WHAT A DIFFERENCE a day makes, especially where the weather is concerned.

Just to show you how the weather can vary, the temperature had reached 98 in Amarillo as of Monday, but on Tuesday morning, it's about 50 degrees below that figure, and isn't supposed to get above 60 degrees for the day's high.

I suppose that's what you call "instant fall."

The nation's weather map on Monday made you wonder if what they were showing you was really happening.

Ahead of the cold front, which pushed through our area early Tuesday morning, the temperatures were in the high 90s. In fact, Denver, Colorado, reached 101 that afternoon, which was an all-time high point for the date.

At the same time, up in Montana, snow was falling. In fact, it set a record for the amount of snow received on a September day in that

So, we apparently are about to get some relief from our long, hot summer, and most people seem to be ready for that change. The growing season is about over, anyway--just as long as we don't get an early freeze, which could hurt the yield on certain crops, such as cotton.

AT FIRST, WE THOUGHT that the fact that outspoken anti-communist representative MacDonald was aboard the Korean 007 airliner which was shot down by the Russians had to be a matter of coincidence.

You just don't expect that an enemy, no matter how athestic, would shoot down an airliner carrying 269 people just to get rid of one anti-communist.

But at least one letter-writer to the Amarillo Sunday News-Globe begs to differ. We quote herewith excerpts from a letter by Bradley Upton of Solano, New Mexico:

"The fact that they had to kill 268 others to get him meant nothing to a murdering bunch of thugs that have murdered 144 million people all over the world. It probably didn't bother their conscience one bit.

"Rep. MacDonald was chairman of the ultra conservative, pro-American, anti-communist John Birch Society. Getting the head man out of the most anti-communist group in the world may have looked like a good idea to them. Hopefully, the idea will blow up in their faces."

Did the Russians shoot down the airliner just to get one individual, who dared to oppose them and all they stood for?

It's hard for Americans, raised in a God-fearing atmosphere, to accept such a premise, but if you consider the communist angle, where the "ends" supposedly justify the "means," then we suppose this might not be such a far-out charge.

The world may never know all of the facts surrounding the mysterious downing of the Korean airliner. In fact, it might be shocking to a large number of people if they did know

the details. But the fact remains that it's a tragic affair anytime a group of peaceful citizens, including women and children, are killed, for no worse a crime than the airliner getting off course and over the Russians' air space.



Rocha Is Winner In Football Picks

Raymond Rocha, Jr. was the winner in the third week of the Bovina Businesses Football Contest. Rocha was one of four contestants correctly picking 11 games for the week.

The top three places were determined through the tie-breaker score.

Using the term "close" on the tiebreaker is somewhat of a misnomer, since Rocha missed the Bovina-Morton score by 35 points. But he was closest of those in the running for cash prizes. He picked the score at Morton 36, Bovina 16.

Second place went to Bobby Cumpton, whose tie-breaker guess of 28-12 was 39 points away from the score. Third place went to Marie Pesch, whose score prediction of 14-12 missed by 43 points. Morton whitewashed the Mustangs, 55-0.

'Effie Mae Shepherd was the fourth contestant to correctly pick 11 games, but missed the tie-breaker by 62 points, picking it 21-1.

Two games on the contest lineup were unusual. One was number eight, which was listed as TCU vs Kansas. Since the game should have been TCU vs Kansas STATE, this game was given to all contestants. TCU and

Kansas had played a week earlier.

The UCLA-Arizona State game ended in a 16-16 tie, and was automatically counted wrong on each entry, since technically it is possible to pick a tie in the contest. So every contestant had an automatic wrong game, plus one right.

The top three contestants missed the same three games. In addition to the tie ball game, they missed Notre Dame-Michigan State, and Oklahoma-Ohio State. These college games stumped a majority of the contestants.

The pro games turned out mainly the way they were picked, although contestants stumbled over the high school lineup to some extent.

With her score of 11, Marie Pesch took over the contest lead in the race for grand prize, with a score of 31.

She replaced Lynn Read at the top of the list. Read managed a score of nine for the week, and holds down second place all to himself.

