pails, and many homeowners. investigating strange noises in the night, have surprised a family of raccoons gobbling up pet food left overnight.

Although raccoons do not reach adulthood until their second year, female raccoons are sexually mature at 9 to 10 months, and in their southern range, more than half conceive during their first year. Males reach sexual maturity after their second year.

The breeding season begins in February, with the young being born in April or May. A litter of from one to seven are born after a gestation period of from 60 to 73 days, with an average of 63 days. They are small at birth, about 2.5 ounces, well furred, and with dark skins. The eyes and ears are closed, with the eyes opening about the 18th day. The female cares for the young, with no help from the male.

After weaning, at about seven weeks, the young will follow the female around, seeking shelter in tangles of roots and vines, crevices, and under rocks. They begin following their parents around on hunting forays about a

The raccoon is considered intelligent by many, although he is more ingenious and persistent than smart. His manual dexterity enables him to perform feats which make him appear superior to other mammals in brain power.

Raccoons are often trained as pets. This is not a safe practice. As the raccoon reaches adulthood, his insatiable curiosity and stubbornness make him destructive and untrustworthy. His temperament also changes, and pet raccoons are known to have caused serious biting and clawing injuries when formerly safe activities were repeated.

Although raccoons are sometimes said to hibernate, they do not. They do, in the colder parts of their range, hole up and sleep for long periods, living on stored body fat until about February. They do not display the physiological changes of hibernation; that of reduced temperature, reduced rate of respiration and heart-beat, and insensibility to pain, that characterize true hibernation.

Raccoons are of the family Procyonidae (animals which come before dogs,) which include coatis, kinkajous, and pandas; the order Carnivorae (eaters of meat,) and class Mammalia (mammal.)

Although recent studies have indicated that the raccoon has been destroying nests of game birds and wild turkeys, this destruction has not been intense. He is, in many parts of Texas, considered a pest. Pest or not, this remarkable, adaptable creature, able to live in varied circumstances and habitats, seems destined to continue to prosper and to prevail in the face of unbanization and other modern
