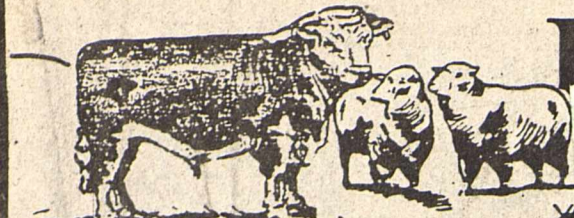

Longer deer hunting season authorized

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has authorized a longer season for white-tailed and mule deer as well as a number of other regulation changes for the 1988-89 hunting season.

The changes, adopted in a public hearing in Austin May 12 will go into effect September 1, 1988.

In most of Texas, the white-tail deer season will open on the first Saturday in November (November 5), which is one week earlier than in the past, and close on the first Sunday in January (January 1). In South Texas, one week is added to the end of the season. The dates are November 12-January 8.

The commission also authorized lengthening of the mule deer season in both the Trans-Pecos and Panhandle regions, from nine to sixteen days. Opening days in both regions will be the same as in the past, with the extra days added to the end of the season. The dates are November 19-December 4 in the Panhandle and November 26-December 11 in the Trans-Pecos.

The commission authorized a change in the requirement for retaining the head of antlerless deer

with the carcass until it reaches the final destination. Certification from the landowner stating the sex of the deer will be sufficient to establish the animal's sex.

Several minor changes were made for turkey hunting. As in the past, the fall season for Rio Grande turkeys will run concurrently with the white-tail deer season. The spring 1989 season will be basically unchanged, April 1-23 in most of the state and April 1-16 in

East Texas counties where a season for hunting eastern turkeys is authorized.

Quail bag limits, which in the past have been set during August after summer counts are completed, will be fifteen birds per day, forty-five in possession statewide. The season will be October 29, 1988 through February 26, 1989. The chachalaca season was set concurrently with the quail season to increase hunter participation.

What is Up with People?

There are five touring casts consisting of about 125 students and staff members. In the twenty years of Up with People's existence more than 10,000 students from fifty-four nations have participated in this one year educational and community service program.

More important than the basic facts of the organization are the stories and histories of those who participate. Up with People has a motto that states "We make places People" and that's where our experiences and education are gained.

The Advance Team consisting of Abbie Montoya from La Puente, California and Jorgen Karlsson from Ostersund, Sweden arrived in Sonora this past Sunday. They will spend the next weeks arranging for host families for the cast during

Cast E 1988, will be arriving into Sonora on June 8 and performing on June 9. This visit is special because fifteen different countries will be represented as well as twenty-five states in the United States. Fifty-five percent of the cast are non-U.S. students, a first in the Up with People history. In this group of highly motivated young adults are some unique individuals.

Some of the cast members you may expect to see are:

Mitsuyo Takagi, 22 years old, comes from Osaka, Japan. She has attended college in the area of American English. She hopes to be a tour guide for people visiting Japan. Most recently, she earned a lot of her tuition for Up with People working as an Investment Broker on the Japanese Securities

Exchange. This year some of her goals are to improve her English and share the Japanese culture wherever she goes.

Johan Karlsson of Kungsbacka, Sweden is a 23 year old accomplished musician. He began with the clarinet at a very young age and then moved to saxophone, flute and keyboards. He has studied music for ten years at a music school, served fifteen months in the military as an Infantry Platoon Chief, studied two years of economics in college, and worked for Volvo for three years. He spends all of his free time playing in bands and hopes to be a Musical Tour Manager some day. He can be seen in the Up with People show with his saxophone most of the time.

Pete Taylor, 26, is a native of Billings, Montana. He has always had a dream to take a bicycle trip across part of the United States. He combined that dream with a fundraising idea to raise over \$2,000 for his Up with People tuition. After getting posters printed and local sponsors, Pete steered out and rode 2043 miles from Billings to Vancouver, B.C. and back. He averaged 107 miles per day on his trip and says, "It was definitely worth the trip!"

Indictments handed down

The Fall Term of the Sutton County Grand Jury met on April 25, 1988 and returned two indictments. The indictments charged Earnest Lykins, Jr. with misapplication of fiduciary property and forgery. Both charges are third degree felonies.

