## Damages from May 11 storm surpasses $\mathbf{\$ 2 5 0 , 0 0 0}$ in Sonora

More than $\$ 250,000$ in damages to vehicles have been claimed by Sonorans following a 15 -minute
storm May 11 which included golf ball size hail. Damage amounts are expected to rise as adjustors began looking at living quarters this week.
State Farm Insurance set up at
the Devil's Rer the Devil's River Inn May 18-19 hail during the storm. Ed LeClair, claims
superintendent for State Farm Insurance in San Angelo, said th company looked at 190 vehicles in the two day period handing out
checks worth more than $\$ 270,000$ A total of 207 vehicles were c'aimed in Sonora. "More claims will be reported as people who didn't think they had much damage from the storm wil
realize it is worse than expected," said LeClair.
