



## Fireworks safety should be every Texan's responsibility


The Texas Commission on Fire Mother Nature may not be as much help in preventing Fourth of July fires this year as she was in 1991. Executive Director Mike Hines said that wet weather in the summer of 1991 was one variable in the reduction of fireworks-related fires during the Fourth of July holiday.

"Wet weather during fireworks season certainly helps fire fighters," Hines said. "But every Texan should be responsible for preventing fires and injuries caused by fireworks by using them as safely as possible or by choosing another way to celebrate.

Fireworks-related fires in Texas decreased by 60 percent in 1991 compared to 1990 figures, according to Jean Mitchell, program manager of Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEXFIRS). TEXFIRS, a program of the Texas Commission on Fire Protection, collects data from 373 fire departments representing approximately 72.4 percent of the state population. In 1990, 1185 fireworks-related were reported to TEXFIRS; in 1991, 480 fireworks-related fires were reported.

Hines added, "Many cities in Texas have banned the use of fireworks within city limits. Although fireworks are still available, the ban has helped make the public aware of the potential fire problem."

State Fire Marshal Ernest rules in your community. Protection warns Texans that Emerson said the safety option is to leave fireworks to the professional technician. "If you choose to use fireworks, use appropriate safety measures," Emerson said. "Teach your children fireworks safety by letting them see that you are concerned about the damage fireworks can cause."



Using fireworks safely can reduce the number of fires and injuries caused by fireworks. The Texas Commission on Fire Protection offers 10 recommendations for safely using fireworks:

1. Purchase fireworks only from a vendor that displays a State Fire Marshal's Office retail fireworks

2. Remember that many cities and communities regulate the possession and use of fireworks. Contact the local fire department or law enforcement authorities for

3. Never let children use fireworks. Always designate a responsible, sober adult to ignite the fireworks.

4. Use fireworks outdoor only, in a clear area away from houses and flammable materials, such as grass, trees, gasoline can's or wooden decks. Be sure that the fireworks, especially aerial fireworks, will not contact or land on potentially dangerous objects, such as power lines or automobiles.

5. Keep a bucket of water nearby while setting off fireworks. Use the water to douse any malfunctioning fireworks or accidental fires and to immerse minor burns. Also use this bucket of water for disposing of used sparklers.

6. Keep everyone, especially children under 15 years old, a safe distance away from the area where

the fireworks are ignited. 7. Read and follow the directions

8. Never touch a firework after it has been lit. If the firework malfunctions, do not try to relight it or pick it up. Carefully douse all used fireworks with water.

9. Never experiment with fireworks. Don't take fireworks apart or mix anything with the contents. Never make fireworks at home. Don't set off fireworks in metal, glass or other types of containers.

10. After you have finished lighting fireworks, cool the remains with water. Then collect all used fireworks materials and put them in a metal container. Cover with water again to reduce the chance of an accidental fire.

"Even one fire from fireworks is one too many," Hines said. "Most of these fires can be prevented. The fun that children and adults have with fireworks can never equal the loss of lives and property caused by

## Teens arrested for felony theft after high speed chase

A high speed chase in Pecos the Ford dealership was contacted the Sutton County Jail.

McKay and Haga were charged with one count of Felony Theft each and bond was at \$20,000 by Justice of the Peace Adelita Smalling.

Would you be interested in hosting an exchange student from Australia, the Netherlands, or even Switzerland? The International Four-H Youth Exchange (IFYE) program can help you.


Beat Stampfli, age 26, is among the IFYE exchangees visiting Texas this summer.

## ASCS announces changes in spousal signature requirements

Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) announces Changes to spousal signature requirements. Changes to 1992 regulations have resulted in significant revisions on spousal signature requirements. Effective August 1, 1992, the signature requirement change will permit a husband or wife to sign on behalf of the other for most farm programs in which either has an interest. Written notification to the county office will be required to deny a spouse this authority.

This policy does not permit a husband or wife to sign on behalf of the other for a power of attorney authorization. Contracts and documents signed before the effective date can only be modified or terminated by the spouse who

The Sutton County Agricultural signed the contract or with a proper power of attorney.

REMINDER: Spousal signatures will be accepted without "power of attorney" unless written notification is filed in the county office objecting to this authority.

Signature requirements have been simplified for partnerships, corporations, etc. When the program document shows the name of the partnership, corporation, etc., the person signing needs only to sign his or her name and does not need to add capacity or title. (Generally the authorized signer has been designated in an agreement, affidavit, corporate charter, or other document and will have been designated on ASCS Payment Limitation forms for ASCS use.)
