## County hires firm to look at redistricting

The Sutton County Commission hired the law firm of Bickerstaff, Heath and Smalling Monday, to look into possible changes of the county voting districts.

The same firm reapportioned the districts for the Sutton County Commission last time it was done in the early 1980s. Changes in the voting districts must be made following each census.

Bickerstaff, Heath and Smalling were hired despite County Judge Carla Fields' recommendation of hiring Jim Allison and Associates, also of Austin.

Commissioner Bill Keel, who had had contact with Allison and Bickerstaff in Austin, preferred hiring Bickerstaff.

"I was more impressed with Mr. Bickerstaff," said Keel. "I wouldn't give Jim Allison 15 cents."

"I was just going by the fact they (Allison firm) charged static prices," said Fields.

According to Fields, both firms would charge \$2,500 for research into whether redistricting would be needed. After that, Fields said, Allison would charge up to \$6,000 with added costs at the county's approval.

No firm estimates were given

for Bickerstaff.

Fields had said the cost of reapportionment in the early 1980s was around \$20,000, but commissioner Mike Villanueva had figures which showed it was around \$15,000.

Fields also said there were some reported problems between the voting registrar and the Allison firm during the last reapportionment.

Graves said he found no evidence of the situation.

"I went through (the reapportionment case) and am aware of no problems," said Graves.

## Espinosa finishes fourth at state meet

AUSTIN - Eric Espinosa finished fourth in the 3A State 110-meter hurdles in Austin Saturday afternoon.

The fourth place finish equals last year's finish by Espinosa in the 300-meter high hurdles at state.

Espinosa finished with a time of 14.8 seconds, just .7 seconds off the winning time.

Espinosa is a senior at Sonora High School and finishes his career as a high school athlete. He competed in football as a tailback where he rushed for more than 900 yards his senior year and led the Broncos in touchdowns.

## No moves made in personnel at schools

After a two-hour executive session, Sonora School Board members took no action on recommended personnel changes by Sonora superintendent Charles Russell.

In an interview Monday afternoon Russell said he would recommend Warren McCarson be reassigned to vocational director.

Other possible moves, Russell said, would include current Junior High principal Smith Neal replace McCarson as Administrative Assistant and Janet Patton to Junior High School principal.

Russell said some of Patton's current duties would be picked up, but the position would be absorbed. He described the move as cost-effective.

When asked after the meeting why no action took place, Russell explained that board member Jesse Bustamante was unavailable during the executive session.

Bustamante was at the meeting until the executive session.

Patton was interviewed by the board in executive session for about 40 minutes, but no details are available.

During the interview Monday, Russell said the personnel changes were being recommended for the best interests of the school

system.

In other news from the meeting, during his superintendent's report, Russell ran down the schedule for graduation.

On May 24 the end of school breakfast will be held at 8:30 a. m. with graduation practice scheduled for the football field at 9:30 a. m. Graduation itself will be at 8:30 p. m. Friday.

Action taken by the board included the approval of Eckert, Ingram, Tinkler, Oilphant and Featherston as the audit firm for 1991-92.

## Sonora 2A?

Sonora schools superintendent Charles Russell said there is a possibility Sonora could be a 2A football team in 1993.

During the school board meeting Tuesday, Russell said April's figures plugged into the athletic formula showed Sonora had 281 students in the high school.

The current low mark for 3A is 285 students.

The University Interscholastic League will look to realign next December or January using attendance figures from October 1991 if the current system continues.

## Voting hot in runoff

The runoff between Lemuel Lopez and Bob Mooney for the final city council slot has drawn quite a bit of interest in Sonora.

City Secretary Becky Covington said 50 people voted absentee on the opening day (Monday) and by 3 p. m. Tuesday 75 people had voted. Absentee voting continues through May 21.

Election day is May 25. The polls will be open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Neither of the candidates are surprised by the high absentee vote total, but are pleased with the turnout.

"It (vote total) signifies a lot more people are interested in the election," said Lopez. "That's always a good thing."

Mooney said, "I've been advising people to vote absentee...I felt at least as many or more people would vote in this runoff."

Election day follows graduation and is the start of the Memorial Day Weekend which is expected to shrink the number of votes cast.

"A lot of people will be leaving town by then," said Covington.

While Lopez said he will wait until May 25 to see if the large turnout is a blessing for him or not, Mooney said it would be a better consensus of opinion.

"I think I'll have a better idea of what the people think," said Mooney.

Expanding on the thought, Mooney said he has noticed that a new person running has had the advantage.

"Since I've been on the council the newcomer draws the vote."

In Mooney's first try he garnered the most votes, then Campbell last year and Preston Love this year.

"I don't know what it is, but maybe the newcomer tries a little better," Mooney said.

Rodeo action returns to Sonora this weekend as the Sonora Sensation prepares for another year.

