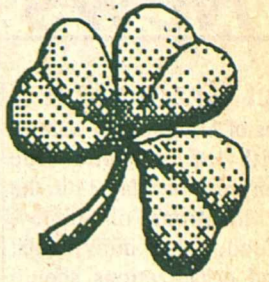


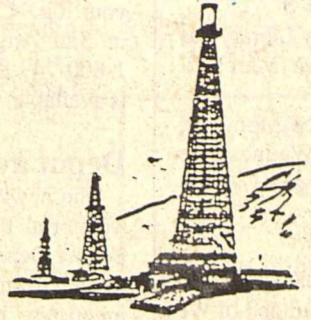

Annual Ram Performance Field Day scheduled for Thursday, March 12

The Annual Ram Performance Test Field Day and Sale is March 12 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES), 28 miles south of here.

Dr. Maurice Shelton, test coordinator, said more than 250 rams from some of the world's top finewool flocks are now completing the 140-day test.

"Only the top 30 percent of the animals finishing will be eligible for the sale," said Shelton. "By sale day, each ram will have been kept or culled on such critical traits as breeding soundness, rate of gain and wool characteristics."

The day begins with an informal ram inspection period ending at 11:45 a. m. for lunch. The "Dutch-treat" meal is catered annually by the Sutton County 4-H Club.

At 1 p. m. the formal education program will start under the guidance of Dr. Carl Menzies, San Angelo TAES resident director. The session will open with Uvalde-based Extension sheep and goat specialist Dr. Frank Craddock speaking on using performance data to improve sheep. Shelton will

follow with some personal thoughts and suggestions concerning the test and his long association with it.

Commenting on the 1991-92 test will be Dr. Chris Lupton, TAES wool and mohair laboratory head at San Angelo.

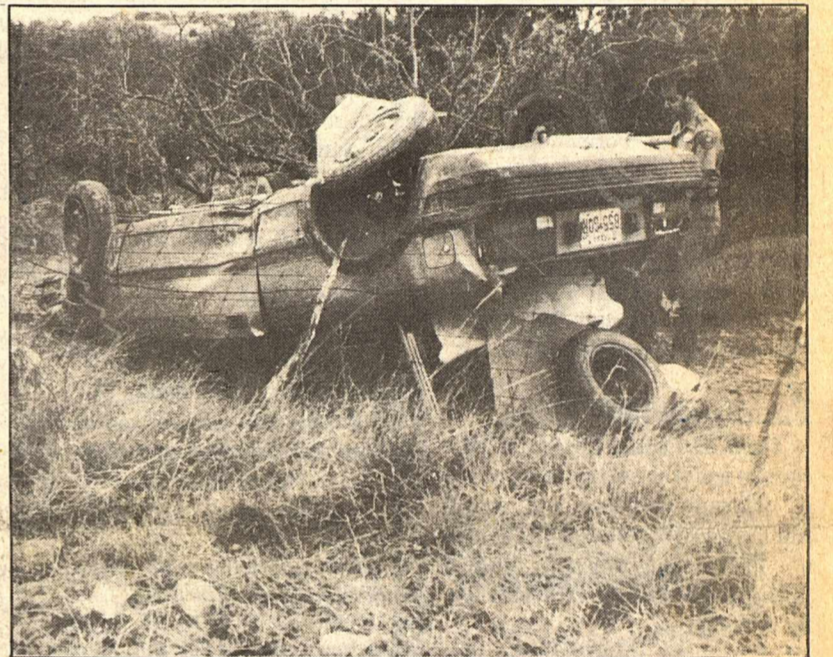
Angelo man dies in one car rollover

Simon Vance Moore, 18, of San Angelo, died Sunday of injuries received in a one vehicle accident 4 miles from Sonora. The driver of the vehicle, 17 year old Jody Brand Garrett, also of San Angelo apparently fell asleep at the wheel and failed to negotiate a curve on Hwy. 277 S., leaving the roadway on the right side. He then overcorrected and skidded into the bar ditch on the left side of the road

before rolling 2 1/2 times.

