## Damages from May 11 storm surpasses \$250,000 in Sonora

More than \$250,000 in damages to vehicles have been claimed by Sonorans following a 15-minute storm May 11 which included golf ball size hail. Damage amounts are expected to rise as adjusters began looking at living quarters this week.

State Farm Insurance set up at the Devil's River Inn May 18-19 to look at vehicles damaged by hail during the storm.

Ed LeClair, claims superintendent for State Farm Insurance in San Angelo, said the company looked at 190 vehicles in the two day period handing out checks worth more than \$270,000. A total of 207 vehicles were claimed in Sonora.

"More claims will be reported as people who didn't think they had much damage from the storm will realize it is worse than expected," said LeClair.

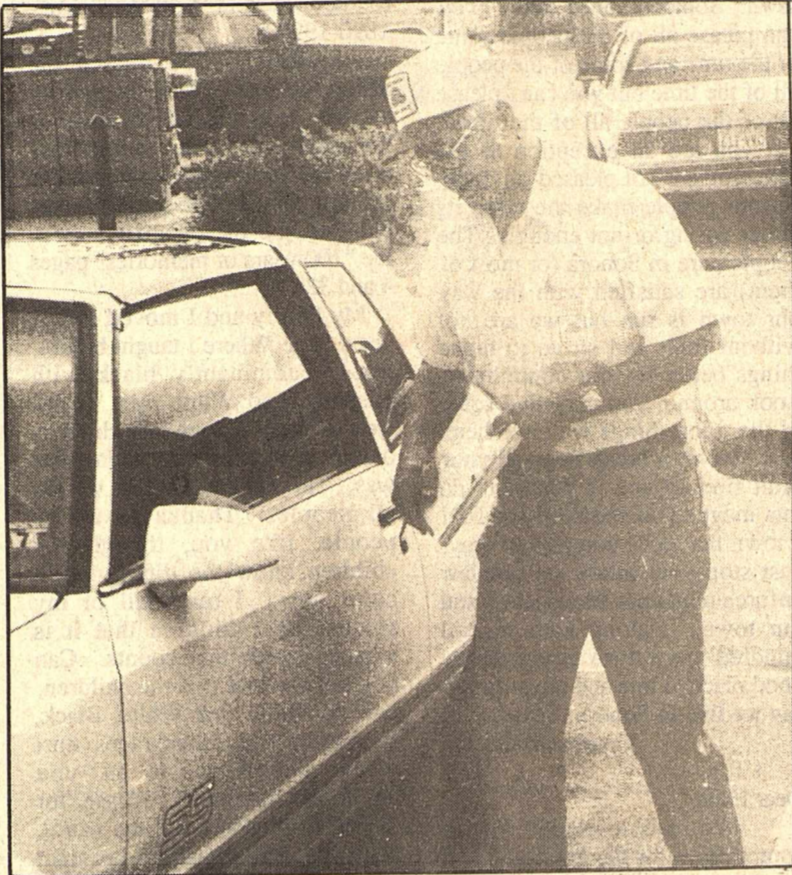
LeClair said the average settlement in Sonora for trucks, vans, autos, busses and other vehicles was \$1,600. He said that compares with an average of \$1,000 to \$1,200 in San Angelo during a recent storm.

Local State Farm agent Sam Dillard said that a catastrophe situation has been declared for Sonora. This means that the company will try to look at all houses that are covered by their insurance company.

Dillard said a preliminary report showed 225-250 houses with claims entered.

LeClair said adjusters will look at houses by a code of severity which has been set up. Codes one and two are the most severe hit houses. Code one is a house that is uninhabitable while code two is a house that may have other major damage plus a leaking roof.

Codes three through five are less

severe from bad damage but habitable to appearance problems.

"We try to take care of the needy ones first with the coding system," said LeClair.

Dillard said two adjusters began looking at structures last weekend and three are working during the week. It is expected to take three weeks to complete the reviews.

Sonora is not alone in sustaining heavy damage from

storms. LeClair said San Angelo has been hit by four storms which has brought 100 claims or more.

Storms in the Brownwood and Dallas to Lake Livingston areas have created tie-ups among adjusters with skeleton crews remaining.

