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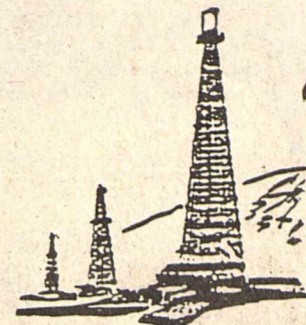

Sonora man arrested after early morning fight

A call early Saturday morning in reference to a disturbance at the corner of Dollie & Crockett Streets led to the arrest of a local man.

Shortly before 4:00 a.m. Sonora Police Officers Bryn Humphrey and Tim Jarrett had to chase down twenty-one year old Jeffery Harris of Sonora as he tried to flee the scene. Harris told officers he needed medical attention due to injuries received in a fight earlier that evening.

Harris was then transported to Hudspeth Memorial Hospital by Emergency Service Personnel. Treatment was refused and he was taken immediately into custody by Officer Jarrett and booked for public intoxication and disorderly conduct.

Joy-ride at Allison Park injures six

Five people were injured late Sunday evening when a joy-ride turned to tragedy.

According to a report filed by Texas Highway Patrol Trooper Norbert Ortiz, Rachel Pena Parker, 23, of Andrews was travelling east on Camp Allison Road when she lost control of her 1974 Jeep as it approached a dip. The vehicle continued through the dip sideways ejecting Parker and continued through the park area.

Nine year old Erby Moreno of Sonora unsuccessfully attempted to regain control of the jeep before it struck a tree ejecting four more

occupants. Three year old Amanda Gonzalez of Andrews was the only occupant not thrown from the vehicle.

Moreno, Cynthia Galindo, 14, Cheryl Galindo, 14, and Justin Parker, 5, all of Sonora were transported by Sutton County Ambulance to Hudspeth Memorial Hospital. Parker and Gonzalez were also taken to Hudspeth Hospital.

The accident victims received various lacerations, bruises, and abrasions. The occupants were not wearing safety belts.

According to Trooper Ortiz alcohol was a factor in the accident and charges are pending.

Sonora out to get Winn's

Sutton Co. Underground Water District offers water well testing

We have received the results for the groundwater samples taken for the Sutton County Water Conservation District's 1992 monitoring program. The sampling and analytical reporting was directed by R. W. Hardin & Associates, Inc. of Austin, Texas. This program is very important because it allows us to monitor any significant change in water quality over a period of time. We gathered information from approximately nineteen (19) wells throughout Sutton County. The individual wells were tested for over thirty (30) different constituents. In a brief comparison of the 1988 results on the same wells, the analysis appears very similar.

We have mailed these results to the individual well owners. If you know that your well was one of the monitor wells, but you have not received your results, please contact this office.

As stated in our last article, the Texas Water Commission (TWC) voted on April 15, 1992 to declare a portion of the Edwards Aquifer an underground river. This action would give the TWC the regulatory powers to require pumping permits and to limit the amount of water withdrawn from the aquifer. This action essentially voids the Texas "right to capture" laws of groundwater by private property

owners. Many landowners feel this infringes upon their private property rights. Several public hearings have been held around the state to allow individuals the opportunity to express their concerns over this matter. However, the TWC plans to move forward with pumping rules for the Edwards Aquifer (river?), but have agreed to hold off on putting them into effect until the legislature has an opportunity to act on this. A draft of these rules is to be published by mid-July. Our District personnel continue to monitor this situation and will try to keep you informed as best we can.

We continue to gather samples from domestic wells for analysis. If we have not yet been to sample your house well, we will be contacting you in the near future for a time to come collect a sample. This testing is done free of charge for the well owner. We are currently testing the following constituents: pH, temperature, conductivity, Total Dissolved Solids (TDS), nitrates, sulfates, chlorides, total coliforms and fecal coliforms (bacteria). Upon request, we will test for lead; however, there will be a \$5 charge to cover the cost of materials.

high school. At this time, the medical field has endless employment possibilities and, hopefully, we can take advantage of these opportunities for our students.

One of our responsibilities as educators is to address the needs of all students and not just the college bound student. Approximately 50% of our students attend college while the remaining 50% go directly into the work force. It is imperative that we strive to give all of our students every advantage possible as they compete in the job market.