An eight-calf match roping contest featuring Keith Hudson of Sonora will be one of the best draws for this year's event which begins Friday and will wrap up Sunday.

Hudson, who picked up a roping championship at the Houston Livestock and Rodeo earlier this year will take on Jerry Alley of Del Rio. The match will be held Saturday following the Open Calf Roping at 1 p. m.

written and said about the bill is untrue.

While every American feels very sorry for all the pain and suffering that Jim Brady has had to endure, the bill named after him must still be debated openly and honestly.

A few weeks ago, Congressman Charles E. Schumer (D-NY), Chairman of the House Subcommittee on Crime and Criminal Justice, held hearings on the Brady bill.

Unfortunately, opponents of the bill, including Congressman and expert witnesses, were barred from those hearings. Apparently, Congressman Schumer has about as much respect for the First Amendment as he has shown for the Second.

Among those not allowed to testify was Jacquie Miller, one of the victims in the highly publicized "assault weapon" shooting at the Standard Gravure printing plant in Louisville, Kentucky.

Like James Brady, Jacquie was severely wounded and is confined to a wheelchair. But unlike Brady, she was not allowed to testify as a pro-gun witness. You see, Jacquie was armed and, had she not stopped to render assistance to a victim of the shooting, was within seconds of ending

Westbecker's mad shooting spree with her own .38 revolver.

Along with this letter is the testimony Jacquie was not allowed to give at those hearings. I think it would be a service to your readers if you would include her testimony or the Brady bill True/False quiz, also enclosed, in your next article on gun control.

I am pro-gun and support the right to keep and bear arms. The Brady bill is not a harmless waiting period, but a permit-to-purchase law. It would change gun ownership from a right to a privilege that could be granted or denied at the whim of a police chief. Whether you are pro- or anti-gun, wouldn't you agree with the public's right to know this information?

If you need further information, I would recommend that you contact Gun Owners of America (703) 321-8585. They are a Washington, D. C.-based pro-gun lobby group that can provide some balance to anti-gun groups like Handgun control that wrote the Brady bill. Sarah Brady is Chairman of Handgun Control, Inc.

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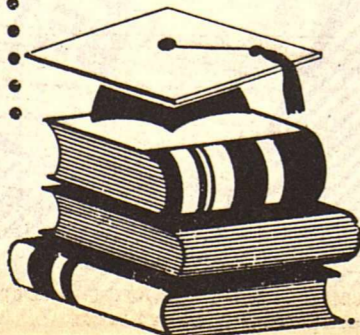

## How can you prevent skin cancer?

Even though overexposure to the sun is the leading cause, it isn't necessary to give up the outdoors in order to reduce your chances of developing skin cancer. Just use good sense and simple measures whenever you work or play in the sun - repeated sunburns are particularly risky.

Cover up with a wide-brimmed hat, and a bandanna for your neck; wear long-sleeved shirts and pants the sun can't penetrate.

Use sunscreens to help prevent skin cancer as well as premature aging of your skin. You'll want a sun protective factor (SPF) rating of 15 or higher. Women can get a little added protection by using tinted opaque cosmetic foundations along with a sunscreen. Apply sunscreen at least an hour before going into the sun and again after swimming or perspiring a lot. Don't use indoor sunlamps, or tanning pills.

Know the ways of the rays for your best protection. You can get burned on a cloudy day. The rays can reach down into three feet of water. The rays can reach down into three feet of water. Try to stay out of the direct sun at midday, as the sun's rays are strongest between 11 a. m. and 2 p. m. and beware of high altitudes - there's less atmosphere to filter out the ultraviolet rays. Skiers should remember that snow reflects the sun's rays, too.

Know your skin. Whatever your skin type, do a monthly self-exam of your skin to note any moles, blemishes or birthmarks. Check them once a month and if you notice any changes in size, shape or color or if a sore does not heal, see your physician without delay.

