I just wanted to write and say how pleased I am that the U.I.L. academic and drama programs have come to the elementary and junior high schools here in Sonora. I have heard both positive and negative comments on the new program, and I would like to say that in my opinion, these programs are highly beneficial to both the students and the school system in general.

I have participated in the U.I.L. program since 5th grade and have found that it has not only helped me with my school work, but it has also given me the opportunity to work with groups of people that share a common interest with me. The students who enter the program at the elementary and junior high levels are more prepared for high school competition. The competition, however, is not the most important thing at the elementary and junior high levels, nor is it stressed. What is stressed is team cooperation, working together to better each other, and education. Once the high school level is reached, competition becomes a factor for most simply because the amount of money in scholarship that is being competed for. Many of you may not know it, but every year over \$400,000 (and that figure is quickly rising!) is awarded in scholarship grants to students who reach the state level of competition. By starting now with the program, these students may have a better chance at receiving one or more of these scholarships.

I congratulate each and every one of the students who participated for their school in U.I.L. events. You may not realize it now, but what you're doing is "going the extra mile". Stay with your hard work and determination and "going the extra mile" may become a habit all through life! This should be your main incentive as well as the fun and rewards possible through the

Carriers in Texas to cover screening

Insurance carriers in Texas will be required to cover as a benefit annual mammograms for women 35 and older in policies issued or renewed on or after January 1,


Texas Governor William P. Clements in June signed into law the bill, SB 1371, which becomes effective September 1, 1987.

The law mandates that every health insurance policy written in Texas to cover women 35 or older must include coverage for an annual screening by low-dose mamography for the detection of occult breast cancer. Carriers, including Blue Cross and Blue Shield plans and health maintenance organizations, will have to reimburse for mammography screening within the provisions of the policy at levels which are not less favorable than for other radiological examinations and subject to the same dollar limits, deductibles and coinsurance.

Under a Maryland law that became effective July, 1986, insurance carriers that offer supplementary coverage to Medicare beneficiares are required to include annual mammography screening as a covered benefit. Under that law, policies providing "wrap-around" coverage will pay a maximum of \$100 for a beneficiary's annual by low-dose screening mammography.

progress into more arid areas.

The syndrome is caused by most likely one of two fundamentals or both. First, it could come from that motley bag of lore which we, with dubious pride, choose to refer to as our heritage. The "heritage" cause, considering the nature of man is quite likely. We picked up the green grass idea from England's houses in a sea of grass with moderate to high humidity. New Englanders learned that white lead diverted from ships was an excellent preservative for pine cottages in varying humidity, hence the white cottages. The two were blended and the white cottage behind a green lawn became an ideal the pioneers brought westward.

Here I sit (figuratively speaking)

in a West Texas drought trying to raise an alien grass lawn on a slope that takes the grass, soil, fertilizer and provides an infusion of new weed's seeds with every tantalizing shower. North winds bring in airborne thistle seeds, a shift to east southeast bring dandelions seeds and seventeen others from indeterminate directions. My activities hardly demonstrate enough intelligence to be classified as insanity, but must be dismissed as stupidity.

Our desertification process is showing amazing progress on the Edward's Plateau. Using the only data base I have access to shows that in less than 125 years we have reduced hilltop topsoil from thirteen grassy inches to two and one-half to four inches predominately loose. A similar loss took much longer in North Africa and Greece. Our utilization of grazing land is more intense, but the ultimate objective

Severance pay does not diminish benefits

I told the local Texas Employment Commission office about this and they said it did not matter, that the two week pay was a "gift". Why should this lady be eligible to draw benefits for these two weeks?

DEAR F.H.: Under our law, only one type of post employment payment will delay a claimant's receipt of benefits and that is wages in lieu of notice. This payment means must what it says. If an employer gives an individual no notice that he is being let go and instead gives him additional wages

to make up for this lack of notice, then those wages will delay payment of unemployment benefits for the number of weeks they represent. An employer is not obligated to pay wages in lieu of

Severance pay, on the other hand, is not listed in the law as a type of payment which will delay, reduce, or otherwise affect the payment of unemployment benefits.