"April was a very active month (for storms) and May has gotten off to an active start," said

## Rodger Davis wins bull riding event at Sonora Sensation

Rodger Davis and Ronnie Whitfield were the big winners in the bull riding portion of the Sonora Sensation Saturday at the Sutton County Park and Arena.

Davis won \$1,125 by winning the short go round with a ride worth 84 points and followed that by winning the average with a 163. Whitfield won the first go round with a 79. That ride was worth \$375.

Whitfield added another \$375 to his winnings by placing second in the average. Shawn Egg was third in average and second in the first go round to collect \$475.

Mike Furr won \$150 for placing third in the first go round.

Total purse for the Bad Company Rodeo Productions event was \$2,500 including \$1,000 added money.

It looked like the Bad Company bulls would dominate the evening as the first four riders failed to stay on for the required eight seconds. Shawn Egg was the first to go the distance and managed a 76 which was good for second place.

There were a total of 29 outs on the evening.

In other events, Karen Townsend of Fredonia won the barrel racing to collect \$297.25. Barbara Gabriel of Harper and

Johanna Fox of Three Rivers finished second and third.

Pam Jones of Sonora finished sixth. In the calf roping Ricky Canton of Houston won the average to take home \$2,108. Canton finished second in the first go round, third in the second go round and first in the short go.

Ray Cooper of Childress finished second and Jim Fuller third.

Richard Gonzales of Rosharon topped the 27 entries in the steer roping event. Gonzales took home \$2,090.90 with the win which included fourth in the third go round and first in the short go round.

Sonoran Arnold Felts finished third in the second and third go rounds.

Kenneth Mauldin of Sonora finished third in average in the steer roping event. Mauldin placed third in the second and fourth go rounds.

Mickey Powers, also of Sonora, took first place in the third go round.

Other events included at the Sonora Sensation were a horseshoe pitching contest and goat-cooking contest.

Monday night of the week from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p. m.

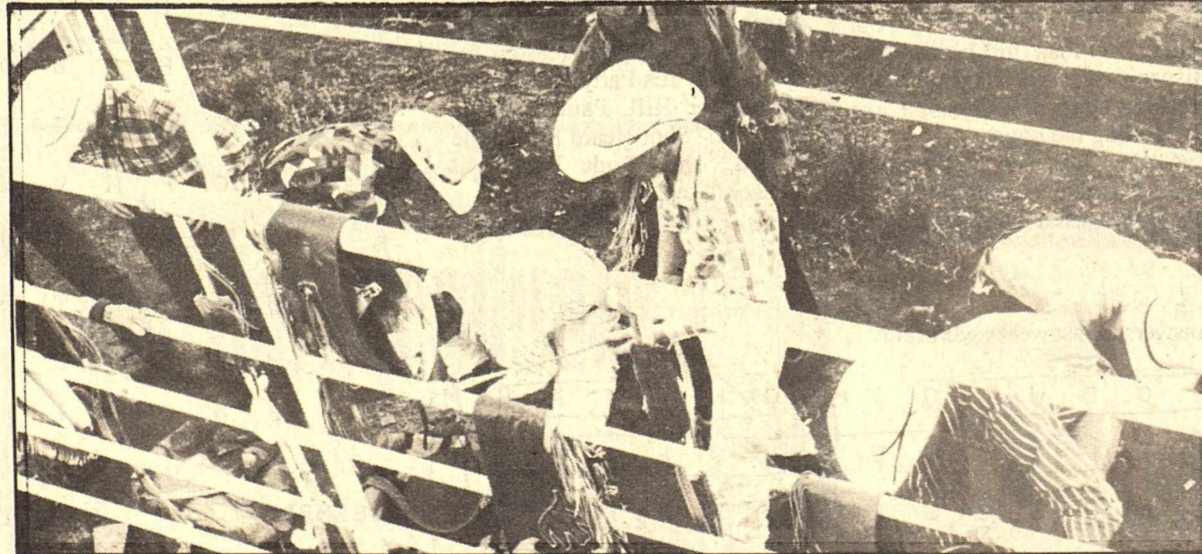
Starting on June 21, the pool will offer Teen Night each Thursday night of the week from 6:30p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

## Sutton County: 100 years and counting

Belt buckles, stock certificates, window displays, pageants, and much more all contribute to the centennial celebration for Sutton County.

The belt buckles and stock certificates are perhaps the top keepsake items.

