Blade To Skip Dec. 28 Issue


The Bovina Blade, which is publishing a larger than usual holiday issue this week, will not publish next Wednesday, December 28.

The Blade office will be closed until January 3, so that staff members may be with their families for Christmas. The next issue of the paper will be



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

Fillies Are Champions In Farwell Tourney

Bovina High School's Fillies won the championship of the Farwell Invitational Tournament last weekend, sweeping to three impressive victories, and running their season record to 10-2 in the process.

The Fillies bombed Adrian, 64-43 in the opening round, handled Texico, 50-35 in the semi-finals, and then downed a tough Friona team, 44-41 in the finals. It was Bovina's second win over Friona during the week, as the Fillies had edged the Squaws, 47-44 in a game at Bovina on Tuesday.

In the opening tournament game, Marie Pesch had a field day, scoring 13 field goals and sinking five of eight from the free throw line for 31 points. Eight members of the team got in on the scoring act. Sonya Mayfield was runnerup with nine points.

The Fillies stretched a 29-20 halftime lead to 48-30 after three quarters, and won easily.

Miss Pesch scored seven first quarter points as the team jumped ahead of Texico, 14-8 in their semifinal game.

It was still a fairly close game, 35-28, going into the final quarter, but in that period, the Fillies outscored the Wolverines, 15-7 to stretch their margin of victory. Miss Pesch with 13 and Miss Mayfield with 12 led the scoring.

Sonya Mayfield scored three baskets and Marie Pesch five points, as the Fillies took an 11-8 lead over Friona in the tournament finals Saturday.

The Fillies and Squaws matched basket for basket in the second

Fillies to a 14-10 edge which hiked their lead to 36-29.

Friona rallied in the final quarter, outscoring the Fillies, 12-8, to pull close, but could never take the lead. Marie Pesch finished up with four fouls and 20 points. The Squaws' big girl, Wennetter Jackson, had 17.

The tournament final was practically a replay of the Fillies-Squaws regular season game on Tuesday at the Bovina gym, in which the Fillies held quarter leads of 12-8, 25-17 and 39-34.

Friona had a big finish, outscoring the Fillies, 20-8 behind the shooting of Miss Jackson, who claimed game scoring honors with 24 points, but once again the Squaws came up three points short. Sonya Mayfield paced the Fillies with 15 points.

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Changes Are Proposed For DWI Convictions

A minimum jail term is mandatory for any person convicted two or more times for DWI under a stricter Texas law effective January 1, 1984.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director and chairman of the task force which recommended tougher DWI legislation, said the new law should close the back door in the criminal justice system for repeat offenders.

"Deferred adjudication, which allowed repeat violators to wipe the slate clean after each DWI arrest, will be eliminated under this new statute," Adams pointed out. "Even if probation is given, a conviction record will be established for the offender and this record can be used in subsequent prosecution of any additional drunk driving charges. Jail time is mandatory as a condition of probation beginning with the second DWI conviction."

The new law provides increased penalties for DWI convictions. Conviction on first offense DWI carries a fine of \$100 to \$2,000 with a jail term ranging from 72 hours to two years. A second offense conviction is punishable by jail time ranging from a minimum of 15 days up to two years with a fine of \$300 to \$2,000. Conviction for third and subsequent DWI offenses carry a fine of \$500 to \$2,000 and confinement in jail for a minimum of 30 days to two years or in the state penitentiary for 60 days to five years.

Minimum terms of confinement are increased by 60 days and fine limits are raised by \$500 if the DWI offense results in serious bodily injury to another person. If a drunk driver is found to be responsible for a traffic fatality, the law prescribes a mandatory term for the violator.

chemical test. The refusal also will be admissible evidence in the driver's trial. The drunk driver's vehicle may be confiscated and sold upon the fourth DWI conviction.

The DPS director predicted that the statute will help deter DWI violations and provide the means to identify repeat offenders.

"Despite increased DWI arrests and enhanced public awareness about this problem, far too many people still believe that there are no unfavorable consequences to drunk driving," Adams said. "Texas law enforcement agencies do not have enough resources to adequately police all streets and highways. However, when these changes in the DWI law take effect, drunk drivers who are detected can count on being punished in a meaningful fashion. This should help discourage drunk driving," concluded Adams.

The Ponies trimmed Adrian, 64-57 in the opening round, before falling to Texico, N.M., 66-64 in the semis. Bovina bounced back to top Friona, 70-62 in the trophy game.

Earlier in the week, the Mustangs had beaten Friona, 64-59 in a regular game. The 3-1 week left Bovina with a fine 10-2 mark for the season, one of the top conference AA records in the area.

