

Fire hits Pool Company grounds

An explosion and fire Monday night caused an estimated \$300,000 damage to Pool Company located on U.S. Highway 277 South.

Todd Churchill of Pool Company said the damage estimate included rigs, tanks and a clean up effort of the draw which runs past Pool.

Sonora Fire Chief Carl Teaff said a representative of the Water Quality Board was at the scene early Tuesday checking the draw for contamination. Teaff said water and fuel went into the draw during firefighting efforts.

Churchill said Pool is responsible for the clean up. The company will scrape away dirt in the draw and dispose of it. Dirt samples will then be taken.

According to Teaff the fire began when an unattended pulling unit of Pool rolled down an incline and smashed into the pumps. The pumps shorted out which, in turn, ignited a gas leak.

Lone Star verdict finalized

On Wednesday, July 31, Judge Brock Jones of the 112th District Court heard arguments in Sonora concerning the jury's verdict in the Martha Miers, et al, versus Lone

Star Gas, et al civil lawsuit. The final disposition of the case awarded the Miers' family \$2.6 million in actual damages and over

a half million dollars in interest. Lone Star Gas Company and

Enserch Exploration were found guilty of negligence that resulted in taking gas without paying for it and conversion of gas (knowingly taking gas that was appropriated without the owner's consent).

Arguments from Lone Star attorneys concerned double recovery of damages and asked that half of the award be set aside.

Judge Jones' decision was based upon, what the plaintiff's attorneys argued, had been the

clear intent of the jury. Taking gas through negligence and converting gas (knowingly taking it) were separate acts at separate times, not involving the same gas. Thus, the jury awarded money for both actions.

As a result, the amounts awarded for each of the two acts of wrong-doing stood separately.

Interest was set at 10%. Lone Star attorneys did not say if an Please see Verdict, page 2

It seemed as if I met half of Sonora in Gosney's store.


The Gosney's purchased the store in 1974 from Carol Ratliff the sister of Tom Ratliff. Bill said

Coming off their best season in almost two decades, the Sonora Broncos will begin preseason workouts Aug. 12.

Sonora head coach Bob Bellard is expecting about 75 students to turnout for the varsity and junior varsity teams.

"We have real good numbers coming up from the eighth-grade," explained the second-year coach who saw low numbers turn out last year at the freshmen level.

Overall, the numbers are up by aout 15 kids over last year.

Providing the nucleus for the ball club will be 18 returning lettermen which Bellard hopes will take a good number of the starting spots. Yet, Bellard said the coaches will have to keep their eyes open to players who have matured during the off-season.

"What I see as the key is we (the coaches) don't go in so set and can't make adjustments (with the personnel)," said Bellard.

The first four days of two-a-days will be without pads and will be a critical time for the players.

During the first four days, Bellard said the players will learn all the offenses and defenses for the entire year.

The most popular teaching technique of coaches is to put in parts of the offense and defense and then perfect them before moving onto something else. Bellard prefers to teach it all in the first four days and then going back and pefecting them.

The first Friday of two-a-days will mark the first time players will don the pads and helmets. After that, another week of practice before the first scrimmage which will be held Aug. 23 at Bronco Stadium against Wall.

The scrimmage will start at 6 p.m. with the junior varsity and varsity will follow.

The civil case was the longest in the 100-year history of Sutton

The case, beginning on June 3, resulted in a verdict on July 26, just minutes after midnight, and final disposition was completed on the last day of July.

The case against Lone Star concerned a bypass line and valve that had been installed 13 years ago. The system, with the valve open, allowed an estimated 40% of the gas from the Miers' B lease to go around the pay meter and into Lone Star's pipeline.

The case in Sutton County was the second involving the bypass line and at least two others have been filed for litigation.

The discovery of the bypass line was the result of an investigation of the field's records for a "take or pay" dispute between Noel Pautsky, the major owner of Oakridge Energy and Lone Star, along with its affiliates.

Pautsky had established the field originally, but sold Lone Star a half interest in the wells in order to complete the field and deliver

This gave Lone Star and Enserch Exploration, Inc. control of the field. Both companies (under the corporate umbrella of Ecserch Corporation) were in total control of the field. They operated the field, metered the gas, transmitted the gas, and marketed

led to many questions that indicated that something was wrong in the Oakridge field.

During his investigation, Pautsky faced numerous obstacles. He lacked money for investigators and had to do much of the work

While trying to figure out what was wrong in the field, he was visiting the Oakridge plant in Edwards County and was bitten by a rattlesnake. He spent time in the Sonora Hospital, but returned to the field later to discover the bypass system.

Pautsky continued his investigation and in December of 1988, he and his petroleum engineer, Mike Claiborne, found the bypass valve and literally uncovered the bypass system.

