Bovina, long snubbed, or ignored, by candidates in statewide political races, will be honored with a visit Tuesday afternoon by Democrat Don Yarborough, candidate for gov-

He is scheduled to be on hand for a 30-minute coffee-drinking session at Bovina Restaurant. Friends, enemies and indifferents are welcome to visit with the gubernatorial candi-

date during his brief stop here. As far as we know, he's only man in governor's race, or any other state-wide race, who has plans to bring his campaign to this community, which was once, and may again, the Democratic stronghold of Parmer

Yarborough ran for lieutenant governor in '60 against veteran Ben Ramsey. He managed for 630,000 votes while taking his licking.

A couple of his campaign slogans are "A TEXAN to put Texas FIRST" and "Make Texas No. 1" His campaign literature points out that he wants to make Texas first in the nation in personal income, job opportunities, education, industrial growth, parks and roads and old age assistance.

Our honest, and probably stupid, opinion is that Marshall Formby of Plainview will get largest number of votes in Bovina's ballot box in first primary. "He's a good candidate and from our part of the state," is reason most often given by Formby supporters. At the same time, his supporters give him little chance of making the

run-off. Should Yarborough make the run-off, and Formby not, we daresay that Bovina's votes would favor Yarborough.

If memory serves us correctly, Yarborough will be first state-wide candidate to visit Bovina since '56 when another Yarborough (Ralph) was here for a coffee-drinking session. The two are not related.

On local political level, this is the election week of the year. Bovina voters scratched ballots for a new mayor yesterday (Tuesday) and those who live in city limits will have opportunity to use their ballotmarking pencil three times Sat irday.

There are two city elections. being held jointly, as well as trustee election.

It's a pretty good idea to take time and trouble to express your opinion via ballot box, Doing so, remember, gives you the right to complain about outcome of that particular election.

If you don't exercise your right to mark a ballot, nobody has to listen to you complain unless they want to. If you do, you get the floor your share of the time during complaint sessions.

Knowing this isn't going to make anyone go to the polls who wouldn't anyway, but in local elections, especially, winners and losers alike like to know that they were elected or defeated by a majority of the citizenry and not by a soreheaded minority.

Also, if a majority of the people vote it helps keep that aforementioned soreheaded minority out of control.

Bovina, we're happy to point out, hasn't been handicapped by a small number of voters or a large number who ignored elections.

Sometimes, we'll admit, it's hard to get things stirred up enough to get people to take any action prior to an election, but come election time and a good percentage of the people will express themselves.

If all Bovina farmers go to Falcon Lake who have been talking about it lately, there's going to be more Bovinians there than here one of these days.







The industry in general reported a good first half during 1961, with demand and profits rising along with general business activity after a tough year in 1960. But by the year's end, production was ahead of demand. The industry will open the new year with a surplus of products.

"It is estimated that for the entire year 1961, demand will show an increase of only about one per cent over 1960," L. F. Mc-Collum, president of Continental Oil Co. and newly-elected chair-

Bank Deposits Production Exceeds Demand As Oil Industry Enters '62

McCollum expects the new year to begin with inventories of crude oil and refined products at a record high of more than 800 million barrels, about 10 per cent above the level at which he believes the industry "could operate efficiently and still have products sufficient to meet any unforeseen contingencies.

By year's end, average nationwide wholesale prices for refined products had declined 5.4 per cent since February and were 3.2 per cent below the level of a year

Is this likely to change in 1962? "The prospects for better prices and earnings during 1962 would be much improved if the anticipated 2.5 to 3 per cent increase in demand were to be met by drawing from existing inventories rather than stepping up refinery


runs." McCollum said. The new API chairman also called for recognition of over-capacity in nearly all phases of oil operation, including increased production of natural gas products and imports.

The foreeast called for a 2.6 per cent increase in demand for liquid hydrocarbons (compared with a 7.7 per cent growth in Gross National Product); a reduction of 76.000 barrels per day in inventories: an increase in natural gas liquids of 31,000 barrels a day and a domestic crude production of 7.185 .-000 barrels per day - unchanged







Parmer County farmers are viewing the developments in the case against the Estes Enterprises with keen interest but have escaped direct involvement

A check on chattel mortgages at the courthouse failed to reveal any mortgages of undue size or without ample reason.

In addition, the number of tanks mortgaged in the county is not apparently out of line with the number of tanks actually needed in county operations. A full check of county records was conducted about six weeks ago in an effort to determine whether mortgages similar to those discovered in Reeves County also existed here. Results were negative.

Several farmers with ammonia contracts with Associated Growers of Friona have voiced some apprehension concerning the assurance of future delivery according to their agreement. Any statement concerning the future operation of Associated Growers of Friona would be speculative.

Several thousand dollars have been paid by farmers as advance payments on ammonia contracts in consideration of the present low price, according to information supplied by farmers in the area. The exact figures are not available.

No action has been taken against the company and no report as to the future operation of the company is accessible at this time.

Although farmers do not agree with the illegal operations of the Estes Enterprises, they have reaped a sizeable profit due to lower prices paid for ammonia since Estes entered the field.

Ammonia prices fell from around seven cents per pound to a low of two and one-half cents per pound in the county after Estes and his associates entered the field. According the reliable reports, ammonia sold at less than cost during the lowest price period.

Several reports of illegal transactions of ammonia during the past five years have been received by Parmer county newspapers, but no undeniable proof has been obtained at pre-

Although the question is far from settled, present indications are that Associated Growers' operations in Parmer county will continue.