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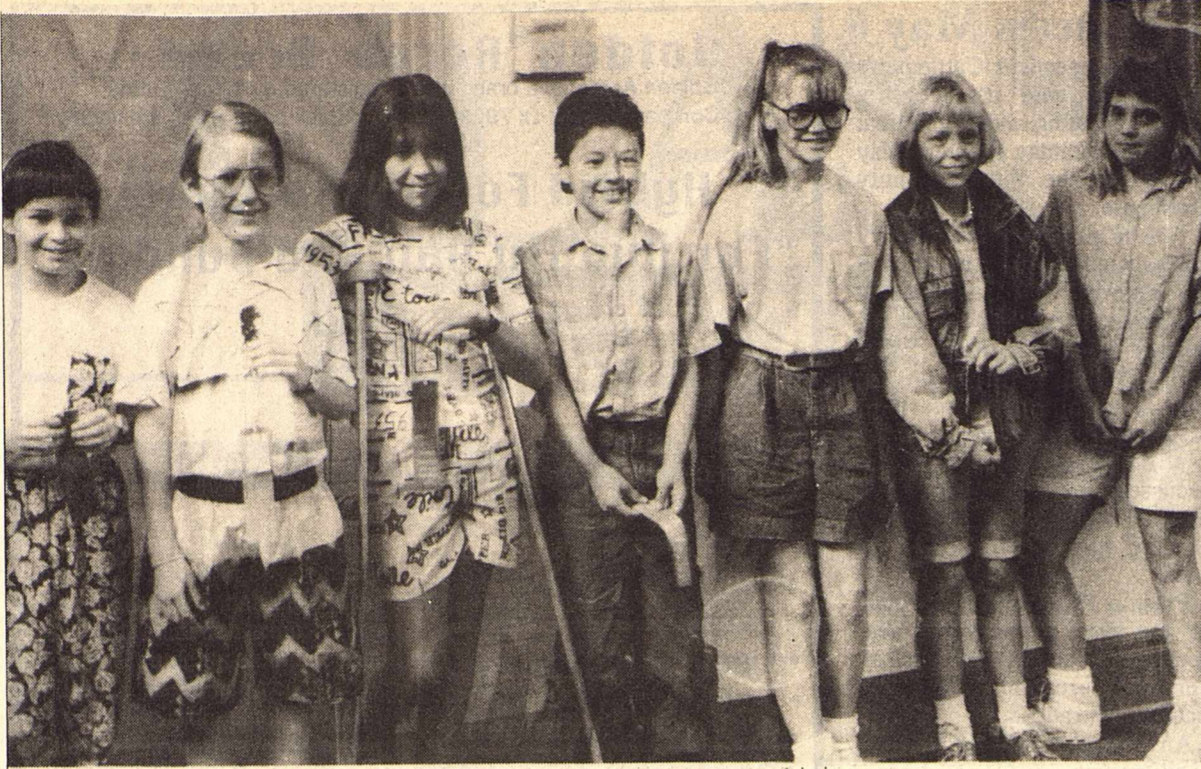

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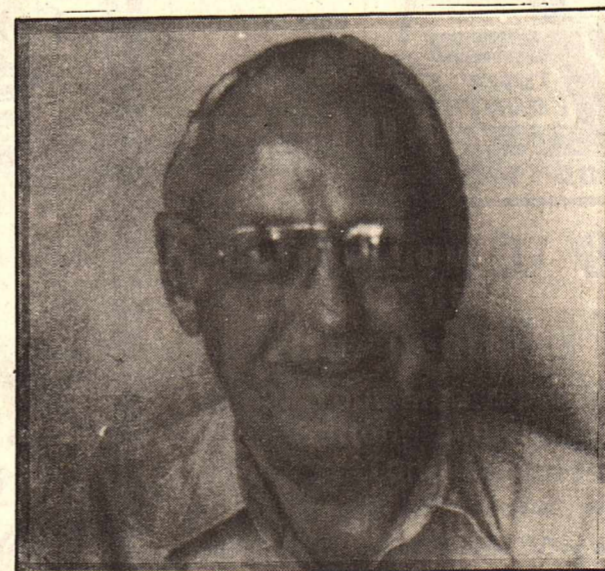

### Soil survey to take place May 19 -20

Five soil scientists with the Soil Conservation Service will be in Sonora on May 19 - 20 working on the Soil Survey of Edwards County according to Lynn Loomis, with the SCS.

Wayne Gabriel and Lynn Loomis from Uvalde, Rex Cochran of Alpine, Dennis Williamson of Big Spring, and Tommy Lovelace from George West will be stationed in Sonora for a week to complete the soil survey of the Edwards Plateau Soil and Water Conservation District in Edwards County.

Many people ask us what a soil survey is. Loomis explained that "it is the most comprehensive natural resource information available to most rural residents, and a very useful management tool for ranchers". He added "a soil survey can be used to plan management of brush, grazing, pasture, cropland, wildlife habitat,

and a host of other ranch management practices".

The soil scientists observe the geology, vegetation, landforms and other surface features as they traverse the network of ranch roads in half ton trucks. At selected locations they examine soil properties in small holes opened with hand tools or in cores obtained with a hydraulic soil probe. Loomis says they always cover up the small holes they dig.

Fieldwork for the Soil Survey of Edwards and Real Counties began in January 1990 and is scheduled for completion in January 1993. Five soil scientists working out of Rocksprings last June mapped 450,000 acres. Last year, the soil scientists completed surveys on 650,000 acres in southern Edwards County.

The survey crew will move to Rocksprings from May 27 to May 31 and June 17 to June 29. The

scientists hope to complete 450,000 acres of soil surveys in May and June. Their goal is to survey most of what is left of Edwards County according to Loomis.
