

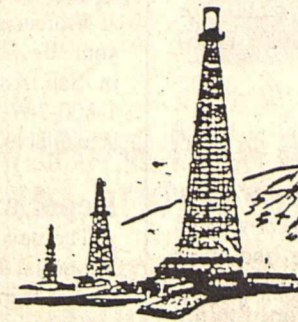

**OFF TO CNFR-** Southwest Texas Junior College sophomore, Duane Jones of Sonora has recently qualified for the College National Finals Rodeo in Bozeman, Montana. Jones won the Saddle Bronc Riding Championship in Southern Region of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association.

## Jones brings home championship title

Duane Jones, the confident but quiet cowboy from Sonora, has been plagued with mishaps in college rodeo throughout his collegiate career. However, he refused to be denied in 1992 and won the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association Southern Region Saddle Bronc Riding Championship.

The third week in June Duane will be competing in the College National Rodeo Finals in Bozeman, Montana against the top collegiate cowboys. Currently he is ranked third in the NIRA standings.

Jones, a 22-year old Criminal Justice Major at Southwest Texas Junior College, was the regional favorite to win the 1992 Saddle Bronc Riding Championship, due to his experience. He didn't let anyone down, but the ten rodeo intercollegiate season wasn't a bowl of cherries for Jones.

Every rodeo he faced stiff competition from McNeese State University Cowboys and even his teammate Johnny Pollock. He had to fight for the title down to the last intercollegiate rodeo held at Hill College in Hillsboro.

This championship title filled a void in Jones' life as he has been faced with upset after upset since enrolling in college two years ago.

During the school year of 1990, Duane was a contender for the All Around and Saddle Bronc Riding Titles in the Southern Region. When a bull stepped on his knee, tearing ligaments, 90% of his cartilage and severed several tendons. This not only took away his hopes of winning Collegiate Titles for that school year, it put him out of competition for nine months.

Duane never gave up. Through therapy, the support of proud parent's, Herbert and JoAnn Jones, and friends like Mack Altizer, he progressed and a year later he mounted his first Saddle Bronc riding horse in the SWTJC practice arena.

"This was a very apprehensive, but exciting moment for everyone that day. I was nervous for Duane, but once he conquered the horse - I knew he was back," Roy Angermiller, SWTJC Rodeo Coach stated.

Next, just this year, Duane lost his brother in an auto accident.

"I had promised my brother that if I qualified for the CNFR, that I would take him with me. Therefore, I will be riding for him and I know he will be there in spirit," Jones stated.

## Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District

In our last article, we reported that the controversial sections of the Pump Installer's Rules had been eliminated, which was true at that particular time. However, the Texas Water Commission staff came out with a draft of those rules in April which still included some of the controversial sections (pump installer reports, chlorination, disinfection and surface completion standards). A meeting was then held in late April with the staff of the Texas Water Commission, certain legislators and underground water district managers. After some discussion and forthright remarks by key legislators, the TWC staff agreed to delay adoption of the proposed rules until the legislature reconvenes.

Many of you may be aware that the Texas Water Commission has declared a portion of the Edwards aquifer to be an underground river which makes it subject of state control. The state has authority over rivers, but groundwater is owned by the landowner. The TWC stated the reasons for this action as follows:

- 1) To stop Federal intervention because of an endangered species lawsuit which requires maintaining flow at Comal and San Marcos Springs.
- 2) Protection of the City of San Antonio for which the

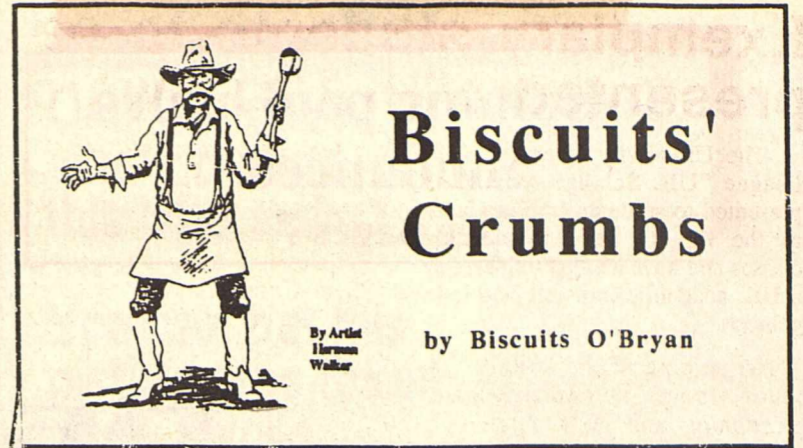
Edwards Aquifer is sole municipal water supply for more than 1.5 million South Central Texans.