The schedule of summer term classes is available through the Registrar's Office.

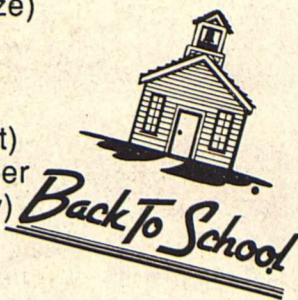

Most will remember it as the movie that earned Geraldine Paige a best actress Oscar. The characters are very real and moving. It is a play that adds greatly to our understanding of our senior citizens.

Schools due more state aid from Texas economy growth

The State of Texas will give local school districts a minimum of \$650 million more than current aid allotments when it meets in regular session next year to draw up a budget for the following two years.

And the new state aid could total even more, perhaps as much as \$1 billion.

The new state money will come from the state's economic growth and improvement.

Even though the economic recovery is measured, it is steady and expected to pump a minimum of \$650 million new tax dollars into the taxes which support state aid to the schools--from the gasoline tax to the sales and franchise taxes.

For instance, State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchinson has promised that the state is building toward a \$200 million cash balance on its books next month, and Comptroller John Sharp confirms this, saying that tax revenues are running ahead of projections. Further, Mr. Sharp says he will recommend further state budget savings.

This \$650 million in new state aid is being factored into every school finance idea now being considered or worked on by legislative leaders.

My office emphasized this to representatives of the many school interest groups in meetings with them within the last month on possible new school finance ideas.

With that kind of new money already scheduled for the schools, there is no room for any person or group to say that the Texas Legislature has gone back on its commitment to excellence and equity in our public schools.

The people of Texas have made it clear--and seem to make it even more clear with every passing new day--that they oppose new state taxes. I agree entirely.

To get by without new taxes will mean belt-tightening in all state services, including the education system, as well as adoption of Comptroller Sharp's recommended budget savings. But belt-tightening in the public schools will certainly be eased by the infusion of this \$650 million or more in new money.

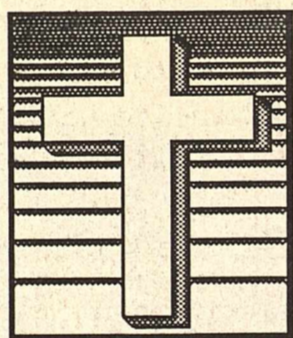
College News

4-H Record Books Workshop - County 4-H Record Books will be due in the county Extension office by 5:00 p. m. on Friday, July 17, 1992. In order to be eligible for the year pins or for any trip planned as a result of records, you must complete an overall record for the current year (up to date) and have it in by the time stated above.

A workshop to help answer questions and get new members on Wednesday, July 8 at 9:30 a. m. at the 4-H Center.

Forms are now available at the county office for pre-juniors, juniors and seniors. Bring your project record forms to the workshop and if you are really serious in record book competition you probably will want to bring a parent or leader as well.

Gold Star Awards Procedure - To be eligible for the Gold Star Award, a 4-Her must be 15 by January 1, 1992, must complete a 1992 overall awards program record, must have at least 3 projects, must show good leadership and must be involved in at least 3 other areas of 4-H activities (examples - method demonstrations, camps, leadership labs, etc.). Applications are due on August 10, 1992.

Awards Application Deadline - 4-H members who are interested in receiving a county award must complete the application form attached and return it to the county office by 4:30 p. m. on Monday, August 10, 1992. This includes the Gold Star, Earwood, and Glasscock awards, as well as all award program categories. While an overall record is not an absolute requirement, it is highly encouraged.

District 13 Prospect Lamb & Goat Show Set - The first ever District 13 only Prospect Show has been planned in Boerne for July 23-24. The show will be different than any you have yet attended. There will be several

recreational opportunities as well as clinics on selection, feeding, fitting and care at the show. If you are interested in attending, come by the office and get a set of rules.

Ewe Lamb class Faces Cancellation - Unless we have several people indicate an interest within the next month, the ewe lamb class at the county show for 1992-93 may be cancelled. Please let us know if you wish to participate in this part of the show.

Lamb Carcass Show - Remember to begin preparing your carcass lambs so that they will be ready for the show in October.

