Speeding man found to be carrying explosive devices

Michael Hopper, was arrested in IH-10, eight miles east of Sonora, on December 28.

Texas Department of Highway Safety Trooper L.D. Whitton stopped the suspect after clocking him traveling at a rate of 92 miles an hour. Turman told the officer that he was traveling from California to Florida. When the suspect could not produce a registration for the vehicle, Whitton asked him to follow him back to town to appear before Justice of the Peace Herman Moore for the speeding violation.

Running a routine motor vehicle identification check on the vehicle, Whitton was advised that the car had been stolen from El Cajon, California. Turman was then arrested for the unauthorized use of a motor vehicle and placed in the Sutton County jail.

Sheepdog trials began over a hundred years ago in Bala, Wales and on Sunday, January 22, 1989 the fifth annual trials will be held in Sonora. The Sonora trials will be at the County Park and will probably begin around 8:30 a.m.

The original trials began much as any other sporting event with friendly banter which amounted to "My dog can beat your dog."

Sheepdogs are a breed of dogs developed in the border country of England and Scotland and are known as border collies. They come in assorted colors with various markings but all trainers agree on one point-"We don't care if they are

purple as long as they work."

The object of a dog trail is to prove the abilities of the dog and handler and the trial course is laid out to simulate actual working conditions as closely as possible. The dogs are directed through the course by voice commands and whistles from the handler.

Local organizer for the Sonora Trials, Patti Strauch, DVM, says the trials are a "poor man's sport" with prize money small and lots of traveling between trials.

Past trials in Sonora have drawn participants from Arizona, Iowa, Tennessee, Illinois, California,

Georgia, as well as all parts of Texas.

The judge for this year's event will be Peter Hetherington of Scotland and competition will be stiff in all classes. Local ranchers and dog handlers will have a chance to compete among themselves without having to run against the professionals.

DEAR COMMISSIONER NABERS: My company is considering setting up a drug testing program in our workplace. As a personnel specialist I need to get as much information as possible about the pros and cons of drug testing before I report to upper management. What, in your opinion are the most important things for an employer to consider in assessing the desirability of this type of program.

Houston, Texas

DEAR S.E.: Above all I think employers need to understand that drug testing is not a panacea for every workplace problem and it brings along its own set of problems.

First, do you have reason to believe that your company even has a problem with employee drug use? Repeatedly I have employers call to ask whether they should implement a drug testing program simply because they suspect one or two problem employees of using drugs. I encourage these employers to take whatever disciplinary action they must take, including termination based on traditional company policy and work performance criteria. It does not make sense to commit your company to an expensive, comprehensive, and intrusive drug testing program just to weed out one suspected bad apple.

Cost is always a consideration. Although initial screening procedures are cheap, under \$10 a screen, they are not specific and reliable enough to support discipline or termination. Any positive screen should ALWAYS be confirmed by a different, more specific test. The best is gas chromatography/mass spectrometry, GC/MS, and it costs \$40 to \$70 a test. Beware however, that even the GC/MS exam, if not conducted carefully and expertly, may give you false results. The National Institute on Drug Abuse is compiling a list of laboratories that conform to its standards. I suggest employers use only first-class laboratories that are willing to provide detailed chain of custody documentation on every sample tested as well as expert testimony in the event of litigation. Too many employers assume that their laboratories are giving them professional, accurate service. I have seen evidence to the contrary.


Know what drug testing really tells you. Drug testing shows only a past exposure to drugs. It cannot tell how much of the drug was used or when. It cannot prove drug addiction or impairment of faculties. It does not prove that a person was under the influence at the time of the test.

Understand that drug testing is still in its infancy so far as the law is concerned. We will undoubtedly get more guidance from the courts in the near future, but workplace drug testing remains a potential for litigation.

Finally, how is your company prepared to handly the results of drug testing? Will your policy be essentially punitive, i.e., automatic termination with a positive result? Or will you provide some type of probation, second chance, or rehabilitative program?

A memo on drug testing is available from my office, and I would be happy to send it to any companies who are interested.





First eighteen year old to register too old to be drafted

resident and city employee of Lafayette, La. celebrates his birthday. By turning 26, Frank unknowingly establishes a milestone for an agency of the U.S. Government and earns himself a minor place in history.

Eight years ago, Frank was the first 18-year-old man to sign up and be processed by the Selective Service System under the continous draft registration program. From today on, however, if Congress and the president order a return to, military conscription under present law, Frank is too old to be drafted. He becomes the first man since Vietnam to pass through the full, eight-year-long period of draft eligibiltiy without being drafted.

Names and addresses of men ages 18 through 25 are kept on file by Selective Service for use in a national emergency. If Congress reinstates the draft, men most likely to be called into military service would be those who turn 20 during that calendar year. Selective Service would first conduct a birthdate lottery to determine the order of call within that age group and then, depending upon the manpower requirements of the crisis, those men whose birthdays draw low lottery numbers would be more

There has not been a draft since all-volunteer military force. In 1975, the Selective Service System was placed in "deep standby" status and the requirement for men to register was suspended. But it wasn't long before several studies and commission reports noted that a draft would be needed again if the country ever became involved in a major conflict. They predicted it would take too long to get men registered, classified, inducted, and

On January 6, Joseph Frank, a trained. In 1980, after the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, President Carter revitalized the Selective Service System and reinstated the registration requirement for men. On Jan. 5, 1981, registration of 18year-old men began again and has continued. Today, using computer technology, the System can begin issuing thousands of induction orders via Wetern Union "Mailgrams" in three days or less, once Congress and the president give the go-ahead.

