Incumbent after sixth term in mayor's office

Incumbent Bill Gosney has decided to run for a sixth term as mayor of Sonora. Gosney is being challenged by Jim Adams in the May 5 election.

After serving as mayor for 10 years, Gosney has learned that the public will watch every step made. "Of all the city employees there are, the local government employees are the most visible," said Gosney.

As for surviving as mayor for 10 years, Gosney said, "I've been lucky to have a good council behind me."

Gosney said the biggest problem facing the city of Sonora is landfills. "Our landfill is in good shape, " said Gosney. ":But that is not necessarily in line with Environmental Protection Agency

thinking."
The EPA is looking to impose new regulations upon landfills which would create regional landfills. "We don't need a regional landfill," said Gosney.

Gosney said regional landfills in the eastern states is feasible where the population per square mile is much greater than in West Texas. He said hauling of the waste would be the greatest problem. According to Gosney, major problems with hauling waste would include expense and dangers involved with possible accidents in hauling waste many miles.

Gosney said a study by a special engineer showed that it would cost \$250,000 to close down the current landfill under the regulations now in place on landfills by the EPA. Gosney said the cost would go to \$1.75 million if the new regulations were imposed by the EPA.

Gosney traveled to Washington D.C. in February with representatives of counties and cities in West Texas to converse with state representatives about the landfill situation. "They said our wants would be conveyed to the EPA committee," said

Since the trip to Washington the EPA has said the new regulations would not go into effect until December. The EPA had been trying to get the new regulations in effect as soon as possible.

Comy said, "We (city and county government) were thinking about having the state have the option for determining a landfill."

If the new landfill regulations went into effect Gosney said, "It would bankrupt us (Sonora). The

consumer pays."

Right now, Gosney said Sonora is financially sound. "We're not the richest town," said Gosney. "But we owe very little."

Adams has put the expansion of industry as a major factor in his campaign. Gosney said getting more industry would be terrific, but there are a number of problems.

"All the businesses that come in need a high availability of land, visible water and entertainment to keep their workers here," said Gosney. "We don't have the land."

Water is not an abundant source either. Most of the water for Sonora is from 240 to 260 feet underground.

Any economic gain for Sonora will have to come from whatever is here. "Nearly all the new industries come from what's already here, expansion," said

The process of building the industry in Sonora will be long and slow, said Gosney. "We have to recover from our down years first," said Gosney.

He believes that is currently happening as the oil business continues to rebound from its slump in the early '80s.


In 10 years Gosney has seen Sonora turn from a town dependent on agriculture to a town that has several economic bases. During his years in office Sonora has received community grants in four times, received a grant for the

wastewater treatment plant, has not had a tax increase since 1984 and sold the city utilities to West Texas Utilities. Gosney summed up his 10 years

by saying, "I like to try to

How bank accounts affect SSI elegibility

How bank accounts affect Supplemental Security Income (SSI) eligibility is an area that consistently confuses people who are receiving or applying for SSI. This column should help clear up some of that confusion.

To be eligible for SSI, a person must have resources of less that \$2,000 (\$3,000 for a couple). Bank accounts are usually considered resources; therefore, they count toward this limit.

What's so confusing about that, you wonder. Well, Social Security considers a bank account considers a bank account yours if your name is on it as owner or coowner and there are no legal restrictions that keep you from taking money out and using it for your own benefit. This is true even if you don't use the account or don't consider the account yours. That means it's important that bank accounts are precisely titled to reflect ownership and access.

Let's suppose Mary Jones applies for SSI. Her daughter, Jane, has a \$3,000 savings account. Jane listed Mary as a

joint owner, primarily so Mary would have access to the money in case something happened to Jane. Although Mary doesn't consider the account to be hers, Social Security does, and she could be found ineligible for SSI because she is over the \$2,000 resource limit. Of course, if Jane's account is titled to restrict Mary's access, the account would not be considered Mary's and would not affect Mary's eligibility.

Proper titling is also critical when community, civic, or social groups collect money for a special reason such as to help pay an SSI recipient's medical expenses. Although the donors gave money to the person, they also placed restrictions on its use, and the account must be titled to show the restrictions. As long as the account title shows the money cannot be used for food, clothing, or shelter, the account is not considered a resource.

Tax defferal available for elderly homeowners

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of a tax option called over-65 deferral. The elderly homeowner simply signs a deferral affidavit at the Sutton County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's homestead, according to Rex Ann Friess, chief appraiser of the Sutton County Appraisal District. To stop a delinquent tax suit, Friess said, the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

"This law means that, if the proper affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Friess said.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that homestead.