On May 18, 1988, the Spring Term of the Sutton County Grand Jury met and also returned two indictments. Ronny Craddock was named in one indictment and charged with the offense of aggravated theft, a third degree felony. Also named in an indictment was Ramiro Buitron charged with the offense of felony driving while intoxicated.

Upon a finding of guilty, a third degree felony subjects a defendant to a penalty of two to ten years years in the Texas Department of Corrections and a fine of up to \$5,000.00. A felony driving while intoxicated is punishable by sixty days to five years in the Texas Department of Corrections and a

Webster stated the arrest stemmed from Craddock receiving some stolen guns that were taken in house burglaries in the Dallas area.

Craddock was arrested, charged and released on a \$10,000.00 Personal Recognizant Bond.

The Sutton County Sheriff's Office is working with the Texas Rangers and a Dallas area Task Force consisting of the DPS, Dallas Police Department, and Dallas area police departments in the investigation of house burglaries in the Dallas Metroplex area.

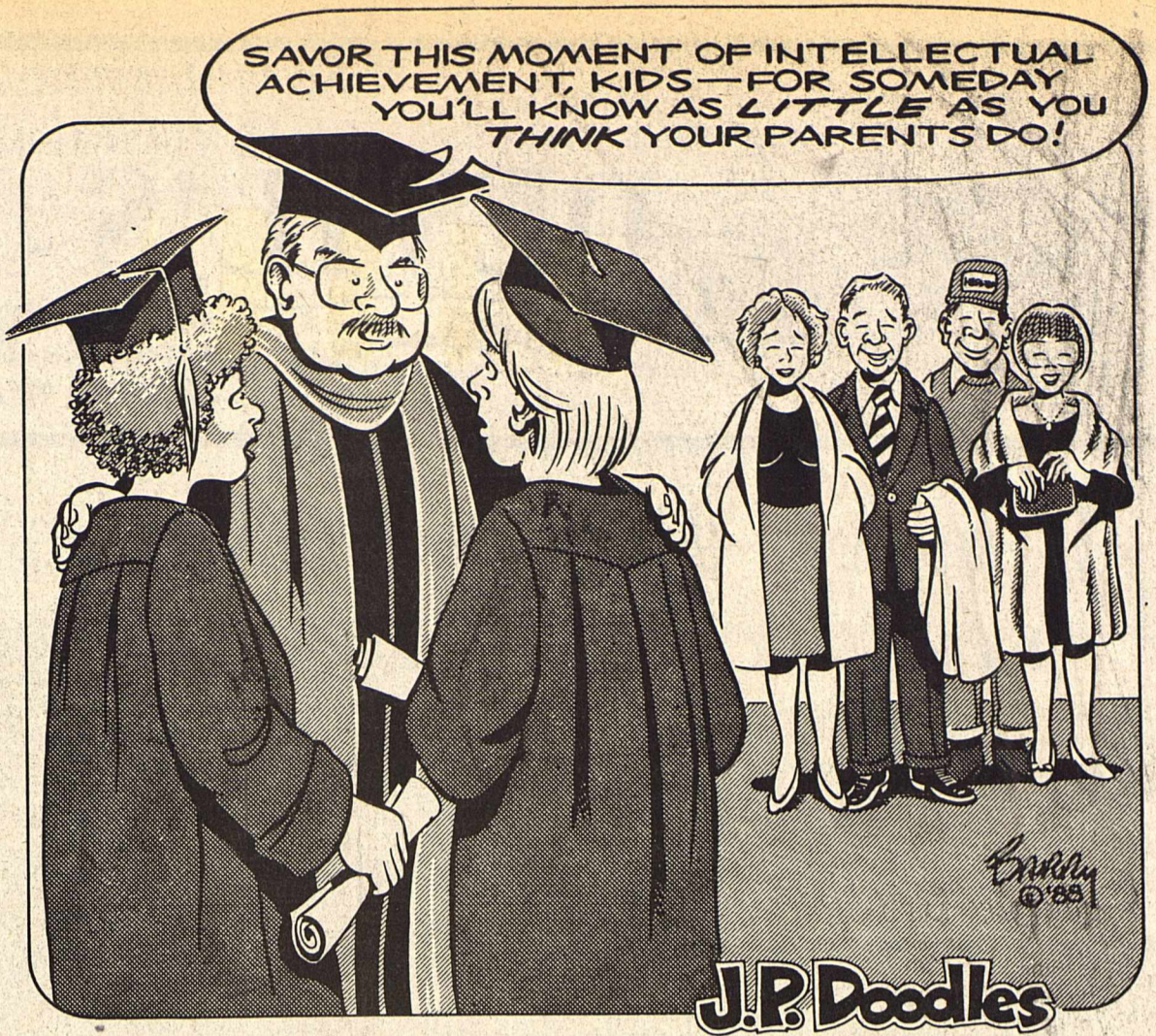

ONE MAN'S OPINION

One notes, with a great deal of apprehension, the television shorts pointing out the great benefits the union have delivered to the American people. The sense of apprehension is derived from the possible answer to the question; "Is the Texas working man about to give up his right-to-work laws in favor of closed shops?"

The union television blips, it must be conceded, present a rosy picture, but like most roses, that picture is supported by a plant with a heckuva bunch of big thorns. The union ads omit the thorns completely so it might be well before we embrace the plant to give a cursory look at those thorns.

The union closed shops, even today through control of their apprentice programs, provide a fertile platform for perpetuation of discrimination within the structure

