WHEN THE New Mexico North-South girls' all-star basketball game was played recently in Farmington, it marked a reunion of sorts for the two opposing coaches.

Coaching the South team was Billy Richards, a former Bovina Mustang basketball star, who now is basketball coach at Reserve, N.M.

Coming by to greet Richards was Clovis Ratliff, who had been Richards' coach at Bovina High School 26 years ago. The two had not met since Richards played basketball at BHS.

Ratliff, of whom we spoke back during the 1982-83 Mustang basketball season, compiled some impressive records in his six years as coach at Bovina. Richards pointed out that Ratliff's teams won 86 games and lost just five during his final three years. This included the trip to the state meet by the 1956 Mustangs.

In fact, the year after Ratliff left Bovina, the Mustangs won 30 straight games. "He was gone, but we still were his players," Richards said. "And I've still got the newspaper clippings."

Ratliff now lives in Farmington. His daughter Nancy was a basketball star at Farmington, and now is one of the top players at Fullerton State College in California. Ratliff was leaving at the time of the all-star workouts for Colorado Springs, where he and another New Mexico coach, Cara Priddy, were to have roles in the Pan American Games tryouts.

But back to Richards and his success story. The former Mustang player coached his South all-stars to a 69-61 win in the game. It was the first-ever for the South in the history of the series.

Helping the South's win was Robin Bradley of Melrose, whose 13 points tied for high point honors. (Robin has relatives living in Friona, which makes this even more of a local tie-in).

Richards played on the 1955-56 Bovina Mustang team which won third in the state tournament, and then won 30 straight games in 1956-57 before losing the sudden-death overtime game at regional.

His overall basketball record is 257 wins and 47 losses. As coach at Reserve, his Mountaineers have appeared in all eleven New Mexico state tournaments. They won state in 1978, and finished second this past season.

In April, Richards was named New Mexico basketball's "Coach of the Year."

Richards and his wife Carolyn live in Reserve, along with their twin sons Toby and Todd. Their daughter Robin has completed her freshman year at New Mexico State University.

Bradley, the Melrose player who was leading scorer in the game, was named all-state, and was selected as Most Valuable Player in the Class A state tournament, which her team won for the second straight year.

## Miller Is Named To SCD Board

Mike Miller of Lazbuddie was recently appointed to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors. Mike will be representing Zone V for the remainder of the term of Dan Smith. Smith of Lazbuddie, resigned after ten years on the board.

The purpose of the Parmer County SWCD, its headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Miller will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

Mike and his wife, Pamela (St. Clair) have four children, Kurt, Kristine, Scott and Jon Colby. The Millers belong to the First Baptist Church of Muleshoe.

Mike graduated from Muleshoe High School in 1964 and from West Texas State University in 1969. Although he started farming after graduation in 1969, he taught science one year at Sudan.

The Millers live and farm in the Lazbuddie area.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government, organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the power of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature.

Organized in April 1948, the Parmer County SWCD has worked jointly with the Soil Conservation Service to serve all landowners and operators equally.

## Nominees Are Sought By GSPA

Grain sorghum farmers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on September 15. Terms of four current board members expire at that time. They are Paul Cobb of Plains, Lee Hill of Dalhart, C.C. Reed of Kress and Olan "Jack" Crowl of Morse. All incumbents are eligible for reelection to the six-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide grain sorghum producers.

Any person in the 29-county TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and is subject to the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

Qualified persons wishing to have their names placed in nomination for membership on the Board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and ten others who are eligible to vote. All nominations must be filed by August 15 at the TGSPB office, Box R, Abernathy, Texas 79311 to allow time for adding their names to the ballot. Forms are available at that office.

Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TGSPB office by September 15. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by September 1, may obtain one at his County Agent's office.

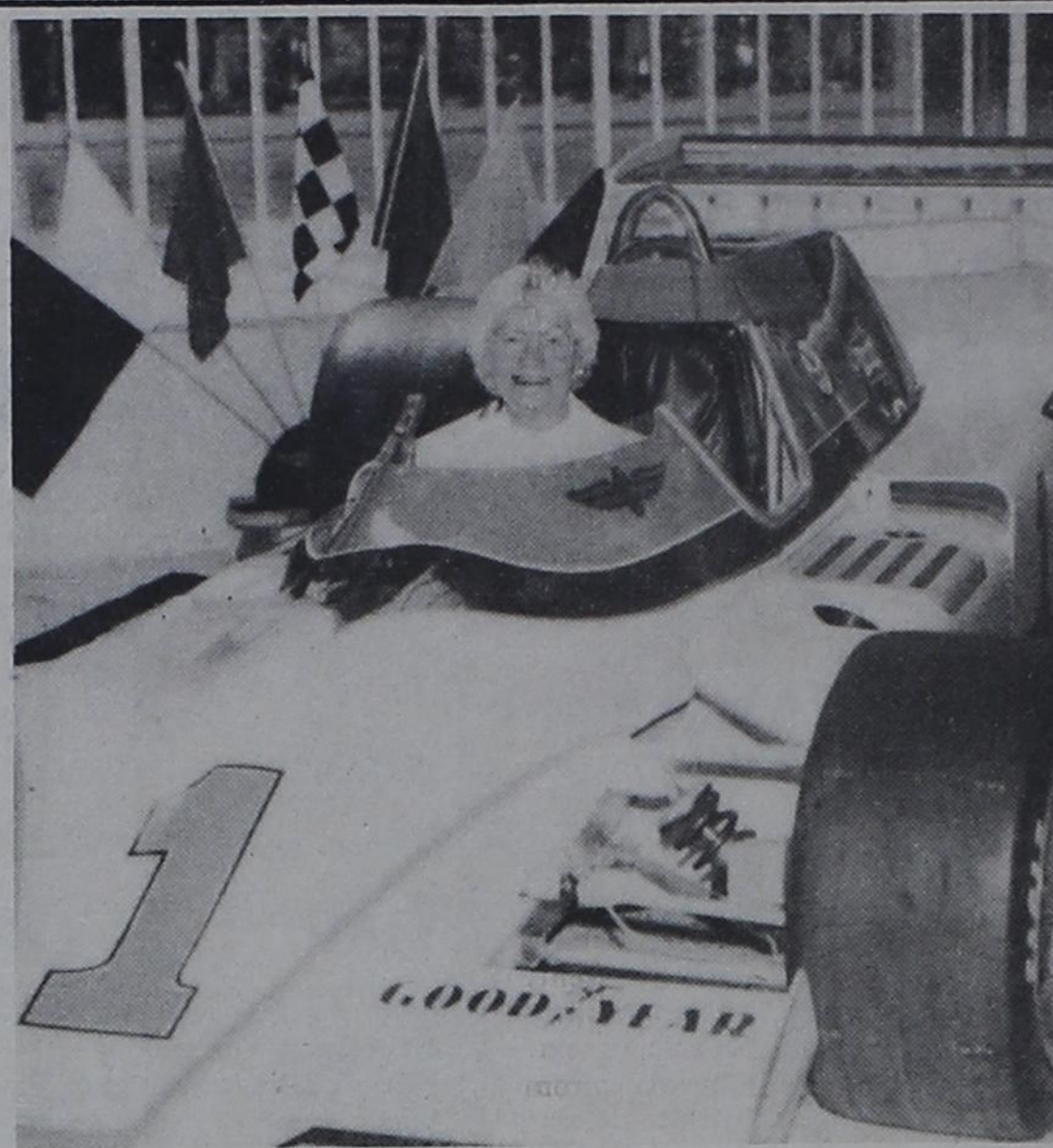
