Damages from May 11 storm surpasses \$250,000 in Sonora

More than \$250,000 in damages to vehicles have been claimed by Sonorans following a 15-minute storm May 11 which included golf ball size hail. Damage amounts are expected to rise as adjustors began looking at living quarters this week.

State Farm Insurance set up at the Devil's River Inn May 18-19 to look at vehicles damaged by hail during the storm.

Ed LeClair, claims superintendent for State Farm Insurance in San Angelo, said the company looked at 190 vehicles in the two day period handing out checks worth more than \$270,000. A total of 207 vehicles were claimed in Sonora.

"More claims will be reported as people who didn't think they had much damage from the storm will realize it is worse than expected," said LeClair.

LeClair said the average settlement in Sonora for trucks, vans, autos, busses and other vehicles was \$1,600. He said that compares with an average of \$1,000 to \$1,200 in San Angelo during a recent storm.

Local State Farm agent Sam Dillard said that a catastrophe situation has been declared for Sonora. This means that the company will try to look at all houses that are covered by their insurance company.

Dillard said a preliminary report showed 225-250 houses with claims entered.

LeClair said adjusters will look at houses by a code of severity which has been set up. Codes one and two are the most severe hit houses. Code one is a house that is uninhabitable while code two is a house that may have other major damage plus a leaking roof.



Big changes for Texas households by Wayne Munn, Realtor*

Texas households in the year 2025 will be dramatically different than they were in 1980, according to a demographer with the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University.

"By the year 2025, the average Texas household size will have declined from 2.71 persons to 2.37," said Steve H. Murdock. "While there will be more households, new households will

be forming at a much slower rate." An aging population will have an impact on future housing. In 1980, 36% of all households were renting. By 2025, only 30% will

be, said Murdock. "The middle-aged householders of the 1980's will be the elderly householders of 2025," Murdock said. "Householders more than 65 years old made up 17.6% of the total in 1980. By 2025, however, this group will include 30.6% of

all heads of households.' Murdock said the changing household patterns have tremendous implications for Texas Real Estate. Smaller households will need downsized housing. While there will be fewer renters and more owner, the owners will be more middle-aged and elderly and less inclined to buy and sell Fewer young housing. households mean fewer first-time buyers and eventually fewer moveup buyers.

Although age structure and household characteristics (family size and marital status) influence the residential real estate markets in Texas, population change is a

principal determinant.

The rate of population growth depends on either natural increase or migration and population growth through net migration has a larger effect on the demand for residential real estate than growth through natural increase. Migration usually involves young adults who have immediate needs

Other important factors on housing demand are general economic trends, changes in family income, interest rates, the availability of capital, and the stock of existing homes.

The predictions are that the market for housing in Texas in the 1990s should be slightly more robust than in the nations as a whole and we are already experiencing an increase in demand in Sonora. We have the stock existing homes and the migration is in progress.

Galindo celebrates birthday Adams and Landry

celebrated his 60th birthday and retirement from the United States Air Force. The celebration took place at his sister Nilda Hernandez's home in Sonora.

His career in the Air Force has spanned 40 years. He was nine when he became interested in airplanes. He was introduced to them by watching movies. He went on to continue his education through the 12th grade, but he did not graduate. Instead he enlisted in the Air Force, at the age of 19, on September 2, 1949. He was sent to Lackland AFB in San Antonio for basic training. He served 18 months in Korea. While there he earned his G. E. D. In May 1951, although he was still in Korea, his diploma was presented to his father in the regular graduation ceremonies of Sonora High School.

He came home to Sonora in February 1952, and was married to Vita Urias on February 10. Vita is the daughter of Jesus and Leocadia Urias. Braulio and Vita honeymooned in Florida because he was sent to Eglin AFB and continued to serve their until 1953. He was discharged from the Air Force on February 3, 1953. They moved to San Antonio to look for work, but he did not find work so he reenlisted in the Air Force on February 24, 1953.

In September 1953 he was sent to Spartan School of Aueronautics in Tulsa, Oklahoma to study aircraft and engine mechanics for which he received a certificate for "Qualified Engine Mechanics." Authorizing him to work on military and airline aircraft. They moved back to San Antonio to make their home. On March 14, 1955 he went to work for Howard Aero Inc. as an aircraft mechanic. Area sheep producers are urged to attend the West Texas Sheep Conference May 18 at the Angelo State University's Management, Instruction and Research (MIR) Center. The conference is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service staff in Tom Green, Menard, Schleicher and Concho counties.

Registration begins at 9 a. m. and the formal program begins at 9:30 a. m.

"Because the sheep and wool industry is so vital to this area, the coordinators of the conference have made a real effort to present the best information possible to help producers with practical management decisions to increase their net income," said Rex Jones, Tom Green County extension agent.

"During the conference, we will be looking at ASU's facilities and using live animal evaluations to illustrate points made during the day."

Among the topics discussed will be ram epididymitis, the Australian method of wool grading, ultrasound, internal parasite control, the lamb market, and the ideal feeder lamb.

Live demonstrations will include selection techniques for ewes, Rambouillet rams, and blackface rams. Palpation techniques used in determining epididymitis also will be demonstrated.