The idea of a centennial belt buckle for Sutton County was brought up by Reverend Kent Kepler. He got the idea after a city in Nebraska was celebrating their centennial in 1984. Since it was

his idea, Kepler was selected as the chairman.

"I think it's going to be a real beautiful buckle," said Kepler.

The buckles are available in three different metals, brass, silver and silver with gold highlights.

The brass buckles are \$26.75; silver, \$192.60 and the silver with gold highlights at \$240.75.

The design of the buckle was originally done by Chris Jones. At the direction of the committee the buckle was revised by Ron Nicholas and Dr. Patti Strauch provided the drawings of the

examples of local livestock.

Buckle orders are currently being taken. Winnie Allen said 33 buckles have already been ordered.

The first order of belt buckles is expected to arrive around July 4. Buckle orders are being accepted now with delivery expected to take six to eight weeks.

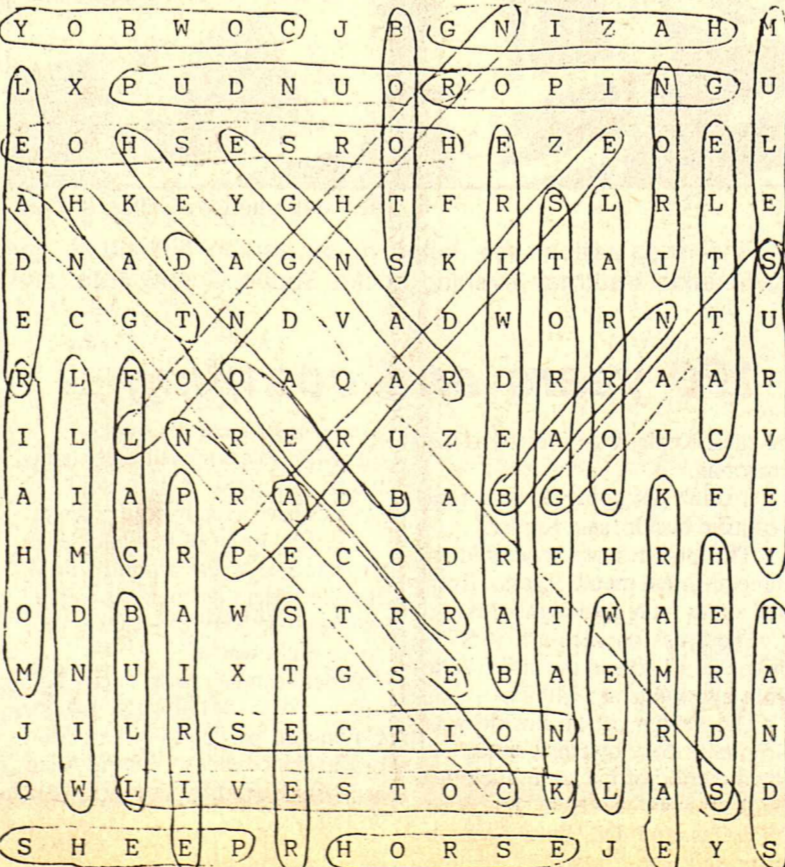
Dear Editor,

Sonora has a fever. At this point it manifests itself more from an underlying apathy rather than conscious actions. Underlying problems are far more bewildering to deal with because they simply defy genuine isolation.

Such is the case with the verbal bantering that has filled the "Letters to the Editor" column recently. The fever of which I speak, of course, is racial accusation and complaints. Though the circumstances seem to support such accusations, the problem is caused by the very people who complain the most and are apathetic in their contributions to a more harmonious community.

Last week's issue saw yet another accusation made against The Devil's River News. To make matters worse, the individual included "A Centennial Salute to Sonora and Sutton County, 1890-1990," funded solely by it's advertisers and The Covered Wagon Dinner Theater. Fortunately, it was these accusations that helped me to isolate the real problem and causation of the 'fever', mentioned above.

Having limited involvement in the newspaper and the dinner theater, I know that the complainant is absolutely mistaken in the information he supplied the reader and "dead wrong" in his conclusions. I seriously doubt that I will treat his future letters with any degree of credibility, as has been the consensus of those with whom I have spoken during the last couple of days.