The Mustangs avenged one of their setbacks with the win over Adrian, which had downed the Ponies a week court.

Adrian held the lead after one quarter, 14-10, but Richard Shepherd, back in the lineup after missing a pair of games, hit ten points by himself, as the Mustangs overtook their adversaries and led at the half, 31-29.

It was 45-43 going into the final quarter. One of Adrian's starters fouled out of the game. Shepherd led Bovina with 24 points, and cousin Michael Shepherd tallied 15.

The Mustangs led Texico, 15-10, and 33-30, before falling behind in the third quarter. The lead changed hands several times, and was tied, 64all, at the end of regulation play.

Terry Tubbs scored a pair of free throws for Texico in the overtime, and that was to be all the scoring, as the Wolverines scored a 66-64 upset win. Richard Shepherd scored 22 points and Michael Shepherd 15.

In the third place game, Friona held leads of 14-12 and 35-31 before the Mustangs came back for a good third quarter to overtake the Chieftains and forge into a 48-47 lead at the end of the quarter.

The fourth quarter was a barnburner. The lead swapped hands a few times, before the Mustangs took control and took it for good. Michael Shepherd was the leading scorer with 21 points, followed closely by Richard Shepherd with 19.

In the December 13 meeting with Friona, the Mustangs faced the Chieftains without Richard

and 16 points respectively.

The Mustangs had to with-stand a fourth-quarter rally, in which the Chiefs outscored them, 23-16 to make it a closer game.

Adams said the revised DWI statute will aid in the prosecution of drunk drivers.

"Under the present law, a person is only presumed to be intoxicated if tests reveal a blood alcohol concentration of .10 per cent or more," Adams said. "The new law establishes that a driver is definitely too drunk to drive at the .10 per cent level."

The revised statute also contains provisions for automatic 90-day suspension of driving privileges for refusal to submit to an alcohol

Jeanne and Bo are special to us as they are to many of you and we wish them much happiness during the holidays and send our love.




Joneses Attend Niece's Funeral In Terrill, Tex.

were held on the young lady's second wedding anniversary.





Family Members' Interests Shown In Home Decorations

Visitors at the comfortable and attractive light colored brick home of Ovid and Doris Lawlis on the south side of Highway 86 just east of the Bovina city limits will not be there very long before they begin to realize that family, the cotton business and hobbies are very important to this couple.

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At Christmas time, as well as any other time of the year, the couple decorates their home in keeping with the theme of their chief interests.

Doris collects hand figurines which are included in different arrangements in her home. She also collects figurines, which depict the interests of different family members, including the couple's five grandchildren.

One of the first gifts Ovid and Doris present grandchildren is a Christmas ornament and included in their plans for the future is the presentation of a special ornament for each one as their own homes are established.

He's also very civic minded and has participated in the activities of the local Chamber of Commerce, and Bovina Lions Club and has served on the school board.

The family attends First Baptist Church and Ovid has served as church treasurer. Doris has been very active in church affairs for the past 30 years. She has been the church librarian, taught Sunday School classes, taught G.A. classes and has been a part of the Women's Missionary Union.



Gene Ezells Make Tour Of European Countries

Visitors at the home of Gene and Genevieve Ezell at 606 Avenue I this holiday season are being greeted by the same courteous Santa who had been a part of the outside decorations for many years. He's brightly colored and lit when it's dark. Some times he makes his bows to visitors from the house top, but this year he's standing near the front door.

The Ezell living room, which is attractively decorated in traditional red, white and green, features a ceiling high natural tree, which had been flocked and is decorated with red satin balls, white hand crocheted snowflakes and other decorations.

One of the decorations is extra special and has been on every Christmas tree the couple has ever had. It was a sourvenir mailed from Carlsbad, New Mexico more than fifty years ago. It pictures an Indian papoose in a cradle board and was first used as a Christmas tree decoration due to lack of more suitable trinkets or money to purchase them with.

This Christmas the Ezells plan to be with a son and daughter-in-law, Roger and Judy Roach Ezell, both teachers in the Plano Public Schools.

Although Gene and Genevieve have always appreciated their family, home, country and friends at the holiday season, as well as throughout the year, their awareness is probably keener since a three week stay in Europe earlier this fall.

On September 15 they flew from Dallas to London, rode a train to the White Cliffs of Dover then crossed the English Channel and boarded a bus, along with 38 other people from Texas and New Mexico. The group visited England, France, Belgium, Holland, East Germany, West Germany, Poland, Denmark, Sweden, Finland and Russia, where they spent seven nights and eight days. While in the Soviet Union the group stayed about 26 miles out of Moscow, 16 miles out of Leningrad and 15 miles out of Minsk. In getting a first hand view of life in a communist country, they noticed the

lack of freedom, lack of attractive farm homes and surroundings -collective farming doesn't allow such things--and old women working everywhere black topping roads, driving trucks, sweeping the streets and taking care of the palace grounds.