of existing law. A second thorn is the economic leverage and vast cash accumulation which provide such a lure to organized crime has taken over several unions and through those unions, several (hundred ?) businesses.

It must be conceded that the early unions were needed to control the greed of management and owners. Once labor laws were in place, however the superimposition of annual percentage wage and benefit package increases on the price of our products (for the same of less production) threatened a gigantic economic slump in the post World War II era.

Still stinging from the 1929 slump we, to cope with the hungry unions and still sell our products on the world market, adopted what is known as a "poison pill" in the takeover financial world today. The

plan showed the typical characteristics of our deeper endeavors.

Our poison-pill was a plan to boost our overseas sales by a simple expedient—that of giving our customers the money to buy our products. If you believe the Marshal Plan was charity, naivety is far from dead—be extremely cautious about salesmen selling toll rights on Brooklyn Bridge.

The plan certainly was an improperly supervised, badly conceived flop. The money was taken (adding to our national debt) followed by a flood of German sales personnel and the post war German boom. I supposed we were lucky because to placate the unions we dissipated our internal resources and put us in a position where we cannot afford the schizophrenic Congressional activity.

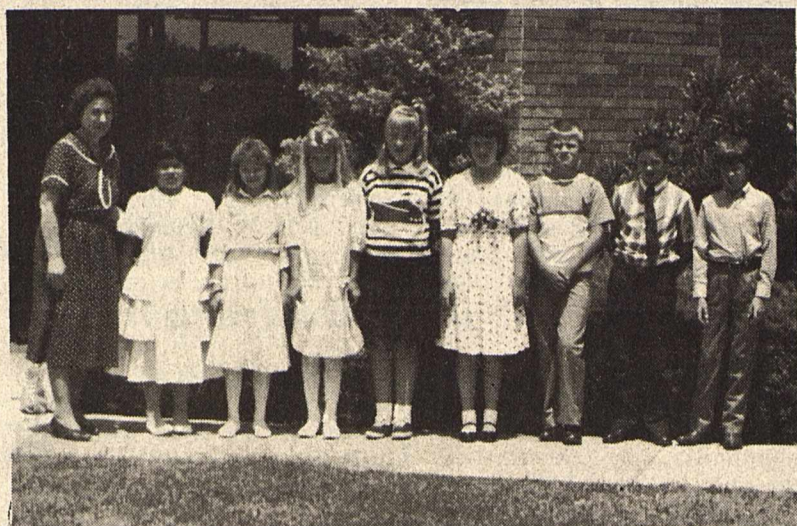

Dear Betty Crocker

Q. How does cream of tartar affect beaten egg whites for meringues? J.B., Bonham, Tx.

A. Cream of tartar stabilizes the foam and contributes to maximum whiteness of a meringue.

Q. How can brown sugar be softened? M.S., Reno, NV

A. Place half an apple or the heel from a loaf of fresh bread with the sugar in an airtight container and refrigerate for two to three days. To soften immediately, heat (250 to 300 degree oven), uncovered, in an ovenproof container for a few seconds.

