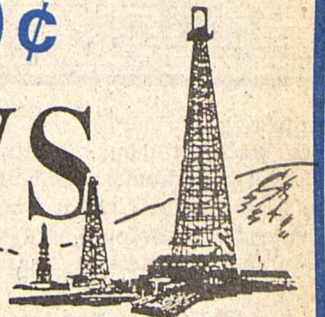

Sutton County Day goes got a very warm reception in Sonora for the Friday and Saturday event with temperatures in the high 90's.

Festivities got underway Friday with a parade featuring over fifty individual entries from Menard, Ozona and San Angelo as well as from Sonora.

For the third year in a row, the first place winner of the parade was the float entered by Lillian M. Hudspeth Nursing Home. Showing that for everything there is a season, the float symbolized the four seasons of life through the four seasons of the year with five generations of the Brotherton family.

Second place in the parade was awarded to the Class of '78 with the Sonora High School Cheerleaders winning third.

Immediately following the parade, the Chamber of Commerce barbecue on the Courthouse lawn. Several thousand persons milled over the Courthouse lawn Saturday looking at various crafts, eating lots of food and participating in the many games and events.

Selected as Little Miss/Mr. Sutton County were Ashley Parker and Seth Prather. Ashley is the three and a half year old daughter of Guy and Latricia Parker. Three year old Seth is the son of Allan and Patti Prather.

Winners of the Sutton County Centennial Belt Buckle contest, sponsored by the Sutton County Historical Society were announced with Chris Jones winning first, Ron Nicolas, second and Luis Gonzales, third.

Stealing the hearts of those in attendance at the Covered Wagon Dinner Theater stage were ten year

old Julie Carpenter and six year old Jake Wyatt, both of San Angelo as they presented some good "old-time" fiddle music.

Julie was selected as the 1988 National Champion for Country Music Beginners at the 17th Annual Fiddler's Jamboree held in Smithville, Tennessee recently.

The six finalists for Miss Sutton County 1988 were announced early in the afternoon. The selection of the finalists is based on rodeo ticket sales and included Traci Teaff, Vicky Anderson, Christi Spain, Brandy Wallace, Donna Varner, and Raina Newbury. 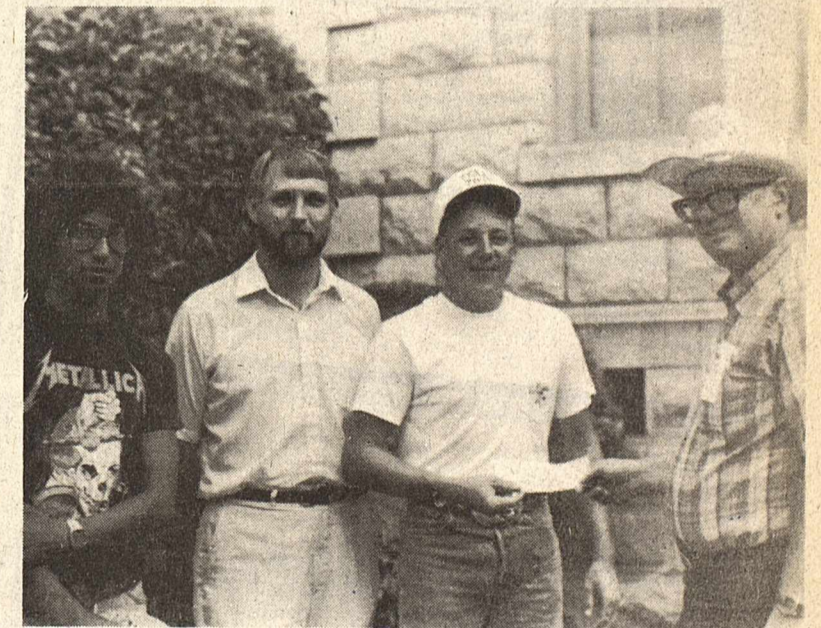