In Russia most of the men are engaged in military and police operations. All television and radio is completely controlled by the government. Members of the tour group were impressed with the efficiency of the mass transit system. Only fourteen out of every 10,000 families own automobiles of any kind, so the large majority of people depend upon the public transportation facilities. Escalators from the ground level travel at a 60 degree angle and a high rate of speed. Mrs. Ezell said, "One day we changed stations seven times and

getting on the escalators wasn't an easy job because the steps were moving so rapidly."

Kremlin, which means fortress is the fortified part of a Russian city. The best known is the Kremlin of Moscow, which has a 11/2 mile triangular enclosure around it. The present walls, which are topped with towers, have stood since 1492. Twelve wide boulevards, like the spokes of a wheel, stretch out from the Kremlin, which stands on a hill overlooking the Moscow River.

Joseph Stalin lived in a small palace inside the walls. However after his death, many government officials were moved outside the wall. Then a few years later the Kremlin became a national monument.

Ezell said, "We attended a Russian

of potatoes, almost no fresh green vegetables and an abundance of horse meat.

At the beginning of the Russian tour the group was told by their guide that they were very bold, very adventurous and very brave. The bus made almost no stops except bush stops, which were scheduled regularly. On these stops men went into the bushes in one direction while women went the other.

Two of the greatest contrasts they observed were made when they crossed from West Germany into East Germany and from Russia into Finland. In Finland the food was fabulous and large fresh tossed salads were available. The highways were super and there was a great deal of traffic.

Gene, who has been Bovina's postmaster since his return from the United States Armed Forces in 1947, was born four miles south of town and grew up here. Genevieve, whose maiden name was Bender, was born at Shattuck, Oklahoma, and has lived here since 1933.

Their three children, Larry, Joan Kay and Roger, grew up here and graduated from Bovina High School. Larry and his wife live in Lubbock. They have three children, Angela, Larry Jr. and Leslie and two grandchildren.

Joan Kay, who married a Bovinan, Dick Horn, presently lives in Tokyo, Japan, where they have been Southern Baptist Missionaries several years. They have three sons, Richard, Tim and Steve.

Both the Ezells have enjoyed travelling and have been in every state of the union except Alaska and have



Lavoida Hawkins' Dog Business Is Answer To Lifetime Dream

Although there are no signs reading "Dogs For Sale" at the country home of Lavoida, Erith, Daryl and Chet Hawkins, which is located west of town, anyone driving by soon realizes that he's in the vicinity of a country kennel.

Upon closer investigation he will find dogs of at least six different breeds and sizes from newborn to aged. Two of the larger ones run free. One is a cow dog and the other is a watch dog. The other 25-30 are the fulfillment of a long time dream of the lady of the house. They're Yorkshire Terriers, Dachshunds, Pomeranians and Pinschers--all teacup, toy or miniature and in a wide range of colors.

When she was a little girl, Lavoida Newbrough, oldest daughter of the late Chet Newbrough and Gwen Pryor, who now lives in Friona, always loved dogs and wanted every one she saw. The only ones she and her younger sister, Brenda, were allowed to have were farm dogs and weren't allowed in the house.

The Newbrough family's first home in Parmer County was in the Rhea Community and the girls attended school in Friona. Later they moved here and Lavoida and Brenda are both graduates of Bovina High School.

Several years following their dad's

death, their mother was married to Kenneth Pryor.

Lavoida says, "When I first got my dogs, mother tolerated them, but now she likes them."

Following her graduation from high school, Lavoida was married and kept busy taking care of her sons, keeping house and working at different jobs, but as she did these things, she kept the dream of living in the country and having a lot of dogs.

However, it wasn't until about two years ago that her dreams began to take shape. Because of the enormous expense of acquiring show dogs, Lavoida decided to buy one female puppy of each breed to begin with. Her first purchase was a Yorkshire Terrier. Later she purchased a female puppy of each of the other three breeds.

She says, "I've learned a lot about different phases of the dog raising business and attended a few shows since I bought my first one."

Like any other successful business, the owner must do a lot of work and planning. There's a lot of book work when a breeder has sixteen females, which produce an average of sixteen puppies annually. The registration papers alone take a lot of time. Then there are breeding schedules, due dates, dates for shots and worming and an endless number of other data that must be kept.