Pautsky, a 72-year-old oil man, was in bankruptcy when Lone Star settled the lawsuit brought by his company, Oakridge Energy.

The suit was settled in June 1990 in Wichita Falls.

Lone Star agreed to pay Oakridge \$20 million, sell the wells back for \$3.5 million, buy gas from the field for \$3 per MCF for 10 years, and agreed to an 80 percent monthly "take or pay" clause.

The wells bought back will pay out in less than two years, and the spot market for gas is around \$1 per MCF. The settlement also allows Oakridge to sell the gas to another market if the price exceeds

The agreement was reached with a jury in place, just hours before testimony was to begin in Wichita Falls.

Testifying in Sonora, the Chief Executive Officer of Lone Star Gas Company, explained the settlement to Oakridge as a

calculated business decision. He told how he negotiated the settlement because he felt that Pautsky would have a jury's sympathy and damages might be excessive.

The CEO said that the decision to settle was based upon the cost to the company and not upon the company's guilt or innocence.

Lone Star chose to wage the two-month battle in Sutton County because the plaintiffs in this case are an affluent ranching family.

The bypass line, the bypass valve, and the gas stolen were the same in both cases. In the Oakridge case the Pautsky family had a working interest in the wells, and in the Miers' case the family had a royalty interest.

David Biegler, the CEO of Lone Star, was the head of engineering for this division when the gas bypass system was installed.

Internal accounting records of the company indicated that Biegler had authorized the funds for the purchase and installation of the system. Biegler swore that he knew nothing about the bypass system.

When asked to locate the bypass system on a scale model in the courtroom using a Lone Star map, Biegler could find two of the points, but refused to find the third point.

Biegler stepped back and testified that he could not read a pipe map.

As president of Lone Star Gas Company, he considered this case important enough to spend almost a week in Sonora as a witness. He also returned to hear the final arguments of the attorneys.

During the week following the jury's verdict in Sonora, Enserch Corporation announced another promotion for David Biegler.

At age 44, he has just been named Chief Operating Officer of Enserch Corporation and was appointed a director and member of the board of Enserch Corporation. Enserch does business in three major areas.

The first is Lone Star Gas Company, a business devoted to the transmission of natural gas. The second is Enserch Exploration, Inc., an international firm involved in the exploration and production of gas and oil. The third company is Ebasco, a construction and engineering firm, that operates internationally and often builds nuclear plants as well as petroleum installations.

Biegler is now second only to the Enserch CEO in corporate power.

Enserch and Biegler are not through with problems arising from the bypass line and valve. Litagation involving an over-ride interest of the Pautsky's grandchildren is upcoming.

Further charges are on the docket in Edwards County for September of 1992.

This suit involves the same corporate defendants and charges Biegler personally with fraud. The plaintiffs in the Rocksprings case are the Wallace family (George, Martha, and Jeri).

The Miers' family felt victorious in that the jury did uphold their contention that g as had been stolen. The decision however will allow Lone Star to pass the entire damage award along to the consumer as "cost of gas".

If the money had been designated as punitive or exemplary damages, the assessment would have come from corporate profits.

The shoulder is a very complex structure which is very easily injured; only the lower back causes more problems than the shoulder. 



Who is my neighbor? - Luke 10:25-37

The lawyer who came to Jesus, seeking assurance of eternal life, was not about to challenge the divine summary of the Ten Commandments: "Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your life and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor like yourself." And he knew that his fellow experts in the Law couldn't challenge his love for God, because he said the right words, went through the right motions, and led a very respectable kind of life. But there was a point where the genuineness of his faith could be challenged. The "love your neighbor" part stopped him cold, so that he had only 1 recourse: "And who is my neighbor?"

It's hard to say whether or not Jesus' answer surprised the lawyer, but His parable of the Good Samaritan is a revealing and judgmental condemnation upon much that goes under the name of Christianity today. It tends to make much of our assumed or professed Piety seem less than genuine. Of course, as long as we say the right words and belong to the right church, our faith cannot be disproved by our fellow human beings. But the parable of the Good Samaritan pins us to the wall and demands that we 'Put Up

or Shut Up'! There's no question about God's great salvation to eternal life received by faith through His loving gift in the life, death, and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ. However, it is not enough to just say the right words - like "Christ is Lord" or 'I love You, Jesus'. There must be total commitment, placing ourselves at

God's disposal and presenting our bodies as living sacrifices (Romand 12:1). Thus it is not mere words but an act of the will. And the only way we can act in this way toward the Invisible God is to commit ourselves to the needs of our Visible neighbor.

"And who is my neighbor"? Jesus gives us the answer - loudly and clearly! Every human being is our neighbor - regardless of color, background, or social status. May God in His grace deliver us from the bigotry and prejudice that taints our soul and teach us how to love our fellow human beings as He has loved us in the greatest Good Samaritan of all history, Jesus Christ.