3) Usage is getting close to exceeding average annual recharge and shortage could not occur if not regulated.

John Hall, chairman of the Texas Water Commission, stated, "It is not our goal to regulate groundwater on a statewide basis."

In the past, the state has been careful to insure that any regulation of groundwater is done at the local level through local water districts such as ours (the Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District). Local control allows for rules and regulations that treat everyone equally. When the state has control, they provide a permit process on a "first-come/first-serve" basis with the oldest permit getting water before the others. The concept of water districts has been successful because it allows the local people the freedom to determine conservation methods and guidelines which benefit their particular area through local control.

The followign directors were reelected at the May 2, 1992 election to serve three year terms: Clay Hicks, Pct. 2; Norm Rousellot, Pct. 3; and Joe David Ross, Director at Large.

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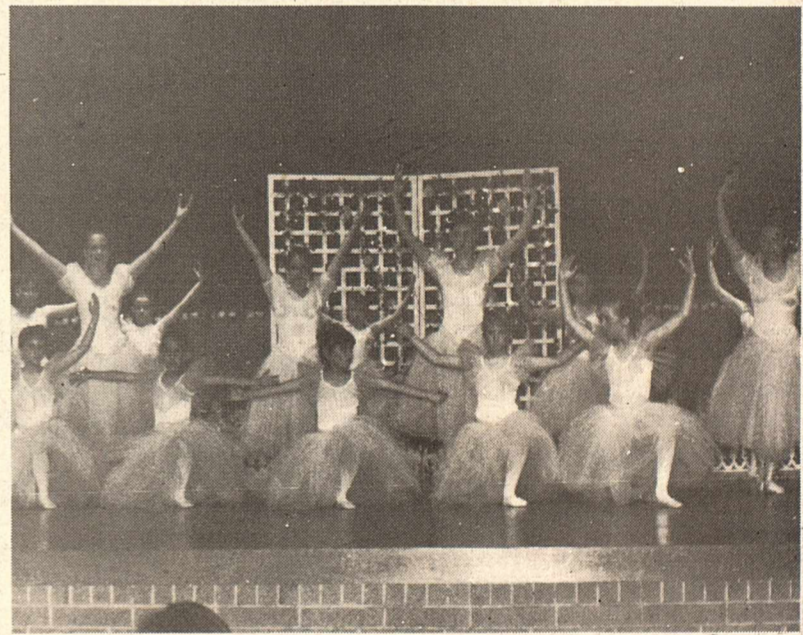