City Asks Cooperation In Street Paving Job

Bovina's City Council, after considering bids on seal-coating city streets, decided to reject the bids, and plans to do the seal-coating job

themselves. Total cost of the job, if contracted, would be about \$17,520, and it should amount to about half this figure if the city does the job themselves, according to a spokesman.

Agri-Sprayers has donated the use of equipment for the paving job.

It is planned to do the north and south streets first. Shoulders will have a layer of sealer applied, and then on the next go-around, the center of the streets will be paved, and the shoulders will then receive a second coat.

Hopefully, the work will be completed in a short time, although the work has to be done when temperatures are 65 or above.

The city asks that residents park their cars in parking lots and in driveways and not in the streets during the time the paving is being done, so work can be accomplished without interruption.

The sealant will be sticky and can be tracked into homes and buildings, so residents are cautioned not to step on the paving.

The city asks everyone's patience and cooperation with the employees doing the work.

County Receives Road Work Grant

Texas Treasurer Ann Richards is sending checks today totalling \$7.3 million in grants to the state's 254 counties for road construction and

maintenance projects. The 27 counties in the Panhandle area are receiving a total of \$500,000.

The State Treasurer each year disburses money appropriated by the legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used by counties for the purchase of right-ofway and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farmto-market roads or state highways.

Richards said the \$7.3 million is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road

Bovina's Mustangs were licking their wounds and were hoping to bounce back from a 55-0 setback they suffered last Friday at the hands of the Morton Indians.

"Our challenge is to get our respect back as a team, and that's what we're setting out to do," said Mustang Coach Larry Helton this week.

Helton said that the team had a good practice on Monday, and that he felt they could bounce back, mentally. The only problem is that the team has been hit a considerable blow by illness and injury. Six varsity players are out of action, and members of the junior varsity are being moved up to fill the gaps.

"We'll probably be starting one freshman plus some sophomores against Dexter. We just don't have any depth," Helton moaned. It is recalled that in the team's win over Amherst, the varsity had only 13 players suited up and available.

Varsity members currently sidelined include Terry Moore, out due to a concussion; Tommy Hutto, who sustained a strained neck; Terry Glasscock, out with an illness; Doug Johnson, who sustained a fractured ankle against Morton; Alfredo Marquez, who suffered a knee injury, and Roy Lumbrera, who received a dislocated knee.

In addition, the junior varsity lost Juan Gonzales, who was playing some great football, with a dislocated shoulder.

"Morton was playing well, and we weren't. I didn't see any 'cheap' shots, it was just a tough, physical game," Helton said. The Indians now

City Receives Sales Tax For September

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$41.1 million in local sales tax payments to the 974 cities that levy the one per cent city sales tax.

The City of Bovina received a check for \$1,500.64 for the period, which was up from the check for \$1,472.35 for the same period in 1982. For the year, the city has received \$16,128.70, which is about \$1,000 less than it had received totally to this point in 1982.

Parmer County's three municipalities received \$7,353.92 for the current period, which was down from the figure of \$8,223.52 of a year earlier. The county's total receipts for the year stands at \$102,933, down 2.1 per cent from the total at the same time in 1982, or \$105,155.

"Last September, we were reporting the biggest allocation based on a single month's tax collections in the history of our state," Bullock said. "This month, with sales tax receipts running about one per cent behind last year, shows us just how fast things can change."

Houston received the largest check--\$7.2 million--bringing that city's nine-month 1983 total to \$102.7 million, 10 per cent below the same period last year. Dallas' check was \$5.2 million, for a \$62.8 million yearly total, up 6 per cent. San Antonio received \$2.5 million, making its yearly total \$31.1 million,

Austin's September payment of \$1.6 million pushed its total to \$20.6 million, a 14 per cent gain from last year. Fort Worth's check for \$1.2 million brought that city's 1983 total to \$19.6 million, up more than 4 per

an 8 per cent increase.

El Paso received \$1 million for a year's total of \$11.6 million, a drop of 8 per cent.

Bullock also sent checks to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA payment was \$8.9 million, bringing the 1983 total to \$117.4 million. San Antonio's MTA check was for \$1.2 million for a 1983 total of \$17.1 million, up more than 9 per cent from

1982. September checks were for taxes collected on sales made in July and reported to the Comptroller by the end of August.