Or soften brown sugar in microwave oven. Place in microwave-proof bowl. Cover tightly. Cook at 100% (high)

checking every 30 seconds until softened.

Q. What's the difference between pancake mix and biscuit mix? Are they interchangeable? J.F., Cleveland, OH

A. The shortening and leavening are similar, but pancake mix is usually sweetened and a mixture of corn flour and lower protein wheat flour. Biscuit mix is made from higher protein wheat flour. For preparation, biscuit mix biscuits need only liquid added. Some pancake mixes call for eggs and oil, as well as liquid.

Pancakes can be made from biscuit mix by adding eggs along with additional liquid. We don't recommend making biscuits from pancake mix.

Kidney stones

The kidneys are among the several organs in the body where stones are apt to form. A kidney stone normally begins as a tiny speck of solid material deposited in the middle of the kidney. As more material clings to the first speck, it gradually builds into a solid object. Kidney stones too big to pass from the kidney may cause no symptoms. However, the most common symptom of troublesome kidney stones is called "colic." This is a stabbing pain that tends to come in waves often a few minutes apart. The patient with an attack of renal colic should have the doctor refer him to the hospital for tests to determine further treatment.

Even with standard diet therapy, some person will persist in passing many and painful kidney stones. At this point, other measures should be considered. It is most important to keep your doctor informed and have regular check-ups. Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital, 308 Hudspeth, is dedicated to serving area residents with quality medical care, 24 hours a day. X-ray and laboratory services are available. Tel. 387-2521.

Those who tend to suffer from kidney stones should visit the doctor at six-month intervals to check for permanent damage to the kidneys.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Bad checks limited

People who delay applying for Social Security retirement or survivor benefits for some time after they become eligible may miss out on some checks, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

This is because the number of months for which back payments can be made is limited.

In general, people who apply for retirement or survivor benefits after they reach 65 can get back benefits for up to 6 months before the month they apply, but not before the month of their 65th birthday.

People who apply for reduced benefits before 65 generally cannot get benefits for any month before the month they apply.

People who apply for benefits because they are disabled--worker, adult children, widows, widowers--

can get benefits for up to 12 months before the month they apply if they are eligible in all other ways.

People can save time when they do apply for benefits if they have the necessary documents ready, Upp said. This includes the person's Social Security card or record of the number, birth or baptismal certificates, W-2 forms or self-employment tax return for the past year, and marriage and death certificates, if appropriate.

More information about applying for benefits can be obtained at the San Angelo Social Security Office located at 2214 Sherwood Way. The telephone number is 949-4608. The people there can suggest other documents if those listed are not available.

Local 4-Her attends 58th National 4-H Conference

Heather Bunkley attended the 58th National 4-H Conference in Washington, D.C. during the week of April 17-23. 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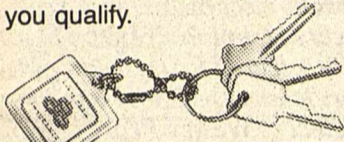

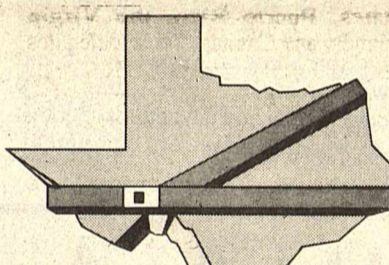

Controlling asthma attacks triggered by allergies

When you have an allergy attack, it is hard for you to breathe? Do you have a tight feeling in the chest and wheeze? If so, chances are you might have more than an allergy, says the Texas Medical Association.

Asthma is a chronic illness marked by periodic attacks of wheezing and difficult breathing. Allergies trigger most asthma attacks. Pollen, cat or dog skin particles, mites in house dust, cigarette smoke, and some foodstuff may cause allergic reactions.

If you have asthma, there are things you can do to help control attacks. First of all, identify the allergen or irritant that triggers the attack.

When do you have asthma attacks? If you have attacks mainly once a year, you may be allergic to pollen grains.

