## What is groundwater? <br> \section*{by Mike Smith}

The volume of underground water

More than half this nation's people More than half this nation's people

- including nine out of 10 rural Americans - depend on groundwater for their drinking water.
Many people mistakenly believe that groundwater is trapped in large underground pools or flows beneath Instead, in most regions. groundwater initially falls as rain or snow. It then filters down from the soil surface to fill the myriad cracks
and spaces below the earth's surface and spaces below the earth's surface.
Groundwater is never pure
Contrary to widely held belief, groundwater is never pure in the
sense that it contains sense that it contains two parts
hydrogen, one part oxygen and hydrogen, one part oxygen and
nothing else. Water usually picks up minerals as it percolates addition, chemicals and microorganisms also can become dissolved or suspended in the water. substance and how much of it is in the water. For example, natural minerals such as limestone
(calcium) may make drinking water (calcium) may make drinking water
"taste better". On the other hand, even a small concentration of sulfur can give water a "rotten egg" smell and an unpleasant taste. Chemical and microbial (viral and groundwater occurs in some regions groundwater occurs in some regions
of the country. In fact, in several areas the most often detected source of groundwater contamination is viral and bacterial organisms from
human and animal waste human and animal waste, not
agricultural run-off or industrial agricult
waste.

The largest volume of potentia contaminants comes from poorly
designed waste treatment systems designed waste treatment systems.
Improperly installed septic tanks and cesspools are the primary source of biological pathogens and nitrates in groundwater. Household products such as detergents
discharged into disposal systems alscharged into disposal system
contaminate groundwater

PROPERY TAX APPRAISAL
PROTEST AND PROCEDURES

A property owner may protest the appraised value of his property or any other action by the chief appraiser, the appraisal district, or the appraisal review board (ARB) that adversely affects the property owner. A property owner must file a written protest with the ARB

A notice is sufficient if:

1) it identifies the protesting property owner (including a person claiming an ownership interest);
it identifies the property that is the subject of the protest; and
2) it indicates dissatisfaction with some determination of the appraisa office.

DEADLINE FOR FILING A NOTICE OF PROTEST:
The deadline is midnight June 24. If the appraisal notice was mailed to you on May 2 or later, or if your protest concerns change in use of land appraised as agricultural, open space, or timber land, the deadline is midnight of the 30th day after the appraisal notice was mailed to you If the protest concerns a change made by the ARB, the deadline is midnight of the 10th day after the notice was mailed to you.
If you received no notice, the deadline is midnight of the day before taxes become delinquent for the year (usually February 1 of the following year).
If you have good cause for missing a deadline, the deadline is midnight of the day before the ARB approves the appraisal records. The ARB decides if you had good caue. Good cause is something beyond a person's control, such as a medical emergency.

The ARB must send you notice of its decision by certified mail.

EEADLINE FOR FILING AN APPEAL OF AN APPRAISAL REVIEW BOARD ORDER: If you are dissatisfied with the ARB's decision, you may file suit in district court. You must file your petition with the district court within 45 days after you receive the ARB's final order.
If your property's appraised value is more than $\$ 1$ million, you must also file a written notice of appeal. File this with the chief appraise within 15 days after you receive the ARB's final order.
