Stavley encouraged Sonora Lions that Municipal Solid Waste Land Fill (MSWLF'S) rules west of the "25 inch Rain Fall Line" were not quite as restrictive but that revised land fill criteria would ensure that MSWLF'S facilities are designed and operated in a manner that is protective of human health and environment.

Stavley quoted some statistics like; Texas moves 19.2 million tons of municipal Solid Waste per year. Three million tons of Texas waste is grass which could be composed.

Two EMS members attend special training

Emergency Medical Service were among about 200 attendees of a special training course on Critical Incident Stress Debriefing (CISD), June 25-28 in Austin. The course was sponsored by the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

CISD is a type of counseling for emergency workers in which fellow personnel in that field and mental health professionals guide a group discussion about stressful incidents, such as multiple deaths in a short period of time or other trauma incident situations. Experts estimate about 25 percent of EMS personnel leave their profession in four years because of such stress. Law Enforcement, firemen, dispatchers, and other emergency workers of this type also have a

large "burnout" rate. CISD course graduates from Sutton County were Ben Pool and Lenora Pool. Both received a scholarship to attend this course from the Texas Department of the state."

Members of the Sutton County Health for the advancement of far West Texas education. The graduates qualify for participation in the Texas Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) Network. The network consists of teams of mental health professionals and emergency workers from around the state who travel to emergency sites and lead debriefing sessions. They also give "pre-incident education," in which workers are educated about the warning signs of excess stress in the emergency field. Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Emergency Management recently added a toll-free number, 1-800-452-6086, to take requests for emergency personnel counseling.

"We're very proud of people who completed this course," said Paul Tabor, Coordinator of CISD, Bureau of Emergency Management in Austin. "Not only have they enhanced their own skills for use in Sutton County but they also will be able to help other people around