Do attacks occur more often on certain days of the week than on others? If so, this might suggest exposure to allergens at places you may be on certain days of each week, such as work or recreational areas.

Is your asthma worse in only one room of the house? If so, the culprit may be mites in house dust or hair or feathers from a pet.

A drug, food, or drink also may be the cause.

To test your ideas of what may be causing you asthma attacks, keep records of how often the attacks occur, how severe they are, and whether they occur while exposed to the suspected irritant. Your doctor also can give you allergy tests to help identify the irritant.

Once the allergen is identified, the best treatment is to avoid it. In addition to this, your doctor may prescribe medication or recommend some other form of treatment.

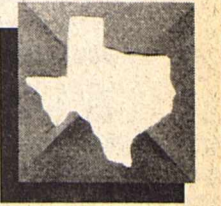


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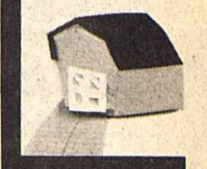
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Heaviest toll on heart and blood vessels Why cigarette smoking is bad for your heart

The Surgeon General of the United States isn't just blowing smoke when he warns that cigarettes are bad for your health. Researchers now tell us that while smoking can certainly cause lung disease, cigarettes take their

heaviest toll on the heart and blood vessels. What many patients and consumers do not understand, however, is just what harm cigarettes can do to the heart.

Lighting a cigarette releases carbon monoxide in the burning process and this displaces some of

the oxygen in the blood, which in turn decreases the oxygen supply to the heart. Smoking also has an injurious effect on the walls of the arteries leading from the heart. At each arterial injury site, the body tries to compensate by sending platelets to repair the damage, where they accumulate and pave the way for atherosclerosis.

Nicotine, found in tobacco, is a stimulant that raises the heart rate and blood pressure, which makes the heart work harder and increases its oxygen needs. Nicotine is also a blood vessel constrictor and can decrease blood flow. The more you smoke, the more oxygen your heart needs, the less it gets; it is a vicious cycle.

If the lungs have been damaged for years of smoking, the right side of the heart has to pump more force to get the blood through the lungs; this enlarges that part of the heart.

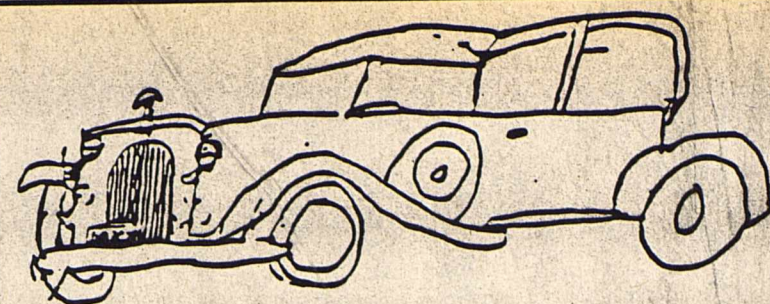
Smoking affects cholesterol levels, too. There are two kinds of cholesterol-protein compounds that researchers agree impact on a person's risk of developing cardiovascular disease. The low-density lipoproteins (LDL's) carry much of the body's cholesterol back to the liver for digestion which helps get rid of the excess. Recent studies indicate that smoking reduces the level of the protective HDL; thereby

compounding the threat of atherosclerosis, high blood pressure, and reduced flow of oxygen to the heart muscle itself.

Of the three major risk factors for cardiovascular disease, smoking should be the easiest to control. For a long-time smoker, however, quitting can be quite a challenge. It will take support from loved ones and a real commitment to reducing the risk of heart attack. The damage caused by years of lighting up may not necessarily be permanent. Studies of former smokers have shown that after about five years, their bodies are where they would be if they had never smoked. Even the HDL levels return to normal about a year after a smoker kicks the habit.

Analyze your smoking patterns; when are you most likely to light up? Set realistic goals to cut down on the amount of cigarettes you smoke each day, until you are able to quit entirely. Don't set yourself up for failure by brooding about never smoking again; take each day at a time. If you can't do it by yourself with the support of your loved ones, get help. There are medically supervised clinics and support groups for those who want to kick the habit.

Whatever it takes, give your heart a chance by making the decision to keep your life from going up in smoke.
