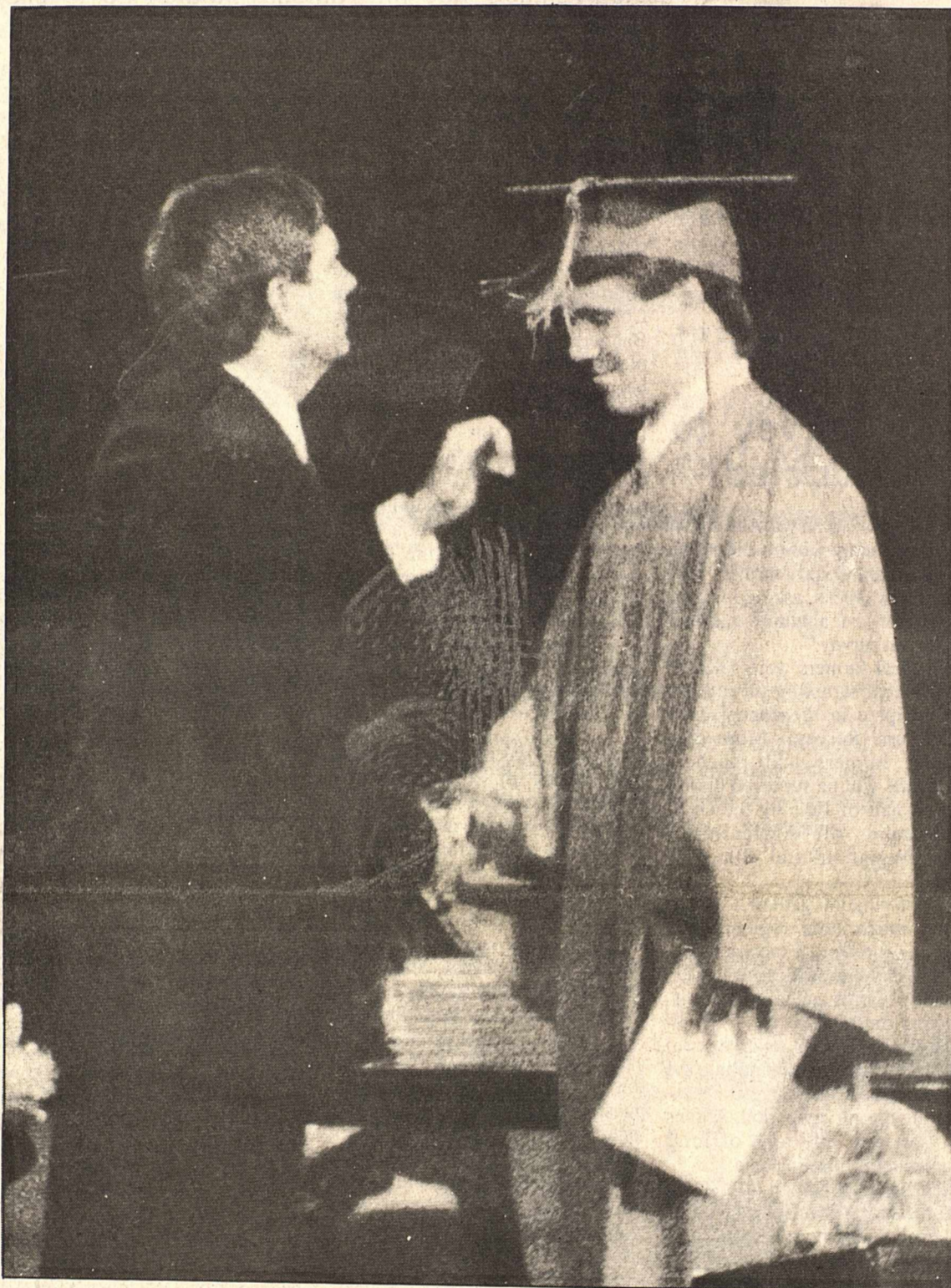

City council names new city manager

In a meeting of the Sonora City Council, held last Thursday, a Hill Country native was unanimously appointed to fill the position of city manager. John L. Pape, currently the assistant city manager of Weslaco in South Texas, will officially take office in Sonora on June 22.

Pape received a Bachelor of Science degree in Human Services from the University of Alabama and has a strong background in economic development. He has also served as director of economic development, chief of police, and civil service director in Weslaco.

In a telephone interview with the Devil's River News Thursday morning, Pape expressed great enthusiasm about his move to Sonora. He noted that Sonora's beauty and friendliness were very appealing. A New Braunfels native, Pape is glad to be moving closer to his family home.

Pape and wife JoAnn, plan to be moving to Sonora in mid June.

Waste disposal could cost Texas towns more than bargained for

These days city officials have every reason to be concerned with solid waste disposal.