Both occupants were taken by Sutton County EMS to Hudspeth Memorial Hospital and later transferred to Angelo Community Hospital.

According to DPS Trooper Ruben Terrones, neither occupant was wearing a seat belt and both were thrown from the vehicle. It has not yet been determined if alcohol was involved.

Eat right with fruits and vegetables

Fruits and vegetables are an important part of a varied diet. Many fruits and vegetables are low in calories and fat and high in fiber, vitamins and minerals. The new Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommends increasing your fruit and vegetable consumption to a minimum of five servings each day, two fruits and three vegetables. A few simple steps can help preserve the nutrients in produce and improve the taste, texture and appearance. Select produce that is not damaged, bruised or wilted, since rough handling leads to vitamin loss. Choose dark green, orange and yellow fruits and vegetables. They are highest in beta-carotene (a precursor of vitamin A) which has been associated with lower cancer risk.

Fresh fruits and vegetables should be sun-ripened, then chilled immediately to preserve the content of vitamin A, vitamin C, folate and other nutrients. Also, don't wash produce until just before eating to conserve C and B vitamins. Wash

without soaking to prevent drawing out nutrients into the water. Don't peel your fruits and vegetables since many nutrients are contained in the skin. Rinse and brush thoroughly instead. Skins also contribute dietary fiber- an added bonus.

Prepare fruits and vegetables as close to serving or cooking time as possible to minimize exposure to air and light. Steam, stir-fry or microwave vegetables, since these cooking methods preserve the most vitamins. Cook vegetables until just tender-crisp. Overcooking destroys vitamins. If you must boil, use as little water as possible. Boiling, soaking or canning draws water soluble vitamins such as C and Bs, and minerals such as selenium and potassium, from the food into the pot.

After boiling, save the vitamins and minerals by using the remaining water in soups, stews or sauces. If you eat and enjoy plenty of fruits and vegetables, you can't help but eat right, America.

Was there really an "Eat More Lamb Club" in Sutton County?

In the March 6, 1931 issue of the Devil's River News the bold headline reads "SONORA LIONS RESOLVE TO EAT MORE LAMB MEAT".

In order to aid a great industry, that of the production of lambs, the Sonora Lions Club, at its regular luncheon Monday March 2, resolved:

That Tuesday of each week be designated as "Lamb Day," meaning that the meat consumption for that day will be LAMB in the household of every member.

Be it also resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to the various service clubs throughout West Texas for their consideration and endorsements for their local conditions.

W. E. James, Lions secretary, suggested that menus be furnished to meat purchasers, in order that the right manner of cooking might help the taste of the meat. It is likely that markets and stores will give recipe books with each order of lamb meat sold. The Eat More Lamb Club is preparing recipes and will soon distribute them.

W. H. Dameron, superintendent of the Experiment Station suggested the resolution. Jack Neill, cashier of the First National

Bank, said that less lamb is being eaten in the sheep producing sections than in other places, and that the producers should begin now in eating their own product. Robert Halbert declared that more sheep raisers should be joining the Eat More Lamb Club and should set an example by eating more lamb meat. John Eaton, manager of Central West Water & Power Company told the Lions that "we should practice what we preach."

B. Hamilton, manager of the Hamilton Grocery, said he would be glad to keep the meat in stock if the people would consume it. "Buzzy" Stokes, manager of Hall Bros. Grain Co., added that requests for lamb meat will demand business houses to handle it.

In this paper and for a while after we find advertisements for lamb being sold by local grocery stores to support the "Eat More Lamb Club." Gradually the ads disappear and we find no further mention of the group.

