City takes step toward single-member districts

The Sonora City Council voted unanimously Tuesday morning to proceed planning for singlemember districts.

City Secretary Becky Covington said the next step is to form a voting-member committee to work with the city council to come up with a plan and to hire a firm to do a study.

The decision to "volunteer" for single-member district came after City Attorney Beth Wallace informed the council, "It appears the courts really do favor singlemember districts."

Wallace said she had talked with officials in other cities who had faced the same issue and found a lawsuit be expensive.

"We're looking at a real steep cost factor either way (win or lose)," said Wallace.

Despite the latest move by the council Wallace said, "Drawing lines (for districts) is a long way

Galindo appeal goes through

SAN ANTONIO - Jose Alfredo Galindo is expected to be a free man this week after his conviction on a drug charge was reversed and remanded by the Fourth Court of Appeals in San Antonio late last

The Court of Appeals reversed the verdict of the Galindo trial due to the State improperly excluded Mexican-Americans from the jury.

Galindo's attorney, Domingo Garcia of Dallas, stated it more strongly, "The decision was reversed on the basis of intentional discrimination by your district attorney (J.W. Johnson Jr.)."

The exclusion of jurors due strictly to race is in violation of the Batson Supreme Court ruling.

In its' opinon filed May 15, the Courth of Appeals wrote the trial courts ruling that there was no Batson violation was in error.

Favela appeal filed SAN ANTONIO - Following on Favela's attorney, Fred Tinsely

Galindo appeal, Tomas "Tiny" Favela has appealed his conviction to the Fourth Court of Appeals in San Antonio.

Favela was one of 14 people arrested during an undercover narcotics operation in 1989.

In October 1989, Favela was tried and found guilty of selling methamphetamines to Lonnie Hood, an undercover agent. Favela was sentenced to 90 years.

Garcia said it is back to square one concerning a trial.

"It is strictly discretionary on the part of the District Attorney as to whether there is another trial,"

the heels of the successful Alfredo of Dallas, said the appeal was based on sufficiency of evidence Tinsely declined to go into any further detail.

While Tinsely is representing Favela in the appeal it was Joseph Montemayor who defended Favela during the appeal.

"It is almost standard practice (to change attorney's for an appeal)," said Tinsely.

Tinsely said the appeal was filed last week and the state now has 30 days to respond to the brief.

Merck placed third in the second go-round at 18.05 for a combined




time of 35.93.

Galindo was convicted on a charge of delivery of a controlled substance and sentenced to life in October 1989 after being arrested in March 1988 during an undercover operation conducted over four months.

Garcia had appealed the Galindo conviction on three points.

The first was improper exclusion of Mexican-Americans from the jury; second, the State failed to disclose exculpatory material until the fifth day of the trial and third, the court erred in admitting evidence of an extraneous offense.

Galindo originally filed his appeal Jan. 23, 1990. His appeal hearing came one year later to the date, followed by the decision last week.

The court did not look at the

other two points after finding reasons for reversal on the first. Garcia said he hopes the errors of the first trial can be avoided.

'Maybe the District Attorney will realize they have been duped by this Lonnie Hood," said Garcia in reference to the State's top witness.

Hood was the agent hired by Sutton County Sheriff Bill Webster to do the extended undercover operation in late 1988 and early 1989.

The operation resulted in 14 arrests of which eight were Hispanic.

"The District Attorney and law enforcement need to re-evaluate the arrests made by this sleaze-ball character (Lonnie Hood)...and consider dropping the charges,' said Garcia.

1 tsp. vanilla 2 1/4 cups all purpose flour

2 tsp. baking powder 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon (optional)

Puree bananas in blender (1 cup). In medium bowl, combine bananas, eggs, sugar and butter until well blended. Stir in blueberries and vanilla. In large bowl, combine flour, baking powder, cinnamon and salt. Stir banana mixture into flour mixture until evenly moistened. Spoon batter into well-greased 2 1/2 inch muffin cups. Bake in 350 degree oven 25 to 30 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Serve warm. Makes 12 muffins.







*Many abusers have a rigid, traditional view of sex roles and parenting.

Work affects retirement differently first year

retirement is, "I know there's a limit on how much I can earn in a year and still get all my Social Security benefits, but what if I've already made more than that limit when I retire?"

The answer is really simple: during your first year of retirement, even if your earnings exceed the yearly limit, you can get a Social Security benefit for any month your earnings are below a special monthly limit.

Here's how it works. In 1991, the yearly earnings limit for people under 65 is \$7,080, and for people 65 and older, \$9,720. Beneficiaries who are 70 or older do not have an earnings limit.

But because this is John's first year of retirement, he can get a full Social Security benefit for any month his earnings are under \$810. So, John will get Social Security checks from July through December even though he's made significantly more than the 1991 earnings limit.

The monthly earnings limits can apply for one year only. It is also applied to the Social Security benefits of children and their mothers or fathers during the first year they start receiving dependents or survivors benefits, and in the year their benefits end.