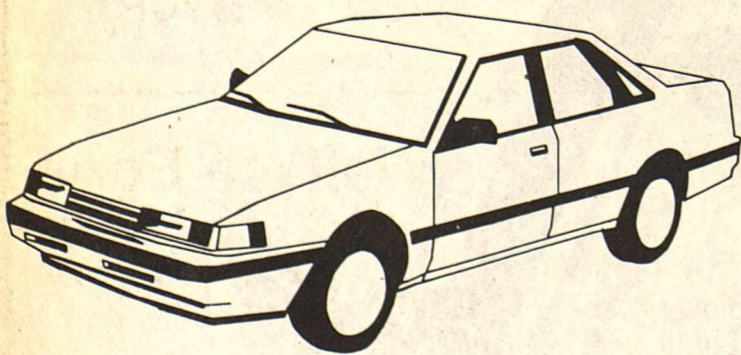

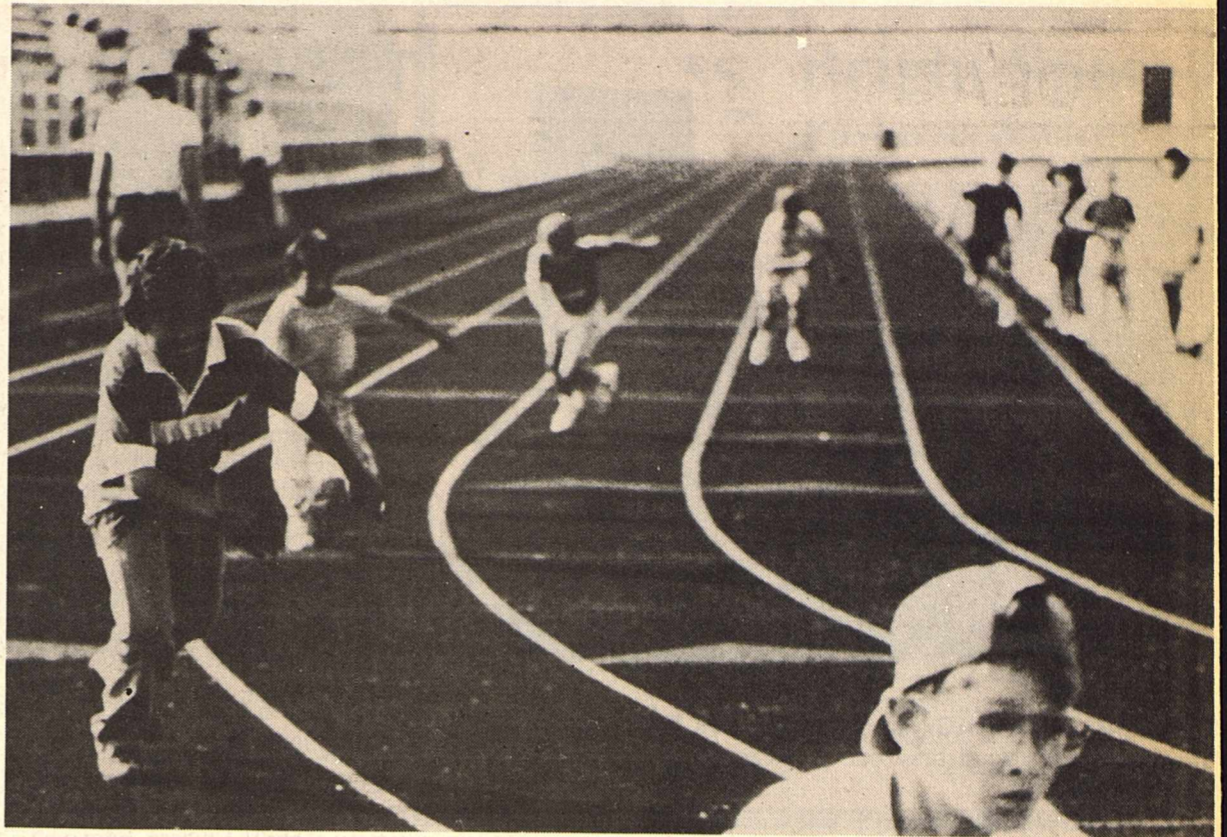
Several awards were presented to



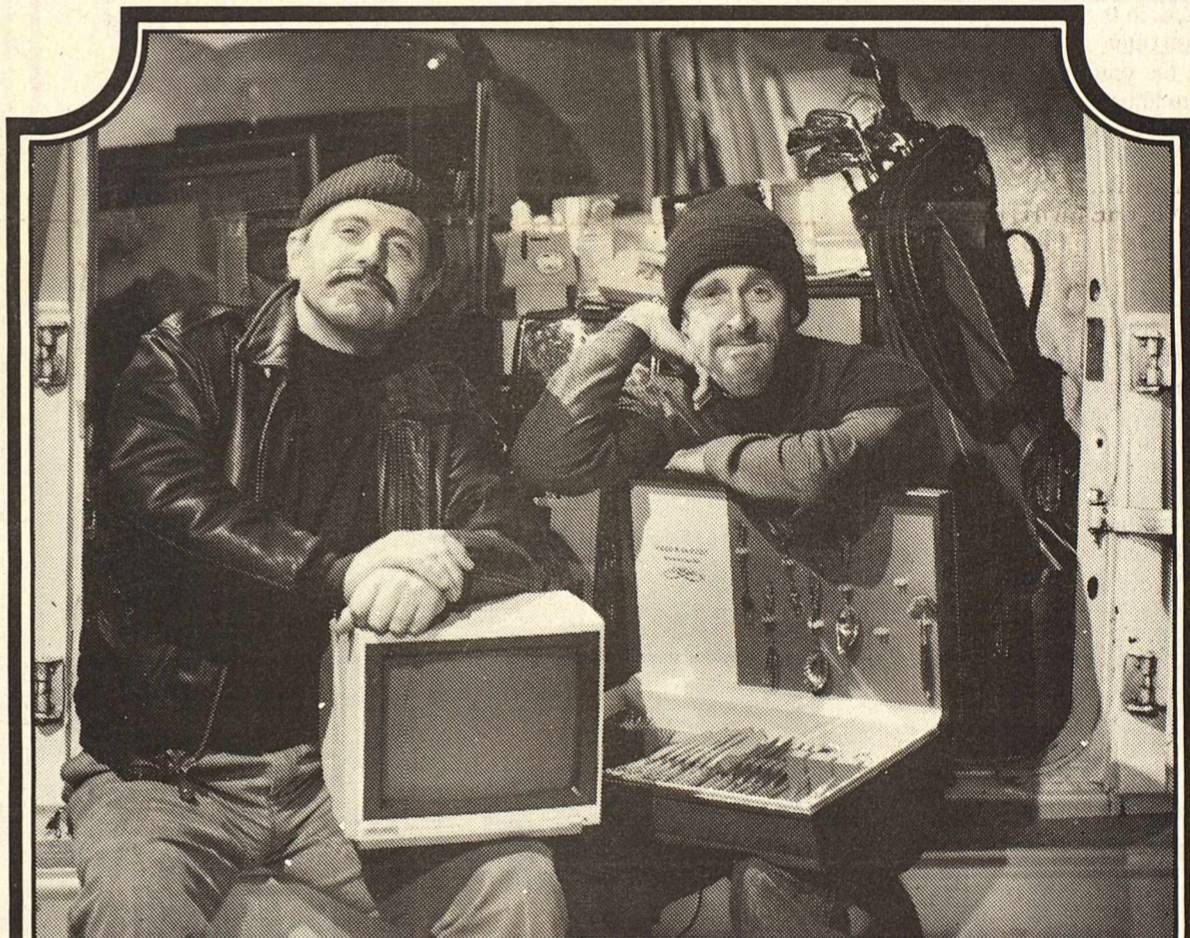

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## TxDot receives award in recognition of safety belt use

SAN ANGELO - The San Angelo District of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has won a place on the U. S. Department of Transportation's "70% PLUS Honor Roll" in recognition of a safety belt use rate of 82%.

TxDOT Executive Engineer Arnold W. Oliver, P. E., presented the plaque to District Engineer Walter McCullough, P. E. at the Annual Awards Banquet held recently in Ozona.