I know for a fact, the CWDT salute was promoted widely in the paper and verbally to just about all who would take the moment to listen. The CWDT has solicited participation, in all four of it's summer sessions, from all elements of our community. It's success has been uplifting for those who have given their time

and effort, rewards have been multitudinous and significant talents have been discovered. Even so, the tabloid and performances lack the Mexican 'flavor' for which the founders sought and presently seek, due to a lack of participation of Hispanic interests.

There has been great concern over the apparent apathy shown by the Hispanic prospects contacted to come and assist in sharing their respective portion of Sonora's heritage. Sonora has evolved from the sweat and blood of both the Hispanic and Caucasian elements. We, who are interested in portraying our past and present to those who will join and listen, are quite proud of our bi-racial heritage and feel the need to utilize it in both personal and social growth and fulfillment.

This institution will most certainly survive the trivial pursuits of misguided social activists, but they can surely create a formidable barrier of tension and distrust and make a mutual commitment to unity difficult.

Nevertheless, it requires we participate in overcoming ignorance of one-another, building on our strengths, nursing our flaws rather than picking at them, and an incredible amount of action.

Our town has always accompanied me in my travels and interactions with other nationalities and races. Right or wrong, good or bad, I experience a significant amount of pride being a Sonoran and would like to be a part of its harmonious and continued growth.

### Galindo celebrates birthday

On May 12, Braulio Galindo celebrated his 60th birthday and retirement from the United States Air Force. The celebration took place at his sister Nilda Hernandez's home in Sonora.

His career in the Air Force has spanned 40 years. He was nine when he became interested in airplanes. He was introduced to them by watching movies. He went on to continue his education through the 12th grade, but he did not graduate. Instead he enlisted in the Air Force, at the age of 19, on September 2, 1949. He was sent to Lackland AFB in San Antonio for basic training. He served 18 months in Korea. While there he earned his G. E. D. In May 1951, although he was still in Korea, his diploma was presented to his father in the regular graduation ceremonies of Sonora High School.

He came home to Sonora in February 1952, and was married to Vita Urias on February 10. Vita is the daughter of Jesus and Leocadia Urias. Braulio and Vita honeymooned in Florida because he was sent to Eglin AFB and continued to serve their until 1953. He was discharged from the Air Force on February 3, 1953. They moved to San Antonio to look for work, but he did not find work so he reenlisted in the Air Force on February 24, 1953.

In September 1953 he was sent to Spartan School of Aeronautics in Tulsa, Oklahoma to study aircraft and engine mechanics for which he received a certificate for "Qualified Engine Mechanics." Authorizing him to work on military and airline aircraft. They moved back to San Antonio to make their home. On March 14, 1955 he went to work for Howard Aero Inc. as an aircraft mechanic. Three months later on July 15, 1955 their first son, Robert, was born. Then on July 6, 1961 their first daughter was, Cecilia, was born. He continued to work for Howard Aero for 9 years.

On October 3, 1964, he joined the Air Reserve Technician program. He was a civilian in a military position which was a dual job. He was assigned as an aircraft flight mechanic at Kelly AFB, the 433rd troop carrier wing.

On December 4, 1965 their twins, Melinda and Melissa were born. On October 10, 1968 their second son, Raymond was born.

In 1970, he was assigned as a flight engineer at Kelly AFB. His



basic flight training was accomplished at Little Rock AFB in Arkansas. He returned to San Antonio on December 3, 1970 and qualified as a flight one engineer. Then he was sent to Dyess AFB in Abilene, Tx. in April 1970 to qualify for aircraft engineer phases 2 and 3. He flew missions hauling cargo, moving personnel and administrative missions to different places such as--Spain, Germany, England, The Azores, New Foundland, Puerto Rico, Panama, Colombia, Venezuela, Bolivia, Peru, Guatamala, Equador, Mexico, Hawaii and Alaska. On June 7, 1973 he received 1,000 hours of flight time on the C130 Hercules. Active flying status ceased in 1980 at which time he had accumulated 4,884 hours of fly time. He left the Air Reserve Technician Program on February 24, 1974 and was assigned to the Department of Defense contract administration services as a quality assurance specialist. He monitored military contacts around San Antonio for manufacture of aircraft parts for military use. He continued at this position until November 6, 1989 at which time he retired with 40 years of service.

On July 9, 1985, his wife, Vita was awarded a certificate of appreciation from the Air Force Reserves for unselfish, faithful and devoted service.