Throughout the country, landfills and potential landfill sites are disappearing. By 1993 it is expected that there will only be 3,300 landfills in operation and by the year 2000 only 2,200. It will be worse in densely populated areas.

The Texas Water Commission (TWC) now requires landfill pits to be lined to insure that no migration leachate (rain water that passes through the trash) enters the water table or groundwater source. Monitoring wells around the perimeter of the landfill are now required to insure that leachate protection systems are working. Solid waste has to be covered daily with 6 inches of soil to prevent insects, rodents and other problems, and after each cell at the site is filled, an additional 3 feet of soil has to be placed on top.

The City of Sonora is now waiting to hear from the TWC on whether they will allow "West Texas Variances", regulation that would be more flexible and practical. Mandating fixed standards for all sanitary landfills is cost prohibitive. It is the sparsely populated towns that will pay the most.

Recycling programs can help to reduce the waste stream but will probably remain voluntary. The

City of Sonora now accepts aluminum, glass, and metal at the site location on Water Street. The major problem is that there is not always a market.

Contracting out the solid waste service does not solve all the

Sonorans pay less than others for waste disposal

Five dollars a month is the current rate Sonorans have to pay for monthly trash collection. Bagged or boxed yard waste is picked up on Fridays at no additional charge if the customer calls the city hall in advance.

Utility customers may also use the landfill without additional charge when they present a copy of their utility statement. This provision does not apply however, for those persons who have been hired to clean someone's yard, garage, vacant lot, or similar action. It also does not apply to contractors or others hauling waste of any nature from the site where they have furnished materials and/or labor in exchange for compensation.

Sonora's rates are low in comparison to many other towns of similar size. Ozona for example

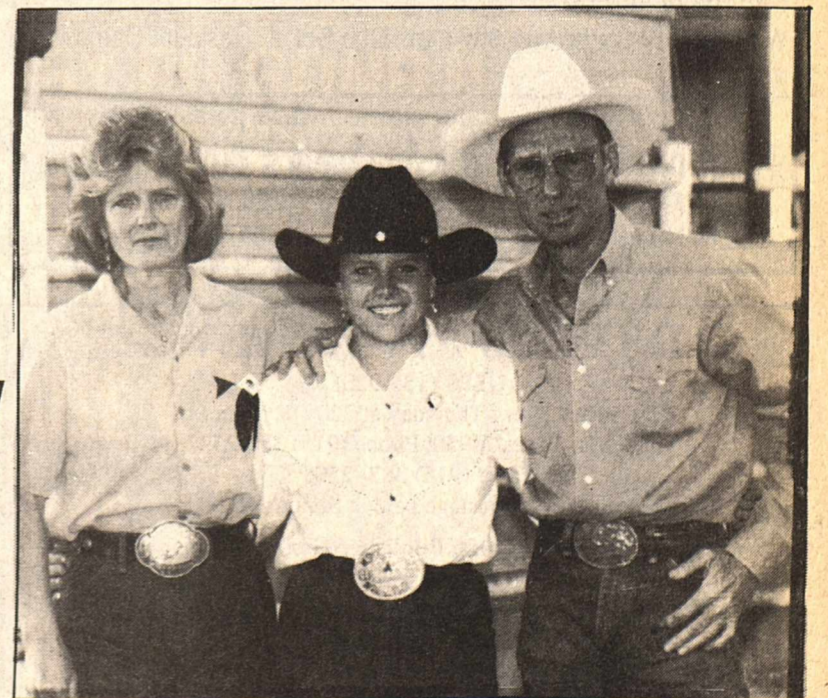
problems. At some point, probably not too far down the road,

Texans will have to make a choice regarding how high the price of solid waste disposal can go before major lifestyle changes have to be made.

currently charges \$9.50 for average residential trash pickup according to Alena Faye, a clerk with Ozona Water & Sanitation.

Pack-Rat Inc. out of Andrews contracted with Ozona in April of this year for solid waste disposal. The waste is taken from Ozona to a dump site in Big Springs. Rates for solid waste pick up in Ozona did not increase when the contract with the disposal company went into effect.

Sonora City officials, though unsure of what the future may hold, realize that the state has the responsibility of protecting the public health and of equitability applying all regulations to fulfill its statutory mandate. The officials are asking Sonora residents to bear with them through the many changes that will occur over the next few years.