Friess stressed, though, that tax deferral for the elderly only

postpones paying delinquent taxes on the homestead; it does not cancel them. During the deferral period, taxes and delinquent interest continue to add up, she said. "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax and interest."

While a penalty may not be imposed on the delinquent taxes during the deferral period, the filing of the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties which were already due. Also, an additional penalty associated with referring the account to a delinquent tax attorney may be charged if taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends.

Forms for filing a tax deferral affidavit are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Friess said.

Property tax exemptions available for disabled veterans

Veterans with a serviceconnected disability can receive under 18 and unmarried; property tax relief in 1990 by filling out a simple exemption form at the Sutton County Appraisal District office, Chief not at application time; Appraiser Rex Ann Friess said.

The amount of exemption is based on the veteran's percentage of service-connected disability and can range from \$1,500 to \$3,000. Friess explained who is eligible for the application:

*a disabled veteran;

*a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried;

*a surviving minor child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veteran's spouse does not survive the veteran and if the child is both

*a surviving spouse of a person killed while on active duty, whether the spouse is remarried or

*a surviving minor child of a person who was killed on active duty, if the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

"Any eligible person who has not received this exemption before must apply by April 30," Friess said. "But, if you received the exemption in1989, you do not need to reapply in 1990.

An applicant can claim the exemption on only one piece of property, such as a home or any other property the applicant owned

on January 1. The applicant must be a Texas resident in order to qualify and must file the exemption application at the appraisal district office by April

An applicant may be required to provide proof of the serviceconnected disability, such as documentation from the Veterans Administration or the branch of the armed services in which the veteran served. Depending on the applicant, proof of marriage, death, or age may also be required.



New minimum wage law now in effect

Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers of the Texas Employment Commission reminded employers today that the US Department of Labor has released interim final rules governing the submission training wage provisions of the new minimum wage law. The new law, which went into effect on April 1, 1990, raises the minimum wage to \$3.80 but also provides for a lower training wage of \$3.35 per hour. The training wage will apply only for certain employees under age 20 and can be applied only for 90 days of employment. It will expire March 31, 1993.

The new law covers all companies which have an annual business volume of \$500,000 or more, while public agencies, schools, hospitals, and some other

businesses will be covered regardless of their annual dollar volume.

The training wage will not apply to migrant or seasonal agricultural workers or the non-immigrant agricultural workers who perform temporary or seasonal work. Also, an employer can pay a worker the subminimum wage only until that employee reaches the age of 20, after which he or she must be paid at a rate not less than the mimimum wage otherwise applicable under th FSLA.

Employees who have been paid the training wage for 90 days can be paid the wage an additional 90 days if they work for a different employer, and if that employer provides on-the-job training. The total period that an employee may be employed at the training wage by any combination of employers may not exceed 180 days.

In order to meet the training requirements of the rule, an employer must provide "jobspecific skills training and personal skills instruction," according to the regulation. Also, the DOL interprets the training wage as meant principally for new hires. Therefore, any employee who has worked for an employer for more than 90 days is ineligible for the training wage.

DOL has a poster that outlines the new law. Copies should be available from your regional Wage and Hour Division. In Texas, regional offices are located in San Antonio, Dallas, Houston and Corpus Christi.







'Mud and Spit' John 9: 1-38

"Don't play in the mud, _ you'll get your new clothes all dirty'! 'Don't spit, ____, you know that's not nice'! Remember? We would hardly think of Mud & Spit as materials for a miracle, but that's exactly the mixture Jesus puts on the eyes of a blind man -& he sees! Physical blindness is a serious handicap, but even more serious is spiritual blindness- to live apart from God in the darkness of sin. The young man in our text had always lived in physical darkness, but Jesus came by and healed him - & he could see what he'd never seen before. But more than that happened, as John uses 38 verses to describe how he came to see other things than those in the light of this world. One by one, the spiritual scales are lifted from his heart until at the end of the chapter we find him kneeling to worhsip Jesus, & hear him saying: "I do believe, Lord." So as we meditate on this double healing of Jesus, we ask God's Spirit to remove any spiritual scales that may still be attached to our eyes - & cause us to say: 'Lord, in a new & deeper way, I believe.'