On March 29, 1990 he was awarded a certificate of retirement from the United States Air Force Reserves for having served 40 years, 2 months and 21 days.

We would like to thank all those who attended and helped celebrate this occasion.

## West Texas sheep conference set

Area sheep producers are urged to attend the West Texas Sheep Conference May 18 at the Angelo State University's Management, Instruction and Research (MIR) Center. The conference is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service staff in Tom Green, Menard, Schleicher and Concho counties.

"Because the sheep and wool industry is so vital to this area, the coordinators of the conference have made a real effort to present the best information possible to help producers with practical management decisions to increase their net income," said Rex Jones, Tom Green County

extension agent. "During the conference, we will be looking at ASU's facilities and using live animal evaluations to illustrate points made during the day."

Among the topics discussed will be ram epididymitis, the Australian method of wool grading, ultrasound, internal parasite control, the lamb market, and the ideal feeder lamb.

Live demonstrations will include selection techniques for ewes, Rambouillet rams, and blackface rams. Palpation techniques used in determining epididymitis also will be demonstrated.

Lunch is free. Further information is available from county extension agents.

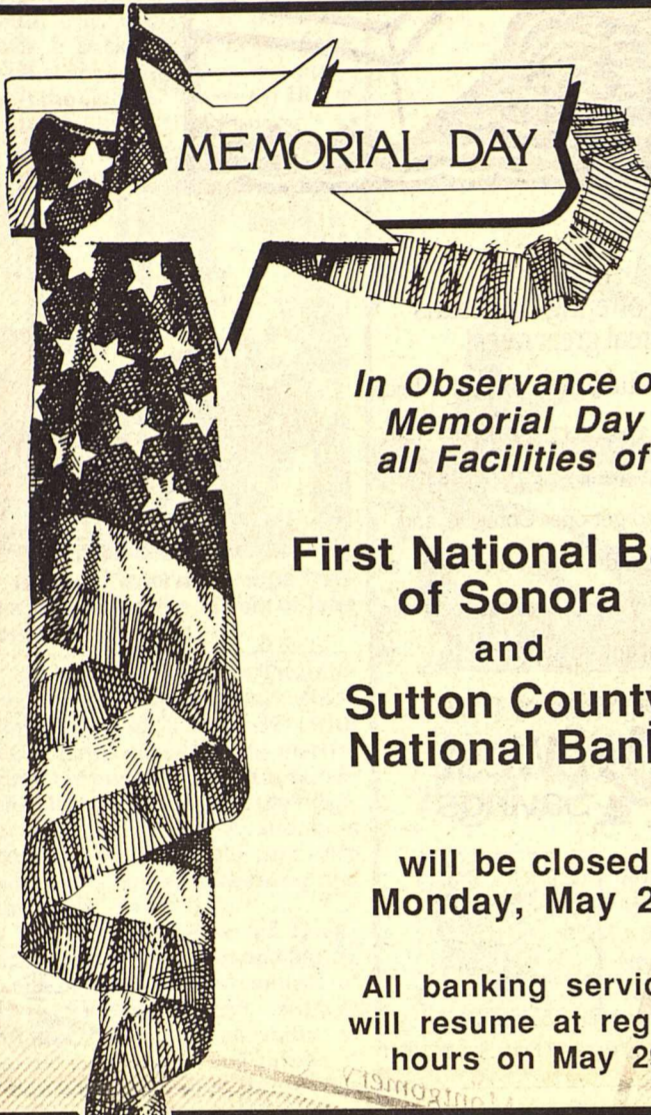

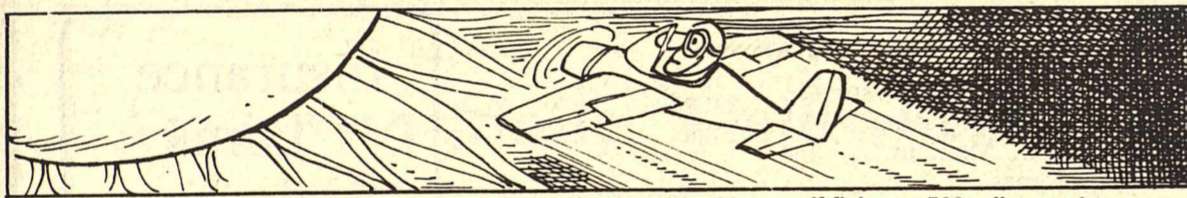

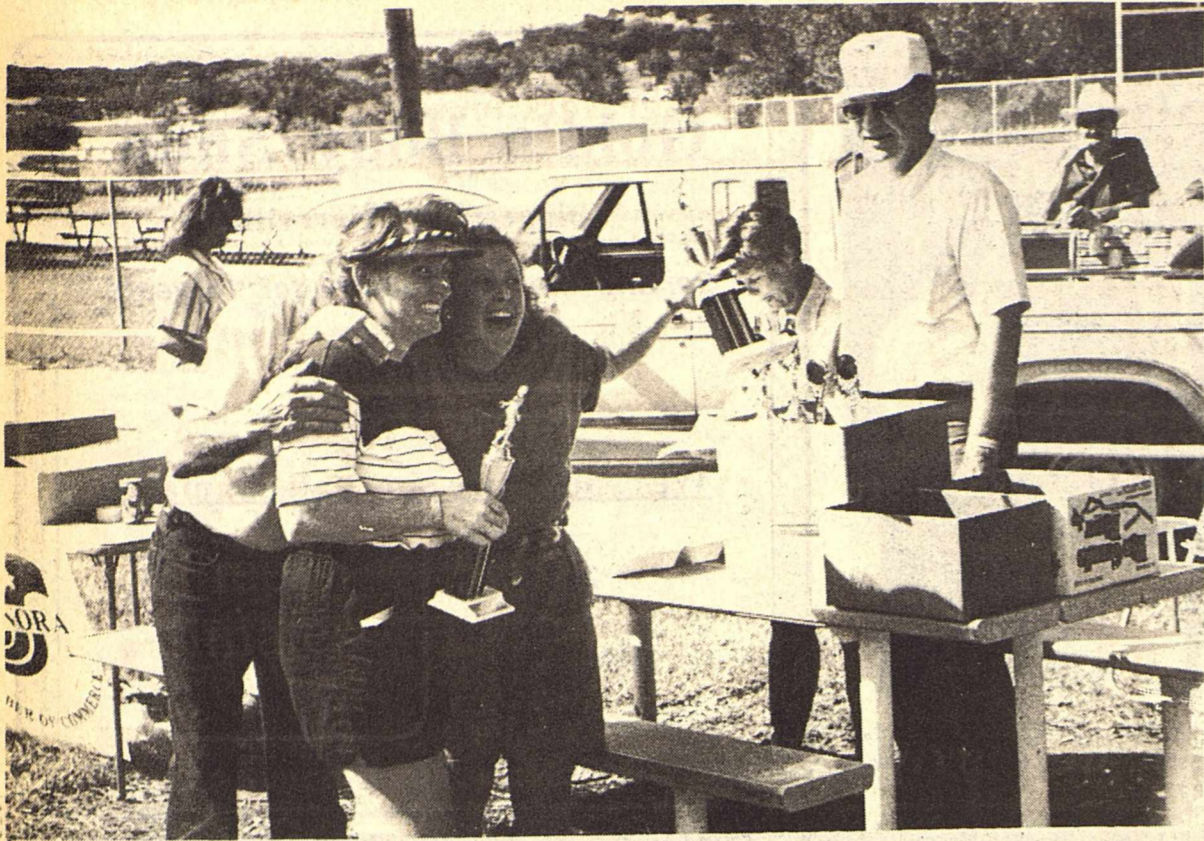

The Rodeo Club will also be sponsoring a calf roping school May 30-31 beginning at 7:30 a.m. each day.

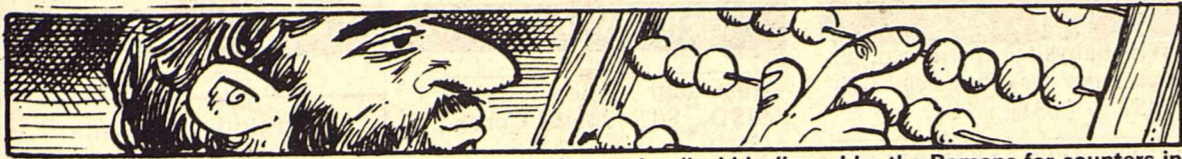