Market Lambs - The market lamb show will be held tentatively on January 16, 1993. If you plan to feed lambs and need assistance in purchasing them, you should notify us at the county office immediately. Many producers are already shipping their club lamb quality lambs and if we miss them they will be more expensive later, so call or drop by soon and let us know how many and what kind you need. There will NOT be a county sale or draw held this year.

Angora Goats - In order for goats to be eligible for the county show, they must be shorn on or after August 1, 1992. The show is tentatively set for January 9.

Swine - Remember there are two categories for the swine show this year. They are draw gilts and all others. The August newsletter will explain these in detail and will also have a form attached for you to complete if you want assistance with the draw or other category. The swine show is tentatively set for January 9.

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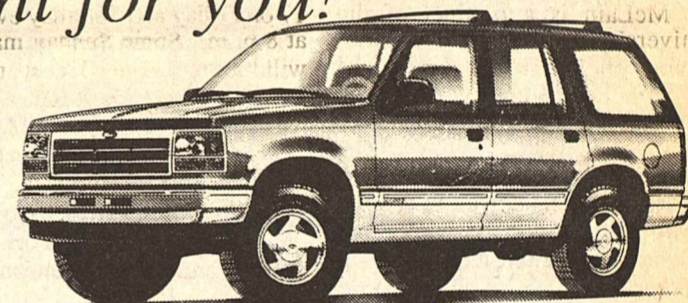
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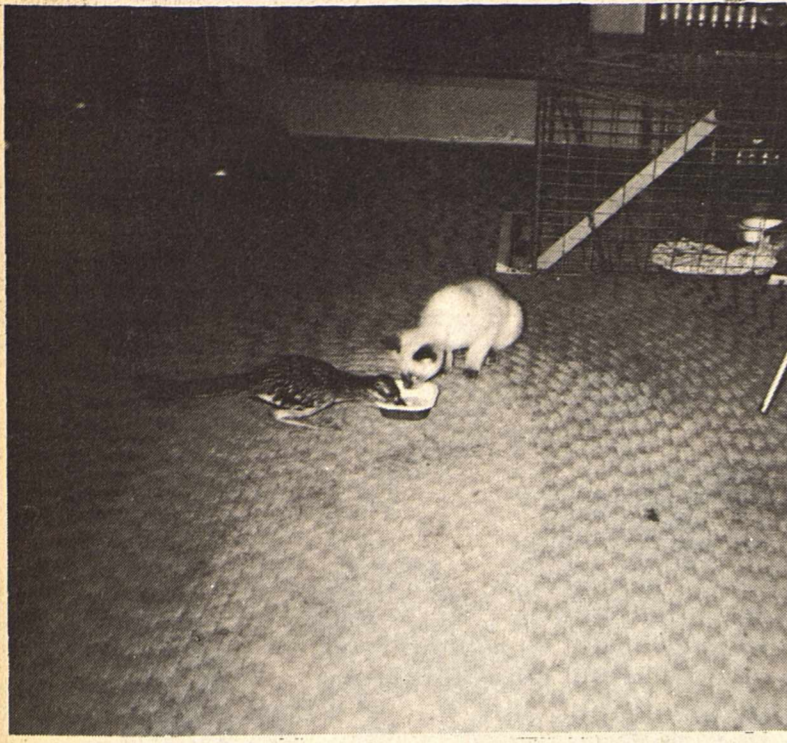

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Surber selected as All Star Track Coach for TGCA

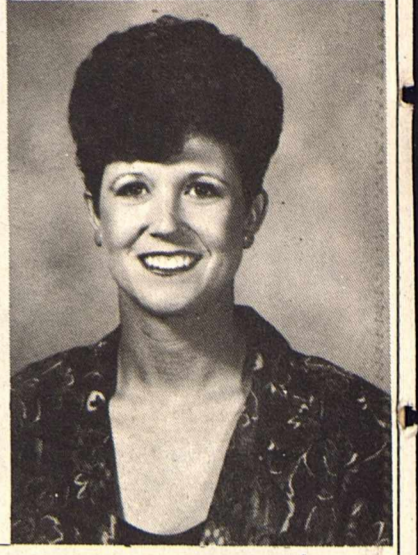
Irion County track coach, Nancy Surber, has been selected as a Division I All Star Track Coach of the Texas Girls Coaches Association.