> With few exceptions, federal law requires every man to register with Selective Service within 30 days of his 18th birthday. (Men have a 60day window in which to comply with this law: from 30 days before to 30 days after turning 18). The process is simple. Men furnish their names, addresses, and telephone and Social Security numbers by completing and signing a short form at any post office. A man who is out of the country around the time of his 18th birthday can register at any U.S. embassy or consular office.

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

Public Notice

On December 30, 1988, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed tariff revisions with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to institute the last scheduled increase in the FCC-approved customer line charge. This monthly charge appears on the Detail of Charges page of your Southwestern Bell Telephone bill.

If approved, the charge will increase on April 1, 1989.

Residence and single-line business customers will incur a 30-cent increase, bringing their monthly FCC-approved customer line charge to \$3.50.


Business customers who have Centrex service will realize a 50-cent increase on each line installed or ordered before July 28, 1983. This will bring their monthly FCC-approved customer line charge to \$5.50 per line.

Other multi-line business customers will incur a 10-cent increase. This will bring their monthly FCC-approved customer line charge to \$5.50 per line as well.

This charge is part of a nationwide plan originated by the FCC so local telephone customers would more directly contribute toward the costs of providing the local portion of their long distance telephone service.

Specifically, revenues from the FCC-approved customer line charge reduce the costs long distance companies pay Southwestern Bell Telephone to provide interstate long distance services to our customers. Historically, these cost savings have been passed on to our customers in the form of decreased interstate long distance

a young doctor gets when he is confronted with a headache patient in the middle of a busy afternoon when he thinks he is stamping out "more important" disease with his number ten brogans-but there is help to find relief.

In the first place, about 30% of the population have fewer than one or two headaches in a lifetime. I don't know why, because I'm with intelligent (If that is any the other 70%. The most common headaches are called "tension headaches" or frontal-occipital headaches with pain that would lay just under your hand placed right over your eyebrows and is associated with pain and stiffness of the neck and sometimes of the upper shoulders. Sometimes called neck muscle tension headache, it is found most often in people who crouch day after day at a desk dealing with some infernal and impersonal office machine. It is associated with muscles that seems to tighten up in the neck and upper back and associated with tedious work and where cramped postures are required for long times. Most folks generally know when they are going to get one of these or what caused it when it appears and generally take aspirin or tylenol for relief, which works about as well as anything. Perhaps more emphasis should be placed to sufferers on exercises that loosen up muscle at work and upon massage of the tighten muscles by family members. If you live alone, point your elbows toward the ceiling and use both hands to massage the neck muscles by yourself.

Migraine headaches are over diagnosed by patients and doctors alike. Classic migraine is always one sided, involves spasm of blood vessels in the brain, the temporary shortage of oxygen followed by dilation enlargement of these vessels. The spasm causes abnormal brain functioning, depending upon where the blood vessel is that goes spasm as a result of some "trigger", be it food allergy, exersion, stress, or extreme changes in temperature.

Before the headache ever appears there are symptoms that appear including flashing lights, blind spots or rolling strips like a barber pole across a segment of the visual field of both eyes, alternations of smell and sound, numbness of a spot of the face or one whole side of the body and weakness of certain shot or suppository can arrest the twenty-five or thirty years ago.

Sinus headaches are over diagnosed by people who have merely a stuffy nose and underdiagnosed by sufferers who have neck and recurring headaches above and below either or both eyes and are associated with some temperature of elevation and occassionally bloody mucus or malodorless nasal discharge. They last for days at a stretch and may be helped with antibiotic treatment.

The reason why the doctor in the first paragraph developed a tension headache when the headache patient consults him, is that realization that headaches sometimes come from conditions or tumor of the brain. Bleeding usually causes severe headaches and paralysis evident on the physical exam, but tumor in the frontal part of the brain may cause no symptom other than headache. These headaches are remarkable when they show up as totally new and different pain from "my usual headache" may occur at unusual times of the day, often waking the patient from a deep sleep, and when they are associated with neurological change including numbness, paralysis, memory difficulties, unusual behavior and so

The solution may be as simple as changing the color of mulch in the garden. According to National Wildlife magazine, researchers have found that vegetables respond favorably to particular wavelengths of reflected sunlight.

Tomato crops grown over red mulch produced twenty percent more top quality tomatoes than those grown over black plastic. Potatoes and green peppers, on the other hand, show a distinct preference for white mulch.

Mother Nature made fruits sweet, juicy and tempting. Then she improved on a good thing by inventing drying. And in the drying process, her fruit just got sweeter

She probably dried her first fruit on a tree under hot, tropical sunshine. Today's food processors still use the sun-drying technique, but now they also use forced hot

Either way, the process of drying iruit reduces the iruit's water content from eighty percent to between fifteen and thirty-five percent. As a result, everything else left behind is concentrated.

Mother Nature was good to fruit. She gave it vitamins, minerals, and plenty of fiber. She made fruit low in fat and cholesterol free.

However, dried fruit may contain as much as seventy percent sugar by weight, or more than many cookies and as much as some candies. As a result, you get a fair number of calories along with your minerals.


Some modern processors have also added sulfite preservatives to light colored fruit, such as apples, peaches, pears, apricots and golden

Asthmatics and other sulfitesensitive people should be sure the dried fruit they are eating is sulfite free. The Food and Drug Administration requires that dried fruit which contains sulfites be clearly marked. Since dried fruits are among the most heavily sulfited foods on the market today, it is important to check.

On the whole though, dried fruits are a delicious way to satisfy a sweet tooth and gain some great nutritional bonuses. Just eat them in moderation.