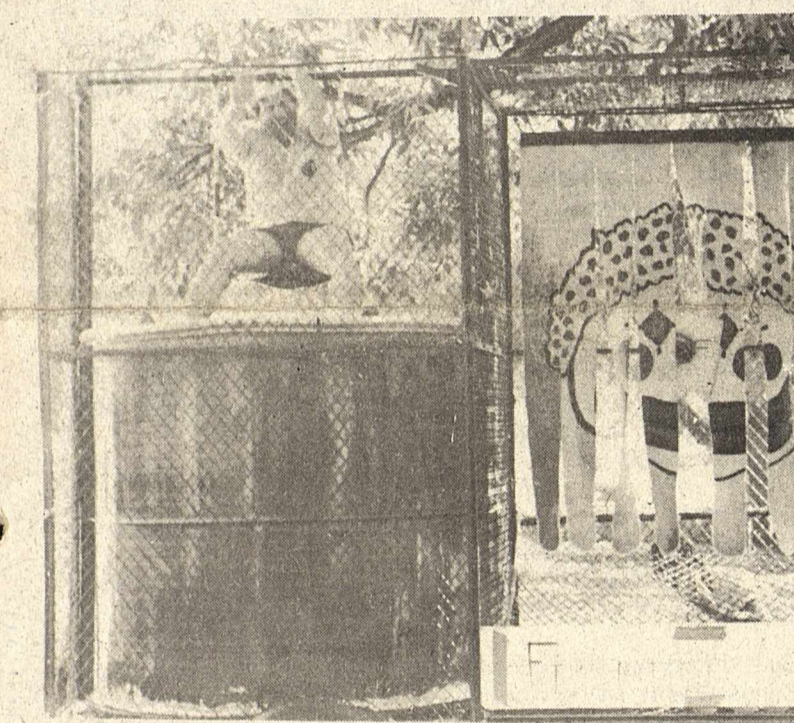

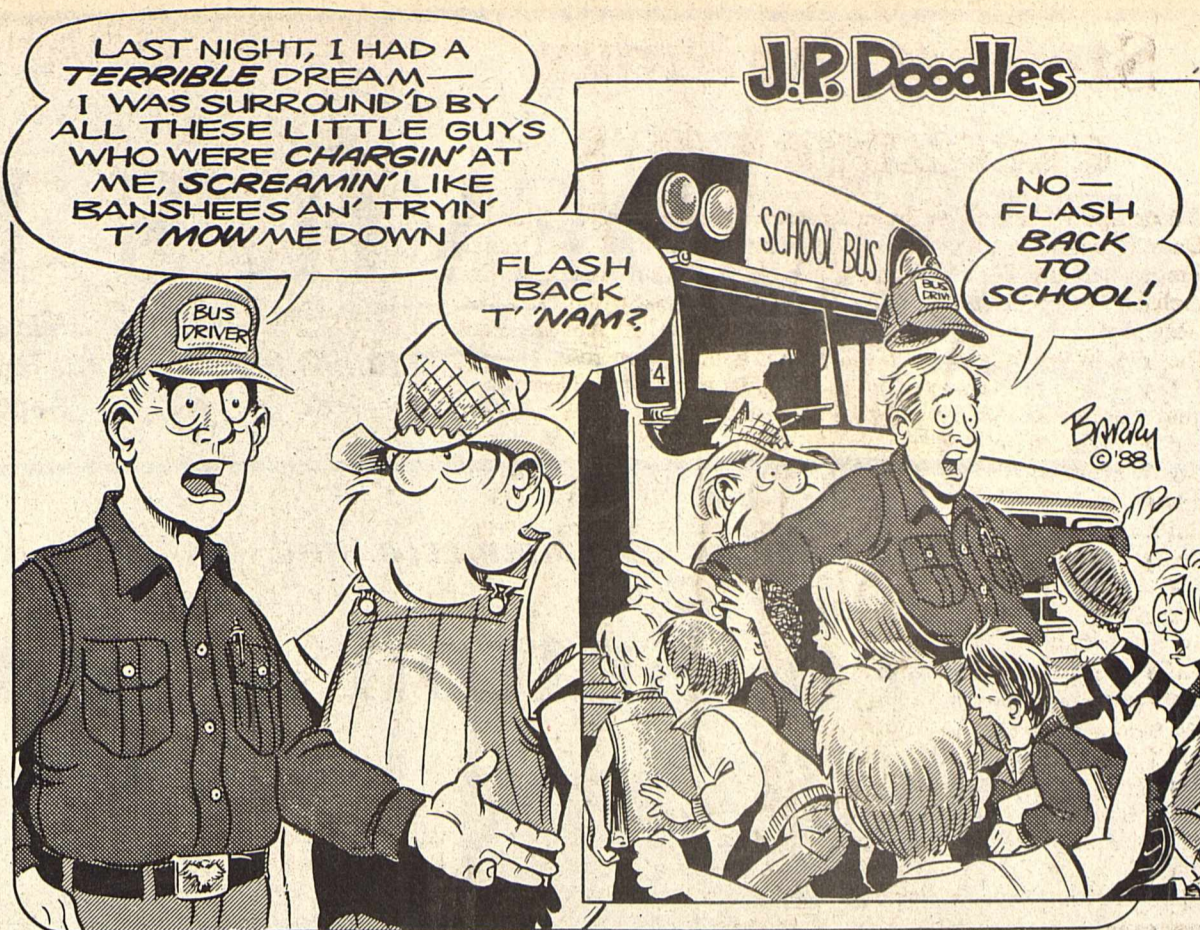
1988 Projections Available

Mark Twain once told a friend of his that each time he submitted a book manuscript to a publisher he said a prayer that the book would be banned by some national group. Nothing, he declared, could do more to guarantee the book's sales success. We have had one recent demonstration of Twain's axiom and a second one is on the horizon.

Common decency demands that the producers of "The Last Temptation of Christ" send free passes to the protestors of the movie with double passes to those protestors who have not seen the movie. Those are unquestionably deserved and well earned benefits.

The movie; two-hours and forty-three minutes of mind-sullying drivel which beyond the title has no basis in scripture, would need a tall step-ladder to reach the lower limits of grade "B". 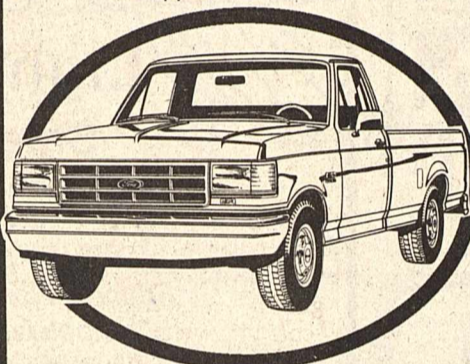
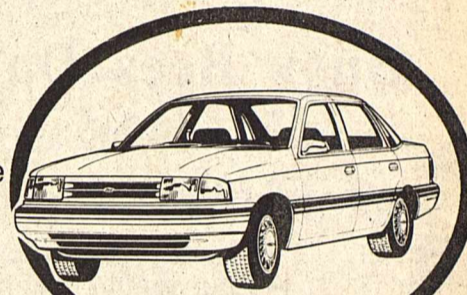

'SELF' CONTROL

Do you know the real truth about you? Are you a hero, or a coward? Are you intelligent, or ignorant? Good looking, or ugly? In personal relationships are you giver, a taker, or both?
"Why? Are there good reasons for these beliefs? Why do you still believe these things, if there are no good reasons?"
If you have undesirable elements

in your behavior and negative ideas, opinions and beliefs about yourself, do something about it. In this respect you are solely responsible for you.

The tools necessary for changing your behavior and self-image are desire, truth, imagination and positive thinking. You must have the desire to improve your 'self,' to examine the very core of You; to find the real You.

You must be truthful with yourself concerning both the positive and negative attributes of your personality.

Why is this?

HOME EC BRIEFS

Are you spending to meet hidden needs?

If you chronically short of money, even on an adequate income, part of the problem could be "hidden needs" that motivate you to overspend.

Try this self-test to identify needs that are often satisfied by spending. Begin by thinking back to the last few times you bought something that, upon reflection, wasn't a necessity. Then answer these questions:

Did I buy it because it made me feel better?

Did I buy it to show my independence?

Was I rewarding myself?

Did I buy it because I felt frustrated?

Did I spend money to get even with someone?

Did I buy it to make me feel equal to or better than someone else?

Did spending the money given me a feeling of power?

Did I buy it because I wanted to wear the latest fashion or have the newest model?

Did I buy it simply because I enjoy spending money?

Did I buy it because I enjoy the activity of shopping and then feel obligated to spend?

