Sutton County Days Assn. will sponsor a County team roping October 14th. Books

#### Upon questioning, more than a dozen Sonora residents said they knew him.

Some remember him as a baby before his mother died, others know his father, and one played baseball with him when they were boys.

Monday, they were asked if they would be able to send Tomas Favela to prison for 99 years if he is convicted of selling a drug to an undercover agent.

"It would be pretty hard," said a neighbor of Favela's when District Attorney J. W. Johnson asked if he could be a fair and impartial juror.

"I guess not," admitted another, when asked if he would be able to vote for the maximum sentence.

One woman, explaining that she knew Favela since he was a baby, silently shook her head when Johnson pressed her about remaining fair and impartial.

"If you think I'm putting you on the spot now," Johnson warned during the jury selection process, "this is nothing compared to tomorrow or the next day."

Jury selected in Favela trial

One man became upset by the questions. "He's not even convicted yet,"

he bristled. Of the 44 members of the jury panel, more than a third indicated they would not be able to be impartial while considering a request for maximum sentencing if Favela is convicted.

Favela sat impassively staring at the courtroom ceiling while he listened to his neighbors say it would be very difficult to send him to prison. His is the first trial resulting from a March 6, roundup in which 14 persons were arrested allegedly selling for methamphetamine.

The final jury selection process for Favela's trial began at 2:35 p.m. Monday. Of 200 local residents originally called, 44 were named to the jury panel after the group had been advised of qualifications and screened for exemptions and hardships.

Johnson and defense attorney Joseph Montemayor, of Dallas, then proceeded with the voir dire phase of the selection process to weed out prospective jurors they





It is hungry out there on Sutton County ranges. We have been feeding cats on the back porch, a policy we have been forced to discontinued due to excessive cat food consumption. A guest count before the policy change showed four cats never seen before, two

opossums, one coon, one fox pup, and one turkey. The pickings are pretty slim on the range for small wild animals and birds.

We formerly put meat scraps out near the dipsey dumpster so the small animals could consume them. That program was cancelled when the wife saw two turkey buzzards sitting on the dumpster.

We are afraid that the buzzards might be observed and put on the endangered species listing. Such a listing might justify elimination of the screw-worm program so the buzzards could have more food. Environmentalist and species preservation logic has done even stranger things.

Seriously, if you are a hunter it would seem to your advantage to give the small animals some survival assistance in these hard times.

If you are a provider of hunting leases it is more important. I can remember in 1935 when a wild turkey breast tasted just like chunk out of a cedar chest. It was indeed disappointing when you had bicycled eight miles to poach turkey. Unaided wild turkeys are survivalists and in desperation they eat cedar berries; hunter satisfaction is not on their priority list. We can hope that we have a cold

we can hope that we have a cold winter for about three reasons: If we don't have enough cold we will have bumper crop of ticks.

Secondarily, a cold winter enhances the posibility of snow which has a very favorable absorption versus runoff ratio. Lastly, a cold winter enhances the likely hood of a sequence of general spring rains allowing us to escape from dependence on the erratic showers for moisture.

## SELP CONTROL

While visiting my aunt and uncle at Juno Ranch one summer, I discovered a clearing nestled between a hill and a dry creek bed. It had huge boulders arranged among clumps of Live Oak and trees, and was situated at the base of a thirty-foot bluff in the hill. When it rained the creek would run with water for a day or two and provide me with, lush green, picturesque solitude in which to contemplate the problems of a 60s era teenager.

When I returned home the clearing went with me mentally and remained safely tucked until such time as I felt the need to recall it as an escape from the hassles of reality. All I had to do was withdraw and put my vivid imagination to work. Within a short period of time I had the place looking like it had been blessed by God Himself.

I gave my retreat a name. It was Valley Green.

From this mental exercise I learned to use the faculty of my imagination to soothe frustrations, raging emotions and discouragement. As I grew, it felt as though I was cheating life and what seemed to be inclinations imposed on me to mature and face reality. Only in recent years did I discover that it was good therapy.

However, I returned to the clearing a few years later to find it abused by hunters who had camped there the year before and used the trees for firewood, the boulders to dress their kill and the draw as a place to throw beer cans. I picked up the cans and did my best to straighten it out, but somehow it was not the same place as it once was.

At least I had the retreat in my mind, that is until I went to Viet Nam. The mental solitude was trampled during a psychological upheaval resulting from the first time I was forced to take a human life.

Trampled; it was devastated from existence. But the feeling I experienced when I found I could no longer use the retreat as an escape mechanism was the same as I felt when I discovered what the hunters had done.

Subsequently, a poem was born.

Valley Green In youth I happened on Valley Green, A rich and splendid, peaceful scene, In gentle breeze would toss and sway. A stream conveyed its whispered tale To willows there within the vale, To honeybees and butterflies In constant toil and enterprise. For days on end I languored there, In solitude's caressing care.

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But then they came to Valley Green, Destroyed the realm I found screne. My flowers died, my little gems, They plucked the blooms right from the stems. They dammed the stream, they killed each tree And left the glen with their debris. The butterflies then flew away And I was left alone to stay, Until I knew the cruel defeat Was absolute, my loss complete. June 4, 1972 J. Michael Fish

Several years passed until I realized the war that waged within me could, in fact, be dealt a deciding blow. During the time I was employed by my uncle on his ranch I informally researched and studied human behavior. Coincidentally, I came across that same clearing while gathering livestock. Something occurred in my brain as though a light had suddenly be turned on.

The faculty I used so adeptly before the war was merely buried by motional garbage I kept heaped and waiting. Just as nature had worked alone through the passage of time to restore the place I reviered as a boy, I could clear and take control of the emotions that once threatened to destroy me.

By practicing new ways of thinking, becoming aware of the abilities available to me and with time to actually apply them in a real world, I was able to turn a basically negative mind into a source of positive reinforcement.

In 1984, I added a third stanza to the twelve year old poem.

With passing time and hopes renewed,




# **Public Notice**

Earlier this month, for example, more than 30 tons of cocaine were seized in three separate raids.