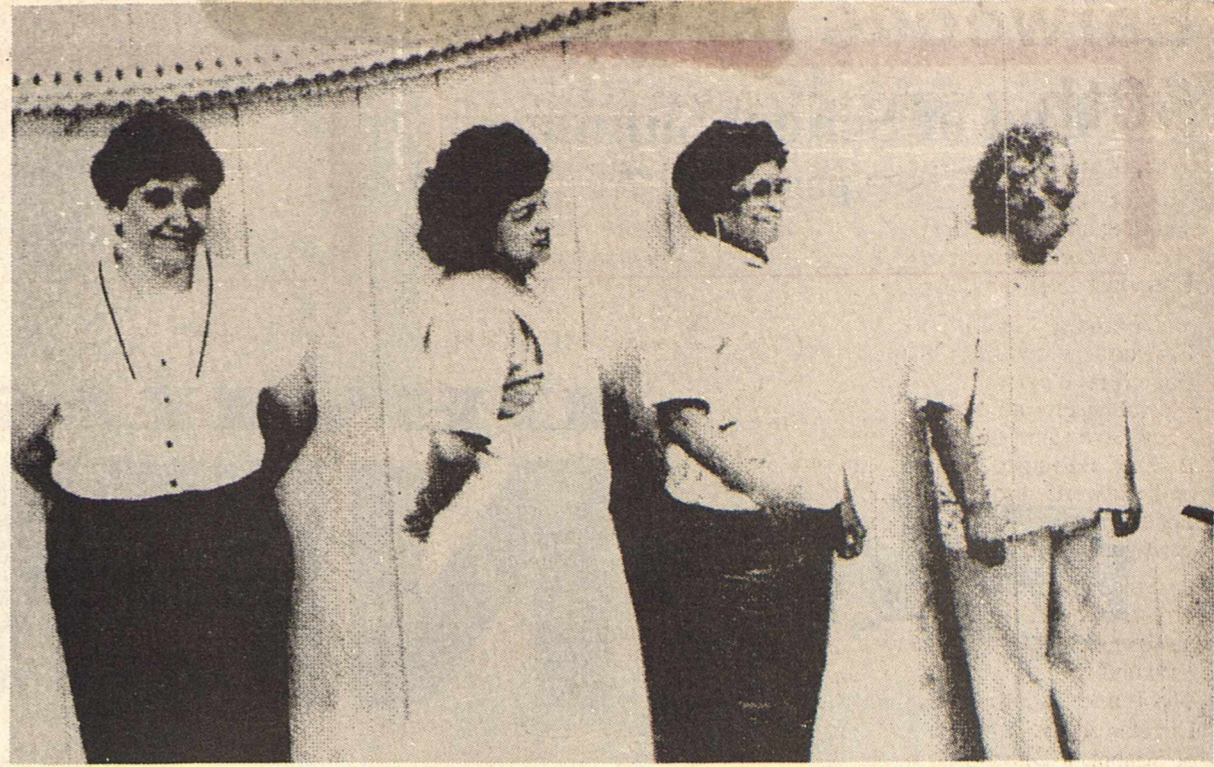

Dear Editor,

I am currently serving as a helicopter pilot aboard USS John Hancock (DD-981) in the North Red Sea. My ship and the embarked helicopter detachment will soon be returning to our homeport of Mayport, Florida. I would like to provide some information about my cruise for possible publication as an article in The Devil's River news. I thought my grandmother, Mrs. Jack Neill, my cousin, Mrs. Edward Earwood, and all my friends in Sonora might get a kick out of such a story.

The name of my helicopter detachment is HSL-42, Det Ten. Our nickname is the "Stoney Rangers". We embarked USS John Hancock on December 2, 1991 for what was supposed to be a six-month Mediterranean deployment. USS John Hancock is a Spruance class destroyer, her main missions are anti-submarine warfare (ASW) and strike warfare. She is equipped with the same Tomahawk missiles that saw great success in the Gulf War. The helicopter detachment consists of five pilots and one helicopter, an SH-60B "Seahawk."

When we deployed, we were all set to spend six months in the Mediterranean conducting ASW exercises and visiting beautiful European ports. During the first six weeks of the cruise, we visited the Greek Islands of Crete and Corfu, and spent Christmas and New Year's in Haifa, Israel. The highlight of the Israel port visit was the tour of Nazareth and the Sea of Galilee, followed by Christmas Eve service at the Church of the Annunciation in Nazareth.

In mid-January, however, it became apparent that the Mediterranean portion of the deployment was over. We had been ordered to proceed through the Suez Canal en route to the Persian Gulf.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff had decided that they wanted the ship's Tomahawk missiles in position to strike Iraq if Saddam Hussein did not cooperate with U. N. inspection teams. While in the Persian Gulf, we flew many surveillance missions to observe the Iraqis repairing oil platforms that had

been bombed by the U. S. during the war. Twice, while in the Persian Gulf, we visited the Arab Emirate of Bahrain, where the main attractions were the exotic Arab cuisine and good deals on gold and Persian rugs.

