### Unemployment benefits-the real story

Dear Commissioner Nabers: Like everbody else it seems, my unemployment tax rate went through the ceiling this year. In reading all the standard rhetoric about the poor economy, the number of unemployed, the insolvency of the unemployment fund, etc., I wonder why nobody wants to discuss the amount of money the Texas Employment Commission pays out to people who really don't want to work.

I am not against temporarily paying a reasonable amount to someone who deserves it, but there are plenty of people who make subsidizied unemployment a way of life. There is not much incentive to get a job when you can sit at home, do nothing, and draw over \$800 a month. Instead of raising taxes, why don't you cut or reduce these benefits?

Based on what I have seen of the system, people miraculously find jobs as soon as the benefits run out sooner. Bad economy or not, Commissioner Mary Scott **Nabers**

Dear Started: Many employers feel as you do. Let me give you some information that may cause you to take a broader view of the system.


First, the benefit formula is calculated to provide only a 50% average wage replacement for a maximum of six months. Receiving only half of what they

could be earning if employed, claimants are fortunate if they can cover their basic obligations.

Second, the \$800 figure you mention is a benefit amount available only to individuals who have earned at least \$20,000 a year for the last year and a half. Benefit amounts vary greatly depending upon the individual claimant's past earnings. They may be as little as \$34 a week for 10 weeks or as much as \$210 a week for 26 weeks.

The legislature recently froze the maximum weekly benefit amount at \$210 and this freexe will remain in effect for two years.

Finally, our data shows that most claimants do, in fact, return to work prior to exhausting their benefits. Add this to the fact that less than half of the unemployed in the state even file for benefits and I think it must be conceded that the system, though certainly subject to abuse, nonetheless serves the majority as it was intended.