In the March 6th issue we also found the following:

SANTE FE REDUCES RATES TO FT. WORTH - In order that Sutton County ranchers may attend the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth at

reduced rates, the railroad has reduced the round trip passenger rates, Sonora to Ft. Worth to \$13.85 from March 7 to 15.

Also Mrs. Buster Halbert entertains the Two-Bit Club in three tables of bridge at her ranch home. Mrs. Joe Hull was hostess to the Baptist Woman's Missionary Union at her home. There were 14 members present. Representative Claude B. Hudspeth was hospitalized in Baltimore with a serious illness. Water users were petitioning for better service in the south part of town and Del Rio Mohair was selling for 29 and 24 cents.

Federal Land Bank reduces fixed rates 2%

AUSTIN - Fixed rate loans for the purchase of agricultural land or rural homes fell to 8.20% this week, local Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs) announced.

The new rate is 2% less than the previous fixed rate available for these loan purposes and is the lowest fixed rate FLBAs have offered in several years.

Up to \$50 million is available for loans through this program, which features a 10-year fixed rate after which the borrower can convert to either a variable rate, or select another fixed rate. Loan payments are amortized for up to 40 years.

"On a typical \$65,000 loan, the new rate means a yearly savings of \$1,300 to a home or land buyer," said Michael R. Davis, president of the Farm Credit Bank of Texas.

The Texas bank provides loan funds to 49 locally-owned FLBAs in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas. FLBAs have provided long-term agricultural and rural home financing for the past 75 years. Together, they have about \$2.7 billion in loans outstanding to more than 42,000 farmers, ranches and rural homeowners in the four-state region.

ICA holds monthly meeting March 2

The Independent Cattlemen's Association held its regular monthly meeting and Dutch treat dinner on Monday, March 2 at the Sutton County Steakhouse.

Present were Preston Faris, guest speaker, Johnston Holekamp, David Shurley, M. D. Shurley, George Wallace, Martha Wallace and Judge and Mrs. Troy Williams of Ozona and Ruth Espy.

Preston Faris presented a informative presentation on the Africanized Killer Bee. The bee spreads 200 to 300 miles a year, and at present has been found as far as Edinburg, Texas. The bees are very aggressive, and if a person approaches there hive within 40 feet they will swarm in attack.

Interesting to know that the African bee and the domesticated bee are identical in appearance and toxicity.

Sevin dust or spray will kill the bees.

The blue boxes posted in trees in different areas were placed at locations by the USDA in order to keep a close watch on the approach of the killer bee.

The African bee will be devastating to the honey raisers in Texas if the bees were to intermingle with the domesticated bee. The loss in honey production would be in the millions of dollars.

Social Security news

Anyone who receives Social Security benefits and who continues to work has to report his or her earnings to two government agencies -- the Social Security Administration (SSA) and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Earnings must be reported to IRS for tax purposes and to SSA because they may affect the amount of benefits payable.

"The fact that both SSA and IRS have an April 15th filing date apparently causes some confusion about the need to file both reports," said Edwin Draughon, Assistant District Manager.

"Sometimes, Social Security beneficiaries think filing an income tax return takes care of the Social Security earnings report requirement," he said. "And while the IRS does share tax return information with SSA, the tax return does not provide all the information that SSA needs."

A second confusing area, according to IRS officials, occurs when Social Security beneficiaries think that they do not need to file a tax return if their income is under the Social Security earnings limit -- in 1991, \$9,720 for people 65 through 69; \$7,080 for people under 65. But there is no connection between the Social Security earnings limits and the requirement to file an income tax return.

A third confusing area arises when Social Security beneficiaries request an extension of the filing date for their income tax return and assume that they will also get an extension of the filing date for their Social Security earnings report.

"Again, the two reports to our two agencies are not related," said Draughon. "And any action taken by one agency does not affect what is required by the other. However, we always try to do all we can to clear up this confusion, and anyone with a question can call Social Security's national toll-free number of 1-800-772-1213. Or call our office. The number is 949-4608."