Did I allow myself to be pressured into buying it by my child, spouse, or friend or a salesperson?

Am I basically a collector?

Do I get pleasure just from owning an item, whether or not it's needed or useful?

Once you know why you're spending, you can find other ways to meet your needs. If you love the activity of shopping, for example, you don't have to give it up. Just leave your checkbook and credit cards at home before you go to the shops.

When you spend out of frustration, anger or happiness, try to find some other way to express your emotions. Physical activity may help you vent steam just as easily, and be a lot less expensive.

*provide assurance to consumers that Certified Home Economists are well prepared for professional practice;

*distinguished qualified professional home economists from those who do not meet professional requirements;

*foster more uniform standards of good practice in home economics;

*encourage increased continuing education within the profession;

*assist employers in recruitment

and selection of home economists; and

*enhance professionalism within the field of home economics through increasing accountability to other professionals and the public.

Micki is one of over 14,500 home economists certified in the U.S. since the effort began in late 1986.

The certification of home economists is noteworthy because as a field of professional practice, home economics is diverse, touching the lives of several million persons every year. Home economists can be found in business, government, industry, education, research, human services and more.

By becoming a Certified Home Economist (C.H.E.) a practitioner established that they have attained a measurable level of professional competence and are committed to continuing development within their field of expertise. To remain certified, a C.H.E. must complete 75 approved Professional Development Units (PDU's) in a three-year period.

Several of Micki's career highlights include:

A native of Custer, Oklahoma, Miller holds a bachelor of science degree in Home Economics Education and Community Services from Oklahoma State University.

Micki is a member of Texas Association of Extension Home Economists and was named the "Outstanding New Professional" by the association.

BREAST CANCER DETECTION UNIT AVAILABLE TO AREA WOMEN

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent five year survival rate and a 90 percent ten year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer even before it can be felt.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Sonora on Wednesday, September 14. Appoint-

ments may be made by calling 387-2521.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease.) These guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35-40 years of age-One baseline Mammogram.
2. 40-50 years of age-A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
3. 50 years of age and over-An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
4. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant risk factors should be examined as appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast can-

cer and family history of cancer.

5. Asymptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an X-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental X-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, VISA, MasterCard and American Express.

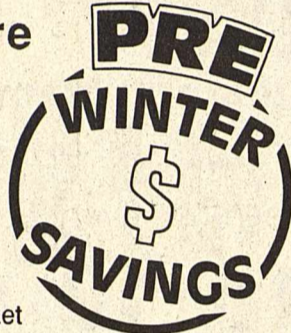

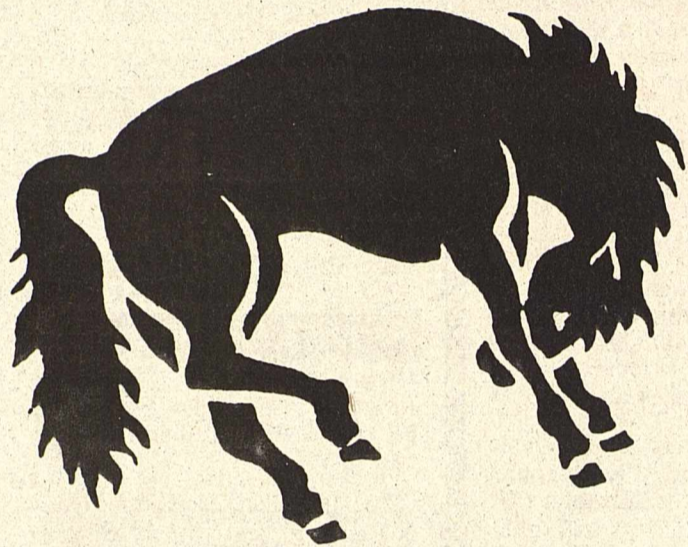

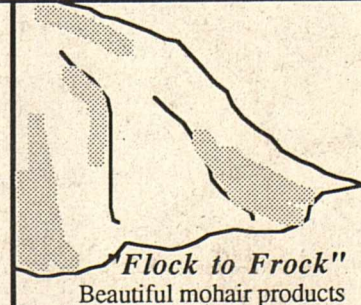