In contrast to wages in lieu of notice, severance pay is something

your company has obligated itself to pay, either verbally or through written company policy or contract. It is usually based upon some formula which is tied to length of service-for example, one week's pay for each year with the company. The payment of severance is not a substitute for notice because it would be payable regardless of the amount of notice given.

If your company has a policy of giving severance, then you must realize your company is, in fact, augmenting payment which may be available under the unemployment insurance law.







VA loan guaranty amended

Recent legislation signed by President Reagan allows the Veterans Administration to relax downpayment requirements in the sale of certain homes acquired by the VA through foreclosure, according to Ted W. Myatt, Director of the VA Regional Office in Houston.

The Veteran's Home Loan Program Emergency Amendments, said Myatt, allows the Houston Office to waive the five percent downpayment requirement on the puchase of VA-owned properties when it is determined necessary to market these properties competitively. This provision was effective February 29, 1988, the date the new bill was signed.

Myatt also noted that the measure redefined the method from computing remaining Loan Guarantee entitlement for veterans who had used some entitlement earlier. Now a veteran's previously used entitlement will be subtracted from \$36,000, the maximum amount of loan guaranty benefits available to an eligible veterans, to determine his remaining entitlement. This provision applies to all loans closed on or after February 1, 1988, unless a guaranty commitment was made on or before December 31, 1987.

Scouling News

The boys in Den 4 said that they wanted to go camping. So in March they began preparing for their overnight campout.

They began by making first aid kits out of band aid boxes that they could wear their belts when they go hiking. Then they had a guest speaker, Mrs. Pool, from the EMS come and teach some basic first aid they need to know.

Our next project was making fire starters, which are made from strips of newspaper rolled tightly, tied with a cotton string and dipped into wax. We even made buddy burners. They are made by coiling strips of cardboard and placing inside of a tuna can. In the center a piece of cotton string is placed, as a wick, then paraffin is poured over it. These can be used in a tin can stove or as emergency road flares for your

The last project besides getting their personal gear together was making sit-upons. Sit-upons are made by folding newspaper into strips and weaving them into mats. The mats are then covered with plastic. We used them to sit on at our campfire.

Finally the time had come. We are ready. One Friday, April 22, 1988 the boys met at the Boy Scout building. We then went to my house on the 2D Genini Ranch south of town. When we arrived the boys went right to work setting up their tents. After camp was made

ready and a snack, we were off on a hike. Some of the boys that looked quickly got to see some deer and turkeys.

After hiking the boys were ready for supper. They each had a hand in preparing it.

When they were finished they were given free time until just before dark.

They were again reminded about fire safety and taught how to build two types of fires.

Finally darkness came and the campfire lit. Everyone told a story. Some were ghost stories and others were just fun stories.

Later that night just as things got quiet the rain and hail set in. Everyone grabbed up some of their things and headed for the house. It wasn't long after everyone was inside that they went back to sleep.

Early the next morning about 5:30 two boys were up and ready to make breakfast. The other boys weren't so eager to rise until about



The Federal Emergency Management Agency gives notice of the proposed determinations of base (100-year) flood elevations, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added Section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR 67.4 (a).

These elevations, together with the floodplain management measures required by Section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. They should not be construed to mean the

community must change any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their floodplain management requirements. The community may at any time enact stricter requirements on its own, or pursant to policies established by other Federal, State, or regional entities. These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for the new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605(b), the Administrator, to whom authority has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination under Section 1363 forms the basis for the new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not prohibit development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact.

Lessees and owners of real property in the City of Sonora, Sutton County, Texas, are encouraged to review the preliminary Flood Insurance Study and Flood Insurance Rate Map available at the address cited above. Proposed base flood elevations along flood sources studied in detail are shown on the flood profiles in the study. The flood sources studied in detail are:


