SAN ANTONIO - Jose Alfredo Galindo is expected to be a free man this week after his conviction on a drug charge was reversed and remanded by the Fourth Court of

week. The Court of Appeals reversed the verdict of the Galindo trial due to the State improperly excluded Mexican-Americans from the jury.