After about six weeks in the Persian Gulf, we were called to duty in the North Red Sea, where we would support U. N. sanctions against Iraq. Warships from the U. S., France, Canada, and Australia comprise the Maritime Interdiction Force (MIF) and conduct boardings of merchant ships bound to and returning from Iraq. The helicopter's role in these boardings is to provide armed aerial surveillance of the merchant ship and her crew until the boarding team arrives and conducts an initial security sweep. The helicopters are also used extensively for passenger, mail, and cargo transfer to and from the ships in the MIF. The only liberty port visited in the Red Sea was Hughada, Egypt, a small, sandy city whose main attraction was the telephones made available to call home.

It's all drawing to a close now. Soon we will be on our way back through the Suez Canal, back across the Atlantic to Florida. Our arrival in Mayport is scheduled for the 6th of June. I especially look forward to seeing Carolyn and Edward Earwood's new daughter, Meredith Elizabeth, when I visit Texas in July. I recently learned that I will be the child's godfather; I'll be sad to miss the late May baptism at St. John's Episcopal Church, but I am excited to have been chosen to be her godfather.

I would sure appreciate your publication of whatever portion of this information you see fit.

To be quite honest, I would be more excited about seeing a story in The Devil's River news than in any of the papers in my hometown of San Antonio.

Farm survey to be conducted

AUSTIN - Chester Ahrens of Gillespie County will be calling on several Sutton County farmers over the next few weeks, asking for their cooperation on a major national agricultural survey.

The local farmers were selected by statistical sampling procedures to participate in the annual June Agricultural Survey. More than 125,000 farmers and ranchers nationwide will be surveyed during the first half of June by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service.

The information gathered will be used to make State, regional, and national estimates of crop acreage, grain stocks, livestock inventories, number of farms and land in farms, and other statistics.

The Texas Agricultural Statistical Service in Austin is handling the Texas portion of the survey.

During the survey period, Ahrens will work as an official "enumerator" collecting data.

Rich Allen, chairman of USDA's Agricultural Statistics Board, explained the purpose of the survey like this: "We are seeking to develop reliable crop and livestock estimates in order to maintain an orderly marketing system."

He continued: "The estimates are a working tool to help farmers and ranchers in their production, marketing, and investment decisions," he said.

Allen added that USDA and university economists, extension agents, farm organizations, lenders, and others depend on the information. "Federal and State agricultural officials base many of their decisions on data collected in this survey," he said.

Ahrens said he wants to make sure that Sutton County farmers are properly represented in the State and national samples, so that local agriculture is reflected accurately in the survey results. Most farmers selected for interviews have already been notified by mail.

"Responses to survey questionnaires are strictly confidential," Ahrens said. Data about an individual's farm or ranch are used only in combination with reports from other producers. Results will be analyzed by USDA, which will report the findings in the next few weeks.

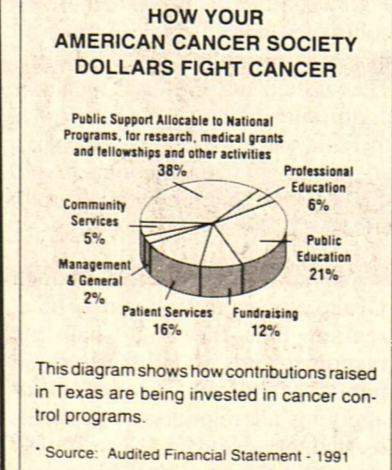

Classes to be offered for diabetes education

Diabetes has consistently ranked as one of the ten leading causes of death for Texans. In 1970, diabetes was the seventh most serious cause of death, and in 1980, it was the eighth. Hispanics, the fastest growing segment of the Texas population, are two to three times more likely to develop the diabetes than whites.

Effective diabetes control strategies such as early diabetes detection and screening of high-risk populations, education programs, and management training, access to routine health care, an intervention in the progress of complications will provide better health care and

reduce hospitalization, death and economic costs due to diabetes. As a community service the Texas Department of Health - Public Health Region 3 Field Office in Sonora will be starting a series of classes on diabetes education.

The series, which will be presented in English and Spanish, will start with "What is Diabetes" on June 11, from 4 - 5 p. m. (English class) at the Field Office clinic located at 211 Highway 277 North. The Spanish class will be held on Monday, June 15 from 4 - 5 p. m. at the same location.

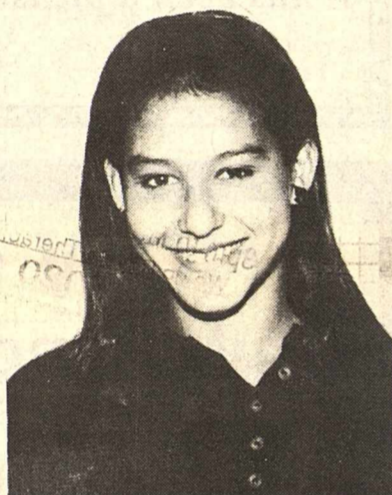
Richardson earns medal