Another time consuming job is keeping up with correspondence with prospective buyers. Even though the Hawkins puppies were ready to sell less than one year ago, there's always a waiting list for different breeds, sizes and colors.

"Most of ours are sold in this area," Lavoida said. "However," she added, "We've had buyers from as far away as Washington State and Houston."

Then, there's the matter of feeding twice daily when different diets are required for puppies, nursing mothers, pregnant females and males. When puppies are first weaned, they're fed baby cereal and honey. Honey is also used for puppies like glucose is for humans and if a newborn seems to be in trouble, he's given a few drops of honey at regular intervals.

Another facet of the business which requires close attention is performing the duties of a mid-wife when it's time for puppies to be born.

"We never leave an expectant mother alone on her due date," Lavoida says.

Sometimes different family members take over on a shift basis and all of them work together when there's an emergency requiring several sets of hands.

When Lavoida isn't taking care of the dogs, she's likely to be found doing needlepoint, crocheting, monogramming western shirts or putting the finishing touches on a bisque figurine of some kind. grapher and does oil painting. She uses her pictures to decorate her home and for gifts.


Erith farms, operates a small feedyard and is employed by Parmer County. Daryl, an employee of Paco Feeders south of Hub, participates in rodeo events, and Chet is a sophomore at Bovina High School. These three go their separate ways during the day, but when evening comes, they join hands to assist Lavoida in taking care of the dogs, which all of them love a great deal.

"Each one has its own personality and you never know what to expect until you become well acquainted with each one," Lavoida said.

Even though each one has a long formal name, they're generally called by nicknames and respond when that name is called.

The two older Hawkins boys, Orby and Korby, grew up here, but have been away several years. Korby presently lives in San Diego, California, and has a daughter, Gina. Orby, recently returned from England, where he had been living five years is now living in Lubbock. He has one son, Erith III, who is one and one-half years old.

"My long range goal now is to raise and show a champion," was Lavoida's closing remark.

Since July of 1962, Dee and Alma Pierson and their families have been living in an attractive farm home west of Farm-to-Market Road 1931 a few miles south of Bovina. Dee is a corn farmer and Alma is a full time homemaker.

Remove from heat and add butter and vanilla. Beat until candy holds form. Drop onto waxed paper. If candy gets too stiff to drop, add a bit of milk as you go along.

Mexican Cornbread

Brown 1 pound ground beef. Season to taste.

Mix 1 cup corn meal, 1/2 cup buttermilk, 2 eggs, 3/4 teaspoon soda, 1 small onion, 1 large can cream style corn, and 1 small can green chillies. Grate 1/2 pound cheddar cheese. Put 1/2 cornbread mixture in greased pan. Add layer of ground meat and cheese then other half of cornbread mixture. Bake 30 minutes at 400 degrees.

Pecan Pie

1/2 cup sugar 1 cup Karo 4 tablespoons butter 3 eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup pecans Cook sugar and Karo mixture until it thickens slightly. Beat eggs real well. Gradually add hot syrup to beaten eggs. Add butter, vanilla and nuts. Pour in large pie shell and bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

This pie bakes quicker because your ingredients are hot to begin with.


One room of the Simms home is filled with railroad memorabilia including a model railroad, which features sidings enough to have three trains running at one time.

For frosting mix 2 cups sugar and 1 cup cream. Boil together, stirring constantly until proper consistency. Add left over syrup and spread on cake.

Egg Custard

3 eggs-slightly beaten ¹/₂ cup sugar 2 cups milk 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 1 teaspoon nutmeg 1/4 teaspoon salt Beat eggs slightly. Add other ingredients. Pour in unbaked pie shell and bake about 30 minutes at 350 degrees.



A farmer usually picked out some choice heads from the crib where his feed was stored, threshed it out by hand and then winnowed it when the wind was at the proper velocity to keep from blowing the heavier seeds

out of the wash tubs, which had been borrowed for the job.

When the O'Hairs first moved to Parmer County from Bailey County in 1955, they lived on a farm south of town. Their four children, Michael, Claudia, Sonja and Freddie Mack, attended school here and are all graduates of Bovina High School.

During the years the children were growing up Artie Faye sewed for them, assisted them with school work, attended ball games and did all the other things mothers of children usually do. All the while she had a yen for music and art, but had very little time to pursue either interest.

The O'Hairs are members of Bovina's First Baptist Church and keep busy being good neighbors, helping others less fortunate than themselves and trying to make their community a better one in which to live.

Since Fred's retirement about five years ago, he has more time for his favorite hobbies-playing dominoes and collecting coins and arrowheads.