Jesus took Mud & Spit, put it on the man's eyes, sent him to wash in the Pool of Siloam, & he came back seeing. Of course, the healing power wasn't in the Mudpack or water of the Pool-it was in Jesus Christ, the Word of God become flesh. God attaches His Word to common things- Mud & Spit, Water, Bread & Wine; and miraculous cleansing takes place. As this man returned from the Pool, those who knew him were so amazed that they began to debate if he really was the one who'd been begging at the Gate. And although it's almost too good to be true, the young man ends the argument by saying: "I'm the one". Since miracles ought to be shared with those who appreciate them most, God's priests, they take him to the Temple. But instead of rejoicing and giving thanks, the Pharisees try to deny this marvelous healing. What a tragedy that some hearts become so hardened that even beautiful' miracles can't move them!

And yet, if this young man hadn't gone through a trial because of his meeting Jesus, he might have gone away with only physical sight. Many of us could point to trials in our lives that at the time seemed senseless and cruel. But later, when life had returned to normal & we had time to look back-we saw something that we hadn't seen before. Then we realized how far we had strayed from God, and how that trial had taught us to depend only on Him. What had appeared to the Mud & Spit of senseless trial became God's Mudpack of grace, lifting heavy scales from our eyes and letting in the light of His great love. So the Pharisees, unable to deny this miracle even after calling in his parents, must contend with the healed man-& through him with Jesus who healed him. They try to discredit our Lord because He worked this miracle on a Sabbath, & even call him a "sinner." So the young man replies: "I know only one thing -So the young man I used to be blind, and now I can see." He seems to get stronger with each question and grow under the attack of the Pharisees. Something's happened that can't be denied-HE CAN SEE! What's more, he begins to see what the Pharisees won't see. God has made contact, a real miracle's happened, the light of the Kingdom is beginning to dawn.


So the Pharisees are right when they ask: "What do YOU say

about Him, since He gave you your sight?" Sometimes the world understands the issue better than the Church. The object of faith is Jesus Christ, but what do we tend to witness to: our Denomination, the Building, the Pastor, the friendly people? So often God's people feel uncomfortable when someone asks a question that calls for a faithful answer. We feel uncomfortable with the Mud & Spit of unbelievers, who ask WHAT we believe - & WHY we believe it. So the Mud & Spit push hard, and what we believe can't be kept hidden in the darkness any longer. But don't get angry at the Mud & Spit, they may be God's Mudpack that challenges us to be exposed to the light- & walk in it. So here come the questions! WHY do you believe, Christian? WHAT do you believe? In reply to the Pharisee's claim to be disciples of Moses whom God spoke to-& the denial of knowing where Jesus comes from, the young man says: "Nobody has ever heard of anyone giving sight to a man born blind. If this One were not from God, He couldn't do anything"! Outdone in both their teaching and denial of the truth, the only way the Pharisees can counter this miraculous healing is to remove the proof from their midst. John tells us they put the young man out of the Synagogue, excommunicated him & cut him off from Temple Fellowship. That's the price he has to pay for walking in the light.

The life of each Christian is a life of witness - similar to that of the main in our text, for each day we have living proof of what God has done for us - & to us. That kind of witness will be challenged, & Is going to be fought against because it says NO to the arrogance and power of the man. It says NO to the darkness, because the scales have been pulled off by the Mudpack of Faith that's been challenged and tried. Jesus heard the young man had been put out of the Temple and went looking for him. Then a tender scene unfolds, as Jesus asks the same question the Pharisees had asked: "Do you believe in the Son of Man"? But what a difference in the WAY the question's asked now. When he finds out it is Jesus, the One who healed him, the young man bows down in worship & says: "I believe, Lord." That's 20-20 vision! That's where the light is found that enlightens our mind, that floods our path and gives us confidence, that glows into every corner & exposes every obstacle & pitfall.

Mud & Spit mixed together, & a blind man sees. But behind the Mud & Spit is Jesus Christ, and the man's spiritual eyes see WHO He is - & he lived in that light. In John 8, Jesus says: "I am the light of the world. Follow Me and you will never wander in the dark but will have the light of Life." As we follow Him to a hill called Calvary and stand under His Cross, the darkness of our sins surrounding us seems to become the light for little while. But then as we follow Him to the place of His burial, the brilliance that bursts forth from His empty tomb pierces the darkness. And the Light of the world touches our eyes, and WE can see! What a glorious thing when we can see every day, saying: "I do believe, Lord", and worship Him who died & rose again for us - that we might live in His Light forever!