The 70% Plus Award is a National Highway Traffic Safety Association (NHTSA) program designed to encourage safety belt use by organizations with a

membership of at least 100. To qualify, the organization must take two surveys thirty days apart, and both must show at least a 70% safety belt usage rate.

Surveys were taken in the 17-county San Angelo District in May and June of 1991, and the results of both surveys were an 82% compliance rate. The current statewide rate now stands at approximately 67%.

In addition to the plaque, the San Angelo District's name will be placed on an honor roll at the National Highway Traffic Safety Association offices in Washington, D. C.

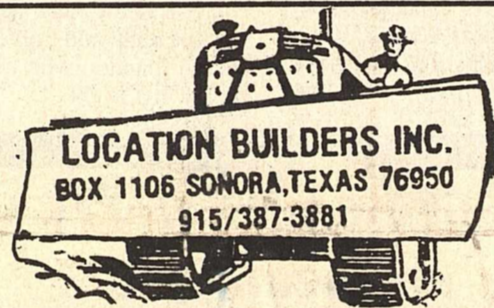

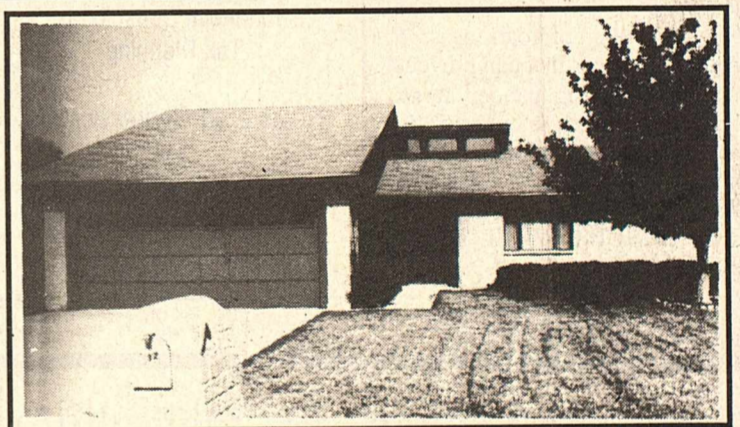
